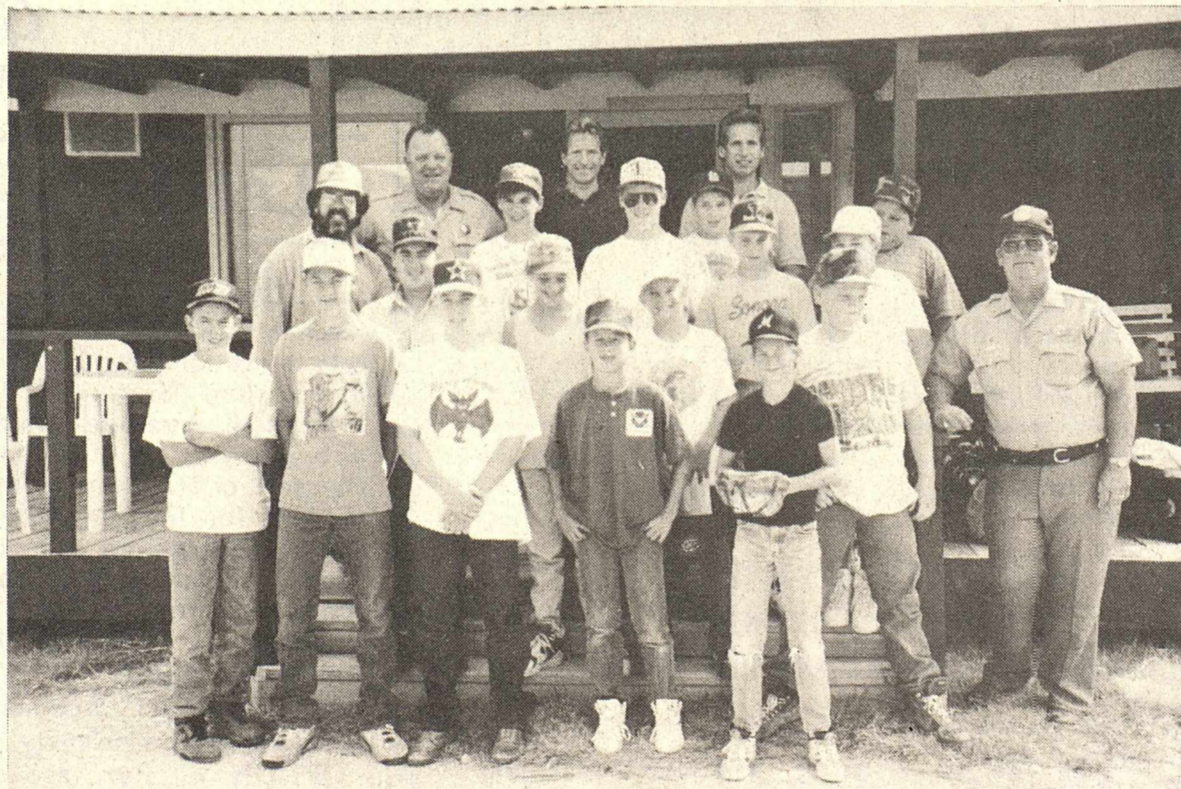
First Hunters Safety Camp held

Professional Puppeteer to entertain at Sutton County Days

The Sonora Woman's Club is pleased to announce that they will be sponsoring special entertainment for children at Sutton County Days. On Saturday, August 21, 1993, a professional puppeteer will entertain at the Cauthorn Memorial Building ("Depot").

Maggie Gilliken is a professional puppeteer from San Antonio. She has entertained at puppet shows for the last 17 years and has

performed with the San Antonio Symphony. Her collection of puppets include 250-300 hand puppets and 50-60 marionettes.

Ms. Gilliken specializes in unique shows that are customized to the audience. She has performed for groups of 10 up to 5,000 people. She focuses on the reaction of the children in the audience and has them use their imagination through audience participation.

There will be three puppet shows performed: 10:30 - Prince and the Pea; 11:30 - Where the Wild Things Are; and 12:30 - Out in the Wild West.

Admission is \$1.00 and refreshments will be served. A special coloring page will be available at the library and handed out to all primary school children. All those who bring the coloring page are entitled to FREE lemonade and popcorn.

All proceeds will benefit the Sutton County Library.

Karschner & Sanders to entertain at CWDT

The entertainment for this Saturday's Covered Wagon Dinner Theater held at the Caverns of Sonora will be Gary Karschner, Cowboy poet and Don Sanders, singer/songwriter.

Don Sanders loves his work and it shows. After twenty-five of singing, playing, writing and recording songs, his energy and professionalism continue to shine.

As one audience member put it, "There's a feeling of electricity, of intellectual lightning when Don performs. Other people come to town and sing their same pretty songs. With Sanders you get beautiful songs and a lot more."

The primary source of Sanders' electricity is his repertoire. Drawing from a variety of musical influences, his acoustic guitar-based compositions always make appropriate use of the style that inspires them. For instance, in "Trust Me," Don uses the hyper-dramatic form of the Argentine tango to underscore the tensions and uncertainties of contemporary romance, sex and courtship.

In "Sing Like a Bird," he flat picks cascades of staccato, damped notes over an African bet while the lyric establishes an exhilarating mystical identity between the singer and the bird. In songs like "Jump Start My Heart" we hear his engine beginning to crank in the wail of his slide blues guitar and in "Southern Coast of France," we're comforted and embraced by lush chords and tender, Jacques Brel-like lyrics.

Sanders keeps his shows fresh and stimulating by constantly creating and adding new material and by changing the emotional context of familiar, earlier compositions. Coming on stage with a book, a news article, a poem, an excerpt from a play he's working on, or his journal, he uses the material as a focal point for an entire set of songs. He brings what's happening in his life and the world to the stage.

Although brainy in

approach, Don makes everyone feel comfortable and at ease. You can sense that he is a participant in the human comedy, as much a victim as anyone else. Another fan says, - I always feel a connection, that there's a real person on stage not just some performing puppet."

Other distinguishing characteristics: combine a breathtaking voice, bleached blond hair and child-like innocence with a bad boy wit and you'll understand why singer-songwriter David Rodriguez describes Don as "endearingly acid."

Ultimately, you'll be entertained, encouraged and uplifted by the positive, practical, passionate idealism that thrives in Sanders and his work. In fact, you'll leave the performance with a song in your heart.

Local artists who will be showing their work during the dinner theater are Mary Lou Gilly and Pauline Ringgold.

After a 23 year career in nursing, artist Mary Lou Gilly began painting 9 years ago. She works in oils and has done numerous original florals, landscapes and portraits.

Gilly has studied with Texas artists Jean Green and Susie Schneider, and portrait artist, Frank Covino from Fairfield, Connecticut.

Gilly, also is president of the Sonora Art Club, is a charter member of the West Texas Art Guild and currently serves as a member-at-large on the WestTAG Board of Directors.

Local artist, Pauline Ringgold, began painting 11 years ago when she studied with well-known Texas artist Jean Green. Since that time she has continued to grow as an artist and studied under several teachers. She enjoys painting as a hobby and paints landscapes and windmills. Ringgold is greatly influenced by southwest art and she works mainly in oils.

Ringgold is an officer of the West Texas Art Guild and is serving as treasurer.

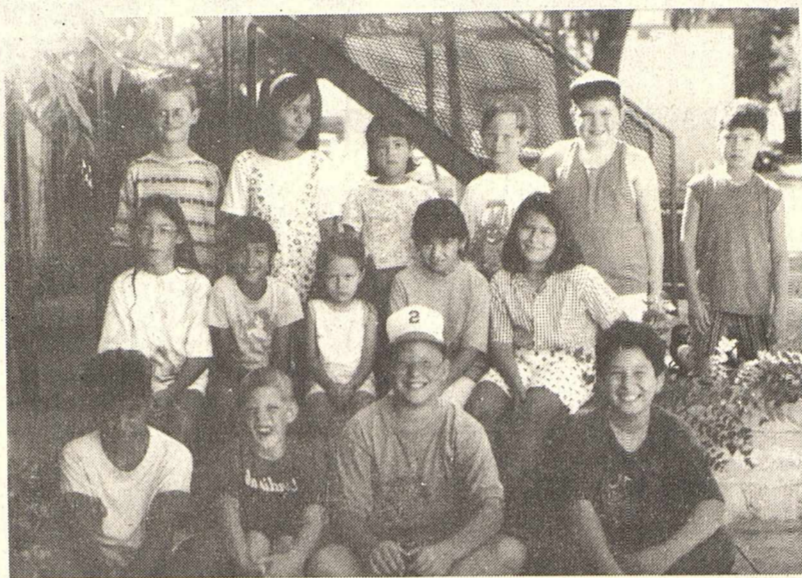
The participants were given prizes for the amounts of books and/or hours that they read. The total number of participants over the 8-week period came to 138.

School board president attends TASB seminar

Sonora ISD School Board President Gloria Lopez was one of more than 500 school board members and school administrators to attend the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) 1993 Post-Legislative Seminar on Public Education, Saturday, July 10, in Austin. By attending this meeting, school board members were able to earn board member training credit as mandated by state law.

The TASB seminar, which is held after the end of each regular legislative session, was designed to brief school board members and school administrators on education issues and legislative activity that took place during the 73rd Legislature, which adjourned May 31.

TASB staff experts discussed Senate Bill 7 (SB7), the Legislature's latest school finance plan; changes in the property tax system; abolishment of the teacher career ladder; and other

legislation passed during the session that will affect Texas public schools, trustees, and educators.

A later afternoon session was held especially for the 101-118 property wealthy school districts affected by SB7 and their neighboring districts. The discussion led by three education attorneys--David Thompson, Deborah Hankinson, and Buck Wood--and by Dan Casey, TASB staff member and noted school finance expert, focused on the details of the new school finance law, the options available to those districts, and the pros and cons of each option.

TASB is a voluntary, nonprofit organization representing local school districts in Texas. TASB's membership includes 1,052 school districts along with 54 tax appraisal districts, 42 junior colleges, 54 cooperatives, 58 county education districts, and the 20 education service centers.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Sir:

A requirement of the recently passed Senate Bill 7 orders school districts with more than \$280,000 in Weighted Average Daily Attendance (WADA) to choose 1 of 5 options as the method for lowering their values. The options, none of which are beneficial to the Sonora ISD, are as follows:

OPTION 1: Consolidation with another district
 OPTION 2: Detachment (de-annexation) of property
 OPTION 3: Purchase of attendance credits from the state

OPTION 4: Contract for nonresident students
 OPTION 5: Tax base consolidation

The Sonora ISD board of Education voted unanimously at the July 13 meeting to order an election on September 11 for the purpose of securing voter approval for the method of lowering the district's appraisal values to \$280,000 per student and selected Option 3 as its choice for complying with Senate Bill 7. This election will allow voters in the school district to decide if the purchase of credits from the state will be pursued. The amount of funding to be given up by the Sonora ISD will be approximately \$250,000 - \$300,000.

If the voters do not approve this method chosen by the board to reduce the district's values, then Commissioner of Education Lionel Meno has the authority, under Senate Bill 7, to de-annex property for appraisal purposes to a neighboring district in order to lower the Sonora ISD's values to \$280,000 per student. According to our interpretation, these de-annexed properties will never be returned to the Sonora Appraisal District, regardless of future appraisal values.

The Board of Trustees is certainly not pleased with Senate Bill 7 and the financial repercussions it has for our school district. However, we strongly believe that Option 3 is the lesser of the 5 evils and we do encourage the voters of Sutton County to approve the purchase of tax credits from the state at the September 11 election.

Head Start program taking applications for the fall

Sonora Head Start will be taking applications for this year's program. Applications may be picked up at 221 N. Main (387-2163) or call Ed Carrasco at 387-3702. Applications can be pick up on August 10 - School will start on August 8.

The Head Start Program is for children ages three through five, but priority will be given to four year olds. Children must be three years old before the first day of

September of the current school year. Applications must include: (1) birth certificates, (2) immunization records, and (3) proof of income such as paycheck stubs, income tax statements, or letters from case workers if families receive food stamps or AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children). Income guidelines vary according to family size and are calculated at the time of registration.

Summer immunization program underway

The Texas Department of Health - Public Health Region 3 (PHR 3) has begun a summer immunization initiative focusing on preschool age children.

"This initiative reflects the concerns both President Clinton and Governor Richards have expressed," according to Joseph Trillo, Immunization Program Manager for PHR 3. "The campaign is called 'No More Excuses - For Their Sake VACCINATE', we want every child in each community to be fully immunized against disease by their second birthday." Immunization levels for preschool children in Texas is around 30 percent.

Region 3 has received nearly \$250,000 to hire staff and purchase supplies and some equipment for this initiative. "The majority of the money is being designated to hire outreach workers to go door-to-door in the neighborhoods and identify children at risk of preventable diseases," said Trillo. "We want the people in the communities to be aware that they will be visited by a TDH representative."

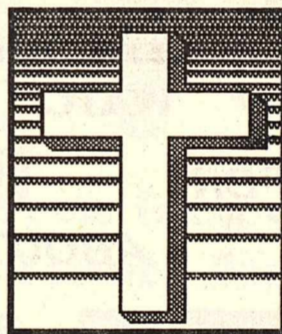

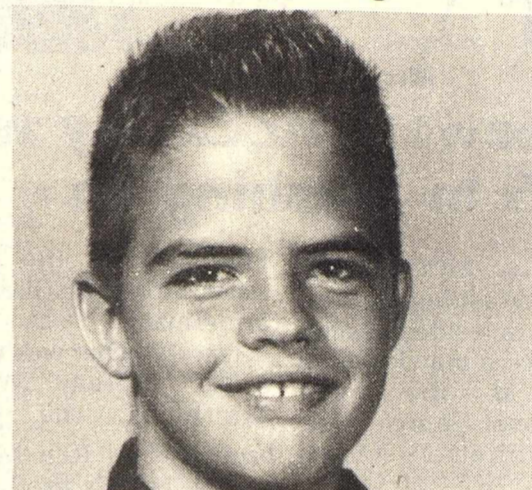

Emergency plan updated

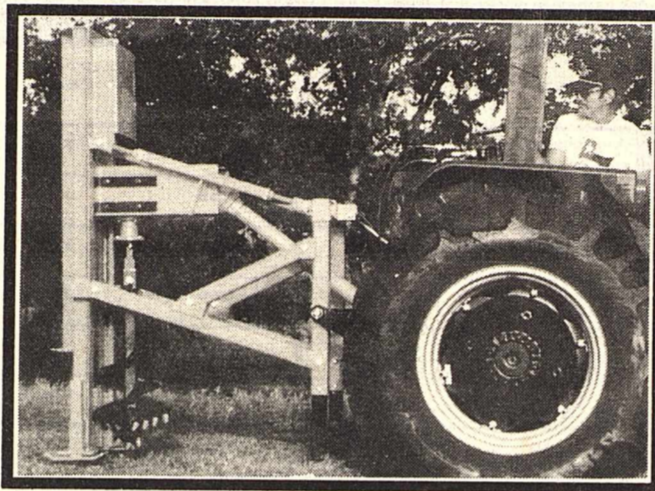

Letter to Households (Single/child) National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program

Parent/Guardian:

The Sonora I. S. D. school serves meals each day. Children may buy lunch for (K-5) - \$1.10; (6-12) - \$1.25; Adults - \$2.00 and breakfast for 60¢. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your child, your child can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart Below, your child can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILD, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number of the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your child should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Charles Russell, 807 S. Concho, Sonora, Texas 76950, Phone (915) 387-2545.

Reporting Changes: If your child gets free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your child gets meals because you get food stamps or AFDC you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your child should get free or reduced price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your child, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D. C. 20250.

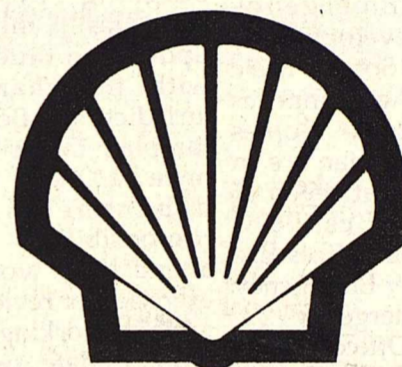

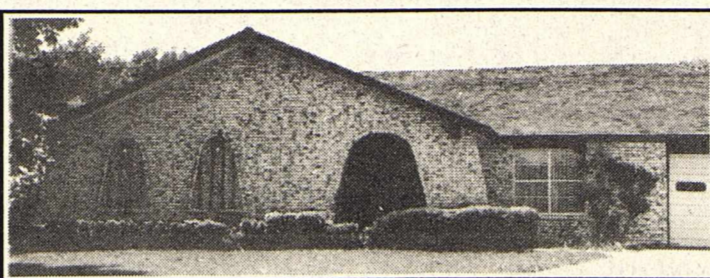

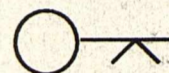
