I want money as quick as I can get it I have been in bed with the doctor for two weeks and he doesn't do me no good. If things don't improve, I will have to send for another doctor.


IF THE LORD be with us, who can stand against us?

City Approves Plan For Tax Building

The Bovina City Council met in a regular session on Monday, June 9.

Present were Mayor Lusk, Aldermen Gober, O'Hair, Barron, Hastings and Charles. Also present were City Manager Tom Bonds, Bedford Caldwell, Lawrence Jamerson, Lawrence Kriegel and Julia Moody.

Mayor Lusk presented Bedford Caldwell a plaque for the many years of service to the City of Bovina as Mayor and City Alderman.

The board voted unanimously to build a building for the Parmer County Tax Authority on a 15 year amortization at six per cent interest plus insurance and maintenance, and the Parmer County Tax Authority would lease the building from year to year or longer if the Tax Board sees fit.

The building would be 1200 sq. ft. at the Parmer County Tax Authority specifications with a paved parking lot. The building would revert back to the Parmer County Tax Authority at the end of the 15-year amortization

The City Manager is to present an ordinance at the next regular or special meeting, to construct the building for the Parmer County Tax

The Board voted unanimously to adopt the ordinance to establish a police reserve force for the city of Bovina, providing for the appointment, power and duties of reserve policemen.

They also voted to extend for two years the ordinance granted to Friona Cablevision the right to locate,

Archie Tarter Wins Race

The Democratic runoff election held Saturday, June 7, had a light turn-out on the county and state level, with 326 votes cast in Parmer

In the county election, Archie Tarter won the race for county commissioner, Precinct 3, over Max Crim, 180 votes cast for Tarter and 146 votes cast for Crim.

In the state elections, James P. Wallace won the Democratic nomination for the Supreme Court Place 1, defeating John C. Phillips. Wallace will face Republican Jim Brady in the November general

election. Michael J. McCormick defeated Tomkins Phillips in the race for place 2 on the Court of Criminal Appeals. McCormick is the youngest person to ever win a spot on the court.

Tom G. Davis won place 3 on the Court of Criminal Appeals, defeating Edith Roberts.

McCormick and Davis will both run unopposed in the November general election.

Sales Tax Rebates Are Above Trend

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said a small decrease in the June city sales tax rebates may indicate consumer caution about the economy and spending patterns.

Bullock said 936 Texas cities should share \$65.3 million this month, compared to payments of \$67.7 million during the same period last year. However, the report indicated that collections both at Bovina and Friona in Parmer County showed increases from the previous

Bovina showed tax payments of \$10,390.62 for the calendar year, compared to \$9,087.03 the same time a year ago, a 14 per cent gain. Friona's rebates have amounted to \$40,112.85, compared to \$33,894.71 an 18 per cent increase.

Manager Is **Named For Apartments**

Steve Sherrill has been employed as manager for the new apartment complex which is being built by the Bovina Housing Authority.

Anyone interested in getting on the list as a prospective renter is asked to contact Sherrill.

Construction on the complex has made good progress. The new target date for completion of the 12 rental units, made up of three quadraplexes, is August 15.

There will be four one-bedroom units and eight two-bedroom units. The apartments will not be furnished, but will have built-in ranges. The bedrooms and living

areas will be carpeted.

Voters Give Nod To Resume Cloud Seeding

Voters in parts of four area counties gave the green light for resumption of weather modification activities halted in 1977 in response to a vote of the people.

The total vote, as reported Wednesday night from Hale, Floyd, Castro and Lamb counties was 2,260 in favor of the proposal to 1,873 against, with the issue losing by a narrow margin in Hale County and by a heavier margin in Floyd County.

weight of 59 pounds to the bushel. Reports are that the 1980 crop will be below the 1979 crop. It looks like the hot winds and hail have caused the yield to be light and below average.

The board voted to hire H.J. Cannon III, ag teacher; David Davis, coach; and Roy Phelps, coach.

in Floyd. Areas covered by the election included the northern portion of Lamb County, most of Hale, the western part of Floyd and southern

part of Castro. The margin of approval in the election was somewhat higher than the margin of rejection in November 1977 when voters in some of the same areas voted to refuse a permit to Plains Weather Improvement Association to engage in cloud

Wednesday's elections were called by commissioners courts of the four counties after being presented with petitions requesting the vote. Backers of weather modification determined the timing would be favorable because of heavy hail losses in much

of the target area within the past year. The weather modification program is financed by voluntary contributions by landowners within the area targeted for cloud seeding, and the cost is expected to run about \$300,000 a year, according to Royce Carthel of Plainview, president of PWIA.

Weather modification, originally tried in this area as early as the late 1940s, has met with varying amounts of opposition over the years. In 1977 and again this year, it was opposed by a group organized as Citizens for Natural Weather.

Proponents of the program say that seeding clouds with silver iodide is proved effective in reducing the severity of hail storms and increasing the rainfall in the area chosen for

seeding. Opponents argue that weather modification remains an imprecise process, which has failed to break up hail storms and actually tends to reduce rainfall, particularly in areas downwind from the clouds which are seeded.

They also argue that silver iodide used in the cloud seeding is harmful to plant and animal life.



Super brights--the high voltage colors--are a second group. They are often mixed in bi-color and tri-color combinations for active sportswear.


Finally, there are the classic spectator neutrals. Chiefly black or navy plus white. These go anywhere, anytime to form the backbone of a super summer wardrobe.

FLBA Gives New Rates

William C. Liles, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe, announced that effective June 1, 1980 new loans will be closed at the variable interest rate of 93/4 per cent on farm loans and 101/4 per cent on rural residence loans, the same rate now being charged existing borrowers on the variable rate. This is a reduction from a 12 per cent fixed rate on farm loans and 14 per cent on rural residence loans which was put into effect earlier this year.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas introduced the variable rate loan in 1969, which allows the billing rate to increase and decrease with variables in the money market. Earlier this year, faced with unprecedented high money cost, a fixed rate loan was offered on a temporary basis. Improvement in the money market in recent weeks makes it possible to return to the variable rate on new



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
