

Marijuana valued at over \$50,000 puts two in jail

Two men taken into custody after Deputy discovers marijuana stash

Sheriff Bill Webster reported that two suspects had been arrested south of Sonora with more than fifty pounds of suspected marijuana in their possession. Friday morning, Sheriff Webster stated that Thursday evening, Sutton County Deputy Sheriff Ed Duncan, stopped a vehicle occupied by two men who live in Del Rio.

The men, Pedro Ramos, age 34, and Thomas Sullivan, III, age 33, were both arrested when ten packages of suspected marijuana was found under and behind the seat of the vehicle they occupied. Another six packages were found in the vehicle's spare tires.

Sheriff Webster stated both suspects are currently in the Sutton County Jail. Bond has been set at \$35,000.

The marijuana had a total value of over \$50,000.

Not on the backs of the **Sheep & Mohair Industry**

WASHINGTON -Congressman Henry Bonilla (R-TX-23) is traveling to wool and mohair country next week. The Congressman's trip to the region will come in the wake of Administration budget cutting measures. One, specifically aimed at attacking the wool and mohair industry, would have a tremendous negative impact on many communities in District-

A Unites States Senate Bill, (S. B. 477) designed to terminate the Wool Act has been introduced by Senator Russell Feingold, who sits on the Senate Agriculture Committee. Feingold estimates several million dollars can be trimmed from the federal budget if his bill is passed.

Due to this economically devastating proposal which targets mohair incentive payments, Congressman Bonilla has asked for members of the wool and mohair industry, as well as locally elected officials, to meet with him to discuss this critical issue.

The Congressman points out that the industry helps to employ some 15,000 people in the United States and that wool and mohair are the dominate industries in this region of Texas.

"Over 80% of the mohair produced in Texas comes from my district. Clearly, the wool and mohair industry is of vital economic importance to this state and any attempt to cut incentive payments to producers will only cost the region jobs," said

"Producers of Wool and Mohair expect their Congressman to advocate wasteful spending cuts to help balance the federal deficit, and this I'll do. But I won't do it on the backs of farming and ranching," said Bonilla.

Congressman Bonilla will be addressing this issue during meetings in Rocksprings, Sonora and Ozona, on Wednesday, April 7, 1993. The Sonora meeting will begin at 1:30 p. m., at the Cauthorn Memorial Building.

Sonora officials make plans to bid for Double Vision Dairy

to continue attempts to develop a dairy in northern Schleicher County, Sonora officials are stepping up efforts to bring the project to Sutton County. If located in the Sonora area, the proposed Double Vision Dairy would have a significant positive impact on the local economy.

Initially, the project was to be developed on 2500 acres of land located 14 miles north of Eldorado. However, that plan drew environmental opposition from citizens in Christoval and San Angelo because the site was located on a draw that feeds the aquifer supplying the San Angelo water system.

"When the environmental opposition first started, we began making preliminary contacts with the partners involved in the dairy project," said Sonora City Manager John Pape. "Our basic position was that, if the Schleicher County site fell through, we wanted them to consider locating in Sutton County."

Pape noted that the environmental concerns raised at the first site would not be an issue in Sutton County. He further stated that the proposed dairy would be a state-of-the-art facility, and would not have an adverse impact on the local environment or water supply.

"Dairies of this design are currently in use throughout Texas and the United States," Pape said. "We have done extensive investigation into this matter, and find no cases of environmental damage. In fact, we found that dairies are not only good for the economy, but make good neighbors as well."

With the decision to abandon the Schleicher County site,

With last week's decision not Sonora will intensify its efforts to land the dairy. Further contacts are being made by Pape and other city officials, including the recently-formed Sonora Economic Development Committee.

In addition to Sonora, several other communities have expressed interest in the project. These include Menard and Fort Stockton, as well as three other sites in Schleicher County.

Trash Terminators to return on April 3

Some 28,640 Adopt-a-Highway and 56,190 Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers around the state are expected to unite on Saturday, April 3, for the eighth annual "Great Texas Trash-Off." The event, which is sponsored by the Texas Department of Transportation in conjunction with the "Don't Mess With Texas" antilitter program, is considered the largest one-day cleanup effort in the nation.

This year's Trash-Off is expected to be the biggest and the best yet, with Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., scouring areas such as city streets and parks while Adopt-A-Highway groups take to the state's roadways.

Across the state you will see Adopt-A-Highway groups such as Lions Clubs, Kiwanis Clubs, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, sororities, fraternities, Masonic Lodges, families, businesses, church groups, etc., arm themselves with trash bags and safety vests to combat litter. Included among the local KTB

Texas traffic fatalities decline in '92

AUSTIN - Traffic accidents killed fewer people in Texas during 1992 than in any other year since 1974, according to figures compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Traffic deaths have declined during each of the past four vears.


Last year, 2,690 fatal traffic accidents claimed 3,057 lives - a 0.7 reduction from the 3,079 deaths in 1991.

"Although we are pleased that there has been a decrease in the number of traffic deaths, we are still concerned about the number of lives lost because of traffic accidents," DPS Director Col. James R. Wilson said. "Some of those deaths could have been avoided if motorists and their passengers had adhered to our traffic laws."

Of the traffic fatalities in 1992. 40 percent (1,222) were killed in alcohol or drug related accidents, a decrease from the 40.6 percent in 1991. Nearly 65 percent of all people killed in the front seats of passenger cars and light trucks were not wearing safety belts, and approximately 24 percent of the 134 fatality injured motorcyclists were not wearing helmets.

The state's death rate, 1.9 deaths per 100 million miles traveled, remained the same as in 1991. The Texas Department of Transportation reported that 162.769 billion vehicle miles were traveled in Texas in 1992, which is a very slight reduction from 1991.



Spring means warmer weather is coming and it is time to clean and store your winter clothing. Clean all items before storing. Even tiny spots of soil or food make the fabric more susceptible to staining, mildew and insect infestations. Launder washable items and garments, but avoid using laundry additives such as fabric softener and starch. Fabric softeners tend to yellow with age and starch attracts insects.

Reduce dry cleaning costs by having "dry clean only" garments cleaned, but not pressed. Store wool garments in moth repellant (balls, flakes, or crystals), but avoid putting moth repellent in baby or children's cotton clothing.

Tailored and professional clothing should be stored on padded hangers protected in a cloth garment bag. Avoid storing garments in plastic whenever possible. Plastic garment bags and dry cleaner bags trap moisture during the

Devil's River News, January 20, 1950 carried the following article:

\$90,000 Store Building Planned Here By Hallum Brothers

Construction on a \$90,000 store and office building fronting 130 feet on U. S. Highway 290 on the Hallum property immediately east of the Humble Station, is scheduled to begin February 1, according to R. L. and Asa Hallum, who plan the building.

To be known as the Hallum Building, the structure is planned to house six stores and will be built of concrete tile and painted. Front will be glazed tile and plate glass, and the building will be set back about 25 feet from the street to provide adequate parking space for customers.

Generally speaking, the building is to be of the "community center" type, with heavy partitions separating the six store spaces, and with each individually air conditioned. Gas outlets will be provided for

R. L. Hallum said Tuesday the building would cover the whole block including loading areas at the rear. Actual dimensions of the building will be about 130 x 50 feet. All store spaces, however, will front on the highway. The roof will be flat, with tar and gravel topping.

C. A. Wise of San Antonio has been employed by the Hallums as superintendent of construction and plans to start work by Feb. 1. Plans call for completion of the building in 90 days, Hallum said.

Devil's River News, May 12, 1950 Superette Market

The Sonora Superette Market, Sonora's first super-market, held its formal opening last night and opened for business today. Located in the Hallum Building on the new highway, the store is owned by George E. (Bud) Smith, owner of the Sonora Grocery, but will be operated as a separate business on a cash and carry basis and will have no connection with the other store.

The super-market is a "first" for Sonora from the concrete tile walls in lime green, powder blue, rose and gray pastel shades, to the insect and verminproof shelving. This all steel shelving does not afford any breeding places for insects because of the hard infrared baked on enamel surfaces which makes climbing almost impossible, eliminates all hiding spots, and offers the insect nothing to eat.





Our EMS Coordinator, Lenora Pool, attended an Emergency Management seminar, sponsored by the Texas Department of Public Safety - Division of Emergency Management, in Austin, Monday, March 22 thru Friday, March 26th. Among some of the seminars Lenora attended were different types of hazards in our communities, hazardous materials, emergency planning for communities, action plans, and mitigation. She attended a number of other seminars too numerous to mention. As head of our emergency management team she coordinates our emergency planning with our EMS, the fire department, police department, city and county officials, to name a few. Our emergency planning is for preparation and action plans in the event of a tornado, floods, and any other disasters that may arise. Lenora has attended many courses and seminars in emergency management, and puts together and shares action plans for Sonora, Sutton County, and

related departments. Our E. M. T. (Emergency Medical Technician) classes, which started on January 21st and runs thru April 27th, two nights a week for approximately 3 hours, are going well, (I suppose!). The "bright, shiny faces of the students" in the beginning of the classes are no longer so "bright and shiny"! At the beginning of each class a test is given over the last session.

These tests are dreaded, but really give some insight as to the difficulty they will most probably face on their state test. Many topics have already been covered with quite a lot to go. Some of the topics include medical emergencies, pediatric emergencies, environmental emergencies, heart attacks & stroke, diabetic emergencies, poisonings, shock, fractures & dislocations, injuries to the head,





School board minutes

The Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District met in regular session on Thursday, March 18, 1993 at 6:00 p. m. in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 807 S. Concho, Sonora, Texas.

Present: Michael Smith, President; Jesse Bustamante, Gary Hardgrave, Sam David Hernandez, Gloria Lopez, Carol Mayer, Donald Patton and

Charles Russell, Superintendent.
Others Present: Michelle Anderson, Bob Bellard, Bob Brockman, Clay Cade, John Canfield, Jeryl Fields, Rex Ann Friess, Donna Hill, Jerry Hopkins, Diane Jacoby, Cynthia Keel, Mark Nelson, Sarah Ortiz, Janet Patton, Ramiro Perez and Bob Ralston.

The meeting was called to order by President Michael Smith and the invocation was given by Superintendent Charles Russell.

President Smith moved to item 4 on the agenda. At Large member Carol Mayer, appointed at the February meeting to fill the vacancy was created by the resignation of Becky Johnson, was administered the formal Oath of Office by Cynthia Keel.

President Smith announced that the Board was going into executive session according to its rights under the provision of Article 6252-17 V. A. T. S., Sec. 2(g) and Sec. 2(e) to discuss personnel matters and also to discuss the complaint registered with LULAC against the district. He further stated that no action would take place in closed session.

The Board reconvened in open session at 8:20 p. m. All members were present with the exception of Gary Hardgrave who had been excused earlier to coach a Little Dribblers basketball game. Motion was made by Donald Patton, seconded by Carol Mayer, to renew the contracts of all professional personnel as recommended by the Principals. Members voting aye were Jesse Bustamante, Gloria Lopez, Carol Mayer, and Donald Patton. Member voting nay was Sam David Hernandez. The motion carried.

The minutes of February 10, 1993 were unanimously approved after a motion by Gloria Lopez and a second by Sam David Hernandez.

President Smith welcomed the many visitors to the meeting, including trustee candidates Michelle Anderson, Bob Brockman, and Ramiro Perez and Meridian Oil tax representative Bob Ralston.

Chief Appraiser Rex Ann Friess reported that 96 1/2% of both the district and CED levies had been collected and that collections were proceeding smoothly.

Superintendent Charles Russell gave brief reports on the tentative school calendar for 1993-1994, staff development days scheduled for April, the spring session of Driver's Education, and Senate Bill 20.

Additionally, enrollment figures were listed as follows: High School 276, Junior High School 253, Intermediate School 230, and Primary School 253 for a total of 1012.

President Smith introduced Band Director John Canfield and Assistant Director Mark Nelson who gave a detailed presentation about their program, listing the many improvements that have been made in the last two years and their projections for the coming years. They concluded their remarks by stating that their major goal was to give their students an appreciation for music that they could carry throughout their lives. The Board thanked Mr. Canfield and Mr. Nelson for their excellent presentation.

For the convenience of guests, President Smith moved to item 13 on the agenda and introduced Special Programs Coordinator Lori Solis and aide Sarah Ortiz. They presented information about the success they are experiencing with the Early Childhood Program. The program not only addresses the development of language, self help, social, emotional, and motor skills for identified At Risk 3 and 4 year olds but also stresses active parent involvement for these identified children. Mrs. Ortiz stated that both parents and children have been highly receptive to the home visits she makes and that she is serving 20 children-17 on a weekly basis. Both Mrs. Solis and Mrs. Ortiz expressed their appreciation to the Board for the interest they have shown and the support they have given to the program. The Board, in turn, expressed their gratitude to both ladies for the enthusiasm they have generated which has made the program so successful. Additionally, the Board was in agreement to increase Mrs. Ortiz's hours in order to enable her to make 2 home visits per family per week.

Business Manager Diane Jacoby informed the Board that TEA is encouraging districts to maximize their investment possibilities. She gave a detailed presentation about Lone Star Investment Pool and TexPool, programs which offer districts the opportunity to make maximum use of their investment funds. Additionally, she stated that both John Ingrum of the district's auditing firm and John Wade of the TEA audit division had highly recommended both programs.

Following a discussion of the programs, Gary Hardgrave made a motion, seconded by Donald Patton, to give the school district the option of investing in the Lone Star Investment Pool. The motion carried unanimously.

Jesse Bustamante made a motion, seconded by Sam David Hernandez, to empower the district with the option of investing funds in TexPool. The motion carried unanimously.

The Superintendent presented information concerning the state of school finance and upcoming The Board, legislation. Superintendent, and Meridian tax representative Bob Ralston held a lengthy discussion pertaining to the issue and the manner in which it may be resolved.

After a review of current bills in the amount of \$261,244.25. the Board unanimously approved payment. Motion was made by Gloria Lopez and seconded by Donald Patton.

Because of the lateness of the hour, the Board was in agreement to table the remaining items on the agenda and to call another meeting for 6:00 p. m. on Thursday, March 25 for discussion and/or adoption of these final agenda topics.

The Board voted unanimously to adjourn at 10:25 p. m. following a motion by Donald Patton and a second by Gary Hardgrave.


