

The Sonora Experiment Station is located on Highway 55, approximately halfway between Sonora and Rocksprings.

A field day and sale of the top animals is set for July 29 at the test's end.

first weigh day is March 10 and the final weigh day is June 30. Final shearing will be July 1-2.

Animal may be delivered as individuals or in sire groups, according to Dr. Frank Craddock Texas Agricultural Extension Service sheep and goat specialist at San Angelo and sale coordinator.

"It's not necessary that the animals be registered," said Craddock, but sale and use values would be better on registered animals. We ask that producers inspect their bucks to see that they are healthy, have two normal testicles and that the scrotum is not divided more than one-third the length of the testicles. The animals will be checked on arrival. Any showing evidence of scab or other contagious malady will not be accepted."

The bucks will be fed first in large groups sorted by size. Between the final weigh day and field day they will be separated into sire or ownership groups so prospective buyers can inspect them individually.

Limit per individual breeder is 12 animals unless special permission is granted. Test officials recommend a minimum of four animals per owner and sire group.

"Ideally, the bucks should be in full fleece upon arrival," said Craddock. "We'll accept shorn animals but they'll be re-sheared them and the short mohair will be worthless. Mohair from animals in full fleece will be returned to the owner following both the first and second shearing unless the buck is sold in the sale. Buyers of sale animals will receive the second fleece.

Council hears proposal First shearing is March 8-9. The for new youth center

The Youth Center was one of the topics of discussion at this months city council meeting. Barbara Stroud presented the council with an outline of by-laws for the youth center. The city council also discussed the possibility of appointing board members to head up the center. A director would need to be hired. Stroud also presented a letter from the Junior High Student Council stating that they are in full support of a youth center and they would help in any way they could.

A building is being considered on the corner of Glasscock and 277 south, there has been no final decision made. It was recommended that Beth Wallace look over the bylaws and at the next city council meeting the subject of the youth center will be discussed again.

The Sonora Golf Club requested assistance for construction of a new maintenance building. The council discussed the possible financial assistance to the golf course and recomended that the golf club set up a committee to determine how much money would be needed to maintain the property.

Bids were also discussed for computer hardware and software for the Public Works Department. A bid for \$10,374 was approved by the council. A bid for two vehicles for the city was also approved.

City Manager, John Pape stated that he would be traveling to Austin to attend a solid waste management seminar to hopefully get ideas or see what options Sonora has with its disposal of feed cost, shearing and lab work on solid waste material. Pape stated

Test Field day and Sale will be March 18 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) here. The station is 28 miles south of Sonora on U. S. Highway 55.

Over 250 rams from 41 of the nations top Rambouillet breeders are on the test.


"The rams are doing well," said Dr. Carl Menzies, TAES Resident Director at San Angelo. "They completed their first weigh day in excellent shape; really better than average."

By field day, data will have been collected on each ram including scrotal circumference, rate of gain and wool characteristics. The top 30 percent of the animals completing the test will be offered for sale at the owners discretion.

field day and sale nears "All sale rams will be tested free of brucella ovis which causes epidimitis, a leading cause of sterility among rams" said Menzies. "With the use of ultra-sound we plan to evaluate the animals for loin eye area and fat thickness. This information will be reported along with the other usual performance train data."

The final weigh day will be February 17 followed on the 18th with the final shearing. Producers wanting to view the rams in the wool should do so prior to the final shearing date. Visitors are welcome to inspect the animals at any time.

Dear Editor,

January 10, 1993 Sunday It is a warm, beautiful day. It is

8:00 a.m. in the morning and later on today I am going to take my children to a birthday party. However, my plans abruptly change. There is a phone call. There has been an accident. Don't know if he will live or die. Too much alcohol in his system to determine what injuries he has. No seat belt, speeding, alcohol. I am listening and suddenly it feels like I am still asleep and this is a dream, a dream that can't be reality because it always happens to "someone else".

Well, it didn't happen to someone else, this happened to my brother. Another statistic to add to the growing number of accidents involved while driving under the influence of alcohol.

These "minor adults" whose claim to fame is a six pack of beer or a bottle of tequila. Where are you now, his good friends, that were out the night that my brother had his accident? It took my family six and a half hours to drive to San Angelo battling nasty weather, not knowing if he would be alive or dead by the time we got there. Yet in all the time it took for us to arrive, not one of you, his good friends, went to the hospital to see if he would make it.

Also, where is the "legal adult"? The one that bought the good cold beer for you "minor adults"? Did it ever cross your mind that you were doing something illegal? That it could have been other people that could have been injured, not only my brother?

This is what drinking "good cold beer" did for my brother: a shattered jaw, which has been wired shut, four broken ribs, a shattered disc in his back, a concussion, a very badly bruised liver and spleen and a memory that amounts to a nightmare.

In the midst all the rumors that are flying around, let me give something that is not a rumor but a fact. My brother can't eat properly, he can't walk and must endure excruciating pain while having physical therapy performed. What you "minor adults" spend on a six

pack of beer amounts to one injection of pain medication for my brother.

So, when you go out partying tonight, tomorrow, or whenever, don't drink a beer for Robert because he had an accident and is laid up in the hospital, or any other person that you know that died from drinking and driving, drink one for yourself, and when you drive home. I hope that you make it. My brother nearly didn't.

On behalf of my mother and father, and family, we would like to thank the following: Hudspeth Hospital doctor and staff, Sutton County Ambulance Service, Sutton County Sheriff's Department, DPS, Angelo Community Hospital doctors and staff and all the persons who called to see how my brother was doing during this difficult time. And thank you "God" for giving him another chance. Some are not so lucky.

Mohair Council of America to hold Mail fraud alert - 2¢ scam

DALLAS/FORT WORTH -

The Postal Inspection Service is warning consumers today not to fall prey to a nationwide mail order scam that is encouraging the underpayment of first-class postage. Promoters of the mail order scam are selling an information package at a cost ranging from \$5 to \$100 that describes how to mail firstclass letters for 2¢, rather than the current rate of 29¢. The scheme is designed to bilk the postal customer out of their money using inaccurate and out-of-date information, says Inspector in Charge D. C. Strader.

The information packages cite Title 39, United States Code, Section 4253, as a legal basis for the 2¢ first-class rate. Inspector Strader advises that this section was eliminated in August 1970 under the Postal Reorganization Act. The current first-class rate is 29¢ for the first ounce or fraction of an ounce.

Unfortunately, some letters bearing only a 2¢ stamp have been delivered without collection of the deficient postage, and that has given credence to the claims made by the promoters of this fraudulent scheme. This is because most mail 2929.

It is our goal to protect the Postal Service from loss of revenue and to stop this fraudulent promotion, says Inspector Strader. Postal employees have been

alerted to the scam and are being instructed to check first-class mail for appropriate postage. Any mail carrying less than 29¢ will be delivered with a charge for the amount due as required by postal regulations.

Inspector Strader advises postal customers not to fall victim to this illegal scam. The penalty for mail fraud is a fine of not more than \$250,000.00 or imprisonment for not more than five years, or both. Postal customers who receive this package are asked to forward all the material to their local postmaster or to the Postal Inspector in Charge, Fort Worth Division, P. O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, Texas 76161-





Cancer Responce System Couple announces engagement toll-free line now available

You've heard something linking suntanning booths to cancer. Could this be true?

Your husband has recently been diagnosed as having colon cancer. What's known about this disease?

For answers to questions like these, you can call the American Cancer Society (ACS) toll free at 1-800-ACS-2345 from anywhere in the country.

This number will connect you with the American Cancer Society's CANCER RESPONSE SYSTEM (CRS).

You won't get an audiotape or a prerecorded message, but a one-toone contact with an ACS staff member or trained volunteer who will begin tracking the answers from a computer with a data bank containing the equivalent of approximately 2,000 pages of text.

The data bank continuously receives its information from sources all over the world; leading cancer scientists, physicians, medical and research centers, plus the Society's own library of resources.

The CRS operator will search through one of the main categories of information listed on the main menu, including: **Cause and Prevention Detection and Diagnosis Cancer Sites Cancer** Treatment Rehabilitation and Supportive Care **ACS** Organizations **Unproven** Methods Other Agencies **General Topics**

After your question has been answered, you might also be offered ACS or National Institute literature about the subject, or a list of sources if you want to pursue the topic in greater depth. The literature is sent only to those who call or request it, not to second parties.

ACS services available locally

The American Cancer Society provides a wide variety of services to the people of Sutton County.

For more information on these services to cancer patients, education programs or how you may protect yourself and others against this disease, the American Cancer Society urges you to call 1-800-ACS-2345. The help you need may be as close as your telephone.

Whether volunteer or staff, all CRS operators take part in a training program that covers the structure and basic programs of the ACS, reviews general information about cancer, its cause and prevention, detection and diagnosis, sites, treatment, rehabilitation and supportive care, unproven methods of treatment, and psychosocial aspects. The operators also learn to refine their communication skills by role-playing, practicing telephone conversation techniques, and considering problems operators might face. They also get practice in learning to use the computer and accessing the national and local data banks.

What does the future hold for the Cancer Response System?

"We're already seeing how very dynamic the CRS is," says Dakutis. "For example we're now including information on new forms of cancer detection like tumor markers, and as the research findings come in, we're adding information about how the immune system works. We're also finding much more general awareness of prevention. In the future the data bank will reflect calls about these discoveries and this new awareness. The system is flexible--it's a good instrument for adapting to the needs of the people who use it."



There are times when death has its kinder aspects. It was designed to bring relief to pain, to stop the flow of tears, to shorten the days of trial and to let the soul go free.

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

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

Social Security information

"Government employees planning to retire soon should be aware that their Social Security benefits may be reduced by their government pension," said Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo.


Social Security benefits are generally reduced for people who also receive a pension from a job where they did not pay Social Security taxes. "This usually applies to former Federal Government employees," said Upp, "although some State and local government employees didn't pay into Social Security so they also may be affected."

Benefits are reduced to eliminate a "windfall" that government employees received before the law was changed in 1983. Upp explained that Social Security benefits are geared to pay a higher rate of return to low wage earners. "For example," he said, "low paid workers could receive benefits up to 90 percent of their pre-retirement earnings. Highly paid workers receive considerably less." Before 1983, Social Security benefits for government employees were computed as if they were low-wage employees, giving them the advantage of the higher Social Security rate plus their government pension. This unintended windfall was not payable to non-government employees, and so it was eliminated.

Anyone can get a free estimate of his or her future Social Security benefits by filling out a request for a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement available from any Social Security office. However, Upp cautioned government employees that their estimates may not accurately reflect their actual benefit. "That's because Social Security cannot calculate other pensions at the time an estimate is issued," he said. "However, when a person actually files for retirement benefits. information he or she provides about other pensions is included in the computation process and benefits are reduced accordingly."

The estimate statement Social Security provides includes a section, "Government Pensions and Social Security Benefits," especially designed to alert government employees that ". . your Social Security benefits and those of your spouse may be lower than the amounts shown on this statement "

People who want a free estimate of their benefits should contact Social Security for the request form. Government employees should also ask for the free fact sheet, "A Pension From Work Not Covered by Social Security", which explains in detail how the adjustments are made and should help the reader determine any reductions to make to his or her estimate

Lady Broncos coach holds impressive record

Clyde Dukes knows what it takes to win.

And he should. He's done his share of it during his coaching career

The head coach of the Lady Broncos has an impressive career varsity record of 281-105 spanning 13 years, the last nine of those in Sonora. He has spent 17 total years in coaching.

So far this season, the Lady Broncos have a 14-3 record and appear headed for another playoff year.

Dukes is highly complimentary of this year's team.

"We can get in the playoffs. You never know how far you'll go, but we have a good opportunity," Dukes said.

"This team is very comparable to other teams I've had in the past," Dukes added.

Their strength, he said, is aggressiveness and depth. Their weakness is a lack of size. "We have to play physically defensively because we're so small. On offense, we have to get the game under control," Dukes said.

Dukes graduated from Abilene Wylie High School in 1966 and from Abilene Christian University in 1970 with a major in math and a minor in physics.

He then taught two years- one in Floresville and the other in the Harlandale district in San Antonio.

Dukes was then hired to teach math and physics in Robert Lee. "I always loved athletics and got a chance to start coaching," Dukes said.

While in Robert Lee, Dukes completed an additional teaching certificate in physical education from Angelo State University.

As a junior high coach and high school assistant in Robert Lee, his junior high mark was 57-1 and the high school teams were district champions and won state in 1977-

It was then that Dukes was moved up to Head Coach for the girls program there for four years. He compiled an impressive 101-16 record, including district champions every year and a regional finalist and regional semifinalist two years.

Dukes was then offered to head up Sonora's girl's program, and he's been doing just that for 10 years.

"I came to Sonora (in 1983) because I liked the town and the situation here. The administration was really nice. It was a great opportunity," he said.

While in Sonora, Duke's record is 180-89, including three district championships, and the Lady Broncos have been in a playoff for district or in the playoffs seven of his past nine seasons.

His most memorable game came in February of the 1988-89 season when his Lady Broncos beat Coahoma in Ballinger for a district playoff game. "We had so much trouble beating Coahoma, but that night everything slicked," Dukes said. The team, however, went on to lose the next-round playoff game to Decatur in Brownwood.

With all of Duke's success, one might ask what the future holds for him and his coaching career.

"Right now my plans are to stay in Sonora until retirement. I have no plans to go anywhere else," Dukes said.



Supreme court indicates unwillingness to protect women

With the ruling in Bray V. Alexandria Women's Health Clinic, the United States Supreme Court has indicated its unwillingness to protect the welfare of millions of American women.

Without the possibility of federal intervention, anti-choice groups can now escalate their campaign of harassment against women seeking abortion - a legal medical procedure.

"The ruling in Bray leaves the door open to mob violence which will threaten the welfare of millions of American women," stated Karen-Pieper-Hildebrand, Executive

Director of Planned Parenthood of West Texas, Inc.

The majority of the court ruled that women are not entitled to federal protection from anti-choice terrorism, since federal courts can no longer police the actions of the mobs who victimize and intimidate these women.

Before the ruling, federal court judges used the law struck down by Bray to subject disruptive protestors to heavy fines and imprisonment. This will no longer be a deterrent to those intent on harassment.

Taxpayers will bear the brunt of

the costs of these terrorist activities in the cities where anti-choice group choose to become a public nuisance. The recent examples of Wichita, Kansas and Buffalo, new York, where the municipalities were forced to spend millions of taxpayers' dollars to protect citizens from mob violence will continue and escalate.

Ms. Hildebrand said, "By then abolishing of federal jurisdiction in the clinic protest arena, the Supreme Court has empowered a dangerous fringe element of society to impede the legal options of others.

of Care en Abilene y TLC Registry en Eldorado. Estos no son "programas" en si mismos. Nosotros ocupamos cada agencia por medio de contratos basados en referencias y seleccionamos uno de sus trabajadores para enviarlos donde se necesite la ayuda.
