

Guest speaker was Maria Carrasco, who gave a very informative discussion on breast cancer in women. Anniversary cake, coffee and punch were served to 14 members and 2

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

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# **Bauldree Directs Deer Distribution Program**

A deer distribution program, conducted under the auspices of the Sonora Ministerial Alliance, will this year be directed by Boy Scout Timmy Bauldree as his Eagle Scout service project. The deer delivered through this program will not be processed, only field dressed. Processing the meat will be the responsibility of the recipient.

Landowners or outfitters whose game management

program requires them to harvest a number of doe deer this season are encouraged to bring the deer to the Branding Iron for distribution. Most deliveries are made on Tuesdays.

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
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
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# **Ask The Historical Society**

Q. Do you have any information on the 1928 fire?

A. Devil's River News. May 4, 1928 -- Fire, caused from the explosion of a stove in the rear of the Rutledge Cafe, Monday night at 11:30 did \$35,000 damage to five business houses in the heart of the business section. The Rutledge Cafe was completely burned with the loss to the owner of approximately \$3,000 with \$2,000 insurance.

Mr. Rutledge lost fixtures valued at \$3,000 while he has \$1,800 insurance. Mr. Mayfield has not decided whether he will build or sell the lot. Should he decide to build, he will erect a fire-proof building.

Gilmore Hardware, next door to the cafe stood a loss of \$3,000 in the burning of their tin shop in the rear of the hardware store. A rock wall saved their stock and building from flames.

The City Market building owned jointly by H.P. Cooper and Theo Savell was not insured, losing approximately \$15,000. Mr. Cooper who operated the market, carried insurance in the sum of \$2,000. He estimates his loss at \$5,000. \$1,000 worth of meat was put in refrigerators the day of the fire.

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by the Sutton County known as the Friendly Store, was the biggest loss. He estimates his loss at \$15,000 with only \$3,000 insurance. This building was owned by Theo Savell. Mr. Savell has not announced whether or not he will rebuild, but it is believed that he will erect a modern fireproof building.

> E.S. Long, proprietor of the Long Barber Shop, lost and was damaged to the extent of about \$500. The fire was checked before heavy damage was done.

> Stites Motor Company was well protected from the blaze by the A&W Drug Store new building of tile and brick. They state their loss was very little. However, it will require time to straighten the stock as it was moved into the street when the fire reached its height.

The A&W Store owned by Misses Allison & Wardlaw was slightly damaged by smoke but not enough to hurt.

The alarm was given by night watchman J.K. Lancaster at about 11:30 and at 12 the fire was under control.

Had it not been for an extra still night with no wind, Sonora would have suffered a \$100,000 loss, it is believed.

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# EMS'ing Around

On November 1st, our monthly business meeting took place. Every year this award is presented to an outstanding member of our organization, in order to keep Gene's memory, our growth, and various accomplishements alive. This is a highly coveted award for many reasons, but keep in mind that the winner is chosen by their peers. This award will be given out at our annual Christmas party. Good Luck Keith, Jody, and Treva!!

We are all proud of you! There is a very important apology I need to make, one that could really make a difference. In one of my previous articles, I mentioned a conversation with a hunter. He was inquiring about using a cellular phone, dialing 911, and gaining access to EMS. Well, recently it has come to light that by doing this, you are more than likely going to get connected to a San Angelo dispatcher. Not to say that using 911 is incorrect, it would just take longer for the message to be relayed to the local authorities. The best thing to do is to call the Sheriff's Office at 387-2288 and request assistance. Now, for you folks in town and surrounding, please continue to use 911. I have made mention of this topic, because sometimes those few extra minutes, can be the ifference between life and death! So, please inform your out of town hunters and guests. And ranchers take note.

My topic for this week is "Safety Traveling During Holidays." Soon excitement makes us all run around in many different directions, especially before a trip. So here are a few tips, we don't need a "Home Alone" in Sonora!! Pre trip your vehicle; check for leaks, loose belts and such. Make sure your oil is changed regularly and consider changing your oil and air filters, especially on long trips. You should check for adequate brake fluid, antifreeze, power steering fluid, and windshield wiper fluid. It's always a good idea to plan ahead so, get gas the day before your scheduled trip and complete all of your packing at this time. Keep a running list of "To Do's"

It's also advisable on long trips, to plan your route ahead of time, and to let the people you are visiting, know your route and approximate time of departure and arrival. # **FCBT Report**

The Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) and the 66 Federal Land Bank and Production Credit Associations in the Tenth Farm Credit District today reported combined net income of \$76.3 million for the nine-month period ending September 30, 1993, compared with net income of \$21.8 million for the same period a year ago.

Arnold R. Henson, FCBT chief executive officer, attributed the \$54.5 million increase in earnings to several factors: lower funding costs, reduction in nonearning assets, successful collection efforts, a decrease in loan loss reserves and a \$6.9 million increase in net gains on the sale of acquired properties. Also contributing significantly to the increase in earnings was a \$20 million charge incurred in 1992 to comply with changes in how postretirement benefits are reported. Discounting the onetime charge, the district's net income was up \$34.5 million over the first nine months of

Combined loan volume on September 30, 1993, was \$3.61 billion, a net increase of \$54.6 million or 1.54 percent, from year-end 1992. Henson said improvements in the district's real estate markets and favorable lending rates led to the

increase in volume.

Highlights of the third quarter and first nine months 1993 financial results also include:

· Nonaccrual loan volume at quarter-end totalled \$105.7 million, down from \$145.0 million at year-end 1992.

· Acquired properties declined 22 percent during the period, to \$66.3 million.

· Capital remained strong at \$786.2 million on September 30,1993, compared to \$694.8 million at year-end 1992.

• Total assets remained relatively stable at \$4.3 billion during the period.

The affiliation of Northwest Louisiana Production Credit Association with the

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district was completed on September 30; however, because of the timing, none of the association's third quarter activity is reflected in the district's results. association has approximately \$46 million in loans outstanding in 11 northwestern Louisiana

"We're very pleased with these results," said Henson. "The strong earnings have helped strengthen our capital position and provide us with the ability to continue to meet the credit needs of agriculture in our five-state region.'

The Tenth Farm Credit District comprises the Austin-based Farm Credit Bank of Texas; 48 Federal Land Bank Associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas; and 18 Production Credit Associations in Louisiana, New Mexico, and Texas.

Nationally, the Farm Credit System reported combined net income of \$286 million and \$971 million for the third quarter and first nine months of 1993, respectively, as compared with restated combined net income of \$257 million and \$701 million for the same periods of the prior year.

Neck, Shoulder And Upper Back

The throat houses the voice box. as well as the passages for food and air. The widest range of movement in the body is in the shoulder joints and neck. These areas are easily strained by overuse. Strains can be caused by univise lifting or sudden jarring movements. When we are under stress, it is the shoulder and neck muscles that tend to hold tension the most. This area links with the throat chakra, which relates to the expression of feelings via arm or body movements, or through the voice. "Heart" feelings are also expressed through the arms. 
