

## A Heartfelt Letter



**Ashlyn Blayne Worley** 

Dear Mom and Dad or Grandma and Grandpa or Aunt and Uncle or Friend and Neighbor,

I apologize if I left anyone out. Really, the only thing you need in order to be included in that group listed above is a love for children and a generous, compassionate heart and, if you have these attributes, you can't help but be touched to the point of heartbreak by the story that follows.

About four years ago Tammy Worley, wife of Danny and daughter of Fern and E.J. Wipff, gave birth to a beautiful baby girl. Ashlyn immediately became the center of her parents' lives. It was their first, and they were naturally proud to the point of bursting with joy and love. Fern and E. J., the grandparents, were as ecstatic as Danny and Tammy. Their other grandchildren lived some distance away, so they were looking forward to

spoiling this one to their hearts' content.

I remember the first time I saw the Worleys and the Wipffs at church, after Ashlyn was born. They just overflowed with love and joy. What a beautiful memory!

Ecstasy didn't last long, though. As Ashlyn grew, her parents began to notice changes in their beloved daughter. Things like not being able to hold her head up as she should for a child her age or being able to focus or distinguish direction of sound. They took Ashlyn to the doctor. The examination resulted in the referral to another doctor, which led to another referral and another, and another. All with the same results. They didn't know what was wrong with her. The fear and anxiety mounted for Danny and Tammy. By now they knew that Ashlyn was terribly ill, but from what?

They knew how to love Ashlyn and to provide her basic needs, but what about her special needs? How could they provide those needs if they didn't know what she required? Can you imagine the frustration, the fear, the feeling of helplessness they must have had? If you've ever been a parent or a grandparent, you've felt at least some of what Danny and Tammy were feeling at this point.

There is more to this storymuch more, but I need to explain my purpose for this letter, even though you probably already know.

The Worleys have been to specialists in Dallas, Houston and all points in between, even Canada. Even though Danny has a good job with Halliburton and good insurance, the bills are mounting. Insurance doesn't pay for travel, lodging and some testing. Not to mention Ashlyn's special needs.

Doctors have now determined that, to the best of their scientific knowledge, Ashlyn has Rhett's Syndrome, a disease for which there is no known cure and one that is fatal. Her condition is rapidly deteriorating, almost on a daily basis. She is mobile only by being carried or in a wheelchair. Tubes jut from her beautiful little body almost constantly. I've not seen her in quite some time now. I hate to admit it, but I don't think I want to. I'm not strong enough to see her suffering. You see, I'm a parent and a grandparent. I can imagine Ashlyn as mine and feel the agony and heartbreak. You can too, can't

As I said, the Worleys need help. My wife and I have lived in this wonderful place for twenty years now, and I've always been astounded at how loving and generous our community is. It's time to show our love and generosity once again. A trust is in place through the Sutton County Community Trust Fund at the First National Bank in Sonora. Your donations are tax deductible and may be mailed or carried to the First National Bank. It doesn't have to be much. It's not really the money that counts anyhow, is it? It's really the outpouring of love and compassion that one shows for another. I'm reminded of another who gave out of love and compassion. God gave his only Son to die for us that we might someday have eternal life. Can we do no less for much, much less?

If you've been touched by this family's plight as I've been touched, I know you'll do what you can to help Danny, Tammy and Ashlyn in their time of need. I know you will, because that's what Sonora and its people are all about. Loving, generous compassionate.

Volunteers are trained as facilitators and can present the workshop in their towns. The workshop, which is available in both English and Spanish versions, presents a new approach to community awareness, prevention and intervention.

Intermediate School. Future sites will include classes at the Church of Christ, classes for city employees and parents of at risk youth.


### **Tiendita in Business** For Over 40 Years

She has very low muscle tone which affects her muscle strength throughout her body. She has poorly controlled seizures and chronic pneumonia, possibly due to aspiration with numerous testing being done. Biopsy of her lungs, P.H. Probe to see if she is reflexing and may have to have a feeding tube. She has hyperactive airway disease which affects her respiratory system. She is on oxygen as needed. Suctioning is done at times, also. She has numerous monitors at home to enable her to stay at home as much as possible. Ashlyn started losing the use of her hands in September of 1992

and went from feeding herself finger foods to not picking up anything. She also started having Grand Mal seizures in March of 1993. I haven't had the heart to write and tell everyone that Ashlyn is staying sick so much, we do apologize for not keeping everyone informed. It's very weighing on our hearts. We appreciate all your help and prayers in the past and the present. We especially ask for your prayers. Ashlyn loves Barney and loves to be read to. She is at S.W. Methodist Hospital, 7700 Floyd Curl Drive, San Antonio, TX 78229-3902 in Room #425. The doctors believe she has Progressively Degenitive Muscle Syndrome of unknown origin. ### Letter to the Editor

Sonora is at a crossroads. It has an opportunity to gain access to the most important "highway" of the next century. The information highway is coming through and Sonora needs to build a first class entrance ramp so that our community can gain access to the new world that is fast developing.

That entrance ramp is the proposed new public library.

A modern library is more than a repository for books and articles. It is more than a place to gather information for reports and edification, much more. Those traditional functions remain important of course. The modern library provides computer access to the libraries of the world. As a student at Emory University's Candler School of Theology, from 1988 to 1991, I was able to access the collections of Harvard, Stanford, Trinity College in Ireland, Cambridge University in England among others from a terminal in the university library. The same capability will soon be available to country preachers in wonderful towns like Sonora, if the citizens are willing to invest in the future. Imagine your child doing a report on Germany in school and being able to communicate at little or no cost with a child in Germany doing a report on Texas. Imagine needing the latest information on gas filled, technology and it being available at the touch of a few key strokes. Imagine what other possibilities may exist.

The modern library, properly equipped and staffed can be a place where a community can share the resources of the world of We need a knowledge. facility with the proper communications ports and wiring that can handle the needed hardware. We need a building that has a sound roof and that is able to withstand the heat of Sonora summers.

Our present facility is literally shaking at its foundation under the weight of its expanding collection of books. It does not have the wiring to support the needed upgrades in computer technology.

To retrofit an existing building into a library is to quote Ben Franklin, "penny wise and pound foolish." Upgrading buildings to meet the physical needs of the library will be costly.

We need a library that is completely accessible to persons who are physically challenged not just because "Americans With Disabilities Act" requires it but because it is the right thing to do. While it may cost slightly less money to retrofit some of the available buildings in the near term, long term, retro-fitting will only cause the problem of upgrading facilities to be postponed.

Sonora needs a new library building specifically designed to meet the challenges of the future now! Stop-gap, temporary measures are not satisfactory!

The proposal developed by the Library Study Committee, headed by Mr. A.W. Bishop is a sound one. The facility proposed by the committee is an excellent one that will meet the needs of our community well into the next century. The cost is reasonable when one considers the cost to our community if we are left behind and are denied access to the "information super highway.

Please support this fine effort to help our community to stay on the cutting edge. Ask your friends and neighbors to support this effort as well. Let's make Sonora an even more wonderful place to live! Let's build this library!

### Students Need to Carry Social Security Cards

"Any student looking for a summer job needs to have a Social Security card to show his or her new employer," says Franklin H. Upp, manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office. "You will need to have the card with you so the new employer will have the correct name and number to credit your earnings and taxes."

If you've lost or misplaced your card, contact Social Security for a replacement. "You'll need to show some identification," Upp said, "but the process is really very simple." You can contact your Social Security office to obtain the form or call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, business days between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00

p.m.

"Remember," stresses
Upp, "your future Social
Security benefits will be based on the earnings posted to your Social Security record, so be sure you use the proper



### **Social Security News**

If you are under 65 and disabled, you are automatically covered under Medicare hospital insurance after you have been entitled to Social Security disability benefits for 24 months.

If you are a widow or widower between 50 and 65 who has been disabled for at least 2 years but has not applied for Social Security benefits, you may be eligible for hospital insurance. Additional information about this coverage may be obtained at any Social Security office.

If you are a government employee and become disabled before 65, you may be eligible for Medicare on the basis of your government employment. In general, a 29-month waiting period is required before hospital insurance protection can start; however, you should contact a Social Security office as soon as you become disabled.

If you, your spouse, or dependent child need kidney dialysis or a kidney transplant, you should also apply for Medicare at any Social Security office. If you cannot visit an office, the application process can be started by phone, or a Social Security representative can visit your

If you are eligible for Medicare, protection generally starts with the 3rd month following the month in which dialysis maintenance treatments begin; however, under certain conditions, coverage could start earlier. The people in the Social Security office can provide information regarding when Medicare protection will actually begin.

delayed. What if you lose your card? Don't worry. All you have to do is contact Social Security and request a replacement. You call 1-800-772-1213 weekdays between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., or (915) 949-3718 weekdays 9:00

a.m. to 4:00 p.m. It usually takes 4 to 6 weeks to get the new card. And remember, there's no charge for the replacement

Drive, San Antonio, Texas.


Earwood's "Summer Time



## Hospital Meeting Minutes Ask The Historical Society

Society Q. Is it true that the Old Spanish Trail almost didn't

come through Sonora? A. In the Devil's River News of February 12, 1927 we found the following answer to your question

When the United States Highways were being designated in 1926 only two routes across West Texas were included: the route from Fort Worth to El Paso and the route from San Antonio through Del Rio. Petitions were sent to Washington last spring to reopen the question. On the grounds that the Hill Country was of too much importance to have all travel routed around it on the north or the south the designation of the Old Spanish Trail route was put through. The official map now issued definitely settles the Junction, Sonora and Fort Stockton route as a part of this limited system of super-highways. This makes the Old Spanish Trail completely a "United States Highway" from St. Augustine, Florida to San Diego, California. It will cease being known according to the various state highway numbers and will take the U.S. shield number and the Old Spanish Trail membership is to see that the distinctive Old Spanish Trail marking is also installed, establishing it forever as the great distinctive "Old Spanish
