Extended Hours

Council hears request to extend hours for beer and liquor sales

City council members heard a request Tuesday that, if approved, would extend the hour in which an establishment that serves beer and liquor would be allowed to stay open.

Albert Bosmans, a partner in Dreamers Restaurant & Lounge, made the request of the council saying it would increase his ability to host private parties during the holidays without the need to close the doors by midnight.

If the extended hours are approved, the city would not be able to designate days in which the businesses would be allowed to stay open for the maximum hours allowed. All businesses selling beer or liquor with an approved license from the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission would be eligible to stay open past midnight.

Council members were unsure how the public would respond and will discuss it further at the December meeting.

Deer Distribution

Ministerial Alliance requesting donations to feed local families

The Sonora Ministerial Alliance has begun a program of deer distribution that is designed to share deer meat with local families who are not able to hunt and to assist area landowners with their deer management programs.

Landowners and hunters who kill a deer but do not want to use the meat for themselves are encouraged to bring the deer, field dressed and properly tagged, to the Branding Iron Smokehouse in Sonora.

Volunteers will then deliver a deer to the home of persons who request one on a first-come, first serve basis. It will be the responsibility of the recipient to

process the deer.

Persons who would like a deer delivered to their home should call Justice of the Peace Adelita Smalling at her office, 387-3322, and leave their name and address.

Persons who would be willing to help deliver deer to families are urged to call Lewis Allen at 387-2616 or 387-3948.

Six deer have already been delivered to Sonora families this season. With the cooperation of hunters, landowners and volunteers, many more Sonora citizens will be able to share the bounty of Sutton County.

Sonora to host CVCOG annual conference Dec. 2

Sonora has been selected as host city for the 1992 General Assembly of the Concho Valley Council of Governments (COG). The annual conference will be held at the Sutton County 4-H Center on December 2, 1992.

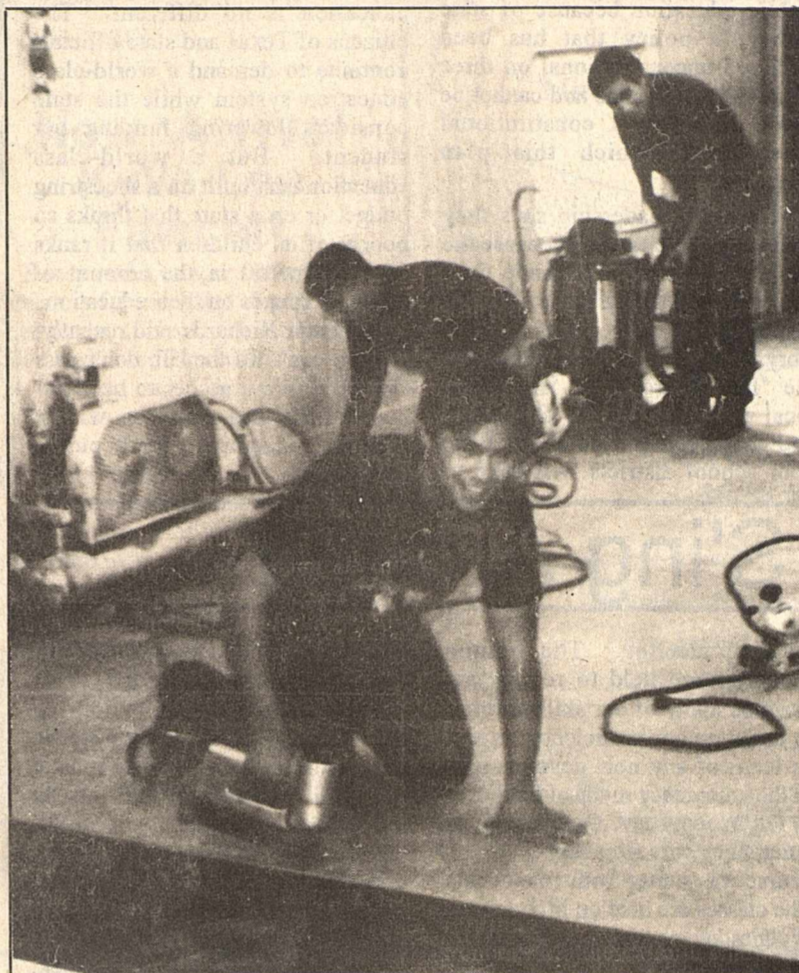
Mayor Lemuel Lopez presented the bid to host the annual event, which was subsequently accepted by the organization's executive board.

"This is the only the first of a number of regional conferences and conventions we are trying to bring to town," explained City Manager John Pape. "Every time we host a

Pape also noted that each event of this type will bring revenue into Sonora. In addition to the direct costs of holding the conference, people attending will stay in local motels, eat in local restaurants, go sight-seeing, and make local purchases while they are in town.

Organized in 1967, the San Angelo-based Concho Valley COG is a regional association of local governments in thirteen counties covering over 16,000 square miles.



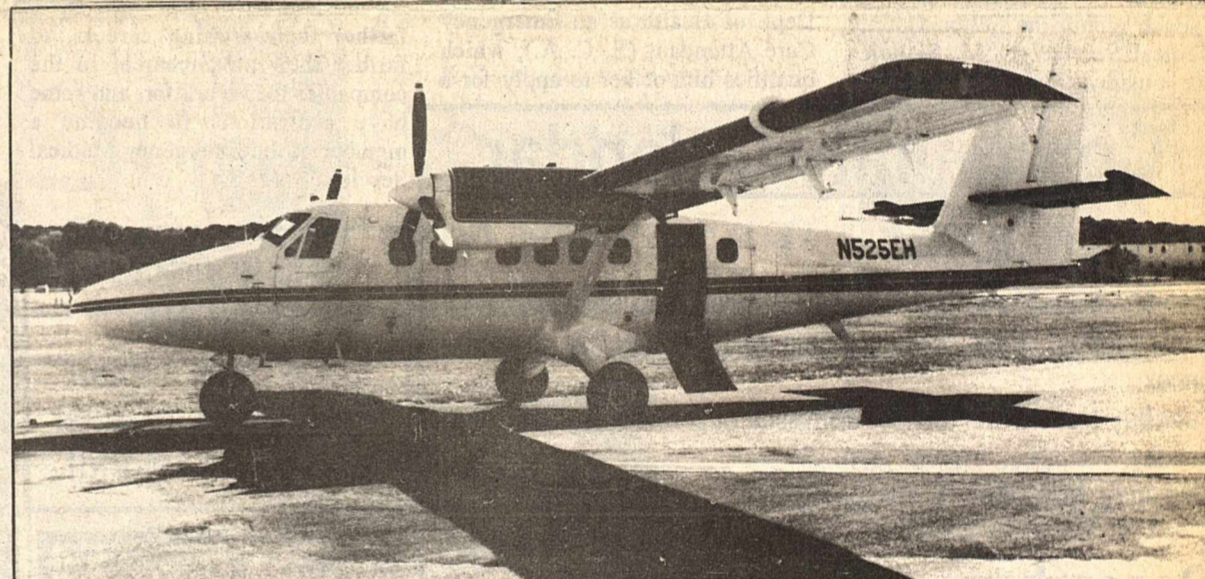

Bronco mania comes to an end Sonora's best not enough in face-off with Alpine Bucks

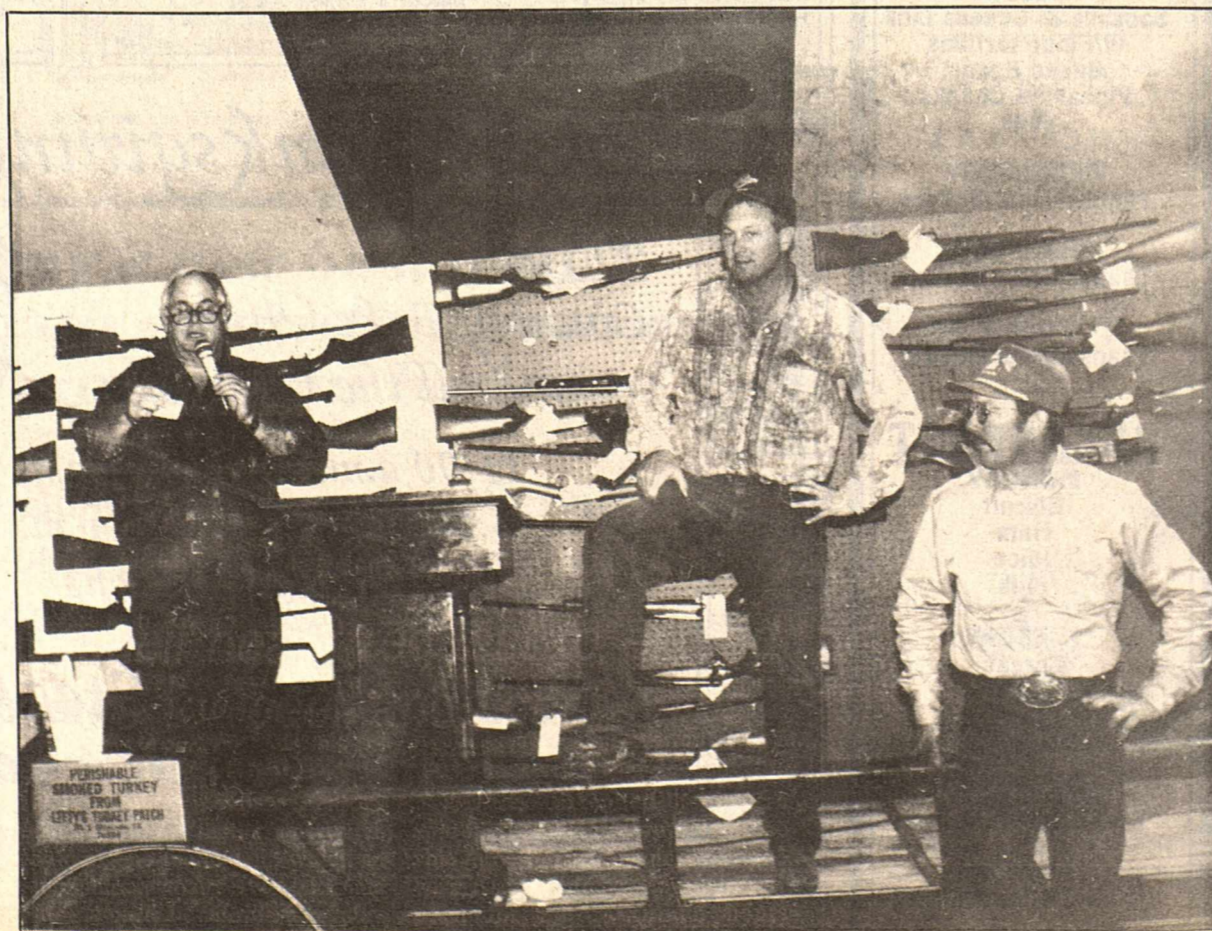

One got the sense that it was going to be one of those nights. The Sonora Broncos kicked off their post season play by kicking to the Alpine Bucks. The kick went to the Bucks Todd Knight, and it took Knight only 13 seconds to put the Bucks on the scoreboard. Knight went left, then right down the sideline for a 93 yard touchdown return. No time to panic so Sonora's Matthew Smith charged in to block the extra point attempt. Great right? Wrong! The ball bounced to Alpine magician, er, I mean quarterback Oscar Lujan who scrambled into the left corner of the end zone for two points. And so it would go until the final score would be Alpine 49, Sonora 15.

Sonora's first possession would contribute to the landslide. The kick to Sonora was miss handled and the Broncos began at the 7 yard line. With an illegal procedure penalty, the Broncos had a first and thirteen at the 3. After three plays

the Broncos were forced to punt. Lee Romero, Sonora's punter was forced to run by an overwhelming rush. He was able to scramble to the 11 but came up short of the first down marker so at the 10:38 mark the Bucks got the ball at the Bronco 11. It took just one play for Lujan to do his trick. He ran left and cut back on a quarterback option. The score came at 10:24. The point after kick was good. The score with less two minutes off the clock 15-0.

Sonora took it's next possession and drove for a score. Joey Guerra and Brian Faris combined on rushes taking the Broncos from their 27 to the 14 where it looked as if the drive would stall. With the ball fourth and four at the fourteen Tracy Crites snuck out of the back field and into the middle to catch a Faris pass for an eight yard gain. On the next play Guerra spun and darted in for a score at the 5:19 mark. The

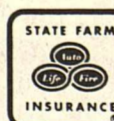

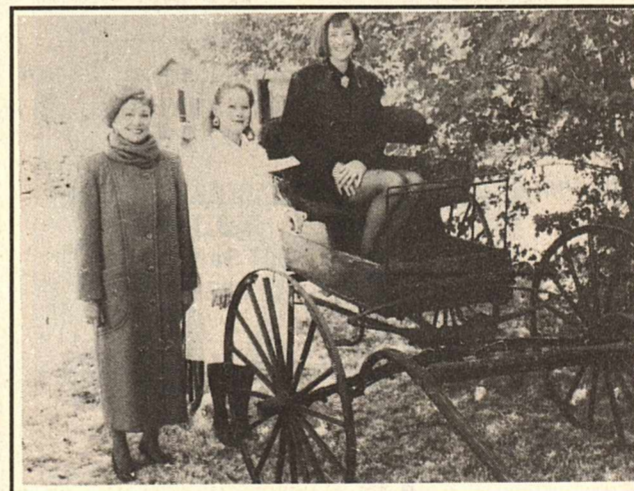

point after kick by Armando Robles was good and the score 15-7. That was the last time that it would be close.

Alpine answered with a score of their own. Lujan and Knight combined for the 69 yard drive. The score came on another Lujan mirror trick. As Lujan swept to the right and seemed to be caught for a loss he zoomed back inside for six points. On the two point conversion try Hadley Smith and Peter Perez combined to stop Magic Lujan for no score.

The first quarter came to an end with the score 21-7. The two teams trade punts and then Lujan would come back to pull another rabbit out of his hat. With the ball on the 39 Paul Espinosa took the ball down to the 9, following a trade off of five yard penalties, Lujan struck with a quarterback option and slipped and slid into the end zone for his third end zone.

Faris was nearly tackled twice but was not to be denied. The play was set up by the blocking of the right side of the Bronco line. Robles kick was good.

Alpine would add another Lujan touchdown as the clock wound down in the fourth quarter.

ASCS available to assist producers

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Programs are available to assist producers in solving their conservation problems. These are referred to as Long Term Agreement (LTA) and Annual Program (ANA). The LTA program allows certain conservation work to be completed over a period of 3 to 5 years. The Soil Conservation Service assists the Rancher in planning the work. When the work is completed to specifications, the Soil Conservation Service certifies the completion. The ASCS agency then pays the cost share.

Herb Schwertner, County Director, reminds producers that a

Long Term Agreement (LTA) sign up is underway from November 16, 1992 through December 16, 1992. If you are interested in long term conservation, contact the ASCS Office to apply. Also remember that any application made in a prior year is now null and void and a new application for 1993 must be re-submitted.

Great American Smokeout

20 million Americans across the country are expected to try giving up cigarettes for at least 24 hours today. Each year many adult smokers try to give up cigarettes for GASO day, 24 hours, 2 or more days, a week, month or forever. Many Sutton County smokers have had success with this program through the years. Of the up to 20 million Americans not smoking for the day we wish you good luck, in the past years up to 4.5 million of them made it through the day without smoking.

The Smokeout is designed as a light-hearted, upbeat event that appeals to many smokers (about 85 percent of whom, according to surveys, would like to overcome their addictions) because it asks for only a one-day commitment. A followup showed that well over a million of the successful "Smokeouters" were still not smoking 11 months later.

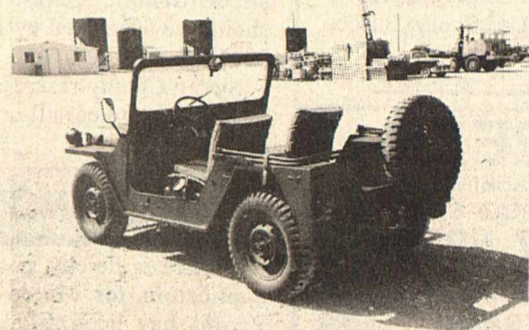
