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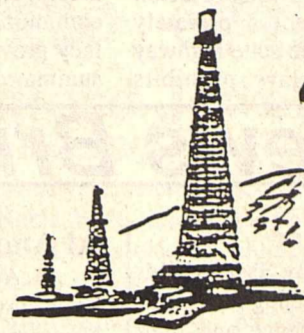

## Routh receives award for service

One of the state's premier crime-fighting organizations presented its 1992 Distinguished Police Office Award to Officer Michael W. Routh of the Sonora Police Department.

The award given by Associated Texans Against Crime (ATAC) was conferred on Officer Routh on Thursday, July 30, during a ceremony at the Sonora Police Department.

Presenting this award was ATAC executive director Zack Dawes. Ed Hodges, director of U. S. Senator Phil Gramm's regional office in San Antonio, also read a letter from Gramm congratulating Officer Routh for his years of service and dedication to the Sonora Police Department.

"The ultimate battle over crime and drugs will continue to be fought on the front lines by our local law enforcement officials. So I want to commend ATAC for recognizing the efforts of officers like Michael, who risk their lives every day to protect our homes, neighborhoods and communities," Gramm said.

The award is given to a police officer who best demonstrates a commitment to making the streets of Sonora a safer place to live, work and raise a family.

Officer Michael W. Routh has a proven record of persistence and attention to duty which has resulted in the successful resolutions of

many crimes in Sonora. His active participation in the youth of the community makes him an outstanding law enforcement officer and a much appreciated and valued citizen of the community.

Sonora Police Chief Brent Gesch told the Devil's River New that it was a difficult choice, however, Officer Routh had demonstrated outstanding qualities. "He's not a hero, but yet he is, stated Chief Gesch. It takes a hero to deal with everyone else's problems and fight crime and then be able to carry on his life as a family man, Christian, and community worker."

Officer Routh is active with Boy Scouts, 4-H Shooting Sports, Dare Program, and a member of the Church of Christ.

ATAC was founded in 1984 as an anti-crime public policy organization dedicated to studying the Texas criminal justice system, making recommendations to improve the system and increasing public awareness of criminal justice issues.

"ATAC is dedicated to supporting local law enforcement agencies in their efforts to stop the rising crime epidemic in Texas," Dawes said. "Our mission is to not only talk about the effects of crime, but to make a difference by bringing innovative solutions to this epidemic."

In the past eight years, ATAC's research and data have formed the background and basis for many policy revisions in the Texas criminal justice system.

The group has been instrumental in influencing legislation on making multiple murders a crime punishable by death, cracking down on illegal speed labs, preventing appeals based on technicalities in indictments, and making possession of child pornography a crime.

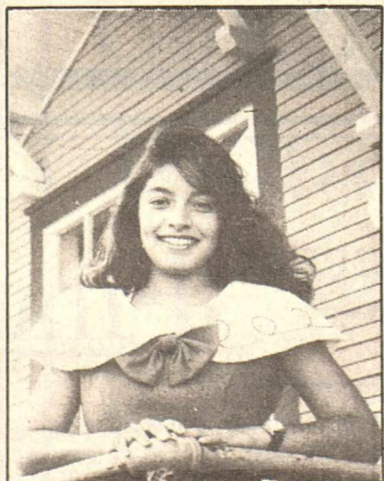
ATAC's comprehensive report on the Texas prison system also led to a major new prison construction and implementation of effective drug and alcohol rehabilitation programs.

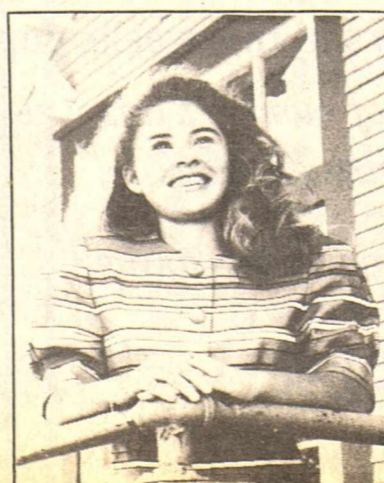

## Texas expands transportation alternatives

Privately owned roads may soon give Texans more transportation alternatives, add emphasis to border needs and expand infrastructure.

At its monthly meeting, the Texas Transportation Commission proposed new procedures for private entities or corporations to follow to obtain commission and Texas Department of Transportation approval to connect a privately owned road with the state highway system. State law prohibits

connecting privately owned roads with state highways, bridges or roads unless approved by the commission and the department.

There is a 30-day comment period once the procedures appear in the Texas Register.

The new rules also require that private entities or corporations hold at least one public hearing to ensure community participation and that they provide the department with a summary analysis and verbatim

transcript of the hearing.

"This is crucial. We want the public to have plenty of opportunity to voice their opinions about a privately owned road in their community and we want to know what they are saying," said commission member David Bemson of Beaumont.

According to the rules, to grant approval the commission and the department must also consider the project's effects on motorist's safety, local economies, the environment and the flow of traffic from the anticipated North American Free Trade Agreement.

Commission member Henry Munoz III of San Antonio said, "The border connections are the front doors to the state's economic future. We will ensure that projects in a county, or in part of a county, that share the border with the Republic of Mexico will not interfere with the free flow of trade."

Pillow bearers were Jennifer Serano and Steve Reyna. Train bearers were Bernadette Nunez and Alex Nunez.

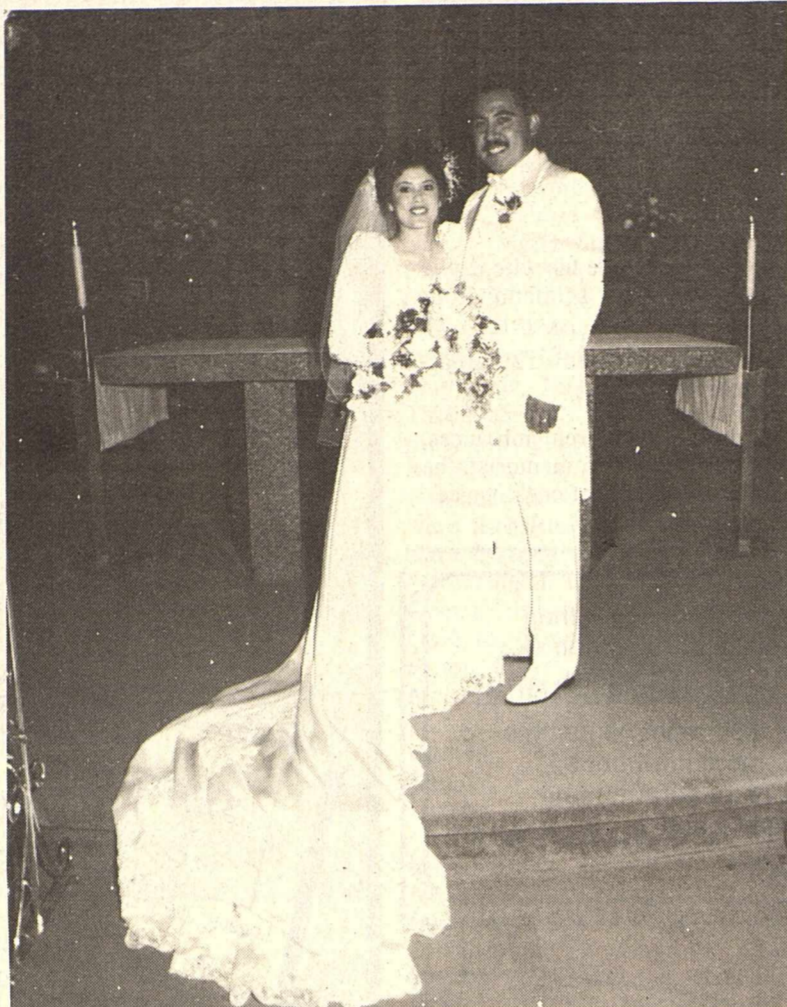
Mrs. Reyna is a graduate of Van Horn High School and is attending U. T. E. P.

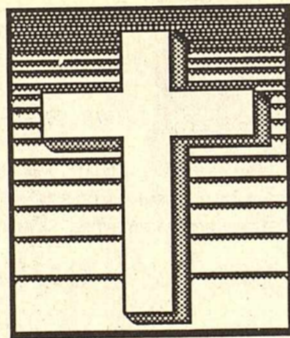

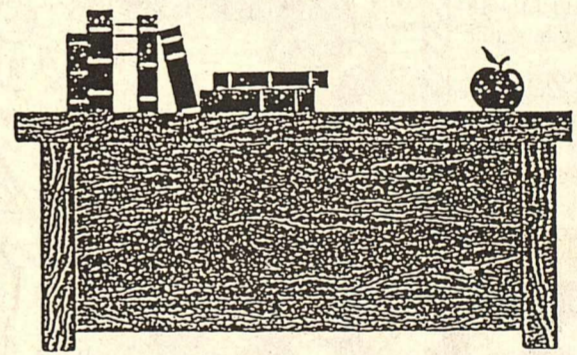

pizza. We have a serious obligation to provide services to those most in need. We do not have staff and volunteers available to keep us with our current clients!

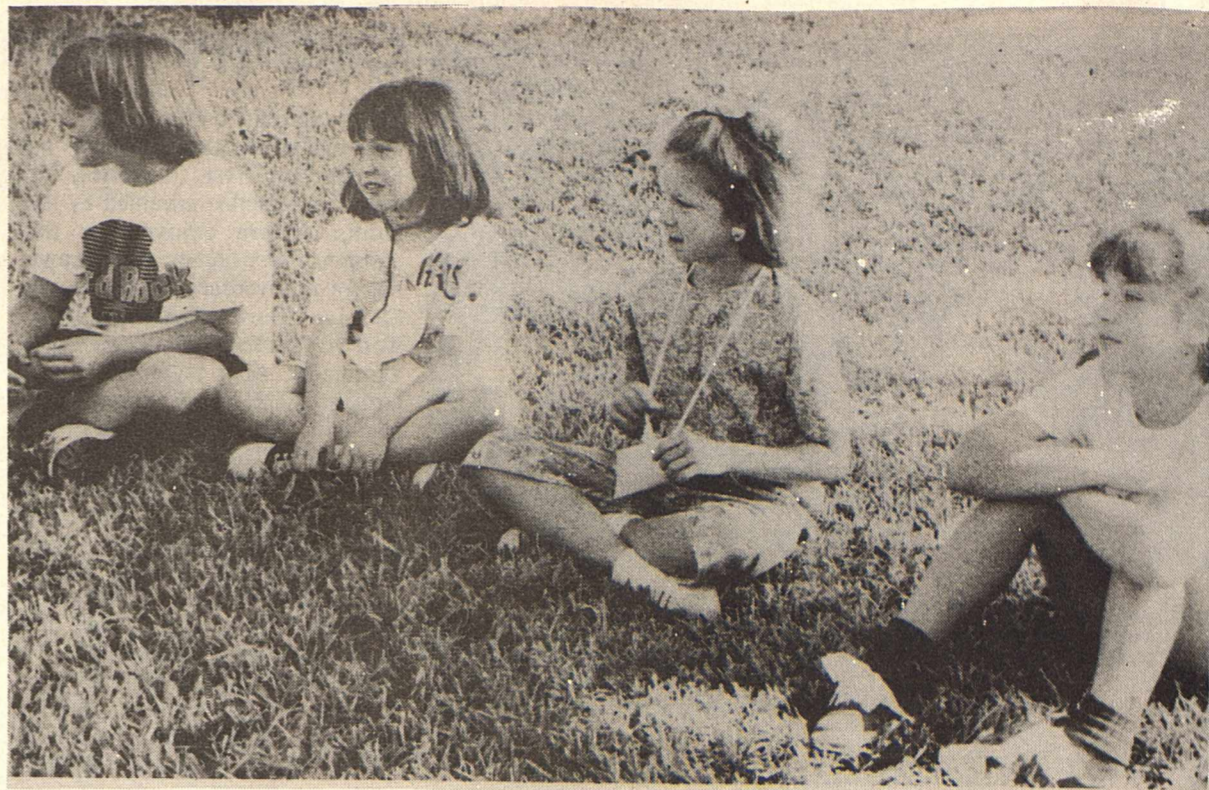
So if you have guests visiting, we'll be happy to serve them in our dining room (they must pay \$3.50). If you've been working in the yard, come as you are!

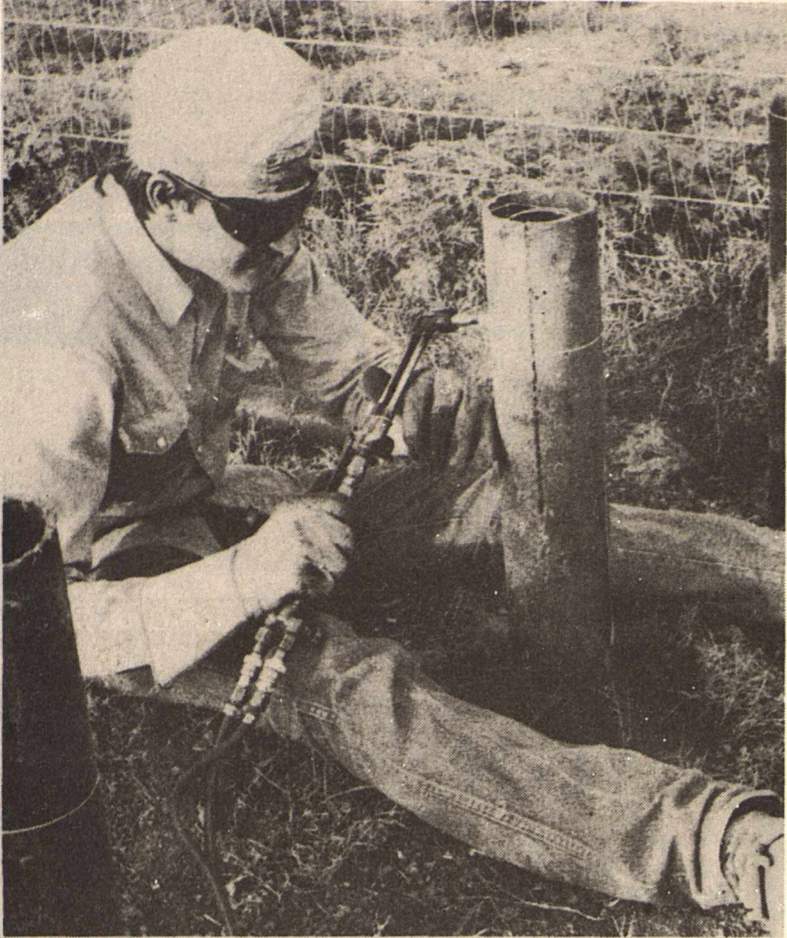

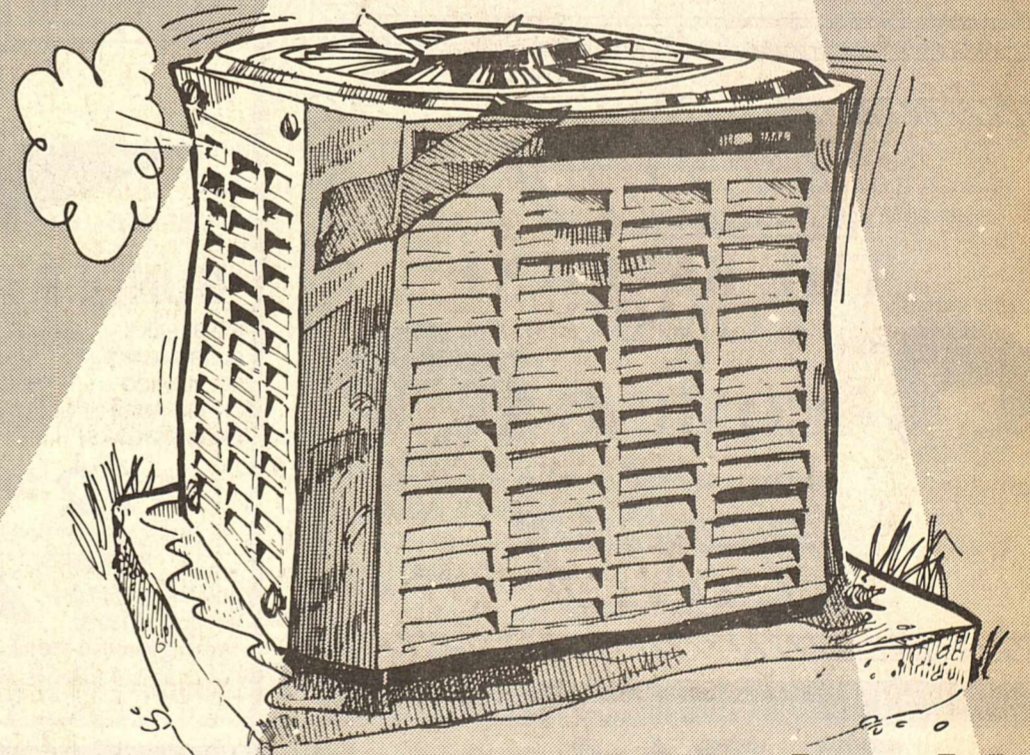

## Yearling goat futurity held

The Sutton County Extension Agricultural Committee sponsored the first yearly Angora doe futurity Sonora on Wednesday, July 22. Participants were invited from Sutton and all adjacent counties.

The event featured a pen of 10 does from each producer. The does were evaluated by Dr. Frank Maddock and Dr. Rick Machen. The scorecard featured 50 points for body (25 points for frame and eight, 15 points for conformation and constitution and 10 points for group uniformity). An additional 10 points were allotted for structural correctness and type (25 points for feet and legs, 15 points for breed character and 10 points for pline). Fleece quality was worth 10 points (15 for fineness and uniformity, 5 for freedom from matting, and 5 for style and character). The final category was fleece quantity worth 25 points (15 points for weight, 5 for length, and 5 for fold). These scores were objectively assigned with actual data adjusted for shearing dates and body conditions on doe weights, fleece weight and staple length.

The does were shorn and the mohair graded by qualified graders at the Sonora Wool & Mohair company. The hair was sorted into grades (2.00), Yearling (1.50), Fine

Adult (1.25), Adult (1.15), and Stain (.70). Prices were randomly assigned for each category as shown in parenthesis. The percentage of each grade was computed by group and a total value based on 100 pounds of hair computed for each lot. Points were assigned based on 1/2 of the dollar value for a range of 64.09 points to 71.39 points.

The final placing for the contest was 1st, Jimmy and Sharon Holman of Sonora with 200.92 points; 2nd, Ronnie and Karen McFadin of Del Rio with 196.36 points; 3rd, Margaret Galbreath of Sonora with 191.39 points; 4th, Larry Finklea of Sonora with 189.69 points; Clay Hicks of Sonora with 188.09 points and Bonner Walsh of Sonora with 181.08 points.

The contest will be evaluated and perhaps opened to producers statewide in 1993. For more information contact Preston Faris, Sutton County Extension Agent in Sonora.

## Wheat program contains zero acreage reduction

Farmers who participate in the 1993 Wheat Program will not be required to reduce their plantings to qualify for price support loans and deficiency payments, according to Herb Schwertner, director of the Sutton County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The 1993 program contains a zero percent acreage reduction.

"This means that there is no requirement to place eligible cropland into an Acreage Conservation Reserve," Herb said.

He said this level was chosen from the statutory range of 0 to 15 percent to ensure sufficient wheat

supplies for domestic and export needs.

Wheat program benefits include target price protection at \$4.00 per bushel, the same as last year, and price support loans at \$2.45 per bushel, 21 cents more than the previous year. To be eligible for loans, purchases, and payments on the 1993 wheat crop, producers must not plant in excess of their wheat acreage base plus plantings permitted on flexible acres. A paid land diversion will not be implemented.

Other 1993 wheat program provisions will be announced at a later date.

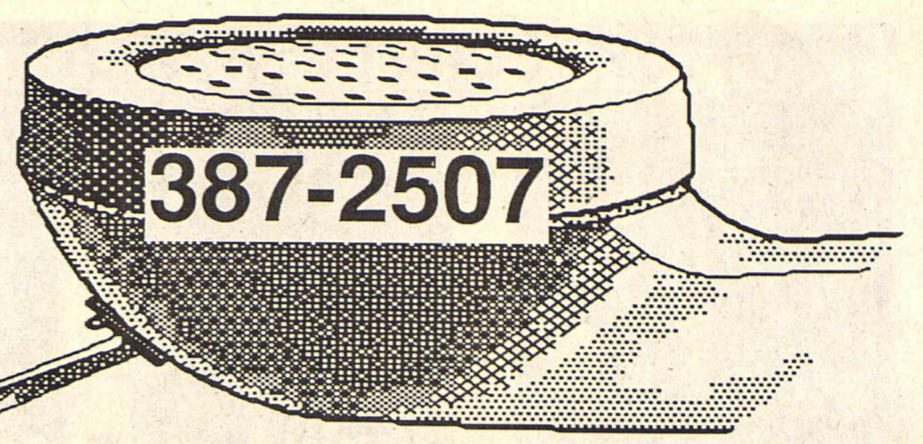
