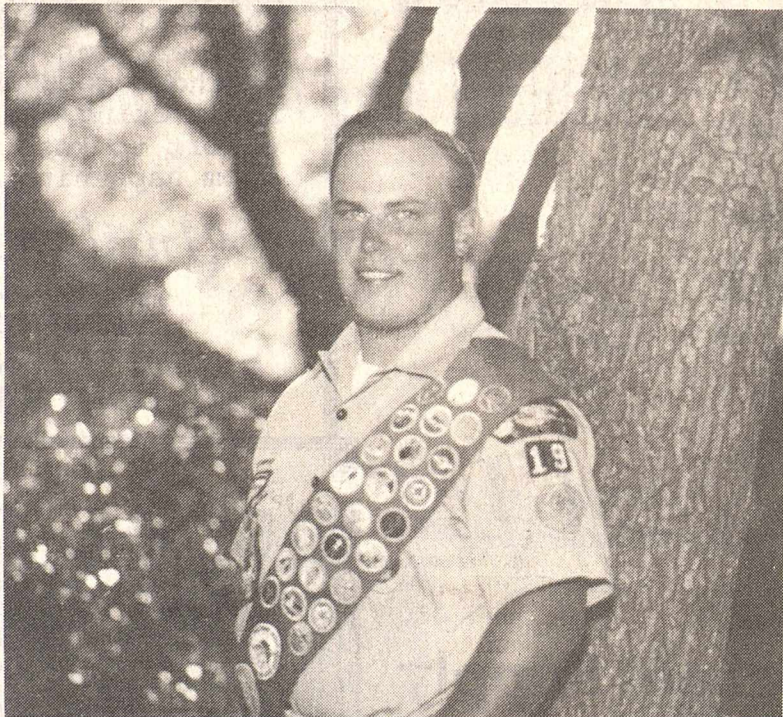
This is a comedy set in a ranch house in Lowake, Texas. The cast includes Marti McLain, as the feisty 80 year old Mama Wheelis, and Carole Thorp as Sara Lee Turnover, the dutiful daughter, who is the best beauty operator in Lowake. Michelle Anderson will be seen in the role of Evalita, the "tramp", who has been married 6 times and wants to be a singing star. Orville is the red-neck, obnoxious brother, played by Tryon Fields. I would personally like to thank all of our law enforcement officers for trying to make some of those good things happen and for risking their lives in an effort to keep some of the bad from happening.

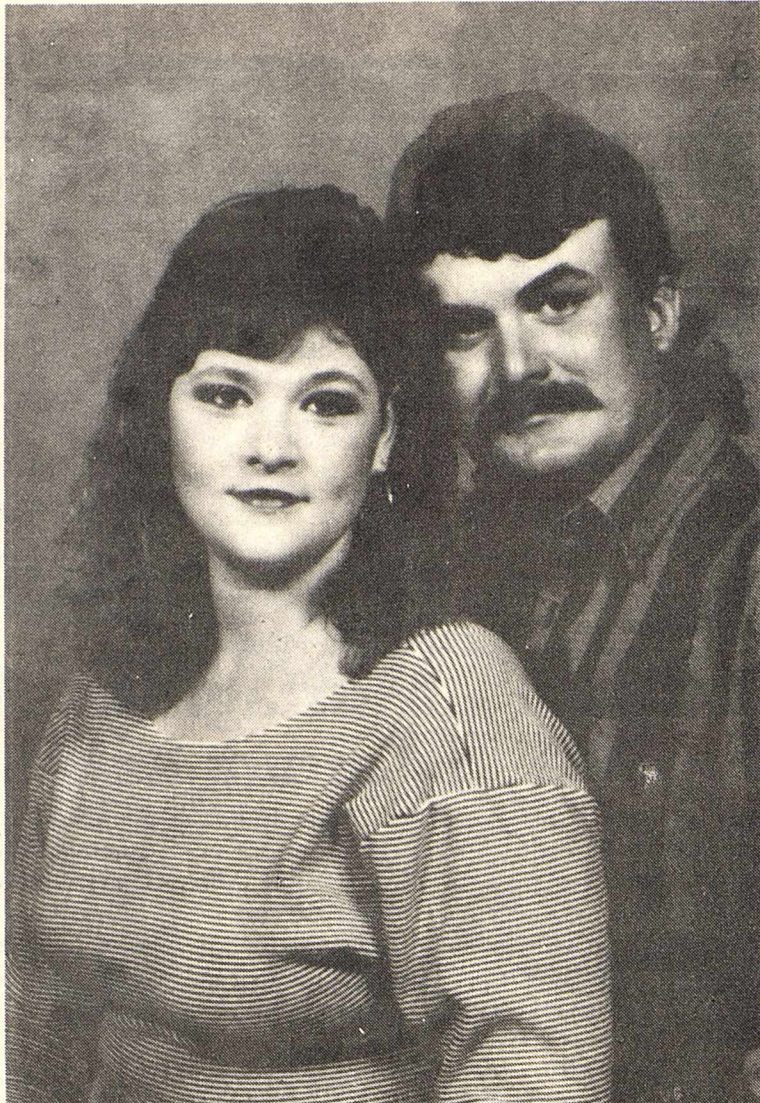

Dear News Editor:

I want to call your attention to an important publication recently released by The Heritage Foundation, the Index of Leading Cultural Indicators. Written by William Bennet, the Index is a comprehensive statistical portrait of behavioral trends over the last 30 years.

It shows, for example, that while population has increased 41 percent since 1960, violent crime has increased 560 percent; illegitimate births have increased more than 400 percent; divorce rates have quadrupled; the percentage of children living in single-parent homes has tripled, and

the teenage suicide rate has increased more than 200 percent.

As a member of The Heritage Foundation, I am eager to see the facts in this document given wide publicity. Only if we admit we are in a crisis of values can we begin to reverse our cultural decline.

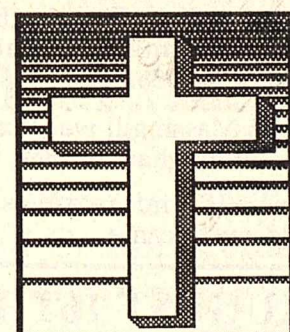

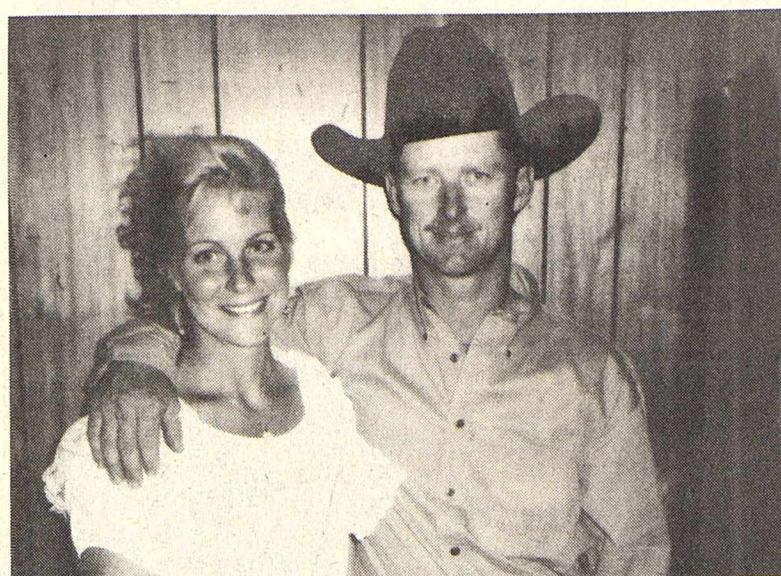
inexplicably dead, their only child, MaryAnne's godchild abruptly orphaned.

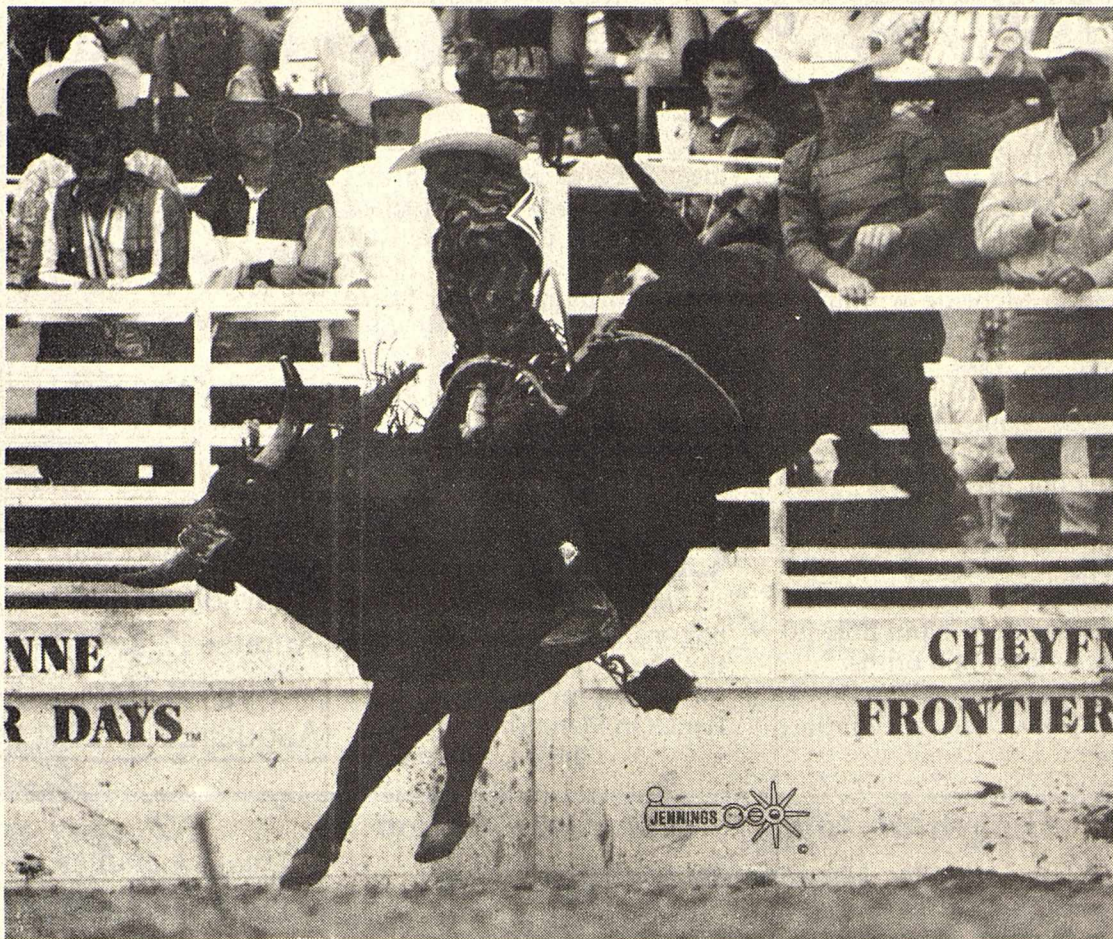

Foreign investors must declare interest in agricultural land

The Sutton County ASCS would like to make all producers aware that a 1979 law was implemented by Congress to require foreign investors to comply with the following conditions.

A foreign person or entity that acquires or transfers any interest other than security interest in agricultural land to submit a completed form ASCS-153 to the Secretary of Agriculture, not later than 90 days after the date of acquisition or transfer. The information required by the Secretary should be reported on a ASCS-153. Copies of this form are available, to foreign persons owning, acquiring, or transferring agricultural land in the United States or its territories or possessions, at the County ASCS office.

Any foreign person who holds, acquires, or transfers any interest in agricultural land and who the Secretary of Agriculture determines did not submit a form ASCS-153 or who knowingly submitted a report that was incomplete, misleading or false is subject to civil penalty of not more than 25 percent of the fair market value of the land on the date the penalty is assessed.

ASCS-153 forms shall be analyzed by the United States

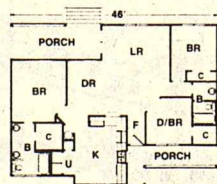

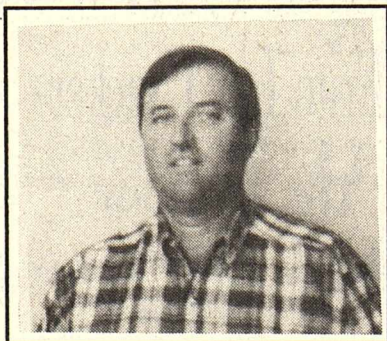

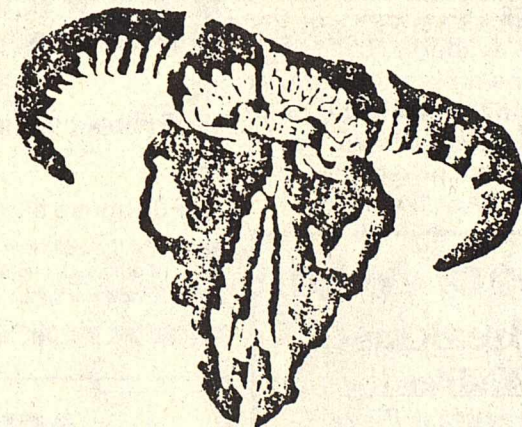

Foreign investors must declare interest in agricultural land

Foreign investors have reported owning over 14.5 million acres of U. S. farmland including over 1 million acres in Texas according to a recent report from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The figure is based on reports filed by foreign groups as of December 31, 1992, under the agriculture foreign investment disclosure.

The report shows foreign agricultural land holdings in all states except Rhode Island and Alaska. Maine reported the largest number of acres owned by foreign persons at 2.5 million acres. The heaviest concentration was found in the south and in the west with Texas being second to Maine.

USDA officials say about 54 percent of the reported foreign holdings involve land actually owned by U. S. corporations. The law requires them to

register their land holdings as foreign if 10 percent of their stock is held by foreign investors. The remaining 46 percent of the foreign-held land is owned by investors not affiliated with U. S. firms.

Of the foreign-owned acreage reported, 49 percent was in forest land, 17 percent in crop land, 31 percent in pasture and other agricultural land, and 3 percent in uncultivated agricultural land. The USDA report said 4 percent of the foreign owned acreage will remain in agricultural production.

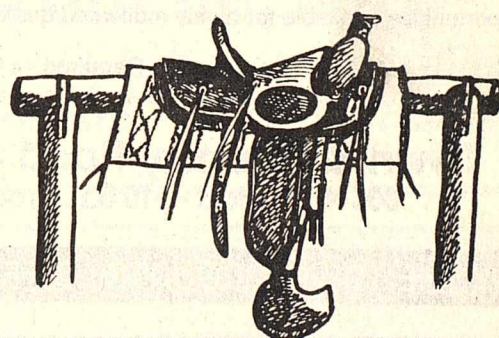

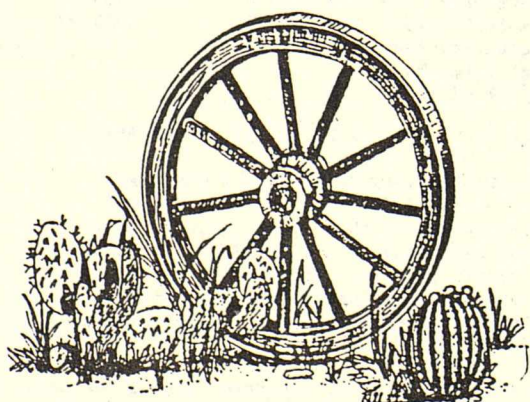

Movie Reviews

Poetic Justice

Rated R for strong language, violence, and sexual situations.

Three stars

After his Oscar nominated directorial debut *Boyz n the Hood*, John Singleton has lost his footing. His last film was a well paced powerhouse that knew what it wanted to say, and said it perfectly. His follow-up, *Poetic Justice*, lacks the discipline to deliver it's message. It's entertaining, but unlike his last film, it certainly doesn't stay with you when it's over.

Janet Jackson does a decent job in the role of Justice, a young woman whose boyfriend gets blown away in the first minute due to senseless gang violence. Afterwards, she becomes a moody hairdresser who constantly scribbles poetry about loneliness and the desire for love and emotional empowerment.

Suddenly the film takes a left turn and puts her on a roadtrip with a postal worker named Lucky (Tupac Shakur) and another obnoxious couple. Things are funnier here, especially if you're in an interracial audience like I was in, where the audience yells back at the screen: "Yeah, baby. You tell him where to go.....Whheww baby, she dissed his butt good." Still, you don't know where the film is going to go, and it doesn't seem to either.

The romance that develops between Shakur and Jackson is very well executed, mostly due to Shakur's great performance. He plays the only character who seems real. While Singleton throws many stereotypes in our faces, making his point about our misguided human nature, Shakur plays the only fleshed out character in the film. He's a very good actor who deserves a better film.

Poetic Justice tries to be too many things - a message movie, an inner-city romance, a wacky road movie - and it becomes a mess in the process. Many problems are thrown aboard, but they're solved too easily (where else can someone beat alcoholism in about 10 seconds), and the poetry being read by Jackson on the soundtrack lacks the power that it needs to shake up an audience. Still, *Poetic Justice* works when characters stop acting like cartoons and face up to reality. This is a very misguided film that never gels. Hopefully John Singleton will do better next time.

Hocus Pocus

Rated PG

1 and 1/2 stars

Okay, here's the concept. Let's have these three witches start off in Salem a few hundred years ago. They get lynched and killed, and then let's bring them back to present day and have them wreck havoc and fight some

twelve year old kids. Alright, nice idea. Just one question. Where are the laughs?

Now, as a critic, I love to laugh. Ask anyone who has been to a movie with me, and they'll tell you that I have a very loud and obnoxious laugh in movie theaters.

In *Hocus Pocus*, I wouldn't have bothered anyone.

The film is incredibly unfunny. The entire theater was bored. I counted 215 ceiling tiles.

The witches, played under intense make-up by Bette Midler, Sarah Jessica Parker, and Kathy Najimy, are a dull Three Stooges clone. All three women are very talented actresses, but they're not given anything funny to do. The kids they terrorize are such obnoxious lumps, you wish they would get killed. When Midler threatens to off one little girl, I started a standing ovation.

Please, for the love of all that is holy, don't see this film.

Robin Hood: Men in Tights

Rated PG-13 for language and adult humor

Three Stars

Mel Brooks once made the funniest movies to ever hit the screen - *Young Frankenstein*, *Blazing Saddles* - but he seems to be on a losing streak. Even though *Men in Tights* has some very good moments, over all it is predictable and disappointing. In his attempt to parody all Robin Hood films, along with other gags thrown in, Mel Brooks has lost his true raunchy sense. *Men in Tights* seem as if it were made for 10 year olds, because most of the humor stays at the "doo-doo, pee-pee" level of humor. Still, *Men in Tights* is worth seeing for the scattered scenes that are very funny. Unfortunately, you have to suffer through a lot of jokes that bomb before you hit the ones that sail.

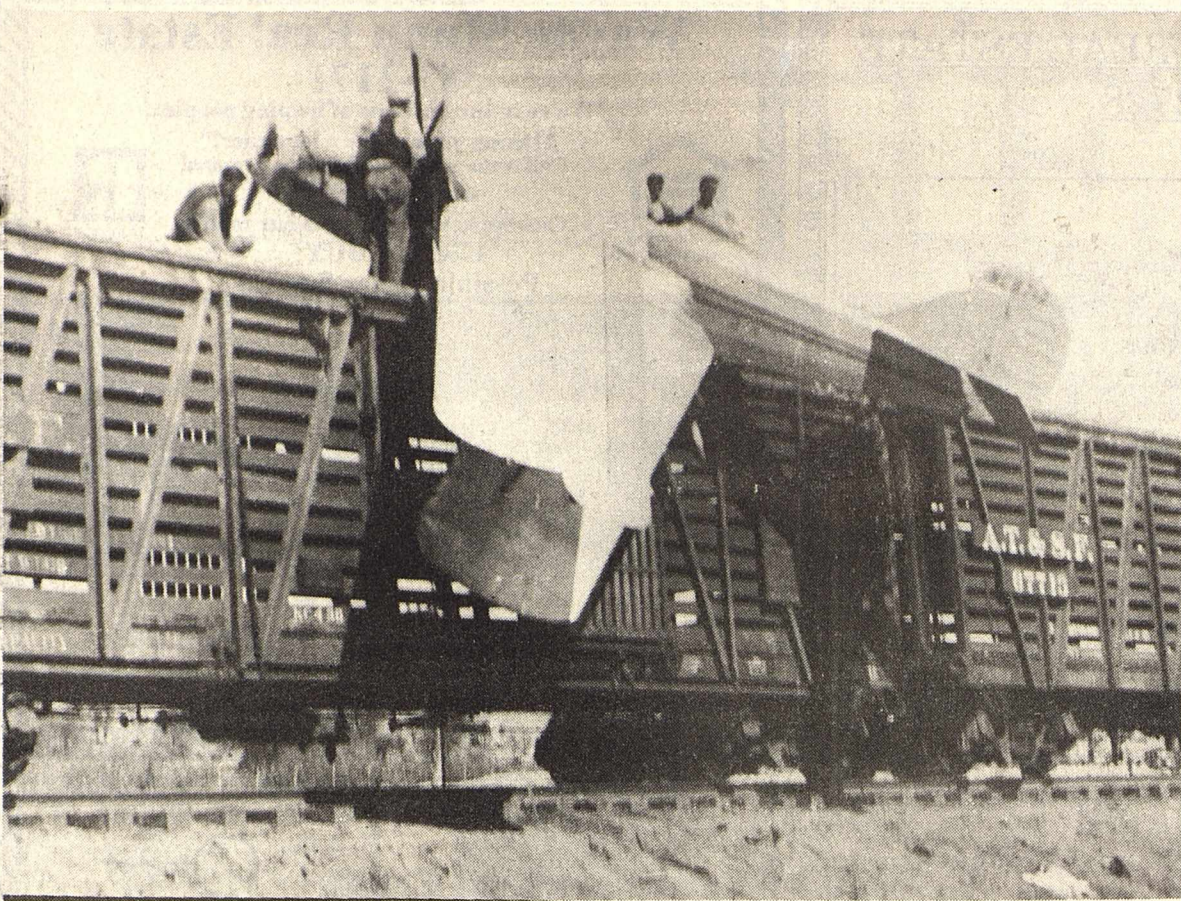

STOCK CAR SERVES AS LANDING FIELD

The Devil's River News - February 22, 1935

National attention was directed to Sonora Wednesday evening when Lowell Thomas, news reporter, broadcast a report of the airplane accident. Some people who heard the report said it was "dressed up" by adding locomotion to the stock car on which the plane landed.

Not a very soft spot for a landing, Atchison, Topeka

and Santa Fe Railway stock care 68096 served in that capacity shortly before noon Tuesday when a Travel Air plane carrying Billy Penick, Tommie Barrow and a pilot came to rest "half on, half off" the car. The airplane, NC 8712, was said to have owned by Jasper Jones, Mike Collier and John Benson who said they had been "barnstorming" with Menard as a "home base" for eight months.

The reason for the crash was said to have been failure to gain altitude after taking off from a pasture near the stock pens. Half of the fuselage, the motor and a portion of the wing structure came to rest on the car and the remainder of

the aircraft dangled above a deep gully at the side of the track.

One of the young men said the plane had been bought a year ago from a Shreveport, La., flying school and that two of them had formerly lived at Monroe, La. Collier's people live in Menard.

Neither of the passengers who said they had agreed to pay seventy-five cents for their ride was hurt nor was the pilot injured. All stepped, somewhat gingerly, from the airplane immediately after it crashed. The plane was badly damaged and had to be dismantled before it could be removed from its unique "perch."

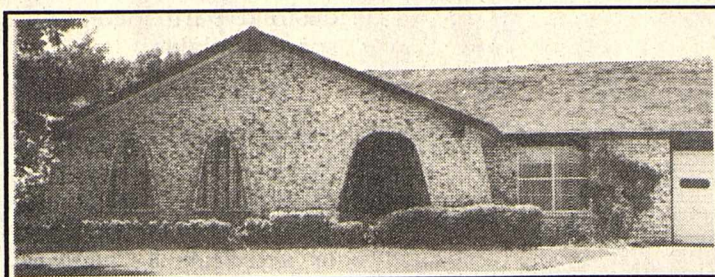

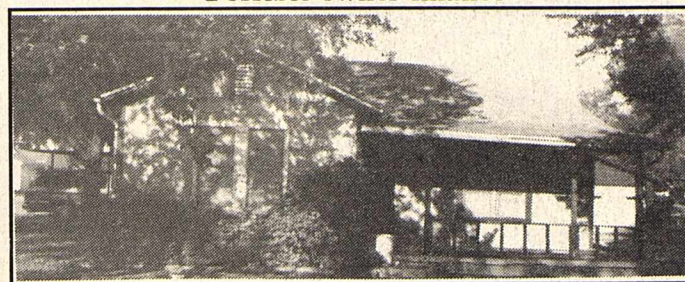

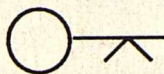
