## July immunization month

July has been proclaimed Immunization Awareness Month in Texas. Throughout this month, the Texas Department of Health and local health agencies will sponsor a variety of events to help educate communities about free or low-cost immunizations for children.

Dr. David R. Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health, said, "We have tried to make it impossible for any Texas parent to plead ignorance as the reason his or her child is unimmunized. But ignorance is only one of the problems. Logistics -- the geographic availability of vaccinations at sensible hours for working families -- are still a problem."

By age two, only 30 percent of Texas children are fully immunized, half of the national average. Vaccinations are expected to cost about \$57 million, a fraction of the expense of treating the diseases.

Governor Ann Richards in April signed into law a childhood immunization bill that requires all Texas children, except those with a religious conflict or medical contraindication, to be immunized against contagious disease such as measles, mumps and diphtheria. Doctors and hospitals will now be required to review children's immunization records. Families will be asked to pay for the administration of the vaccine. If the family is unable to pay the administrative fee, vaccines will be administered free of charge. State law already requires children to be immunized against diseases

like measles, mumps, diphtheria, whooping cough and polio as soon as they enter school. But many children under age six have not been vaccinated.

"As a pediatrician, I have seen too much of the senseless tragedy associated with failure to vaccinate children against thoroughly preventable diseases," Dr. Smith said. "It is long past time for us to have all but wiped out such devastating disease as measles, yet within the past five years, more than 4,400 Texas children under five years of age have had the disease -- including 14 who died from complications of measles."

"Let's hope that the added momentum of Immunization Awareness Month will renew this state's determination to finally defeat the diseases against which we have had vaccines for decades," the commissioner said.

A Texas House and Senate Concurrent Resolution sponsored by Senator Judith Zaffirini was approved in March by the Senate. It was carried by Representative Nancy McDonald and adopted by the House in May. The resolution noted the health problems associated with low immunization rates, resolved that the Texas Department of Health would review the development and implementation of a statewide immunization registry, and declared July Immunization Month in Texas.

## Mayor signs proclamation

For the past five years, the State of Texas has led the nation in morbidity and mortality for many vaccine-preventable diseases. Texas also ranks last among all 50 states in the percentage of children who have been fully immunized, with immunization levels in some parts of the state below those of third world countries.

It has been estimated that three out of every 10 two-year-olds are not age-appropriately immunized, and in our inner cities and

colonias, less than 50 percent of two-year-olds are fully immunized.

The low vaccine rate in Texas can be overcome through concerted efforts of health care leaders, public officials and citizens.

Only through such efforts can we reach the goal of 100 percent immunization of children under the age of 18 at the earliest possible date.

Therefore, I, Lemuel D. Lopez, do hereby designate the month of July 1993 as Immunization Awareness Month in Sonora, Texas.

## Sonora Independent School District receives report card

We have just recently received the Annual Performance Report from the Texas Education Agency for the Sonora ISD. The report is based on the Academic Excellence Indicator System which contains data on student performance at both campus and district levels. In addition, the report provides four specific comparisons:

1. Campus and district performance is compared to standards of excellence set by the State Board of Education.
2. Campus performance is compared to the performance of a group of 100 similar campuses. District and campus groups are constructed considering similar characteristics such as percent of economically disadvantaged students and district wealth.
3. Groups of students are compared to other groups within a single campus and/or district.

4. Campus and district performance are compared to prior year's performance.

The report also contains profile information on:

1. Students, including enrollment, ethnicity, and economic status.
2. Finances, including revenues and expenditures.
3. Staff, including number and types, years of experience, degree held, salaries and turnover rates.
4. Programs, including student enrollments and operating expenditures.

The information contained in the School Performance Report is extensive and assists us in identifying the strengths and weaknesses of the Sonora ISD. The report is definitely available to the public and a public hearing will be held at the August board meeting for the purpose of discussing this report. Reports can be obtained at the Administration Office located at 807 South Concho.

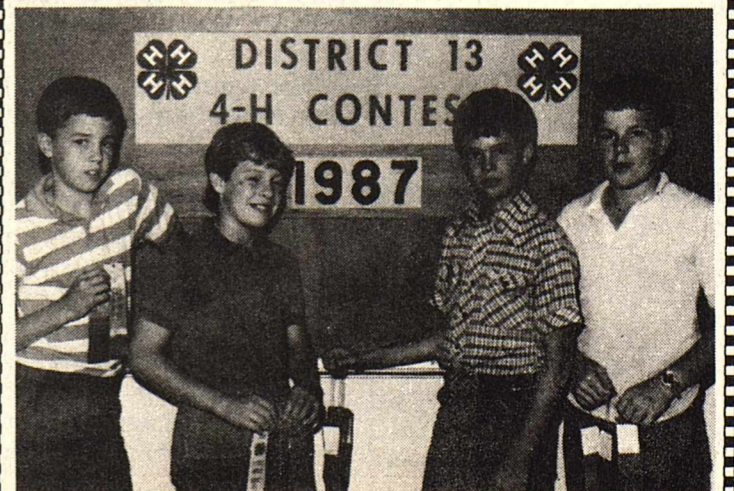

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# School Board minutes. . .

The Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District met in special session at 12 noon on Monday, June 21, 1993 in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 807 S. Concho, Sonora, Texas.

Present were: Gloria Lopez, President; Michelle Anderson, Jesse Bustamante, Donald Patton, Michael Smith and Charles Russell, Superintendent.

Absent was Sam David Hernandez.

Other present included: Bob Bellard, Jeryl Fields, Cynthia Keel, Terry Marrs, Smith Neal and Lori Solis.

The meeting was called to order by President Gloria Lopez and the invocation was given by Superintendent Charles Russell.

Special Programs Coordinator Lori Solis and High School Counselor Jeryl Fields presented information concerning interagency collaboration between all child protective and child service agencies. Mrs. Solis stated that she had contacted most of these agencies—including Mental Health/Mental Retardation, Child Protective Services, Family Outreach, and Human Services—and that each of them had expressed a need for having a common facility where such services could be provided.

Mrs. Solis further stated that coordination of the agencies in one central location would make the services more practical and productive and would better serve the needs of children whose basic needs must be met before there is any chance of meeting their educational needs.

Mrs. Solis said that she and facilities supervisor Smith Neal had located a building in the school district which would be suitable for housing the various agencies and very accessible for the children the agencies would serve. The Board directed Mrs. Solis to pursue the matter, finalize plans, and report to them at a later date.

Director of Maintenance Smith Neal reported on various repairs needed in district and on the need for continuing the district's

policy regarding transportation vehicles. After some discussion, the Board authorized Mr. Neal to let bids for roof repairs; to move the Ag. pick-up into the district's fleet and let bids for a new Vo-Ag. pick-up; and to go through State Purchasing to buy a small bus.

Superintendent Charles Russell reported that there was mass confusion concerning school finance. However, he stated that he talked with several other wealthy districts, including Ozona, Irion County, and Crane, and they had indicated they were in favor of Senate Bill 7's Option 3—purchasing weighted average daily attendance. He further stated that, at the request of Meridian Oil tax representative Bill Tullock, he had checked into tax base consolidation (Option 5) but that he could see no advantage to it since a school system would lose local control of its district along with losing some of its money.

The Superintendent concluded his remarks by stating that he would have a recommendation regarding the finance options at the July meeting.

On motion of Michael Smith, seconded by Donald Patton, a resolution ordering the special election on August 14, 1993 to select a Trustee from Precinct 3 was unanimously approved. The resolution is attached to and made an integral part of these minutes.

The Board unanimously approved election officials after a motion by Michelle Anderson and a second by Jesse Bustamante. The officials are as follows: Barbara Stroud, Precinct 3 Judge; Lewis Allen, Precinct 3 Alternate Judge; Cynthia Keel, Absentee Clerk; and Diane Jacoby, Alternate Absentee Clerk.

Jesse Bustamante made a motion, seconded by Donald Patton, to accept the resignation of Vo-Ag. teacher Lee Bloodworth. The motion was unanimously approved.

The resignation of choir teacher John Zimmerman was unanimously accepted after a motion by Donald

Patton and a second by Jesse Bustamante.

Athletic Director Bob Bellard presented information concerning the recommended applicant to fill the math vacancy at Junior High School. His coaching assignments will include both boys and girls sports. 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

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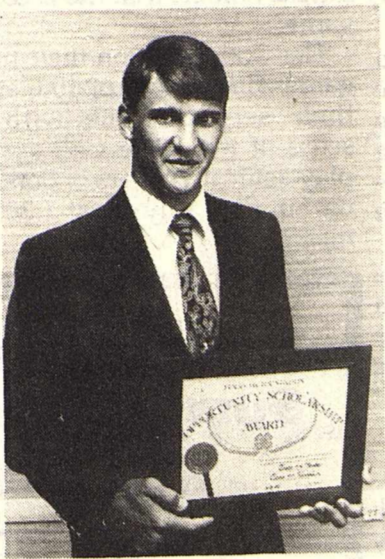

Sonora Pony League held their first tournament in Sonora June 26 and 27 along with the Sonora City League.

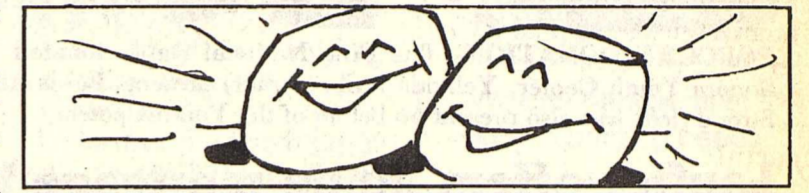
Six teams were involved in Sonora, Iraan, Ozona, Menard, Big Lake and Junction. Iraan took first place, Big Lake second, and Menard third.

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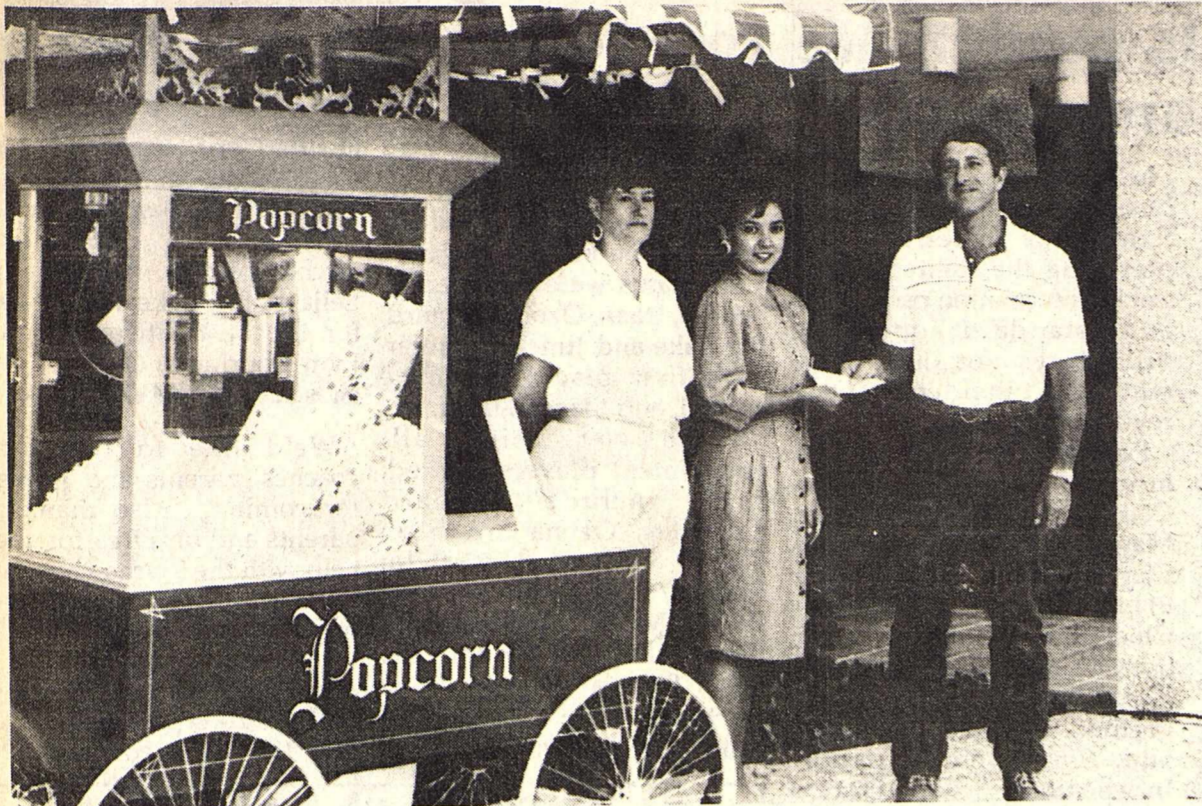

## ASCS serving conservation needs of Sutton County

"Producers who have serious soil erosion, water quality, or pollution problems on their land may want to review the list of Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) practices available at our office," Herb Schwertner of the Sutton County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said.

Herb said ACP funding to solve these and other conservation problems is available through annual and long-term conservation agreements.

Under the "Continuous sign up" provision for the Annual program for conservation work, producers may voluntarily apply for cost sharing at any time throughout the year. Practices available to county producers include brush control, livestock water wells, pipelines, water storage tanks, and cross fencing.

In 1992/93, ASCS approved 30 ACP requests to treat soil and water conservation problems on 8500 acres of Sutton County Ranchland. "Producers who need cost-share assistance may apply for the ACP by coming to the ASCS office," Herb said.

The program offers financial and technical assistance to help producers solve critical soil, water, and pollution problems on their land is designed to encourage producers to correct these problems.

"ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION IN ALL PROGRAMS ADMINISTERED BY ASCS IS ESTABLISHED UNDER LAW WITHOUT REGARD TO RACE, COLOR, RELIGION, AGE, SEX, MARITAL STATUS, DISABILITY, OR NATIONAL ORIGIN."

Fans of John Grisham's novel won't be disappointed in Sydney Pollack's film version. Audiences, however, might feel shafted. The plot is simple. Tom Cruise becomes wound up in a web of conspiracy and murder once he becomes accepted in a thriving Memphis law firm whose major clients happen to be the mob. The F. B. I. forces Cruise to become their undercover snitch, which would leave Cruise on the run for life, for the Mob is very vindictive (I know, I've been a member of the Mafia for 14 years now.) The pacing of the film is fine, and all of the performances are top notch, especially Gene Hackman, who pulls off the difficult task of turning his bad guy character into a sympathetic charmer. 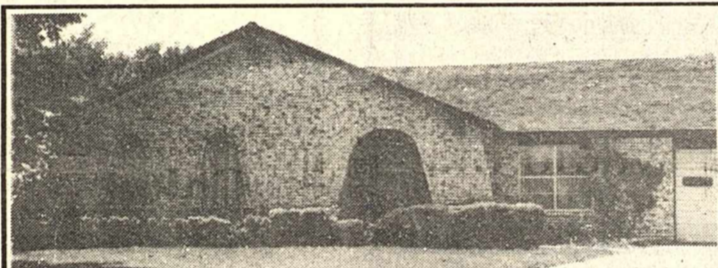

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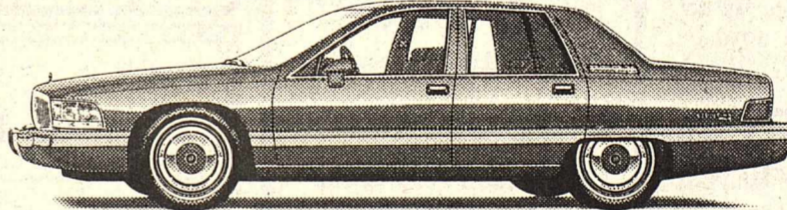

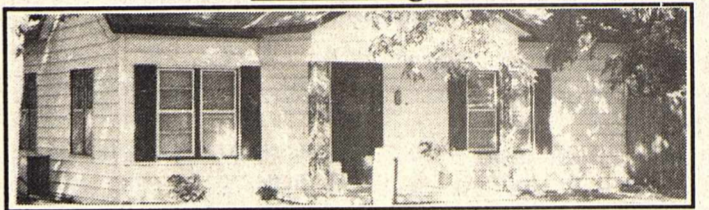
