City council members heard a would extend the hour in which an liquor would be allowed to stay

Volunteers will then deliver a deer to the home of persons who request one on a first-come, first serve basis. It will be the responsibility of the recipient to

process the deer.

Persons who would be willing to help deliver deer to families are urged to call Lewis Allen at 387-2616 or 387-3948.


Mayor Lemuel Lopez presented the bid to host the annual event, which was subsequently accepted by the organization's executive board.



Recently, Governor Ann chards, Lt. Governor Bob ullock, and Speaker Gib Lewis weiled the "Fair Share Plan" to nance public education in Texas. he 12 organizations comprising e School Finance Working roup, as well as the Texas ssociation of Secondary School rincipals and the Texas lementary Principals and upervisors Association, are sappointed and dismayed by this an and in the state's lack of ommitment to adequately fund exas' public education system.

The "Fair Share Plan" is a classic ise of passing the buck from the ate to local school districts--but e bucks will come from the ockets of local property taxpayers. he plan will cause the largest local roperty tax hike in Texas history, ad it will result in a drastic eduction in state aid for our udents. It is a lose-lose situation.

A reduction in state aid means nly one thing--another substantial icrease in property taxes--an crease to the tune of perhaps \$2.5 \$3 billion over the biennium.

Public education costs will not main constant next year. Though e proposal would add \$650 ullion in new state funds to public chools over the biennium, schools will have more students to educate, more classrooms to construct, and more teachers to pay. Additionally, schools will be faced with salary increases as required by law, continued pressure to bring classroom teachers' salaries up to the national average, and higher health care benefits. On top of that, schools, like all Texans, will see increase in utility and transportation costs next year. All of this will more than offset the increase in state aid, leading to an actual decrease in state aid per

In essence, the local property continues to be the cash cow of public education because of state policy, a policy that has been declared unconstitutional on three successive occasions and cannot be made right by a constitutional amendment, which this plan

The state leadership says they won't support a tax bill because the people of Texas have made their voices heard loud and clear. But the taxpayers are only given half the story. They have not been told that the "Fair Share Plan" will cause local property taxes to skyrocket, and that even the poorest of the poor school districts will have to raise local property taxes to unbearable levels just to stay even.

Under the "Fair Share Plan", Edcouch-Elsa ISD, the poorest school district in the state, will have to increase their tax rate by 22 cents for an increase of only \$48 per weighted student. Edgewood ISD, the lead plaintiff in the school finance lawsuit, will be forced to raise local property taxes next year by 28 cents just to break even.

Unfortunately, the "Fair Share Plan" becomes the "Unfair Share Plan" for Texas schoolchildren and Texas property taxpayers. When you go to buy an automobile, you realize there is a relationship between cost and quality. Public education is no different. The citizens of Texas and state officials continue to demand a world-class education system while the state considers lowering funding per student. But a world-class education isn't built on a shoestring budget or on a state that thinks so poorly of its children that it ranks 36th out of 50 in the amount of money it spends on their education.

Governor Richards said recently, "If you can't fill the till, don't pass the bill." We urge her to heed her own advice and come up with a plan that adequately funds public

training meeting. The training meetings are held to review and practice many of our skills in order to maintain our proficiency, as well as learn of any new developments in the emergency medical field.

On Wednesday, October 7th an emergency care attendant (E. C. A.) course was started with 14 students. The classes are held on Monday and Wednesday evenings, except for the Wednesday prior to Thanksgiving. and will conclude on Monday, December 7th. Shortly thereafter the date will be announced for the state exam, which will most likely be held in San Angelo. The exam is given by the Texas Department of Health. Upon passing the exam the student will be licensed by the Dept. of Health as an Emergency Care Attendant (E. C. A.), which one business meeting, and one qualifies him/or her to apply for a

position with any Texas Emergency Medical Service (E. M. S.). This license is good for and renewable in four years. This is an enthusiastic class working very hard to master the skills and learn all they can in many topics. Strong earnings reported by farm credit district

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
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Up and down year comes Broncos from page 1 to an close for Broncos

DS1 Service

DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts.
