## Love Helps Expand Recycling Efforts

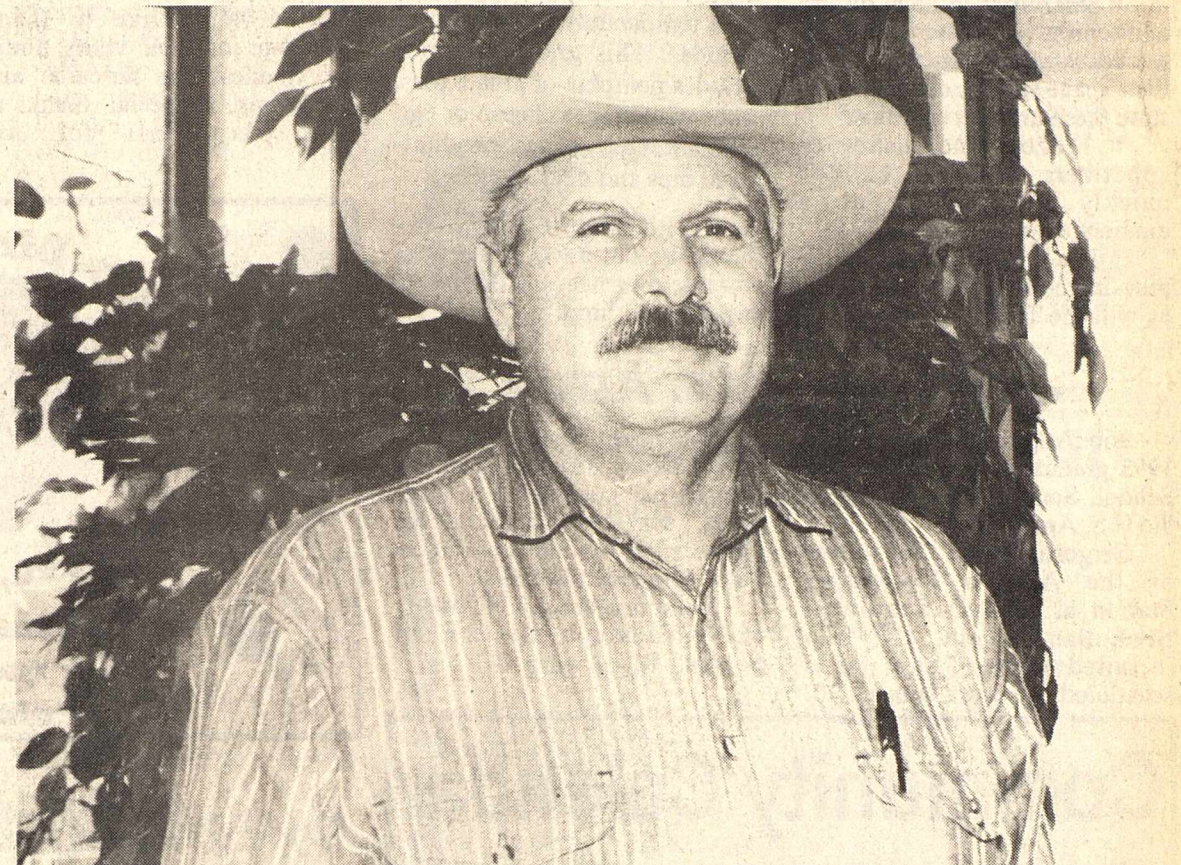
The City of Sonora is once again expanding local recycling efforts with the help of several local restaurants. Beginning this week, city crews will be distributing special steel-can recycling dumpsters to the Sutton County Steak House, the Commercial Restaurant, and Pizza Hut.

The recycling dumpsters for restaurants were the idea of local businessman Preston Love. Recognizing that commercial restaurants could strongly enhance to the city's efforts by recycling steel cans, Love brought his idea of a recycling dumpster to the attention of City Manager John Pape. In turn, Pape then had public works crews prepare special color-coded dumpsters for commercial recycling use.

When Mayor Lemuel Lopez heard the idea, he volunteered to have his restaurant participate in the program.

"Preston Love has always been extremely civic-minded, as this tremendous idea of his demonstrates," Mayor Lopez said. "This kind of community involvement is what makes Sonora a great place to live, and I am glad to have the opportunity to personally participate."

The special dumpsters are painted in the same bright

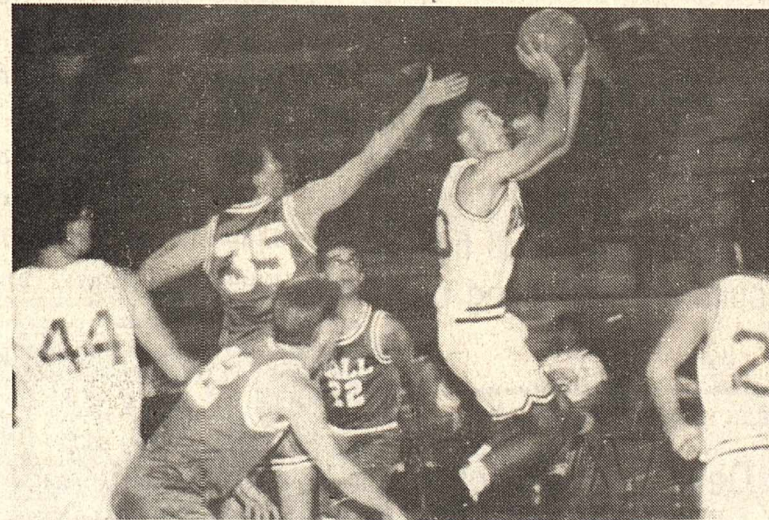
yellow as the steel-can receptacles at the Recycling Center. City crews will empty the recycling dumpsters at no additional charge to the restaurant.

It happens. Last minute changes in holiday plans leave you with no alternative but to purchase an already prepared turkey meal with all the trimmings. Or perhaps you choose to go this route to reduce the time stress.

For those who decide to buy a prepared meal, follow these tips:

- \* If you're buying a cooked, ready-to-eat turkey or other prepared meat, pick it up within two hours of serving time, or plan to refrigerate it immediately after purchase and reheat later.

- \* Try one of the convenient packaged stuffing mixes.

- \* Salad bars in delis offer a convenient way to create a tossed salad or vegetable tray. Plan space in the refrigerator to store these until serving time.

- \* Frozen side dishes or appetizers can be cooked quickly and served at a moment's notice.

- \* The deli or cafeteria also may have choices for desserts, as will the frozen foods section

of the grocery.

Convenience foods are sometimes a lifesaver, but they can be a potential for foodborne illness if not properly handled.

Follow these food safety rules:

- \* Keep hot foods hot, cold foods cold, and everything clean. Don't leave any foods in the Danger Zone temperature range of 40° F. to 140° degrees F. for more than two hours.

- \* This means that any foods containing meat, poultry or dairy products must remain refrigerated until serving. After serving, any leftovers need to be refrigerated or tossed. None of these foods should remain at room temperature for extended periods. This group of foods includes pumpkin or cream pies, cakes with cream cheese or egg white icings, dairy product-based dips and deviled eggs.

- \* Perishable leftovers should be put away as soon as possible but necessarily within the two hour limit.

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## ASK THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

by the Sutton County Historical Society

Q. I've seen articles in your column on WWI, WWII, and Vietnam. What happened to Korea?  
A. This is the first request we have had for Korean War information and will answer it with articles from December 1951 issues of the Devil's River News.

Devil's River News, December 14, 1951

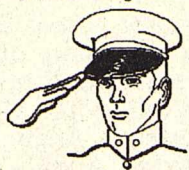
High on a mountain in Korea, within 50 yards of front line bunkers defended by the 7th Division, Baker Company of the 31st Infantry Regiment has constructed an out door chapel. The benches consist of logs laid on top of sand bags, the altar is made of discarded ration boxes covered with a blanket, and instead of a stained glass window there is erected behind the altar a huge wooden cross. The soldiers enter the chapel through an arch of pine limbs.

The chapel is named in honor of Pvt. Jack D. Cochran of Alakoma City, Ala., a former member of Baker Co., who was killed in action recently. It is dedicated not only to Cochran but to the hundreds of other soldiers who like him have belonged to this company and who have fought and died that truth and freedom might be preserved. Baker Company participated in the Inchon Landing and fought a courageous rear guard action near the Chosin Reservoir when the First Marine Division was fighting its way out of an encirclement in that region. Two days after they dedicated Cochran Chapel the company withstood an intensive banzai attack by the Chinese.

Sgt. Frank L. Moore, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Moore, received his orders placing him on the inactive reserve list this week at Camp Hood. Sgt. Moore, who received his last promotion while serving on Okinawa, graduated from Sonora High School in 1947 and served a year in the army from 1948 to 1949. He was called back to duty in October, 1950 and entered combat in Korea December 27. He was wounded January 10, 1951, and after his release from the hospital was transferred to Okinawa.

A Korean Christmas Carol



'Twas the night before Christmas, and all through the tent was the odor of fuel oil (the stovepipe was bent). The shoe-pacs were hung by the oil stove with care, in hopes that they'd issue each man a new pair. The weary G.I.'s were sacked out in their beds, and visions of sugar-babes danced through their heads, when up on the ridgeline there rose such a clatter, (A Chinese machine gun had started to chatter). I rushed to my rifle and threw back the bolt. The rest of my tent mates awoke with a jolt. Outside we could hear our platoon Sergeant Kelly, a hard little man with a little pot belly.

"Come Yancy, come Clancey, come Connors and Watson, Up Miller, up Skiller, up Baker and Dodson!" We tumbled outside in a swirl of confusion, so cold that each man could have used a transfusion. "Get up on that hilltop and silence that Red, and don't you come back till you're sure that he's dead." Then, putting his thumb up in front of his nose, Sergeant Kelly took leave of us shivering Joes. But we all heard him say in a voice soft and light: "Merry Christmas to all - may you live through the night."

We wonder how many of our readers remember that little ditty?

We know our readers like to see pictures with our columns and we would like to be able to give you one every week. In order to do this we will need your help. Please look through those old albums or boxes and see if you don't have a picture you could loan us to use in our column or one you could give to the society. We are still trying to get a picture of everyone who is buried in the Sonora Cemetery and who has ever lived in Sutton County. We will match these pictures up with columns in early issues of the Devil's River News and run them each week. Your help in this project would be greatly appreciated.

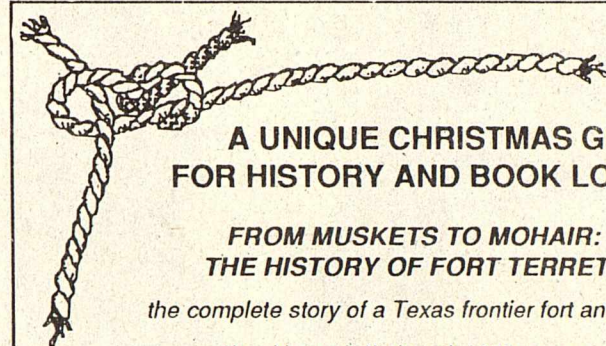

# ASCS County Committee Elections

Charles Shannon has been re-elected to serve a three year term on the ASCS Committee. Maggie Davis has been elected first alternate and Sharon Holman as second alternate. A total of 145 votes were counted. Alternates may be called upon to serve in the event a regular committee member is unable to complete a term of office.

In other ASCS Program news, ranchers are urged to come into the ASCS office and file for their 1993 Wool, Mohair, and Unshorn Lamb Incentive. Producers are encouraged to file by January 31, 1994. Late filed documents can no longer be accepted by the County ASCS Office. You will need to bring in head counts, shearing dates, grading charges, freight charges - if any, and any unshorn lamb purchases. If you have purchased unshorn lambs we will need the sale sheet showing the number of head and weight of lambs you bought.

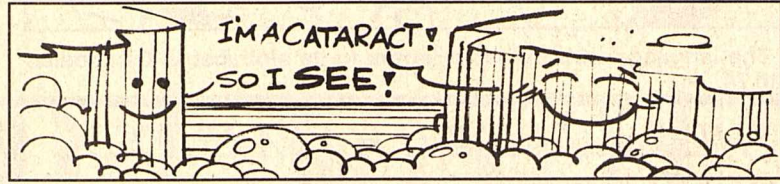
Herb reminds producers of Payment Limitation requirements for this year and deadlines for filing Wool and Mohair documents. Farm Bill Provisions require that Person Determination forms (CCC-502), Highly Erodible and Wetland Certifications (AD-1026), and related forms be completed at the time any program application is made.

For 1993 Incentive, the required AD-1026 (s), and CCC-502 are now due for the County Committee review. **PROGRAM PAYMENTS CANNOT BE MADE UNTIL REQUIRED FORMS AND DETERMINATIONS ARE COMPLETE.**

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, disability, marital status, or national origin."



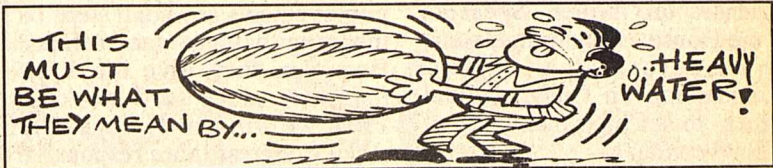

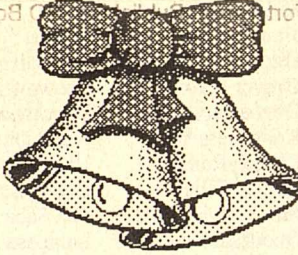

# Bonilla Speaks Out

Last year was known as the year of "change" in politics. Voters across the country were angry with Washington and demanded that something be done to reform the attitude inside the Capitol. The people told Congress that it was time to make some real changes in the way it does business. Although Congress only passed a few of our reforms before it adjourned for the year, those of us who are dedicated to improving Congress are looking forward to next year to achieve more of our goals.

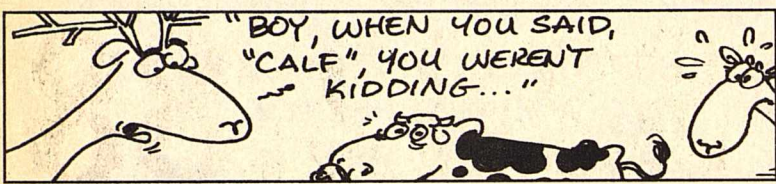
As a member of the reform-oriented freshman class, I saw this year as a chance to make the system more open and responsive to the people it is designed to represent. We championed such measures as term limits, the line-item veto, the balanced budget amendment, the discharge petition, the elimination of House select committees and a reduction in the amount of taxpayer money spent on office expenses for former Speakers of the House. In addition, some of us advocated a Citizens Commission on Congressional Ethics to set high standards of official conduct.

The good news is that some of these measures were passed

by the House. Early in the session, after a big push from the freshman class, the House voted to eliminate four House select committees. These select committees consumed your tax dollars not considering legislation, but merely providing a forum for various special interests to advance their agendas. The House also voted to reduce funding for former Speakers of the House.

Finally, we were successful in making discharge petitions public. An important piece of legislation is being held up in a committee, members of the House can sign a discharge petition to demand that the legislation be brought to the floor for a vote. These discharge petitions used to be secret so you couldn't tell whether your representative signed it. Now that representatives aren't just saying one thing at home while doing something else in Washington.

These successful improvements are small steps on the long path to real reform. However, they give me hope that with more hard work in 1994, we will slowly but surely make Congress more responsive and accountable to the American people.

# ASCS Announces Long Term Agreement Sign-Up

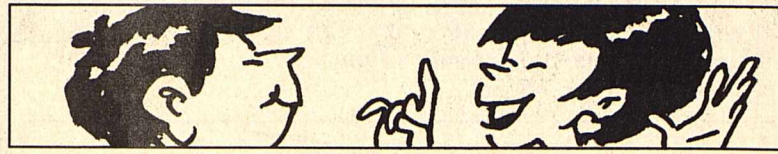
Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) programs are available to assist producers in solving their conservation problems. These are referred to as Long Term Agreement (LTA) and Annual Program (ANA). The LTA program allows certain conservation work to be completed over a period of 3 to 5 years. The Soil Conservation Service assists producers in planning the work. When the work is completed to specifications, the Soil Conservation Service certifies the completion. The ASCS agency then pays the cost share.

Herb Schwertner, County Director, announces that a Long Term Agreement (LTA) sign-up is underway from December 15, 1993 through January 14, 1994.

If you are interested in long term conservation, contact the ASCS office to apply. Also remember that any application made in a prior year is now null and void and a new application for 1994 must be submitted.

Under sign up provisions of the Annual Program (ANA) for conservation work, producers may apply for cost sharing any time throughout the year. Practices available to county producers, include brush control, livestock water wells, pipelines, water storage tanks, and cross fencing. Application may be made by coming to the ASCS office.

Applications received in the County Office by January 15, 1994 will be reviewed for possible cost sharing at the February Committee meeting.

The little shorties and the plainer calves are almost unmerchantable. A new trim well balanced bull of any Exotic, English or Brahm breed would correct this problem in many herds across the country.
