## Officials discuss rabies outbreak

City, county, and state officials met at Sonora City Hall this week to discuss the current
rabies situation and ways to address the outbreak before it becomes critical. Since January, ten confirmed cases of rabies have been reported in the Sonora
area. Jeff Sanders, a zoonosis
control specialist with the Texas Department of Health, briefed local government officials and law enforcement officers on the current rabies situation.
Methods of handling suspecting rabid animals and limiting human exposure were among the topics
discussed. discussed.
Of the Of the ten confirmed cases in the Sonora area, none have
involved domestic animals. Six of the rabid animals have been of the rabid animals have been
skunks, two were raccoons, and two cases involved foxes. All
have been found within a halfhave been found within a halfmile of the city, prompting local
officials to encourage local residents to have their pets vaccinated.
"While this is not a serious outbreak, we want to urge

This resting place is where we find oil today. These resting (cracks in the earth) by faults pinch-outs (fiti formation poes nature. The very nature of a
geologic formation can cause it to trap hydrocarbons, as well. For example: many oil
reservoirs are found in a syncline reservoirs are found in a syncline
or anticline, which are humps (up or down) that prevent (by the effects of gravity) oil from escaping once it has collected. When oil fields are explored for, a wildcatter uses techniques to locate these certain geologic
events or traps that might lead events or traps, that might lead
one to believe that oil may be trapped there. Even when a structure is located that could hold oil and/or gas, it still may just hold water. The water is there because the oil was unable
or unwilling to stop there or unwilling to stop there. It
may have moved on to where gravity or some other natural force would have it settle.
Which brings us back to the
reasons some places on this earth reasons some places on this
have oil and others do not.
First, the conditions have to be right at the right time to make a
region or area petroleum prolific If the conditions are not there to create the oil, then there will be -no oil. If the oil is ready for migration but the traps are somewhere else, the oil would most likely pass through withou stopping
Some places like the Permian
Basin of west Texas and the Basin of west Texas and the
reefs and thin layers of sand and limestone that are throughou Central West Texas were ideal places for petroleum to form and to be trapped at the time most of
our petroleum was created deep our petroleum was created deep
under the earth. Then, geologic events happened to create the trapping mechanisms required for the petroleum to stop and wait to be discovered eons later The lack of deep basins and
reefs throughout geologic time in
New Hampshire are prime New Hampshire are prime
reasons why there is not much oil there. It is unclear if any petroleum may have been created "way back when", but we are pretty sure that it was not trapped
in very many places in New in very man
Hampshire.

Thus, geologic events and timing of life cycles of pre-
historic plants and animals have conspired to place oil and gas in certain places and not in others.
Now, whether this was the
result of God smiling on us and not them.. that is another matter

ASCS announces wool \& mohair - rates for 1992 marketing year

The Sutton County Agricultural Stabilization and conservation Service (ASCS rates for the 1992 marketing year. The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended, provides a formula to determine the wool year. Herb Schwertner, County Director, reports the 1992 support price for wool is $\$ 1.97$ per pound. The support price for mohair is $\$ 4.613$ per pound. - (Incentive) Payments are based bring the national average market price received by all wool and mohair producers up to the announced price support levels. A producer cannot receive portion of proceeds on that portion of proceeds from
marketed wool or mohair sales price per pound for any individual sales documents which is more than four times
the national average for wool or mohair.
The 1992 national average price for shorn wool is 74 cent per pound. Mohair is 86 cents per pound.
Payment rates for 1992 marketings are 166.2 percent o he net sales proceeds for shorn
wool; $\$ 4.92$ per hundred pounds liveweight for unshorn lambs; and 436.4 percent of the net sales proceeds for mohair Promotion fund deductions from wool and mohair payments were
