

The ongoing theme for National Nutrition Month, EAT RIGHT AMERICA is a call to action by the American Dietetic Association that challenges Americans to take charge of their nutrition habits.

For 1994, the EAT RIGHT AMERICA campaign will focus on the theme "Nutrition Fuels Fitness." Let's not forget that eating is fun and keep it that way.

The social aspects of eating are important. The Japanese even have an additional guideline recommending that people "make all activities pertaining to food and eating pleasurable ones." If traditional foods important to your cultural and ethnic heritage are high in fat or sodium, try using lower fat and lower sodium versions or just eat smaller portions. Take time to enjoy meals with your family and friends. Try new foods and preparation methods--you may discover new favorites! Making eating pleasurable as well as healthful promotes a feeling of well being.

Some points to keep in mind when using the dietary guidelines are as follows:

The Dietary Guidelines apply to your total diet, not just one food, one meal, or even one day, but all food

Thorp Returns From Meeting

Senior Center Director, Carole Thorp, has recently returned from attending two separate meetings in Ft. Worth and Austin.

At the Directors' meeting of the Texas Association of Senior Centers in Ft. Worth on March 5th, the board discussed funding for senior centers at the national and state levels, the upcoming Joint Conference on Aging to be held in Dallas, April 24th to 27th, and the 1996 JCOA Conference to be hosted by TASC. Present at the TASC meeting were President, Pat DuBois of Mansfield, President- Elect Sandra Huber of Gonzales, Secretary, Virginia Chamblee of Bedford, 2nd Vice-President, Debbie Edwards of Killeen, Treasurer, Jesse D. Moses of Amarillo, Linda Ogden of Euless, Les Matthews of Athens, Carlton Lancaster of Fort Worth, Carole Thorp of Sonora and Barbara Ellis with the Texas Department of aging in Austin. Carlton Lancaster and Carole Thorp both stressed to Ms.Ellis their concerns with the trend of finances being moved from Senior Center programs and in stead being utilized by Area Agencies on Aging who are now providing Services that have been typically provided for senior citizens by senior centers (such as benefits counseling). They were assured that this was not T.D.O.A.'s intent and that their concerns would be taken back to the board members. Mr. Lancaster went so for as to "beg" TDOA to "not rob Peter to pay Paul" by cutting funding for senior center operations and meals. After all, these are the very programs that provide many senior citizens with their only assistance and access to help

choices over time.

The Dietary Guidelines work together to help you choose a healthy diet. Choosing a diet with plenty of vegetables, fruits, and grain products will help you lower your fat intake. A diet low in fat and moderate sugars (and alcohol, if you drink) will help you maintain a healthy weight. Choosing foods with less fat will make room for calories from the variety of foods you need to get enough protein,

> vitamins, and minerals. You don't have to give up favorite foods. No single food is "good" or "bad," by itself. It's how it fits into your total diet that counts.

Balance your choices. Here's an example of balancing fat. If you choose whole milk rather than skim, you can balance your fat intake by saving the calories from 2 teaspoons of fat in your day's meals. For instance, skip the sour cream or butter on a baked potato. If you enjoy ice cream, have some; just remember to eat lower fat foods at another meal to balance your total fat intake. Other options are to eat less of the high-fat choice or eat it less often or choose a lower fat alternative such as frozen yogurt instead of ice cream.

JoAnn Palmer, secretary of the Sutton County Historical Society, in previous columns, has stressed to the citizens how important old photographs are to the Historical Society. One man, from reading the columns, realized he had a "treasure" in old photographs. Realizing their significance to the history of Sutton County, he then donated them to the Historical Society. There were over thirty photos, some dating back to 1890.


One picture was the third oldest photo taken of Sutton County known to the Historical Society. Among the photos were several pictures of the downtown area after the 1903 fire. The pictures were taken from two different angles. The existence of these photographs was not known. Also among the photos, there was a picture of the bridge over Lowry Draw (this was a surprise, JoAnn has yet to find any photos of that particular bridge), a picture of Felton's Cave containing a scene never seen before, the interior of the Vander Stucken's Store, several photos of Sonora taken from Eaton Hill, pictures of Main Street before the 1903 fire, the interior of Maude S. Saloon, views of the Dry Devil's River, early day firemen practicing, at least half a dozen Noah Rose photos, a picture of a celebration in June of 1916 and several old postcards with pictures of Sonora when the draws flooded.

Several other pictures of significance to the history of Sonora were found among the throng of photos. They are to be used in future Historical Society columns. If you have any pictures, old or recent, that you don't want or need, the Historical Society can use them. Remember, today's events are tomorrow's history!!

Parents Becoming Unwitting "Dealers"

Parents are becoming unwitting "dealers" in a new drug trade.

Children are sniffing and huffing products found right under our nose: cleaning solvents, hair spray, correction fluid and glue. One in four seventh graders has inhaled legal substances that become toxic with inappropriate use, according to the 1992 Texas School Survey of Substance Abuse, conducted by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. Inhalants are four times more popular than marijuana and an estimated 16 percent of fourth graders have tried inhalants.

Because inhalants are easily obtained and legal, they are often the first substance a youngster will try. But the toxic impact of inhalants to the body may be greater than alcohol and other drugs because the body retains the chemical components of inhalants longer. First time inhalant users have collapsed and died from powerful adrenaline surges that short circuit the heart. Permanent brain, kidney, liver, lung and bone marrow damage can also develop.


Often, parents and educators are unwitting suppliers, failing to be suspicious when typewriter correction fluid or household glue and solvents disappear. But they can be alert for telltale signs of inhalant abuse: paint on hands, mouth or nose • spots or sores around the mouth • drunk, dazed or dizzy appearance • chemical breath odor • anxiety, excitability, irritability • nausea, loss of appetite • red or runny nose or eyes.

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
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
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These two photos were taken after the 1903 fire from angles that it was not known pictures were taken from. The photographer was O.H. Palmer.



Sutton County Underground Water District News

Submitted by the Sutton County Underground Water **Conservation District**

A safe water must not contain any organisms that would indicate the presence of disease bacteria.

Several diseases may be transmitted by unsafe water; typhoid, paratyphoid, bacillary dysentery, amoebic dysentery, hepatitis, gastroenteristis, and cholera. All of these are intestinal disorders - the microorganisms that cause them live and grow in the intestines of infected people or warm blooded animals who have the disease or who carry the disease. When fecal matter from one of these people or animals gets into the water supply, the pathogens can be transmitted to a well person who may then get the disease. Carelessness in personal sanitary habits may contribute to the spread of the disease.

Bacteria are the most plentiful of all living organisms. Many bacteria are helpful and even necessary for everyday living, while only a few cause disease. Both disease-causing and helpful bacteria live in the intestines of humans and animals. Disease bacteria are difficult to detect because there are so few of them compared to the helpful ones.

Therefore, testing of water samples is done by using indicator organisms. One of these is the coliform group of bacteria. Coliforms live in the intestinal tracts of animals and humans. Although these bacteria usually do not cause disease, they do indicate the presence of fecal matter in the water. Whenever fecal matter is present, disease-causing organisms can also be present. Total coliform originates from insects and warm blooded animals. So when E. Coli are

detected, they indicate that feces from warm blooded animals may have contaminated the water and the possibility that disease causing organisms may be present.
