THE TEXAS TOURIST Council, along with the Texas Highway Department, is pushing a "See Texas First" theme for this summer, buoyed by the rising cost of fuel and other factors.

This, plus the fact that daughter Laura is performing this summer at Six Flags Over Texas, helped us decide on a vacation trip to the Dallas-Fort Worth area last week.

We were surprised to find gas prices as low, if not lower, in that area than they are here at home.

As June Floyd stated last week, Six Flags is observing its 20th anniversary this year, and a big effort has been made to promote the park, which has become one of Texas' main tourist attractions during its 20-year history.

They have a major star attraction at the park each week during the summer. Ron Marlowe, the Elvis Presley impersonator, was the featured act while we were there. There is a new amphitheatre which must seat around 2,000 people, for these main attractions.

Other acts which will be featured before the summer is over will include Crystal Gale, the Oak Ridge Boys, Ronnie Milsap, B.J. Thomas, Larry Gatlin and Kool & The Gang.

Six Flags is also presenting an outstanding fireworks display every evening at 9:30 which is proving popular.

Not having been to Six Flags for some time, we found that there were some ride attractions which were new to us. These include the "Judge Roy Scream," and although we had ourselves psyched up to attempt this roller-coaster ride, the lines were always just a shade too long. (That sounds good, anyway).

Naturally, daughter Laura's show at the Southern Palace was the main attraction for the Ellis family, and we managed to take it in more than once. Thankfully, it is one of the inside (air-conditioned) shows, which helps cool you off after making the rounds.

We were sufficiently impressed with the Southern Palace show. The costumes are unbelievable; the production is great, and as usual, the kids in the show are top-notch. We had known this before Laura got the opportunity to perform, having seen their shows a number of times.

THERE ARE OTHER attractions in the D-FW area, including the Texas Rangers' major league baseball team. Stanley and I managed to work in a couple of Ranger games while there. When the batter hits the ball, one of two bases makes a high-pitched noise, telling the batter which base he is to touch. His object is to touch the base before one of the fielders touches the beeping ball.

Area Sweltering In 100-Degree Heat

The Bovina area was sweltering under the season's first heat wave the first part of the week, as the temperature hit the 100-degree mark, and then some.

Monday afternoon's high temperature was 103 degrees in Amarillo, and that was also the official high reading at Friona's weather station. Some local thermometers were said to have hit 105 degrees.

By early afternoon on Tuesday, the mercury had again climbed to the 100-degree mark, and forecasts indicated that that level would again be reached on Wednesday, with no relief in sight, at least in the way of rainfall.



One bright spot as far as the hot weather is concerned is the fact that the area's wheat and barley harvest has been allowed to move ahead and make good progress.

The hot weather also is good for the area's cotton and bean crops, but irrigation farmers will be busy watering the corn and maize, which requires considerable moisture when the mercury climbs to the levels of this week.

Reports continue to indicate that the yield on the 1980 wheat crop is somewhat below that of 1979.

The hot days in June caused the grain to shrivel, reports say.

Court Re-Invests CD From General Fund

Re-investing \$50,000 of county money from the general fund, and approval of payment of the county's Workman's Compensation insurance highlighted the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners June 9.

After discussing budget matters with County Treasurer Benna Felts, a motion was passed to re-invest \$50,000 from the county's general fund in a 60-day certificate of deposit.

A bill was presented from Horn-Clayton Insurance Company for Workman's Compensation insurance policy covering county employees, in the amount of \$11,784. The bill was approved.

A bill for boarding care of Dora Fields, a Parmer County foster child, in the amount of \$186, was approved.

A statement from attorney Doyle Curtis, who served as defendant for a juvenile, was approved for payment.

A number of soil conservation work projects were approved, including \$137.50 for Arnold Hromas, \$25.00 for Norvell Strawn, \$277.00 for James Brown, \$12.50 each for K.K. Johnson, Gary Sheets and Doyle Johnson, \$37.50 for Bruce Billingsley, \$50.00 for Max Steinbock, \$25.00 for Finis Jennings and \$100 for Robert Gallman.

Duval Burton of the Soil Conservation Service met with the court expressing concern about the Bovina damsite on Running Water Draw.

Census Bureau Urges Response

Were you counted in the 1980 Census of Housing and Population?

If you think you or your family might have been missed, fill out the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" form printed in this week's issue as a public service. Cut it out and return it by mail to U.S. Census Office, P.O. Box 11094, Amarillo, Texas 79111. The form will be checked against the master address list for your area so there is no chance of an individual or household being counted twice.

This appeal to the public is made by William Soule, manager of the Amarillo area District Census Office. Soule says that the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" campaign is an additional effort to insure that no one is overlooked during the 1980 Census.

A few days before April 1, Census Day, questionnaires were mailed to all residential addresses in this area. They were to be filled out and mailed back on April 1. Since that time, the Census Bureau has hired and trained local residents as census takers and sent them out to call at homes from which no questionnaires have been

received. They are also now contacting households that have returned inadequately filled-out questionnaires to gather complete information. The Census Bureau hopes that any households missed in these previous operations will respond during the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" campaign.

Soule noted, "A check is now being made to ascertain that a questionnaire for every known household has been completed and shortly we will be able to turn over to local officials the population counts for their communities."

These preliminary population counts will be subject to a review by local elected officials. The purpose of this Local Review Program is to give city and county officials an opportunity to spot errors while census workers are still in the field. This allows the Census Bureau to recheck any questioned population counts and should contribute significantly to the accuracy and success of the 1980 Census.

Appraiser Named For County Tax Board

Hiring of the Chief Appraiser for the Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board was the main item of business Monday night at the regular meeting of the appraisal board in Bovina.

Patsy Nance, who is currently employed as the Bovina School Tax Assessor, will assume duties July 1 as the Chief Appraiser for the new Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board.

Mrs. Nance was chosen from a field of ten applicants for the position. Five of the applicants were interviewed in person.

The board also was advised that the City of Bovina had accepted the terms under which the board will rent a building to house the new tax office.

A 30x40-foot structure is to be built. Rent on the structure, which is to be financed by First State Bank of Bovina at six per cent interest, is to be prorated over a 20-year period to cover the cost of the building, plus interest and insurance.

The present estimate for monthly rent is around \$250. At the end of the 20-year period, the building will belong to the Tax Appraisal District.

Prior to the next regular meeting of the board, July 7, Mrs. Nance is to prepare a budget, which will estimate the operating expenses for the office and the cost to each taxing unit for the fiscal year.

Additional employees will be hired by Mrs. Nance as needed.

County's 1979 Cotton Figures Released

Cotton production from the 25 High Plains counties represented by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in 1979 came to 2,750,600 bales of 480 pounds net weight, according to figures just released by the Texas Crop & Livestock Reporting Service (TCLRS), Austin.

The total was the third highest on record, trailing the 1977 crop of 3,215,400 bales and the 2,888,700 bales produced in 1973.

Planted acreage according to TCLRS was a record 4,565,800, over a half million acres above the 4,043,000 seeded in 1978, which was the previous high. But adverse weather, including one of the most severe hailstorms ever seen in August, cut 1979 harvested acres by 17 per cent to 3,789,250. Yield per harvested acre for the 25 counties averaged 348.4 pounds, up from the 274.4 pounds harvested in 1978 but far below the area high of 513.2 pounds set in 1965. The 10-year High Plains average yield per harvested acre, 1970 through 1979, now comes to 356.3 pounds.

Dawson County, with 243,800 bales, led the area in total 1979 production. In second, third and fourth places were Lubbock (240,600), Gaines (228,700)

Per-acre yield leaders on the Plains in 1979 were Martin (552 pounds), Howard (525), Midland (510) and Garza (505).

B.A.S.S. To Meet July 1 In Friona

The recently organized Friona Bassmasters, an affiliated chapter of the national Bass Anglers Sportsman Society (B.A.S.S.) will hold its next regular meeting at 8 p.m. on July 1 at the Friona State Bank. The meeting is open to any interested bass fisherman, according to Leroy Lundy, president of this local bass fishing conservation group.

The Friona Bassmasters are one of 1400 affiliated chapters of the over 300,000 member national bass fishing organization headquartered in Montgomery, Alabama. Besides an interest in improving anglers' bass fishing skills, the Society has acted to improve fishing waters and protect the sport of fishing.

Since its founding in early 1968, B.A.S.S. has become the watchdog of the waterways for sports fishermen. Recently the Society spearheaded a national effort of curbing the charging of use fees at Army Corps of Engineers reservoirs across the country. The national B.A.S.S. and its affiliated Chapters rallied support for legislation by Congress to prohibit the collection of use fees from Corps of Engineers recreation sites at lakes and other waterways.

The organization of B.A.S.S. Chapters into 36 State Federations has strengthened the Society's ability to respond to threats of problems of pollution at the state level. "These organizations are the first line of water and environment pollution defense," said Lundy.

Bass fishermen interested in organizing other area B.A.S.S. chapters and forming a united B.A.S.S. Chapter Federation in the Texas Panhandle can contact Leroy Lundy, 806-247-2784. Other officers in the Western Plains Bass Club-Bassmasters are Charles Hough, vice president, 806-265-3428 or Dale Cunningham, secretary, 806-247-3846.

The Federation will work closely with state game and fish personnel and elected legislative officials for the improvement of the sport of bass fishing, said Lundy. Other projects

include the organization of youth fishing programs and a state-wide Chapter tournament.

Each year State Federations send a six-man team to compete in the National Bassmaster Chapter Championship sponsored by national B.A.S.S. Last year the top five national teams divided \$8,500 awarded by B.A.S.S. for use in their states to improve the sport of bass fishing.

From time to time FFA members will be introduced in this column. This week, Kenny Carrell is the FFA member we want you to know.

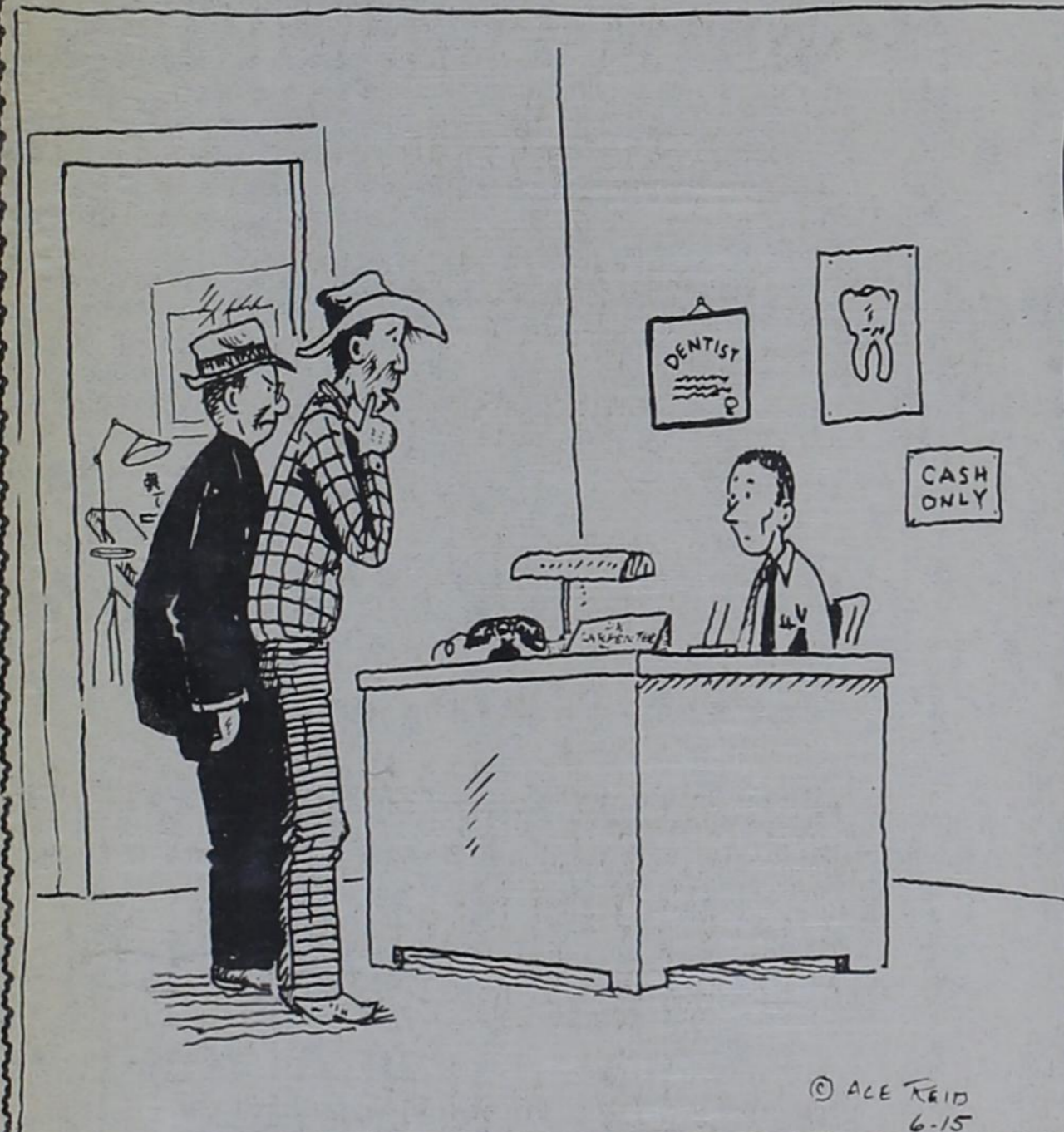

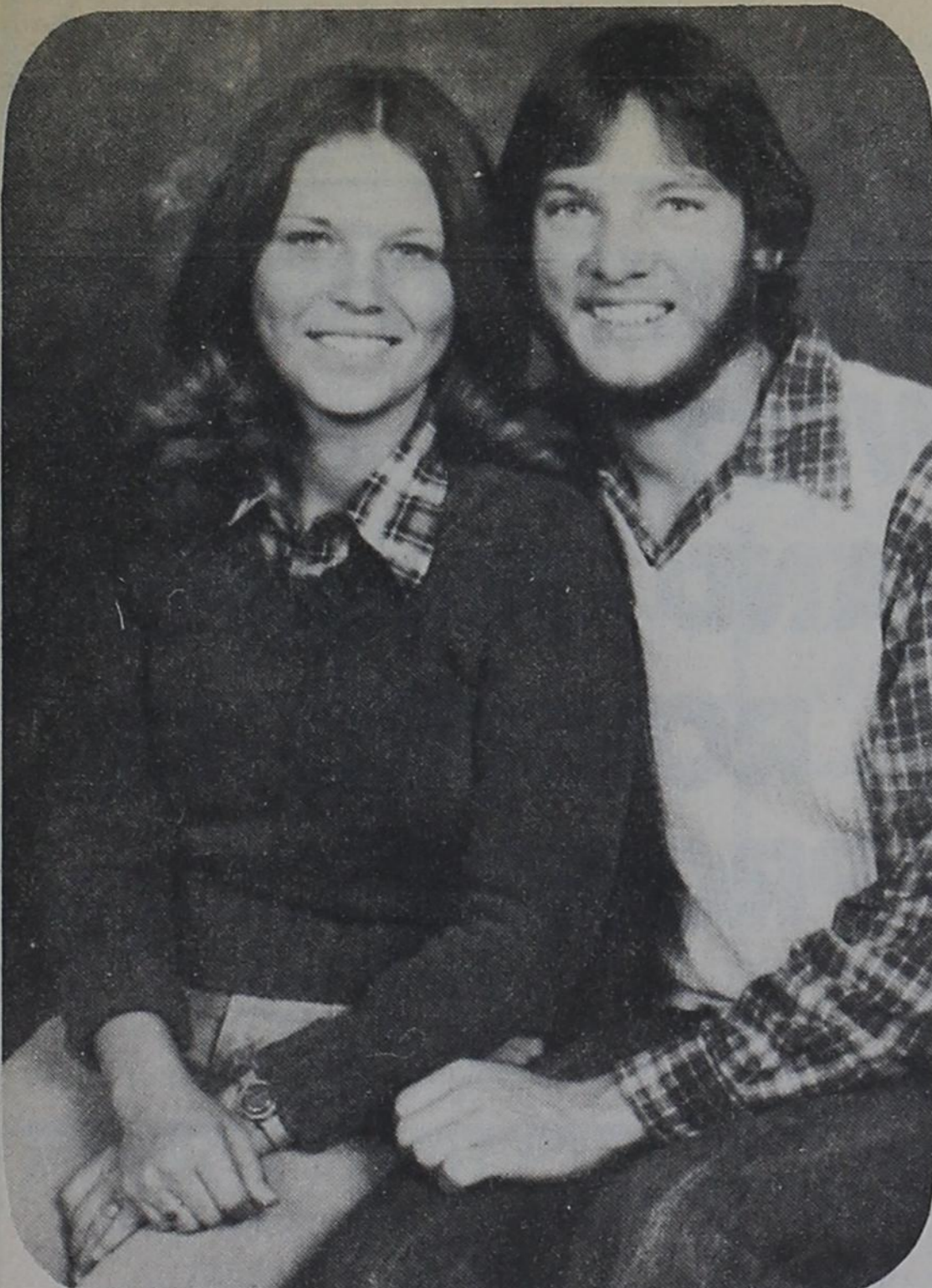

Six Flags Over Texas Installed Gas Station

Five self-service islands, with a total of nine two-sided pumps, offer regular, unleaded and diesel fuel.

Staffed by park personnel, the Six Flags station is open for business during park operating hours. To offer complete gasoline availability information to the public, the park

has also established a gasoline hot line at 214/641-7200.

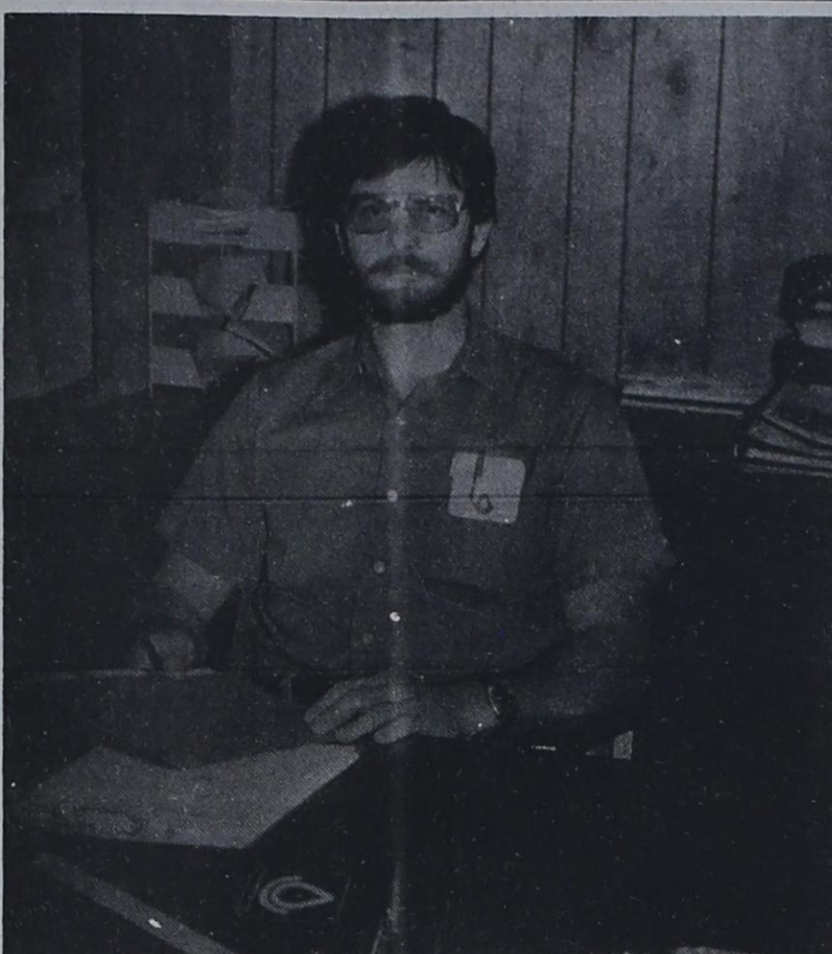
"Through the use of this telephone number, we can communicate to thousands of potential visitors information on the availability of gasoline not only in our park but also at stations surrounding the park," Williams said.

As an additional aid to travelers, a convenience store will also be located at the station. Motor oil, ice, soft drinks, snacks, cigarettes and other convenience items will be available at the store.
