Shurley Bros. Plan Big For Boer Goats

M.D. and Marvin Shurley, two brothers from Sonora, have big plans for a Purebred Boer Goat herd here in Sutton County.

The Shurleys have recently imported Boer goats from New Zealand. These Boer goats are the worlds

largest meat goats.
Originally, the goats were purchased by the Shurleys to improve their herd, but Boer goats are now being considered exotics. The prices of these goats has risen tremendously. Prices for Purebred Boer Goats has doubled in the last year. Presently, each Boer Goat sale seems to bring higher and higher prices. Recently, one Boer Goat sold for over \$89,000. At the first U.S. public auction, held in August, the Boers sold for an average of \$10,000 each.

According to M.D., it is still profitable for ranchers to use this breed to diversify their existing goat businesses.

There are about seven different types of Boer Goats. The type of goat that is generating the most interest now is the "improved" breed. The Shurleys took the top 5% of their Spanish goat does and bred them to purebred Boer bucks.

M.D. and Marvin stated

that anyone buying Boer goats should be very careful as some of the embryos coming out of New Zealand are not of the "premier herd". They encourage buyers to deal with reputable agents when buying from overseas.


The Shurleys now own "Krugerand", the North American Grand Champion Buck. M.D. and Marvin say that presently it is easier to sell Boer goats than Spanish

ranch, I noticed that these goats were much bigger than Spanish goats and the seemed to be more docile. The

coloring of these goats is white with a red head. Top bucks can weigh as much as 250 pounds.

As part of EAT RIGHT AMERICA™ "Nutrition Fuels Fitness" campaign sponsored by the American Dietetic Association, Americans should eat a diet with enough fiber.

Although most health authorities agree that fiber is important in the diet, it is not yet known exactly how much and what types of fiber are needed each day. Some health organizations have suggested healthy adult Americans increase dietary fiber 20-30 grams per day, roughly twice what most Americans eat now. They also suggest an upper limit of 35 grams per day to avoid any adverse effect such

as bloating, gas, or cramping. Fiber should come from a variety of food sources including vegetables, fruits, and whole-grain products.

If you're not use to eating foods that are high in fiber, increase fiber gradually. Since fiber draws water into the large intestine, be sure to drink plenty of liquids - 8 or more cups a day - including water, juice, milk, and other beverages, soups and so forth, to avoid cramping.

The suggested levels of fiber are not meant for children, the elderly, or people on special diets, due to limited research with these groups. Because high-fiber foods are usually bulky and low in calories, small children, for example, may find it difficult to eat enough to get the calories they need to grow. However, everyone, including small children, should include fruits, vegetables, and grain products in their daily diet.

Some ways to obtain at least 20 grams of dietary fiber are by eating the following amounts of foods:

· Three servings a day of vegetables such as broccoli spears, corn, baked potato, and kidney beans;

plus Two servings a day of fruit such as pear, apple, banana, figs, and orange;

· Three servings a day of whole-grain products such as whole-wheat bread, hot oatmeal, or other whole-grain

"Trail Ride For Rehab" To Be Held At Chadbourne Ranch

The historic Chadbourne Ranch in Coke County invites you to escape the world of planes, trains, and automobiles for a weekend in April. April 16-17 the Chadbourne Ranch hosts the first annual "Trail Ride for Rehab" to benefit West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene and San Angelo. Participants travel by wagon or horseback over private ranch roads and enjoy the rugged beauty of this scenic ranch which is normally not open to the public.

Trail riders will move along the ruins of Ft. Chadbourne. The fort was established in 1852 and was in use until 1864, providing protection to early settlers of West Texas. There were several skirmishes with the Apaches, Comanches, Lipan, and Kickapoo which inhabited this area.

G.G. Odom moved to the area shortly after the Civil War established the Chadbourne ranch. At one time the ranch encompassed an area which ranged south to San Angelo, including the present Ballinger area, and back to the present location. The ranch now is a 27,000 acre ranch and is currently owned by the descendants of Mr. Odom.

The Chadbourne ranch has done a remarkable job in preserving the atmosphere that existed more than a century ago. The ruins of old fort

Chadbourne still stand silently above the rolling hills and lush pasture lands. The ranch still teems with deer, wild turkey and other game, as it has for so many years. Camped out

under the stars, it's not difficult to let your mind drift back a hundred or so years. The "Trail Ride for Rehab"

Apply for College Tuition Money Early


(DM)-Spring filing deadlines for student financial aid mean that it's time to get applications completed for help with college tuition bills. The Federal Family Education Loan Program makes it easier for students and parents to get loans for higher

Federal PLUS loans provide help for parents regardless of family income. Creditworthy parents may now borrow as much as they need, but not more than the cost of education minus other financial aid such as scholarships and grants. The current interest rate for Federal PLUS loans is 6.64 percent APR through June 30, 1994.

Access to education loans is easier for students too. Students who demonstrate need will find subsidized Federal Stafford loans available for borrowing up to \$8,500 per year, depending on the grade level. For subsidized Federal Stafford loans, the government pays interest while the student is in school or during authorized periods of deferment. Unsubsidized Federal Stafford loans are readily available with no requirements to demonstrate need; however, interest is not paid by the government. The current interest rate for Federal Stafford loans is 6.22 percent through June 30, 1994.

Before applying for loans, students must fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), available from any high school guidance office or college financial aid office. Although this application is free, some colleges may request that students fill out a supplemental form, for which there is a fee.

Former director of financial aid at Butler University and currently a

Some families mistakenly eliminate themselves from student financial aid by not applying. The rules that determine who receives student financial aid are complex so it's best to apply to make sure you know where you stand. You just might qualify.'

A special loan information hotline, 1-800-562-6872, is available Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. -5:00 p.m. E.S.T., for students and parents who may have questions about federal education loans. An automated voice response system takes messages at all other times.

Sonora Main Street Manager, Melett Rowland, is pleased to announce the Low Interest Loan Program which is now available through both local banks in conjunction with the Main Street Program.

Anice Read, Director of the Texas Main Street Program, met with First National Bank President John Childers, Sutton County National Bank President A.W. Bishop and Vice-President Cashier Ray Smith on February 23, 1994 to establish the guidelines which would dictate the program.

Buildings eligible for the loan must be in the Main Street

Project Map Area. Each bank has put up \$20,000 toward the loan pool at an interest rate of 4%. The maximum loan amount at 4% is \$10,000 per building storefront. Additional funds can be negotiated at the bank's regular rate. All proposed work must be approved by the Main Street Advisory Board before loan applications can be completed.

Applications for the Low Interest Loan Program are available at the Main Street Office in City Hall. Technical assistance is available for restoration plans through the Main Street Manager at no cost

to the applicant.



Q. All the emphasis on courses of study in schools now has made me wonder what pupils had to take to graduate in the early days?

A. Devil's River News, November 14, 1914 School

An exhibit of the courses of study of Sonora High School will be both interesting and helpful to parents and pupils; to parents that they may have competent information upon which to base a proper appreciation of the school, and to pupils that they may hold continually in mind the requirements for graduation, and apply themselves accordingly. The course of study here follows:

First Year: English -Composition, Reading Classics. History - Myers Ancient History. Mathematics High School Algebra to page 205. Science - Physical Geography, Physiology. Latin - Pearson's Essential.

Second Year: English -Composition and Rhetoric Reading Classics. History -Myers Medieval. Mathematics High School Algebra completed. Science Agriculture. Latin - Caesar.

Third Year: English -History of American Literature, Composition writing. Mathematics - Plain Geometry, including all the originals. Science - Chemistry. Latin - Virgil Aeneid, or Book Keeping - Williams and Roders System.

Fourth Year: English -History of English Literature, Composition Writing, Reading Classics. History - American History and Civics. Science -Physics, Laboratory work. Latin - Cicero, or Book Keeping.

These courses of study total eighteen units for graduation, a unit being any high school subject pursued during a session of not less than nine months.



VISTA Volunteers Sworn In

On Wednesday, February 23rd, 1994, Governor Ann Richards swore in VISTA volunteers. VISTA volunteers are people who volunteer their time to make sure children get immunized and educating mothers about prenatal care and the availability of food assistance.

Eli Segal, assistant to President Clinton and head of the Corporation for National and Community Service, stated that 4,400 Texas children have had measles in the last 5 years and that 14 died in fiscal 1994 from the preventable disease. Mr. Segal talked about the untapped potential of those who died, saying any of them

might have been an artist, Texas governor, or a researcher who would discover a cure for AIDS.

"We cannot allow our children to die from illnesses we have the knowledge and the skill to prevent," he said.


Ms. Richards told the volunteers, "We're asking you to walk a little way with someone who needs a friend, with someone who needs assistance...We're asking you particularly to pay attention to the children of Texas."

The governor also issued an executive order establishing the state component of President Clinton's national service program and accepted \$480,000 in federal funds for it.

Texas' volunteers are the first VISTA workers eligible for the education money - which was proposed by Mr. Clinton during his 1992 campaign and approved last year by Congress - according to the Corporation for National and Community Service, created to bring together federal domestic volunteer organizations.

Well, a pick-up truck ripped past me and I felt its mirror just graze my arm. A mille-inch closer and it would've hit me.

The moral of this story is: please give an officer room when he's standing next to a car alongside the road. Leave an extra lane of space, it could save a life."

DEFERRED ADJUDICATION

A. Deferred adjudication is almost like probation-it puts the ticket on hold, usually for a 30 to 60 day period. If you don't get another moving violation during that time period then you're okay. However, it's offered only at the judge's discretion.



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
