Stephenville has over 200 dairies according to city secretary Joyce Pemberton, and without these, the towns existence would be water, trucking companies exist primarily for the purpose of transporting the milk for processing, and most recently a cheese plant
went into production. Farmers in the area supply part of the feed for the dairies, and the rest is either grown at the dairy or trucked in. A great number of people benefit from this industry
There have been complaints about the smell caused by the dairies, fear of contamination to neighbors water supplies - but with no proof
of such contamination, and the state has required some older dairies to of such contamination, and the state has required some older dairies to place adequate drainage to prevent any contamination - at the cost of
the dairy owner. A new dairy being built would most probably be required to have this drainage plan included in its construction.
For many years Stephenville has thrived off these dairies without contamination to their water, yet San Angelo is a arraid ONE dairy would hurt their pure water supply. An editorial in the San Angelo
Standard Times all but called Eldorado citizens ignorant for supporting the dairy. Did San Angelo bother to check with other dairy towns before jumping on the band wagon about this issue? Instead did they offer to put that money into Eldorado to help them find an alternate solution? God knows Eldorado consumers have put enough money into San Angelo over the years. Let's check into this Let's check into this possibility with an open mind. Remember, San
Angelo will only tell the bad - not the good. The dairy is a convenient scapegoat for San Angelo and only displaces guilt for a problem the have known about and should have corrected years ago. If you wil remember, reports of raw sewage running into the Concho River were quickly diverted into stories about a dairy that could cause damage to San Angelo's water supply. This issue reeks from the politics involved.
If Sonora could convince the owners of Double Vision Dairy to change their plans and locate here, eldorado would se uses dairy products - why shouldn't we benefit from it?
