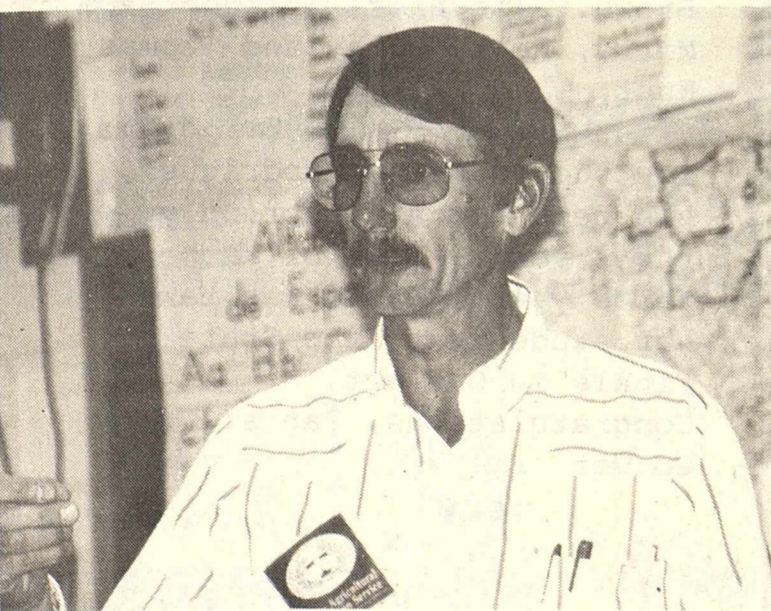

Louis also ran in the 400 meter relay and the 1600 meter relay. Those teams place 4th in both events.

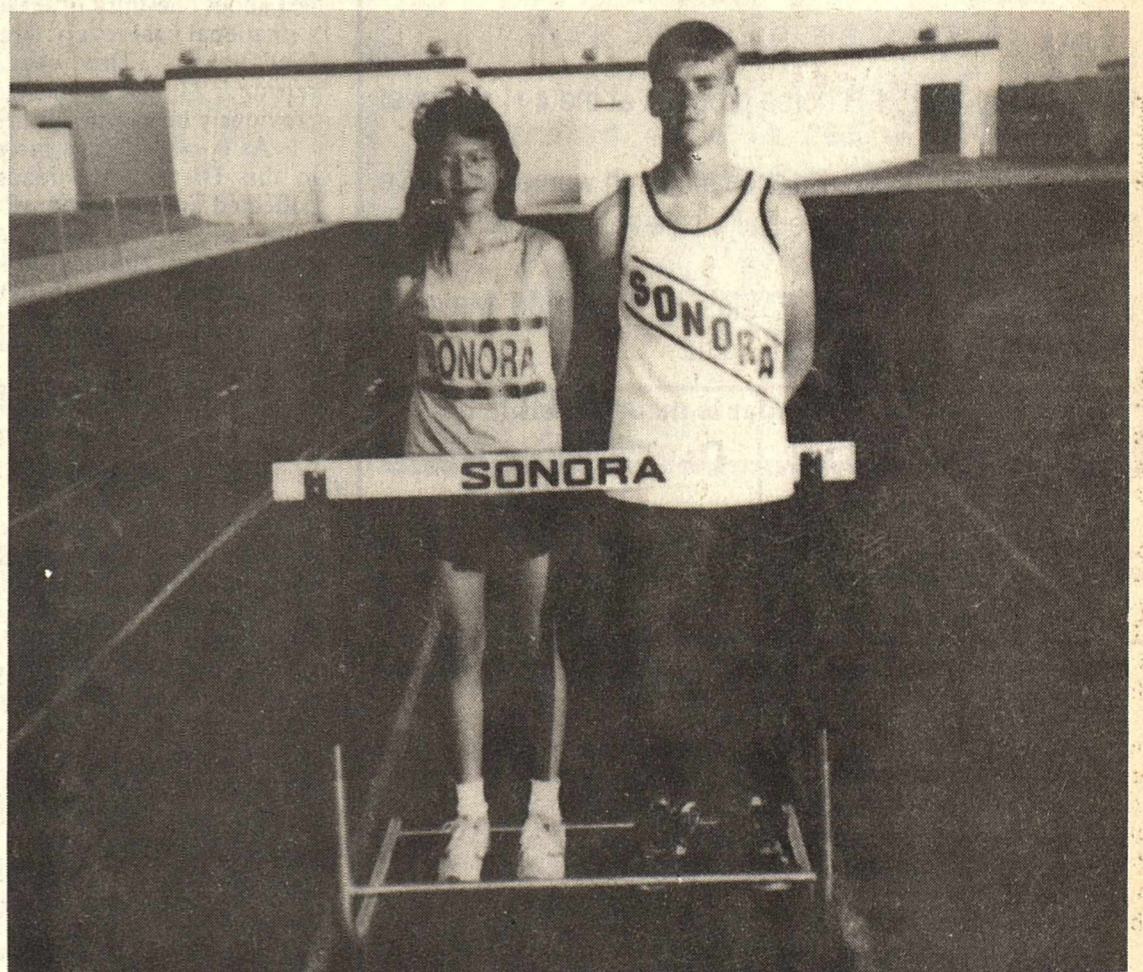
Betty was part of the 800 meter relay and the 1600 meter relay teams which placed 6th in both events.

A Heartfelt "Thank You" To Sonora

I would like to thank everyone for their prayers, cards, food and wonderful help and time that you have given to our family and Ashlynn.

I would also like to say a very special thank you to the person who wrote the article in last week's Devil's River News. Your thoughtfulness and concern is appreciated

more than you will ever know.

I want to let everyone know a little more about what is going on with Ashlynn. She has not been definitely diagnosed with Rett Syndrome. She does, however, have many characteristics of this disease, as she does with several others. Two of the doctors who have examined her have diagnosed her with

Rett Syndrome, but her main neurologist has not diagnosed her yet. The problems with a diagnosis is that she has so many characteristics of so many different syndromes.

There is no test available to determine whether she has Rett Syndrome or not. Diagnosis is made strictly by characteristics and regression of developmental skills.

Whatever she has, it is NOT contagious. Ashlynn has regressed over the last 18 months, losing some motor skills (mainly her hands). She has never been able to crawl or walk on her own. She can, at times, walk with assistance.

She is currently out of the hospital. There is a high

Letter to the Editor

In February of this year, the Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District conducted our annual monitor well testing. Our monitor well program consists of approximately 60 wells. We test about one-third of these on a rotational basis every three to four years. This year we retested 21 wells that had previously been tested in 1990.

As a cost-savings measure to this District, the manager collected and prepared all the samples to be sent to a commercial laboratory in College Station, Texas. These

samples were analyzed for over 30 constituents each.

From the monitor wells tested this year, the recently received results show no significant changes in the water quality since the last analysis. Reports on these individual wells have been forwarded to the individual well owners.

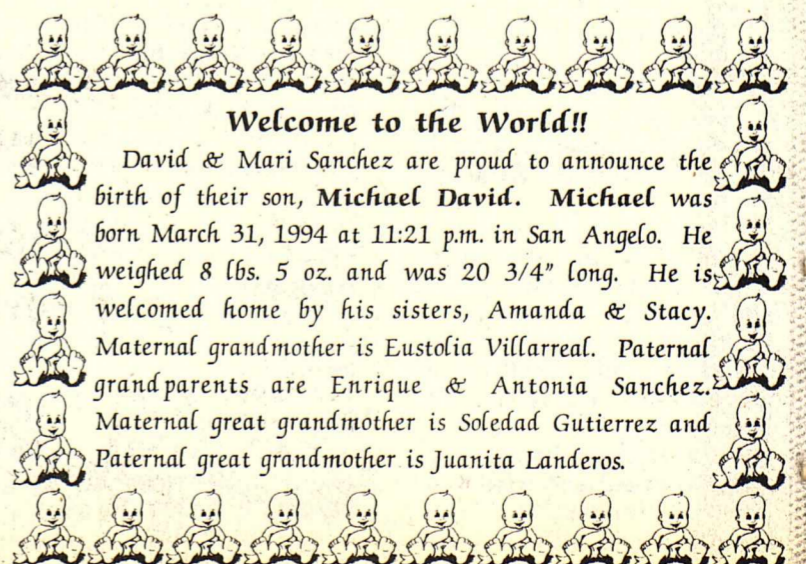

On April 5, 6 & 12, 1994 Sutton County Emergency Medical Service sponsored American Heart Association Course A cardiopulmonary resuscitation classes from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at the Sutton County Emergency Medical Services Building. Instructors for the classes were: Treva McReynolds EMT, Jody Luttrell EMT, Carla Garner EMT, Pat Campbell EMT, George Keese EMT, & Donna Keese EMT.

Course A consists of learning how to do one-man rescuer CPR and foreign body airway obstruction management. Upon successful completion of a 25 question test and a skills test, each participant will be certified for a period of two years with the American Heart Association.

The classes were a great success, with thirty-four employees being certified in CPR.

Rifle Club Travels To Kerrville

Saturday, April 23, the Sutton County 4-H Rifle Club traveled to Kerrville, Texas and took Sixth Place in the District Shooting Meet which was comprised of Rifle Clubs from Bandera, Bexar, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Kerr, Medina, Wilson and Uvalde counties.

Using a single-shot bolt-action 27 caliber rifle, fitted with regulation peep sites, each shooter is allotted 45 minutes to fire at 3 targets. The targets, consisting of 10 Bulls-eye each, are marked for shooting positions consisting of prone, kneeling and standing. Upon completion of the allotted shooting time, the targets are scored per bulls-eye, the highest score being 10 points for a perfect center hit, and the ten bulls-eye are then added together for a position target score, the highest possible being 100 points. The scores of all 3 targets are then calculated for a shooters total

score, the highest possible score being 300 points.

Members of the Sutton County 4-H Rifle Club and their scores are Matt Routh - Prone 65, Kneeling 50, Standing 50, Total 165; Blaine Wilkinson - Prone 89, Kneeling 63, Standing 58, Total 210; Jamie Teasley - Prone 77, Kneeling 51, Standing 25, Total 153; Bryce Williams - Prone 58, Kneeling 48, Standing 3, Total 109; Alternate - Cole McMillan. Of these scores, the top three scores of the team were calculated for a total of 528 points.

The Sutton County 4-H Senior Rifle Club consists of Bonner Walsh with scores of Prone 78, Kneeling 58, Standing 41, Total 177 points.

Coach Mike Routh and all of his 4-H Rifle Club members are to be commended for their success.

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) has awarded the City of Sonora a grant in the amount of \$197,300 for additional water system improvements. Mayor Lemuel Lopez received notification of the award in a letter form TDHCA Executive Director Henry Flores late last week.

The project will involve the construction of an additional 100,000 gallon ground storage tank connected to a dedicated well and pumping station. The tank and pumping station will be located in the southwestern portion of the community.

"We sought this grant for three basic reasons," explained Mayor Lemuel Lopez. "It will provide a closer water source for people living in the surrounding

neighborhoods; it will improve fire protection; and it will help ensure the long-term water needs for the city."

The grant application was

prepared by City Manager John Pape, Public Works Director Jim Garrett, and grant consultant Mike Duran.

The award was one of only

six awarded to communities in the Concho Valley Region, and was one of the largest projects to be funded.

Plans Underway To Expand Shooting Program

District competition has become very rigid as larger counties with the funding for year round rifle clubs have joined the District. However, in keeping with the high standards taught and signified by the Sutton County 4-H Association, we can't let our 4-Her's down. Plans are underway to provide an expanded shooting program to include a Pre-Junior, Junior and Senior Rifle Team as well as an expanded practice season which will provide the Rifle Club members the experience necessary to compete. In order to achieve these plans, volunteers to coach will be needed as well as extra funding to equip more 4-Her's

adequately for meets. This 4-H program provides youth the opportunity to learn the discipline and respect needed to handle firearms safely. Sutton County is in the heart of lease country for hunting and

our youth is exposed to firearms daily, so if you can help in any way, shape or form to enhance the Rifle Club program, please contact the local 4-H center.

Ask The Historical Society

Q. Who was Will Carver?
A. Some time in the 1860's, Maggie Scott, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Jerry Scott of Pipe Creek, gave birth to a son that she named William. We can find no record of her being married at this time. In the 1870 census we find Maggie Scott married to Richard T. (Dick) Carver and William is listed as a Carver and his step-son. The same listing is repeated in the 1880 census. We have no idea who the father of William Carver was, and as a historical society we can report only facts not speculation.

Work logs from the "Sixes" indicate that Will Carver was employed there from June 1889 to January 1, 1891. Parts of the log are illegible but his name shows up again in 1896.

On February 10, 1892, Will Carver was married to Viana Byler. She was born on July 24, 1874 and died on July 22, 1892, supposedly from complications in childbirth. She is buried in the Byler plot in the Sherwood Cemetery but there is no stone on her grave.

It is said that Will Carver was heartbroken over her death and went back to working on the ranches a bitter and changed man. He quit ranching in early 1896 and went into the saloon business in San Angelo with Sam Ketchum.

This Ketchum, Tom "Black Jack" Ketchum and Carver joined together to form a gang.

In 1896, George Franks alias Bill Carver was identified as one of the robbers at a bank in Nogales, Arizona. In 1897 he was again identified as one of the train robbers at Steins Pass. In 1898 he was identified as being one of those taking part in a train robbery of the Colorado and Southern between Des Moines and Folsom, New Mexico. In July of 1899, Sam and Will robbed the same train of approximately \$50,000. In a shoot out a few days later in Turkey Canyon, Sheriff Farr was killed and two deputies wounded by the gang. Sam

Ketchum was wounded and died in custody on July 24, 1899 and the rest of the gang scattered.

On August 16, 1899, Tom "Black Jack" Ketchum was wounded and captured when he attempted to rob a train alone. His right arm had to be amputated, he was tried, convicted and the now famous "lost his head", hanging was held on April 26, 1901. Black Jack implicated Will Carver in the Steins Pass robbery before he died. Will Carver is now the only surviving member of the original Black Jack bunch.

In April of 1900 Will Carver is given credit for the death of George Scarborough and then joins Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kids gang, the Wild Bunch. On August 29, 1900 Will is identified as one of their gang robbing the Union Pacific train near Tipton, Wyoming. He is again implicated in the robbery, by the gang, of the bank in Winnemucka, Nevada on September 19, 1900, of \$32,600. In December 1900 the gang is on a spending spree in San Antonio and the famous picture of them is taken.

On March 27, 1901 O Thornton is killed by Walker, an alias of Carver, at the Kilpatrick place in Concho County. Will Carver was

known to use the following aliases, Franks, McDonald and Walker. Telegraphs were sent out and the gang was on the run.

On April 2, 1901, several members of the gang came into Sonora for supplies. Will Carver and George Kilpatrick were severely wounded in a shoot out at Jack Owens Bakery by Sheriff E.S. Briant, Deputies Henry Sharp and J.L. Davis and Constable W.H. Thompson. Kilpatrick lived, despite his wounds, and Carver who was shot in the right lung, twice in the right arm, twice in the right leg, once in the left arm and once near the temple, died at the courthouse three hours later. Sheriff E.S. Briant was credited with killing Carver and received \$1,000 reward from Wells Fargo Express Co.

Carver stated he was one of the Carver boys, Will

Carver, before he died. His body was identified by Ben Binyon, W.L. Aldwell, George Hamilton, E.R. Jackson, Archie Kuykendal, M.V. Sharp and Misses Ervin. A picture of his niece, Laura Bullion was found on his body.

Laura Bullion admitted in print to being Will Carver's lover and to riding out with the gang. One of her aliases was Della Rose. When arrested in St. Louis, old love letters from Carver, written from Sherwood, Texas and Ponca City, Oklahoma were found among her personal effects. Also found was a notebook in which was written "W.R. Carver killed, Tuesday, April 2, 1901."

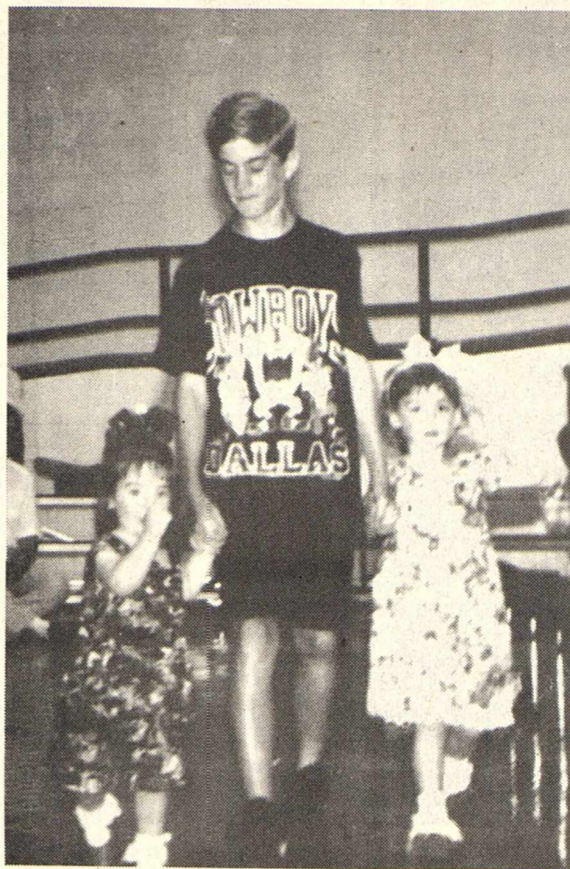
Will Carver was buried in the Sonora Cemetery. There is a stone on his grave with only the date of April 2, 1901. Some say that his friend, George Hamilton put the stone on his grave and

some say that Laura Bullion bought the stone. Too many years have gone by to prove who put it there.

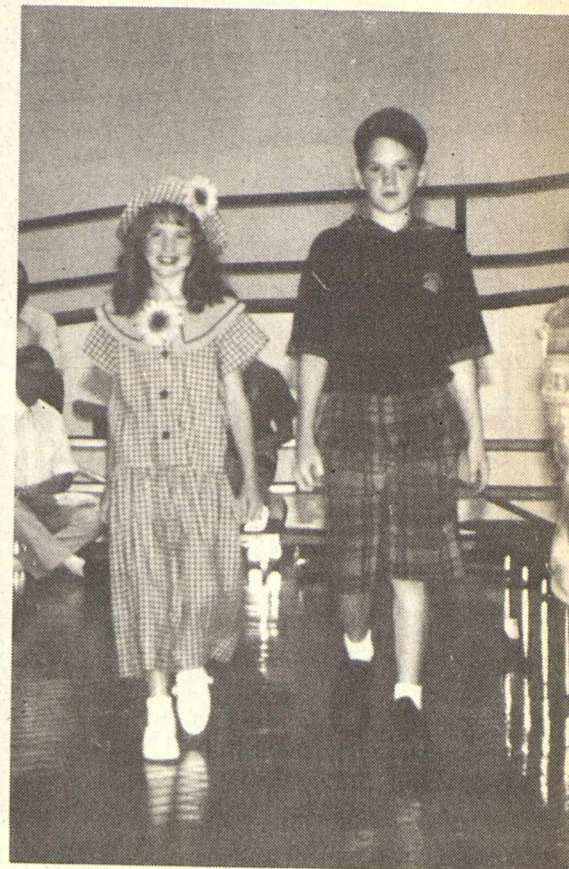
To sum it up, Will Carver was a man who for approximately 30 years of his life was an honest and hard working man. For some reason he suddenly gave up ranching and fell in with a bad crowd. His claim to fame is that he was allegedly a robber and murderer in two of the most famous gangs in the history of the Old West. He was never prosecuted and found guilty of these acts, but he was identified as taking part in them.

Recently the City of Sonora named the City Park the Will Carver Park and erected signs denoting same at a cost to the tax payers of \$298.50. Some people are upset over this and some think it is great. As the Sutton County Historical Society we will not take sides in this issue. We will print histories of people on request but will not voice political opinions.

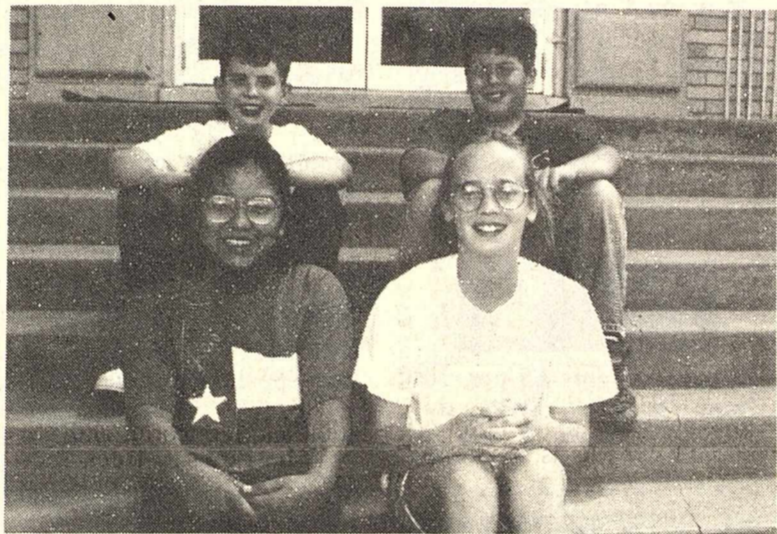
