Public Housing Agency voted in by council

A Special Meeting of the governing body of the city of Sonora was held on the 25th day of August.

The council voted to create a Public Housing Agency. This is a governmental agency created to aid low income families with rent.

Housing landlords must bring

their housing up to the H.U.D. standards to qualify for Public Housing renters.

Any individuals desiring aid with rent must fill out forms and qualify as low income individuals.

The council also considered forming a board of directors to

govern the Public Housing Agency. A part time position will be created to manage qualifying land lords and tenants.

The council also ratified the handicapped space marking which was painted at the Law Enforcement Center for Sutton County Days.

Broncos ready to start 1992 season

Well, ol' Bugs is not the only one who is ready to get the show started. Coach Bob Bellard's 1992 Broncos finished their preseason scrimmages in an outstanding effort against the Badgers of McCamey. "I am very pleased with our effort. The second team was especially strong," said Bob Bellard, Bronco head coach.

McCamey started the controlled scrimmage with 15 offensive plays. On the second play, Matthew Smith made an interception. The Bronco defense gave up only one first down and shut down the Badgers with great hits and intensity. "The kids were really hitting, and on defense, that really counts," said Bellard.

On Sonora's first series of plays, the Sonora offense really shined. Brian Faris connected with Wade Spain for 70 yards on a picture-perfect pass play.

"I looked up and it was there. Brian did a great job," said Spain. "It was like a dream. I ran just a straight fly pattern."

"It has been taking me some time to get my timing right. On that play the line blocked great (they did the whole scrimmage), and Wade ran a perfect streak. It just all came

together," said Faris.

Joey Guerra also had an excellent set rushing for 53 yards on 5 rushes. Shane Keller gained 17 yards on two carries.

"We had just an outstanding first set," said Bellard.

Money confiscated after search by THP Trooper

Over \$11,000 was confiscated last week after a routine traffic stop.

Last Wednesday, six miles east of Sonora, Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Norbert Ortiz stopped the driver of a 1986 model Buick for speeding. Trooper Ortiz noted suspicious actions of the driver and his passenger and with written and verbal consent a search of the vehicle was conducted.

While searching the vehicle Trooper Ortiz discovered \$11,592 hidden in the trunk and drivers compartment of the car. Further investigation revealed a homemade hidden compartment under the length of the dash.

The vehicle was seized and the

driver of the vehicle, Anthony Dale Harness, 21, and Carlos Luis Saabedra, 26, both from Houston, were taken into custody and transported to Sutton County Jail where they were given a receipt for the money and later released.

Trooper Norbert Ortiz contacted DPS Kerrville and made arrangements for the canine unit to come to Sonora for further investigation of the vehicle.

The investigation by the canine unit did not reveal any drugs, however, DPS Kerrville advised that the dogs were alerted to certain areas of the car and this would indicate that the vehicle had been used to transport narcotics.

City resumes mosquito control program

After a brief suspension of operations, the City of Sonora has reinstated the mosquito control program. City Public Works and Fire Department personnel are working cooperatively to cover the city in spraying operations during the evening hours.

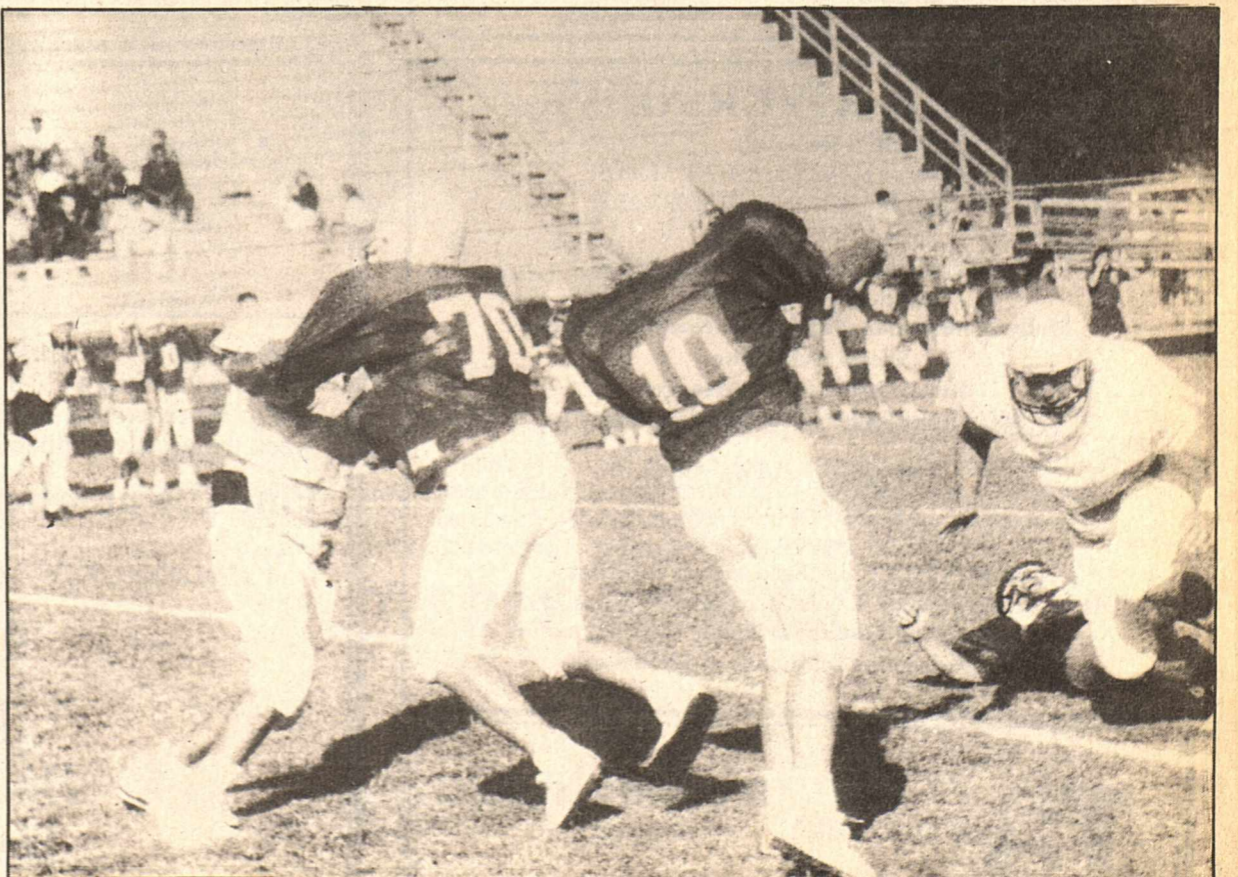
The mosquito control program was temporarily suspended two weeks ago when a local citizen voiced a concern over the types of pesticides being used. In view of the nature of the concern, the city halted spraying operations until a complete review of the program could be conducted.

"Any time a potential community health concern is raised, we take the matter very seriously," City Manager John Pape said. "We felt it most prudent to suspend

mosquito control operations until the state health authorities could review our program."

The Texas Department of Health worked with local public works personnel in reviewing the pesticides being used, along with the city's method of spraying. The review found that Sonora's program is in full compliance with all existing state laws and regulations.

"The spraying will be conducted during the early-evening hours when the winds are relatively calm," Pape noted. "This helps to prevent the spray from drifting and provides more effective coverage. As in the past, any city resident who does not want the area around their property sprayed can contact City Hall."

She is survived by her husband, Whiskey of Sonora; a son and daughter-in-law, Wayne and Judy

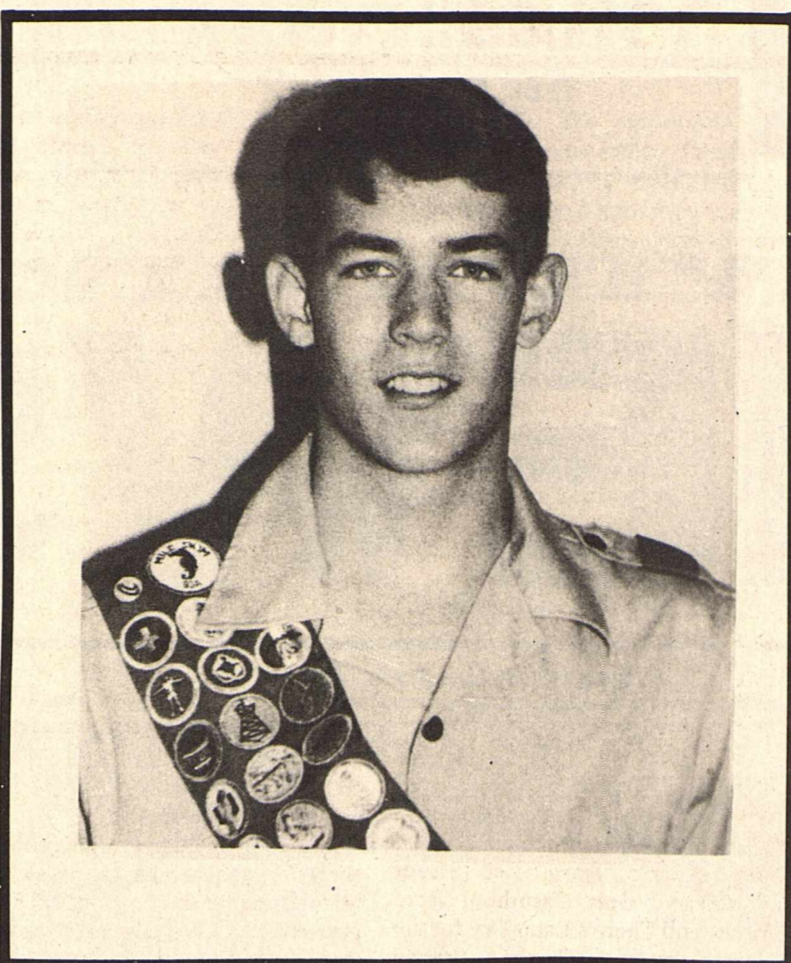

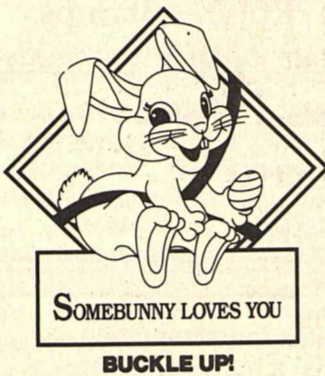

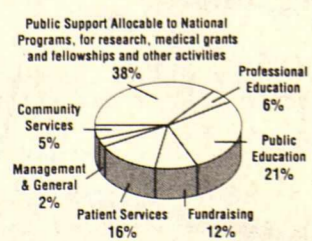

Sonora 9-1-1 introduces interpreter services

Sonora 9-1-1 personnel now can communicate with callers in more than 140 different languages.

People who do not speak English will understandably have experienced frustration calling for emergency services. Correspondingly, our people are hindered in their efforts to help when they cannot communicate effectively with callers.

9-1-1 was please to announce that they are erasing the language barrier in Sonora and improving the quality of emergency services they provide.

The department's multilingual capability is provided by AT&T Language Line Services, the world's largest provider of over-the-phone interpretation.

When dispatchers receive an emergency call from someone who doesn't speak English, they call Language Line Services, special toll-free 800 number. An interpreter is added to the conversation within moments. In the field, police officers, fire

fighters and paramedics also can access Language Line Services via the 800 number. AT&T interpreters are on duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The first step toward helping people is being able to communicate with them.

Situations that require an

interpreter are on the increase; not just in metropolitan areas, but throughout the country. More than 40 million visitors from overseas travel the U.S. each year, and as many as 20 million people living in this country speak a language other than English.

Ask the Historical Society by the Sutton County Historical Society

Q: Do people really eat mesquite beans?

A: Yes! Some people really like them and will pick them off a tree branch and chew on them. They are loaded with sugar, and to the Indians were a great source of quick energy.

In February of 1988, the Texas Highways magazine had an excellent article entitled the "Marvelous, Maligned Mesquite." It stated, "Cooks and carvers hail the hardy and versatile mesquite, long the barbed bane of farmers and ranchers."

Woodcarvers really like mesquite because it is real easy to work and has such beautiful grains in it. We have seen some of this work at a show in San Antonio and the graining in the wood is really gorgeous.

Cooks love the mesquite. They use small chunks of dry wood for outdoor cooking. They love the flavor it gives their foods, domestic and especially wild game.

Mesquite Bean Stock: In late summer or early fall, pick dried bean pods from the tree (not off the ground). Rinse, drop into saucepan, cover with water, put on a lid, and boil two hours. When

liquid turns reddish, mash bean pods with a potato masher while cooking. Strain and retain the liquid. It can be used as a marinade for meats or a base for vegetable soup. Mix it with meat loaf or hamburger meat or use it to baste on the barbecue.

Mesquite Jelly: Use Mesquite Bean Stock (It takes a full grocery bag of beans to make six quarts of jelly.) Simply follow the instructions accompanying any commercial pectin.

Mesquite Wine: Add a tablespoon of sugar or honey per cupful of Mesquite Bean Stock. Pout into cheese cloth covered crock or jars and keep in a cool place until mixture stops bubbling. Makes a nice, sweet, dessert type wine. This wine was once used by the Tonkawa Indians.

Mesquite Flour: Snap dried mesquite bean pods and grind them in a blender. Sift out the black bean kernels. Mix half and half with corn meal. The flour makes tasty cornbread and tamales.

During the War Between the States, mesquite beans were boiled to make an ersatz coffee. Mesquite leaves made a bracing tea. During the time of the Comanche uprisings, mesquite pods were worth three cents a pound to the U.S. Cavalry as horse fodder. They brought a dollar a bushel as a treat for man or beast at San Antonio Markets as late as 1897.

Comanches chewed mesquite leaves to cure a toothache. Yumas treated venereal disease with them. Yaquis pulped them with water and urine to make a poultice for headaches. Mexican women boiled them with clothes as a bleach. Papagos used the mesquite's inner bark to ease indigestion. Various tribes have used mesquite's gum as a balm for wounds and sores, to mend pottery, to make black dye, to aid digestion, to brew into tea for diarrhea, or simply to chew for pleasure.

Texas contains about 50 million of the 70 million U.S. acres where mesquites are the dominant vegetation. Increasingly valuable as a trendy firewood and as a source of wood for fine furniture and

construction, the mesquite's attributes are being researched for other practical uses: tannins, ethyl alcohol, acids, sugars, plastics, wallboard. Mesquite gum is gaining popularity in the manufacture of gumdrops, lozenges and mucilages.

As you can see, the mesquite has had many uses through the years and they are continually trying to develop new ones. We understand all the reasons the ranchers do not like the mesquite and can sympathize with them.

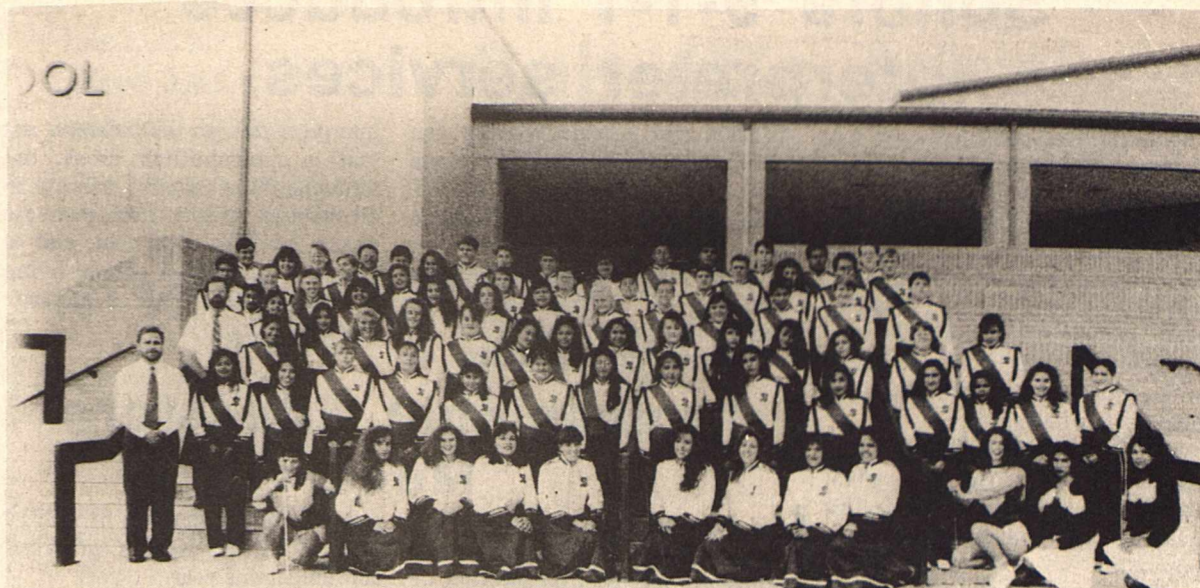

Season Opener

The Sonora Senior High School Bronco Football team will open its season against preseason District 6-2A favorite Wall, this Friday evening, September 4, at 8:00 p.m., at Bronco Stadium.

The Wall Hawks are led by All-West Texas preseason selection Ben Thomas, on defense, and returning all district quarterback, Chad Box on offense. Though the Hawks have an excellent set of running backs, Cory Braden and Thomas, they have gone to the air early and often in its preseason scrimmages. One of the keys for the Broncos this year will be the leadership provided by an experience offensive line. "We've got an outstanding offensive line," said Bellard.

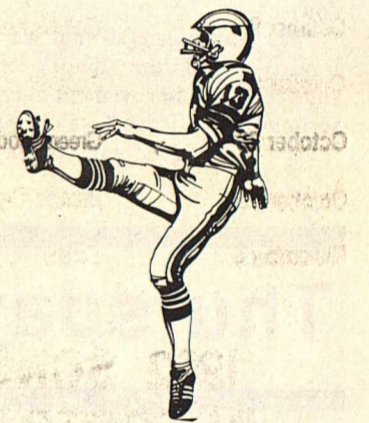

Wad Spain is the split end. "Wade has a lot of potential as an outside threat," said Bellard. Hadley Smith is the second split end.

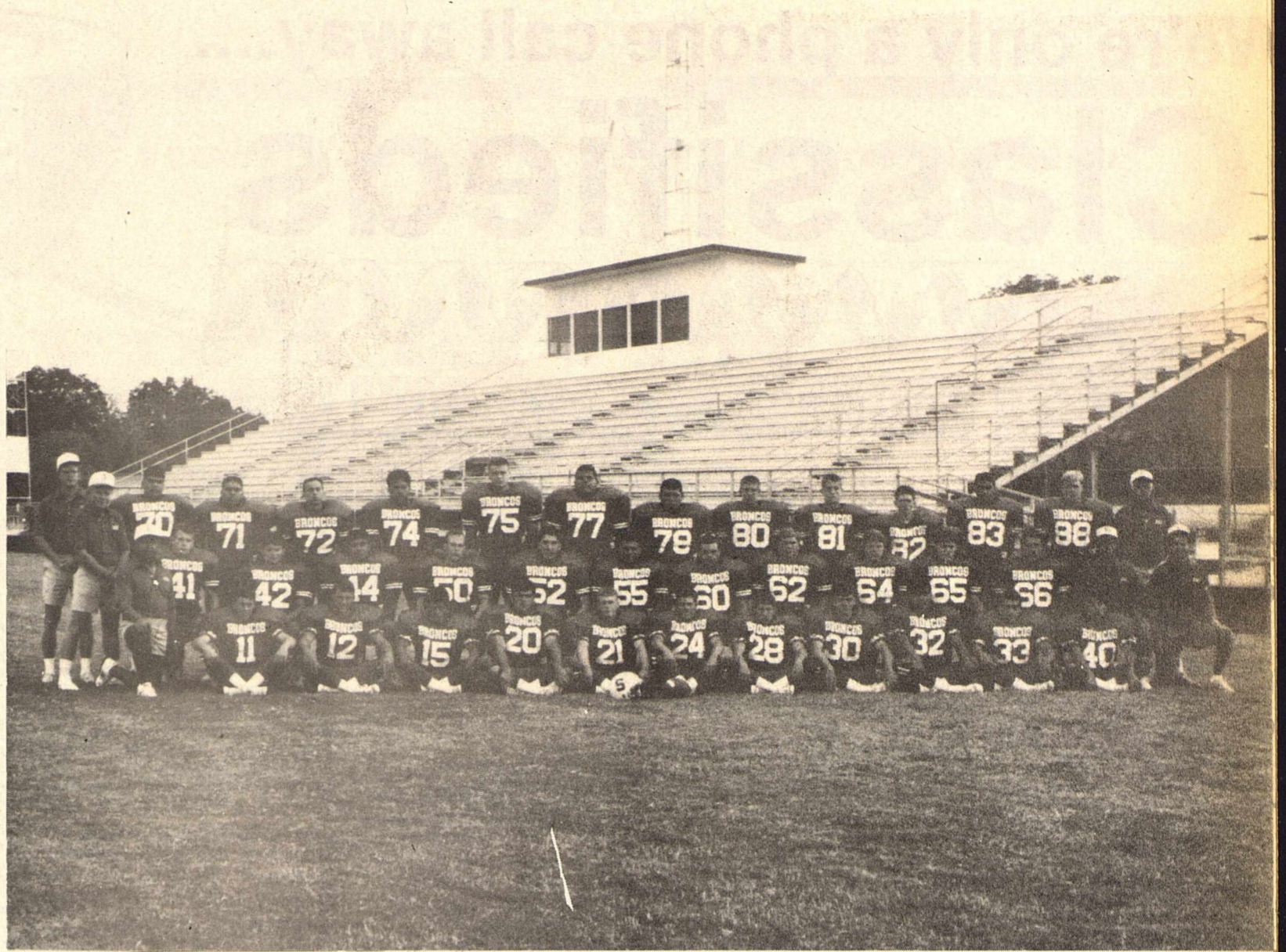
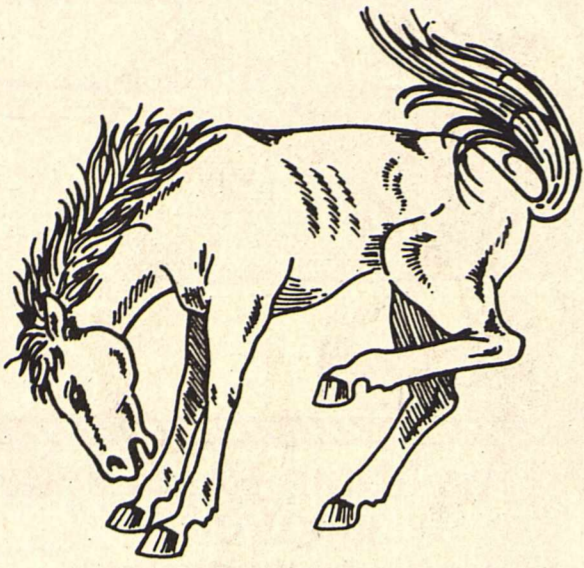
