Texas traffic fatalities decline in '92

AUSTIN - Traffic accidents killed fewer people in Texas during 1992 than in any oth figures compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety Traffic deaths have declined during each of the past four years.
Last year, 2,690 fatal traffic accidents claimed 3,057 lives - a deaths in 1991 .
"Although we are pleased that there has been a decrease in the number of traffic deaths, we are still concerned about the number accidents, " DPS Dise of traffic James R. Wilson said. "Some of those deaths could have been avoided if motorists and their passengers had adhered to our traffic laws."
