Sawyer named to **FNB Board** of Directors

Edwin Sawyer III has been elected to the Board of Directors of First National Bank of Sonora, according to an announcement by J.W. "Web" Elliott, Chairman of the Board of the West Texas bank.

"Mr. Sawyer will be the third generation of his family to serve on our board," said Mr. Elliott. "It is rather unique that three generations serve their friends and neighbors for such a long period of time.'

E.E. Sawyer, Sr., a pioneer Sutton County rancher and businessman served on the Board from January 1911 to April 1935, over 24 years. His son, Edwin E. Sawyer, Jr. was elected to the Board in September 1935. At the age of 20, he was the youngest director ever elected to the Board. He served the Board actively until his death in July 1989, a tenure of almost 54 years.

Edwin Sawyer III attended public eschools in Sonora and graduated from Sonora High School. He attended Southern Methodist University and Texas Tech University.

He presently serves as an active Director of Sonora Wool & Mohair Company, Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association and Sutton County Underground Water Conservation. He is Chairman of e latter



The commissioners discussed in more detail the sick leave/holiday/ vacation policy for the shortened work week. Employees falling under this new work week will receive one day of sick leave for every 160 worked hours. Employees would be required to work two extra hours during the week preceding a holiday.

Fraser vows to stop confirmation of water commissioners because of new rules

"With the stroke of a pen, the Texas Water Commission eliminated over 100 years of constitutional water rights and stole the property of many Texans," said Troy Fraser, Republican candidate for Texas Senate District 25. During a visit to Sonora, Fraser said control of the Aquifer is the first attempt by the TWC to control all underground water in Texas and he vowed to stop the confirmation of Chairman John Hall and the other newly appointed Water Commissioners.

Fraser said recent Water Commission rulings would devalue millions of acres of private property, render some land useless and severely restrict economic development in West Texas and the Hill Country. "The value of millions of acres of land could plummet because of this action and land owners will not be compensated. I call that highway robbery, "he said.

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Fraser said the new ruling could be reversed by defeating the upcoming confirmation of the newly appointed commissioners, all of whom must be confirmed in the next legislative session.

"Water is the most precious commodity in West and Central Texas and the lack of it could cripple economic development in our part of the state," Fraser said. "The theft of private water rights by the Texas Water Commission could cause our area of the state to dry up and blow away," he said.

"During these tough economic times, government should be providing incentives for economic growth and jobs, not eliminating them," Fraser said. "The new corporate income tax and the elimination of private water rights will make it considerably more difficult to bring new jobs to this part of Texas." Fraser said control of this vital resource must be returned to the people of Texas. "Replacing the current commissioners with people who respect individual water rights would solve this problem," Fraser said.

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$4,688 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$4,998 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.7700 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Sonora Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of \$.24 that will provide \$4,618.78 per student in state and local revenues.

O. When did the Dunbar family come to Sutton County?

A. We found the following in the Devil's River News of September 27. 1935:

MRS. MARY DUNBAR, 88, DROVE HACK FROM **TENNESSEE IN 1875.**

Women, it seems to this observer, who has no intention of claiming to know anything about the sex, are just about the same whether they're twenty-eight or eighty-eight - that is, in certain respects. Take age and birthdays, for instance:

After a NEWS representative called Mrs. Tom Sandherr's home Monday to ask if he might call on her mother, Mrs. Mary Deborah Dunbar, eighty-eight years old last Sunday, Mrs. Dunbar laughed and asked her daughter. "Why didn't you tell him I was

forty-eight instead of eighty-eight?"

But rightly so, Mrs. Mary

questions her interviewer and her daughter asked about her interesting life. It is believed she is the oldest person in Sutton County. She liked Hack Driving.

Driving a hack from Tennessee with her husband and two small children, Paul C., who died in Hobbs, last spring and a daughter who is now S.E. Armistead of Del Rio, proved so attractive to Mrs. Dunbar that she wanted to push on when they got to Dallas so that they went to Waxahachie. They had a covered wagon to carry their belongings and at night they slept in it.

Mrs. Dunbar recalled this week that when they crossed the Cumberland River not far from her birthplace, her small son cried, "I wanta go back to the house." Mr. and Mrs. Dunbar had sold all their Tennessee things and were determined to come west. Mr. Dunbar's sister, who lived near Waxahachie had died two weeks before they got started, but they decided to make the trip anyway.

Dunbars "Farmers Once" That was in 1875 when Mrs. Dunbar was only twenty-eight. They farmed in that section for the next quarter of a century and in 1901 went to Reagan County. After four years there, they came to Sutton County and settled on the home place, still in the family, seventeen miles from Sonora on Cusenbary Road.

Although she was only a girl of fourteen to eighteen at the time of

the Civil War, Mrs. Mary Deborah Dunbar (we like the quaint sound of the name "Mary Deborah") remembers a great deal about it. But let her tell it:

"We lived nine miles from Fort Donaldson and about two miles from Dover. I remember the gunboats coming up the river to attack the fort. Those were troublous days. We heard the cannon booming for a week when the fort was attacked.

"Then after the surrender, soldiers trooped past our house by the hundreds. One of the poor fellows cried out - 'Fort Donaldson's surrendered, madam, and we're hungry!'


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



"We still had slaves then so we called to them to put meat to cooking in every available vessel. But the hungry men wouldn't wait. They grabbed it and began eating before it was even cooked."

Mrs. Dunbar's husband, W.E. Dunbar, who died in 1919 when he was seventy-two, ran away from home and enlisted in Morgan's Brigade, although his father tried to persuade him not to do it. Her brother was killed at Franklin, Tennessee, after having been captured by the Northern forces, held a prisoner in Illinois two years and finally sent to Mobile, Alabama, in an exchange of prisoners transaction.

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Besides the Sutton County children - Mrs. Sandherr and D.B. (Bug) Dunbar, Sutton ranchman -

and Mrs. Armistead of Del Rio, she has a son, Russell S. Dunbar, a Glasscock County ranchman, who makes his home in San Angelo.

Despite her advanced age, Mrs. Dunbar is in fairly good health at this time. She is quite deaf and her eyesight has been affected to the extent that she has not been able to read for three or four years.

There are many articles like the above scattered throughout the 1930's newspapers. They are a great resource to anyone working on their family tree.
