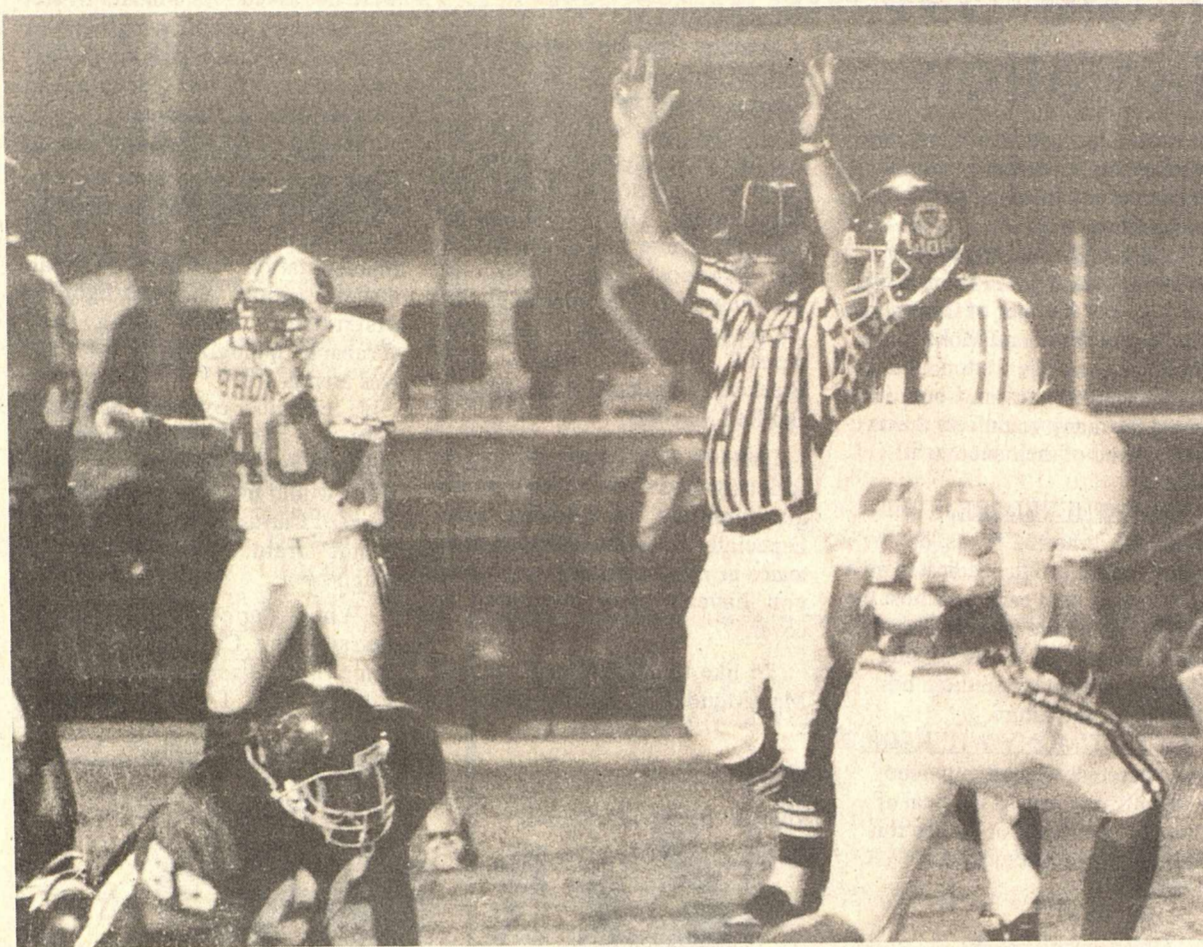
Yearbooks

Sonorans attend town meeting to hear strategy for economic development

"We have two choices, we can sit back and do nothing, or we can try a new approach. If we do nothing, Sonora will most likely drift along into oblivion," said City Manager John Pape, as he led a "Town Meeting" that was held Tuesday evening, September 15 at the Sonora Depot Amphitheater.

The meeting was called by the Mayor and the City Council to consider "An Economic Development Strategy for the City of Sonora." The event was attended by 55 citizens who represented a broad section of the community.

Sonora Mayor, Lemuel Lopez, opened the gathering stating the support of the council for the plan. "We have an opportunity to grow and prosper," said Lopez.

"This is something that the community must work on together. This strategy is not an answer, but rather it is a beginning," said Pape. "This is about our future and our children's future."

Those in attendance were given an extensive background paper that spelled out the basis of the plan.

Among the key points in the strategy is using the School of Business Administration at Angelo State University to assess our present position. This extensive

evaluation process, which will be provided at no cost to the community, will be a place from

Street closing among topics in council meeting

After approving the minutes of the regular meeting of August 18, and the special meeting of August 25, City Attorney, Beth Wallace, brought up the fact that any paper or information held by the city, is open to the public. There are some guidelines. For example, purchasing information, such as taking bids are considered private under law.

There was a public hearing concerning the closing of a portion of 2nd Street, between block 49A, lot 6 and block 50A, lot 1, abutting the property belonging to Turney Friess.

Council woman, Marie Barrera, requested to consider condemning

property belonging to Mrs. Juan Jimenez for the use as a street to the David Sanchez and Santiago Gonzales residence. There are two major questions to this problem: "Where does the property line run?" and "Who owns the gap that exists?" Surveyors have been called and there will be a special meeting in two weeks to decide on this issue.

Barrera also requested to discuss the recent closing of a portion of St. Ann's Street and consider the re-opening of the street. Since the street was closed there has been trouble getting down Rock Avenue. The property does belong to the

Police Chief Gesch attends workshop aimed at reducing demand for drugs

Sonora Police Chief Brent Gesch recently completed an intensive, three-day training workshop designed to enhance law enforcement's role in reducing the demand for drugs. The program, held in Dallas was conducted by the National Crime Prevention Council with support from the United States Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance and co-sponsored by the Greater Dallas Crime Commission and Mayors United on Safety, Crime and Law Enforcement.

Participants for this unique program were selected from a pool of Police Chiefs and Sheriffs from throughout the State of Texas. Chief Gesch's attendance was an acknowledgement of his commitment to reducing drug problems in Sonora.

"Enforcement must work hand-in-hand with prevention/education and treatment if we are to make a difference in the overall drug problem which now consumes our nation," said John Rosiak, Director, Substance Abuse Prevention Programs, National Crime

Prevention Council. "Law Enforcement professionals have an opportunity to lead or act as a partner in coordinating demand

reduction efforts. Demand reduction efforts combat the drug problem at its roots; these efforts have been time-tested and are effective."

Rededication of Liberty Park draws crowd of over 500

More than 500 people were present for the rededication of Liberty Park on Wednesday, September 16, 1992. The festivities, emceed by Sandra Luz Gonzalez, began with the Mexican National anthem. This was followed by the presentation of the American, Mexican and Texas flags by Fred Perez, Mike Villanueva and John Pape.

Margaret Cascadden, representing Mayor Lemuel Lopez, who was out of town on business, delivered the welcome to all the guests.

City Manager, John Pape spoke briefly about the rededication of the park. This was followed by a welcome, in Spanish, delivered by Fred Perez.

Father William R. DuBuisson pronounced the blessing of the "Plazita," and then celebrated Holy Mass with all the guests. The Grito was proclaimed by Ramiro Perez. The liberty bells were rung to symbolize the re-opening of the park.

The Mighty Bronco Band played the National Anthem and allowed the community to see their new flag and drum major uniforms.

The various aspects of Diez y Seis (Mexican Independence Day) were discussed by Mr. Lazaro Dominguez, who spoke of its history, and Coach Primo Gonzalez who delivered the biography of Miguel Hidalgo y Castilla, the father of the independence (in Spanish).

The Mighty Bronco Band entertained the crowd with 3 more

songs: "Fiesta en Sonora," "Borracho de Besos," and "De Guerra." "De Guerra" was last played in public 150 years ago during the time of the Mexican revolution.

Pablo Favela spoke on the history of Sonora's previous celebration of Independence Day. After the dismissal, everyone enjoyed the music of Oscar Galindo and stayed to participate in the festivities.

There were several food booths at the rededication: hamburgers were provided by the award-winning Colt 45's; Rosie's Cafe donated the proceeds from the sale of fajita tacos to St. Ann's Catholic Church and also sold corn on the cob; Las Guadalupeanas donated sodas; and a group of private citizens donated enough watermelon for everyone to enjoy.

The Senior Center donated an afghan which was crafted by Maria Dominguez and the Senior Center Crochet Club for a raffle. The winner of this beautiful afghan was Lupe Jimenez.

Thank you to everyone who participated in this celebration: City Manager, John Pape and the City workers for the beautiful restoration of Liberty park and the people who were too numerous to mention, who donated time, energy, etc. to make all this possible.

Mark your calendars for future celebrations at Liberty Park. A Cinco de Mayo celebration and another Diez y Seis celebration are planned for next year.

Broncos tame Ozona Lions in 26-6 romp

The Sonora Broncos soundly beat the Lions of Ozona 26 to 6. They were supposed to. If ever a team could be tempted to be overconfident, this team could have been. They were bigger, quicker and more skilled, but if that were all it took, they would not have to play the game.

Bronco head coach, Bob Bellard, was pleased with the effort of his charges. "We played pretty well. We got a chance to play a lot of folks and were only a block or missed tackle away from total domination. We played a pretty good football game and we beat a team with a lot of potential."

The Broncos took their opening possession and drove for a touchdown in just seven plays. "We did what we had to do: we took control of the ball and the game and scored on the first drive. Again, the Broncos were led by the running of sophomore running back sensation, Joey Guerra, who gained 130 yards for the game and 28 yards on the 53 yard drive. Seniors Shane Keller and Brian Faris also contributed to the drive, which was entirely on the ground.

The Bronco defense was awesome. They held the Lions to 35 yards rushing and they held a pretty good quarterback, Justin Castro, to 7 completions on 24 attempts, making 3 interceptions.

The second Bronco score came on an absolutely beautiful run by Keller. Following a Pete Perez interception, Keller ran 55 yards on the next Sonora play, carrying half of the Ozona defense with him as he tore off tackle for the touchdown.

The final Bronco TD came on a two yard dive by Guerra in the fourth quarter on a drive that was highlighted by key pass plays from Fair to Shannon Escalera and Keller.

The other scoring for Sonora came on two Armando Robles field

goals of 38 and 35 yards. "Our kicking game was excellent for the most part," said Bellard.

Ozona was never in contention during the game, and scored only on a drive late in the fourth quarter.

Bellard said that he was happy with the Bronco's over-all performance. "This was not an ugly win. We did what we had to do. This was a better Ozona team than the others that I have seen. We did our job and did it well."

In other action around District 6-3A, Friday, District favorite Reagan County demolished Lamesa 35-7. Also, Crane lost to Pecos 3-0; Kermit lost to Ft. Stockton 27-8; Greenwood lost to Denver City 26-13; and Colorado City fell to Slaton 27-0.

Breckenridge Preview Does their 0-3 Record lie?

Sonora takes its 3-0 record on a long road trip to face Breckenridge Friday at 8:00 p.m. The Broncos face a team that is better than its 0-3 record.

"We face a team that is not nearly as bad as its record might indicate. They have lost to three good teams, including Burkbennet, Clyde and Sweetwater. They are not a bad ball club. They have a great wide receiver and they try to get the ball to him," said Sonora head coach, Bob Bellard.

Breckenridge is coming off a stunning 54-0 rout at the hands of Sweetwater. "Don't let that fool you. They made some great plays that were called back because of

better than the ones I remember. But, of course, my memory is not exactly as good as it used to be either.

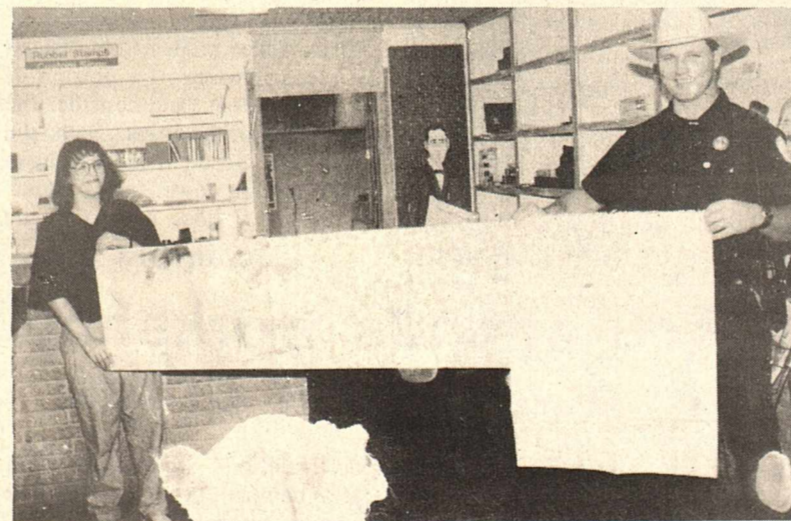
Did you know that the kids today are better behaved than we were 20 years ago? The Sonora band kids sure are. They aren't perfect, but they sure are fun and very talented.

which to develop a blueprint for our future.

Another important factor in the plan is to build on our heritage. By using our ranching and western heritage as jumping off points, the plan calls for the future development of tourism and the development of an agribusiness industrial base. "We can chase after smoke stacks, but that will not work. Tourism and ranching are things we know about," said Pape.

Redeveloping downtown and making small business consultants available to local small businesses are also goals of the program. "We have an historic and significant downtown which is more than 50% empty. We want to encourage new business to locate downtown, and help those there stay. The kind of new business we want would compliment rather than compete with our existing ones," Pape said.

A focal point of the small business development strategy centers on a "Shop Sonora First" campaign. "Too many of us buy too much in San Angelo. If we can learn to shop at home, more money will stay here. Every time a dollar is spent in a community, it "turns over" at least six times. By bringing in more retail, we bring in more potential for folks staying here rather than spending money outside of the community," Pape said.

Part of the plan is already being implemented in a cleanup program. The city is working to improve the appearance of its vehicles and structures. A spring cleaning for the whole town will also be proposed.

"There is no one answer to strengthening the local economy. The common elements, however, are commitment, dedication and a vision."

City, but it was never officially designated as a street. Mrs. Barrera also suggested building a bridge. This would cost an extreme amount of money in material cost and engineering work. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) would require a survey of the draw to see how much water

displacement there is. Margaret Cascadden brought up an earlier study resulting in an ambulance or emergency vehicle taking seven minutes longer to get to the area when water was up. This study alone cost \$50,000.

Virgil Poloczek gave a presentation on the Rural Conservation and Development (RCD) program. This program has been in existence with the Administered Group of Soil and Conservation service. It is very similar to the program that was developed here in 1958 with the flood prevention. Those funds were federally expended through the counties. That project cost about \$2 million. All thirteen structures took about four years to build. The RCD program is very similar to this program. This is grant money provided through the Soil and Conservation Service. Right now they are requesting counties in Soil and Water Conservation Districts to become members. The cost is \$25 a year per organization to join. All were in favor of joining the program.

There has been a request from Sonora I.S.D. for an additional crosswalk on College Street.

The City Council was requested to authorize a staff to contact Todd Engineering, Inc. to provide services for the preparation of an application to the Texas Parks and Wildlife for the construction of a new swimming pool and dressing facilities. There was a motion for authorization and all were in favor.

All members were in favor of amending the sewer and garbage collection rates. They were also in favor of amending the city drug policy.

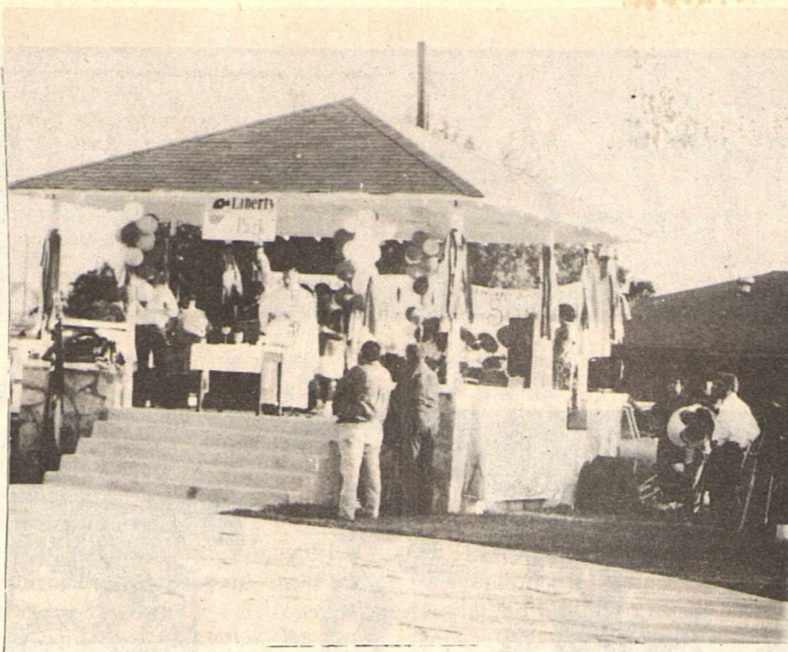

Clinic staff attends course

Deborah Peaslee, M.D. and Bertha Castillo, LVN, of Schleicher County Medical Center, recently completed the American Heart Association's Pediatric Advanced Life Support Course in San Antonio. The course was intended for instruction to healthcare providers dealing with infants and children. Included were information for rapidly recognizing conditions potentially leading to cardiopulmonary arrest and strategies for preventing that progression, as well as knowledge and skills necessary for resuscitating victims of cardiopulmonary arrest.

The course was taught in the

form of lectures followed by hands-on experience. Small group and individual sessions allowed practical application of the skills and knowledge gained in the care of critical situations. A team approach and advanced preparation and planning for a wide range of medical emergencies were emphasized.

In a rural hospital setting, where the team of caregivers is small, every person must strive to play a larger role. Thus, continuing education (both courses and individual study) is essential and each individual must, in turn, strive to pass on skills and information to others.

FBI opens local office

The Federal Bureau of Investigation recently opened a Resident Agency in San Angelo, Texas. The San Angelo Resident Agency will operate as a satellite office out of the Dallas Division and will be staffed by two Special Agents. This office will serve 15 counties in west Texas: Crockett, Sutton, Schleicher, Menard, Reagan, Irion, Tom Green, Concho, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown and Mills.

The establishment of the San Angelo Resident Agency will expand the FBI's presence in west Texas and will provide a timely

response to matters within the FBI's jurisdiction. In addition to the traditional violations addressed by the FBI, agents assigned to the San Angelo Resident Agency will work with state and local authorities. They will address violent crimes and drug related matters. This emphasis on violent crimes and drugs is part of the FBI's initiative to redirect FBI resources from foreign counter-intelligence to investigating violent crimes and drug offenses. The local office will be located in the O.C. Fisher Federal Office Building, 33 East Twohig, Room 317, San Angelo, Texas 76903.

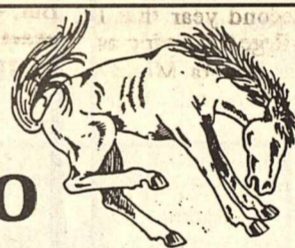

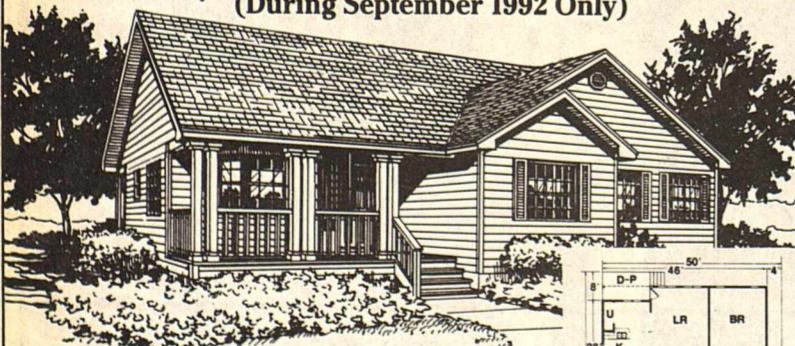

Sonora Junior Varsity ties up Lions

The Ozona Lions junior varsity, led by quarterback David Brown, rallied to tie the Sonora Bronco JV 20-20 in a game played at Bronco Stadium. However, it was an outstanding defensive effort by Sonora's Chris Gutierrez that preserved the tie when he blocked an extra point attempt with 2:00 left in the game.

Brown, who was 0 for 5 in the first half, with one interception, came back firing 7 for 13 in the second for 55 yards, including one stretch where he went 4 for 4, leading to the second Lion score.

On offense, Sonora was led by the running of Sophomore Gilbert Vara, who ran for 123 yards on 20 attempts. The offensive line also did an outstanding job in breaking holes for Vara, Mike House and Gabriel Perez to run through.

The game began on a sour note for the Broncos when the opening kick-off was mis-handled and was pounced on by the Lion's Eric Elisondo, giving Ozona the ball first and ten at the 10.

After an incomplete pass and a short running play, with the ball on the 7, Brown brought the Lions to the line and dropped back to pass. The Broncos were putting an excellent rush on and hurried

Brown, who threw the ball up. Perez was there to grab the interception, ending the Lions' first scoring threat. Sonora was unable to move the ball on its first possession and was forced to punt.

Ozona took the ball on its own 27 and was carried by Matt Ortiz for the first score of the game. The 15 play drive was highlighted by 12 Ortiz runs for 68 yards. The TD came on an Ortiz dive at the 1. De La Garza's kick was good.

Sonora's offense countered with a great drive of its own. The Broncos went 90 yards on 10 plays. The Broncos used a balanced running attack, with Vara and Perez sharing the ball. Vara - left 10 yards; Perez - right for 6, and so the Broncos went galloping down the field. Vara got the score on a 1 yard scoot off the right tackle. Vara scored the two point conversion, a trap up the middle, giving Sonora an 8-7 advantage.

Ozona would threaten to score again late in the half, following a fake punt. With 1:18 left in the half, the Lions lined up in deep punt formation, with Ortiz as one of the short backs. The snap went to Ortiz, who ran for 30 yards around the left end for the first down. With the Lions driving at

the 19, the Lions fumbled and Levi Pool, who had an excellent game on defense, came up with the recovery.

Sonora opened the second half with a 6 play, 64 yard drive that was highlighted by a 37 yard run and penalty combination. As Vara ran 32 yards up the middle, he was tackled by the face mask and 5 yards was added to the play. The score came at 7:55 in the quarter on a Vara 6 yard run. The 2 point conversion attempt failed.

After Ozona could not generate any offense on its second possession of the half, the Broncos took the ball in for a score. Again, Perez, Vara and House combined for an outstanding drive. Jason Morely's pass play for 13 yards to Jesse Capuchina was the long play of the set. Again, the Bronco score came on a 5 yard Vara run. The 2 point conversion failed.

Ozona answered the Bronco score with one of their own, as time ran out in the third quarter. The drive was all Brown. Brown to Tony Valencia; Brown to James Nelson; Brown to Valencia, Brown to Nelson. Four plays, four completions, four first downs, and so it went until Brown kept the ball on a quarterback sneak for the score.

De La Garza's point after try was good.

The final Ozona score, which produced the tie, was on a 27 yard, 5 play drive, following an interception by Lion's Andres De La Garza. With the score 20-20, De La Garza, who as the Lion's place kicker had done an excellent job all evening, was unable to get the ball over a surge of Sonora players, when Gutierrez leaped into the air and blocked the point after try.

After Ozona tied the game in the fourth, the Broncos had the ball for one last possession, but were unable to move the football and the game ended 20-20.

Q. Who is the oldest living person in Sutton County?

A. We know that Jim Luckie was born March 15, 1899 in Marble Falls; Joseph VanderStucken was born February 15, 1901 right here in Sonora; Pearl Martin is 95, Mrs. Lottie Rode was born on February 18, 1893 in Kimble County; Eulojia Flores was born March 11, 1902; Geronima Castro Sanchez was born September 30, 1901, but we are really not absolutely sure who the oldest person is. Readers, let's put you to work. Please send us the names and birth date of the oldest members in your family so we can make a list of the oldest residents of Sutton County. You can mail the name and birthdate to the Sutton County Historical Society, P.O. Box 885, Sonora, Texas 76950-0885.

Q. My name is Thera Owens and I live at Route 1, Box 298, Sunset, Texas 76270-9612. I am looking for information on Walter Horace

Gilbert and his wife Ida Isabelle Decker. Walter was the sheriff of Sonora around 1917.

A. Sutton County Marriage Records show that Walter H. Gilbert married Ida Decker on May 24, 1914. Walter was not the Sheriff of Sutton County, but a Deputy Sheriff. He did reside in the old jail building and his wife cooked meals for the prisoners.

Ida Decker is related the Decker Hotel people. Their hotel stood at the end of Main Street directly across from the Court House where there is now an empty lot. We are sending a picture of it to Mrs. Owens.

Joseph VanderStucken remembers Mr. Gilbert as a heavy set man who used to eat lunch at times at the Decker Hotel. Ida Decker's parents were Frank and Laura Decker.

Mrs. Owens has a picture of Walter Gilbert standing in front of the old jail building that she will send us to add to our display in that

building. She stated that she thought Walter Gilbert was a Texas Ranger at one time. If any of our readers can give her any information on Walter or Ida Decker, please drop her a line.

Readers, we are still looking for copies of pictures of everyone buried in the Sonora Cemetery to match up with newspaper stories and also anyone who has ever lived in Sutton County. We are also looking for copies of pictures of Veterans of WWI, WWII, Korea, Vietnam and the Persian Gulf. Copies made on Canon Lazer Copiers like the one Cactus Copy has at Sunset Mall cost only about \$1 for black and white pictures and a little more for color copies. Maybe you have an extra copy of an old picture, or some old school pictures you might want to donate. We need your help if this project is to succeed.

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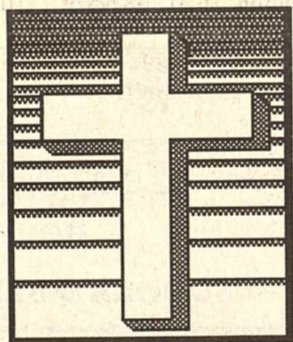

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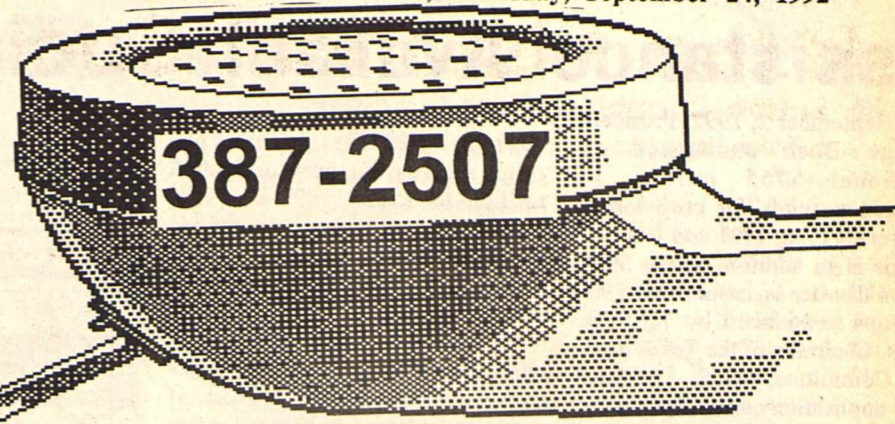

Assistance Available

On September 2, 1992, President George Bush announced an additional \$755 million in emergency funds for crop losses incurred in 1990, 1991 and 1992.

This is in addition to the \$955 million disaster assistance for 1990-91 crops announced by Jerry D. Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, Jan. 2.

The application period for disaster claims on fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 and harvested in 1992 will begin Sept. 8 and end Oct. 2, Harris said. This is phase II of the current disaster program. The application period for producers with losses on other 1992 crops, and for producers with losses from 1990 or 1991 crops who did not previously receive disaster payments for those losses, will begin on Oct. 13 and end Feb. 12, 1993. This is Phase III of the disaster program. "Disaster assistance is available on a per-farm

basis for any two years of 1990, 1991 or 1992," Harris said. "The original program provided \$955 million for either 1990 or 1991. Now, relief will also be provided for fall-seeded program crops planted in 1991 for harvest in 1992."

"Producers will be eligible to apply for assistance on 1990, 1991 or 1992 crop losses; however, if producers received assistance for any of those years they may not receive further assistance for that crop year. Producers who receive payments for fall-seeded program crops will only be eligible for assistance for 1992 crop losses."

Producers with qualifying gross revenues if less than \$2 million per year may file claims for losses of participating and nonparticipating program and nonprogram crops.

"Producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," Harris said. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent. Producers with 1992 crop losses are required, under certain conditions, to purchase crop insurance for 1993."

Harris said producers intending to file for assistance should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the official application period opens and they should contact their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office for additional information.
