Community Banking Month



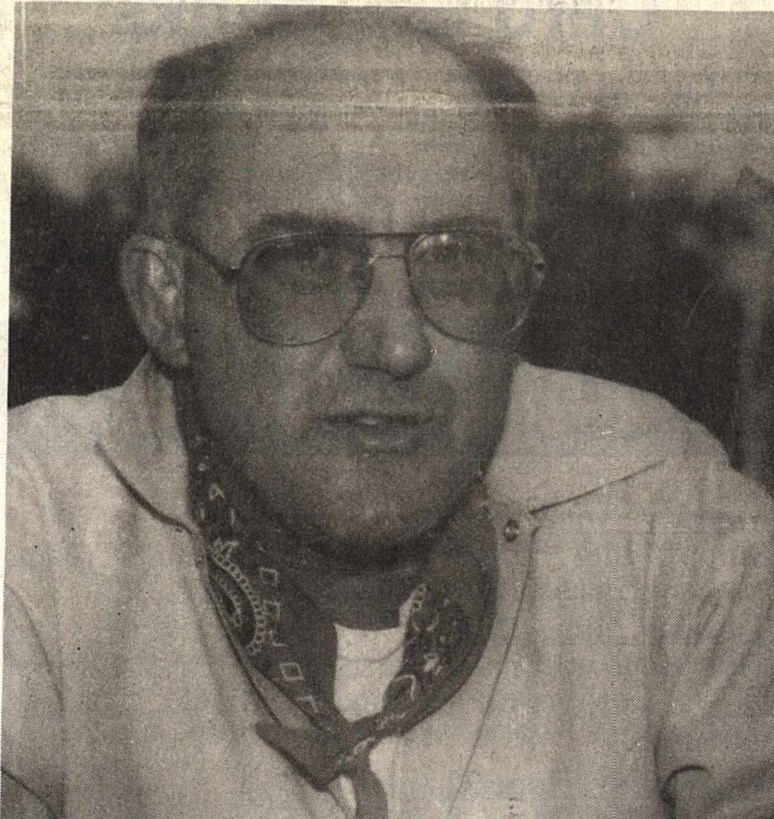

On Wednesday, June 8th, a grass fire swept through parts of the Vestel Askew Ranch northeast of Sonora.

Firefighters from Sonora and Eldorado were called to battle the blaze.

Sonora firefighters were called to the scene shortly before noon and worked to contain the fire until approximately 6:30. With the fire under control they headed back to the station.

Soon, they were called out again. Wind shifts had rekindled the fire and it was on the move again.

Approximately 15 Sonora

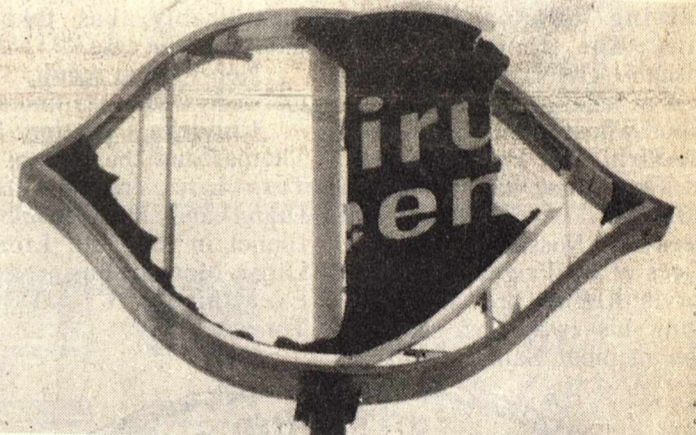
firefighters fought the blaze until well after dark until the fire was fully contained.

Approximately 3 sections burned.

Heavy storm clouds were on the horizon and firefighters were praying for rain. The rain finally came on Thursday, bringing with it high winds and hail.

Trees were uprooted, signs were blown down, limbs were scattered but there were no reports of injury.

Another thunderstorm struck on Saturday night. Not as much damage was evident or reported from this storm.

Mr. Wilkinson composed his first song when he was in the second grade. He began writing poetry in Junior High School.

His first album, *Texas When Texas Was Free*, consisting of 9 songs, was released in 1990. The song was produced by Lloyd Maines and the supporting musicians were drawn from the cream of local talent.

The song became the first release by Adobe Records, a label set up by Tom Woodruff, whom Mr. Wilkinson had known for a number of years.

Album reviews of *Texas When Texas Was Free* were unanimous in announcing the arrival of a new folk/country songwriting talent from the Llano Estacado.

Mr. Wilkinson released his second album, *Deep In The Heart*, in 1992. This album, consisting of 17 songs, was also recorded by Adobe Records.

Biscuits O'Bryan, Cowboy Poet, will be the host and storyteller for Saturday evening, June 18th.

The entertainer for Saturday will be Steven Fromholz, Texan singer, songwriter and balladeer.

Mr. Fromholz is a "singer, songwriter, storyteller, actor, comedian, playwright and white water river guide in pursuit of a fulfilling career in any of the above."

He has had great success in his songwriting with songs recorded by such artists as John Denver, Michael Murphy, Hoyt Axton, Jerry Jeff Walker and Willie Nelson. He received two platinum records for his efforts. He has also recorded eight albums of his music for ABC, Capitol, Lone Star and his own, Felicity Records.

As an actor, he has appeared in four stage plays in Austin, Texas, and is a regular performer with Esther's Traveling Follies, an Austin based musical comedy group.

"Bosque County, Texas", a play written by Steven and his partner, Don Toner, opened March 27, 1992 at the Live Oak Theater in Austin, and has broken all box office records for the theater. The play is based on his song "Texas Trilogy".

Since 1985, he has become a trained professional river guide on the white water rivers of Mexico, New Mexico, Arizona, Wyoming and the Big Bend of Texas.

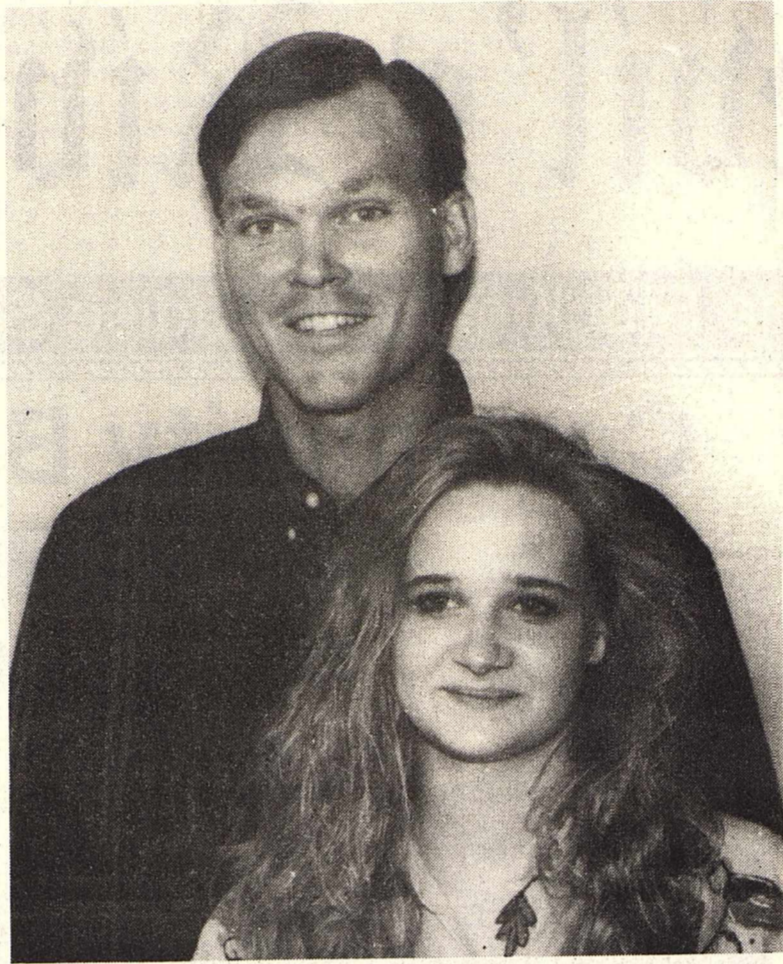

Ask The Historical Society

Q. Do you have any information on a Franz Zealand?

A. Devil's River News, June 20, 1930 Franz Zealand, 29, a bridegroom of only a few weeks, was drowned Monday at noon in the Dry Devil's draw, about seventeen miles southwest of here when his horse reared back with him in the middle of a large hole of water.

A Mexican named Sousto was with Zealand at the time of the accident and went for help. One hundred men searched for 12 hours before Cassius Taylor found the body about fifty feet from where he was last seen when going under the water.

Mr. Zealand was a native of Holland, had been in this country for twelve years working on various ranches in Texas. He was employed by Mrs. J. W. Wilson on the ranch. His body was laid to rest in the Sonora Cemetery. He is survived by his widow, parents and relatives in Holland.

Upon checking the cemetery records we find that Mr. Zealand is on our missing list. Does anyone know if this body was moved somewhere else or where it is located in the cemetery?

Q. Do you have any records on people who served in WWII?

A. The Devil's River News has articles on many of the men from Sonora who went off to war. Unfortunately we have very little on the Mexican-Americans who served. In an attempt to update our files we are collecting copies of discharge records and pictures, in uniform if possible, of veterans of all wars. We would sure like to add you to our list. Mr. George Smith has been a great help to us in this endeavor. In conjunction with the 50th Anniversary of D Day we will try to publish a short article on a veteran each week.

Cesario Martinez - Even though he had been born in Mexico and did not have to serve, Cesario Martinez went off to fight for his new country. He was inducted into the USAAF at Ft. Bliss, Texas on February 25, 1941, his 24th birthday and over nine months before Pearl Harbor was bombed.

Mr. Martinez served in the following battles and campaigns: Naples-Foggia, Rome-Arno, Southern France, Rhineland, Central Europe. He was awarded the Purple Heart with I Oak Leaf Cluster for wounds received on September 8, 1944 and January 6, 1945. He also was awarded the EAME Campaign Medal with 5 Bronze Stars, American Defense Service Medal and Distinguished Unit Badge.

Cesario Martinez attained the rank of S/Sgt and was a Squad Leader. He was honorably discharged October 1, 1945 at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

KSH Offers Education/Support Program

Understanding, peer support and increased community awareness of the problems associated with mental illness are the goals of the newly organized Family Support and Education program being sponsored by the Kimble County Community services Center. The Center, which is a community-based mental health clinic operated by the Community Services Division of Kerrville State Hospital, serves Kimble, Mason, Edwards, Menard, Sutton and Schleicher counties.

"There is very limited formal or informal support available in this area for person's who are either experiencing mental illness or for the families or concerned friends of these individuals," said Vera Joy, RN and Director of the Junction facility. "One in four Texas families is affected in some way by a mental illness and frequently, especially in the rural setting, people simply don't know what options they have. Many times they don't realize that help is readily available. The Family Support and Education Program is designed to help get that word out in a safe and neutral fashion. All an interested person has to do is come and share in a covered dish supper, meet some new friends, pickup the brochures

we have available, and then, should they ever need it, put the information to work for themselves or for someone that they know," she concluded.

The Family Support and Education program is a multi-disciplinary project of the Center. "Each of the divisions within the facility have agreed to sponsor a covered dish supper and provide a brief informational program on a mental health topic. said Joy, We also provide for a question and answer period and plenty of time for socialization and interaction." Topics for upcoming meetings will address children's mental health, Depression, coping with stress, Rehabilitation, medication interactions, and promoting a healthy mental attitude and lifestyle.

According to Joy the meetings are currently based at the Junction clinic but,

depending on response, the plan is to rotate through the other four counties served by the Community Services Center. "We are willing to go where the residents of this area are best served and where we can get the information out to the most people. Our staff members have no difficulty with going to Sonora, Eldorado, Mason, Rocksprings, or anywhere else that folks are willing to meet, share a meal, exchange information, and learn," added Ms. Joy.

The next meeting of the Family Support and Education Program is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on June 20th at the Kimble County Community Services Center. The Center is located at 202 N. division.

West discards a low heart on the third diamond and South, with only eight sure tricks, must now try to locate a ninth. He can lead a spade to the jack and, if it wins, he is home. Or he can lead a heart to the king and hope that East has the ace. In the actual case, both of these methods fail, if attempted.

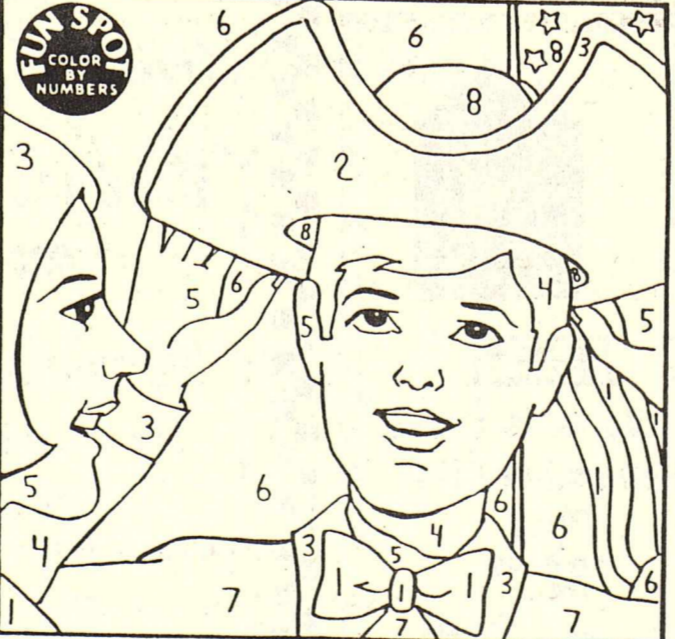
But there is a third method of play that guarantees the contract. Declarer cashes dummy's ace of clubs at trick six, leads a spade to the ace, and exits with the jack of clubs. This allows West to cash the K-9 of clubs as South discards a heart.

By now everyone is down to four cards and South holds the K-J of spades and K-5 of hearts. West has the Q-9 of spades and A-7 of hearts, and he is forced to lead either a spade or a heart. Whichever he leads, South acquires his ninth trick. The third way is clearly the best way to play the hand.

Lloyd's of London specializes in insuring against risks their clients are unwilling to run. A suitable premium is paid by the client to guard against the danger he fears will occur. If it does occur, Lloyd's pays for the loss.

A bridge player often assumes the same role as Lloyd's. In effect, he becomes an actuary in certain situations, computing the possibility of gain against the possibility of loss. He weighs the chances of one possibility against another, and often happily winds up paying a small premium in order to assure a potentially large gain.

Consider this deal where South wins the opening club lead with the seven, continues with the queen, which also wins, and then cases the A-K-Q of diamonds, hoping for a 3-3

Leslie Carrasco has been recognized as a result of her high scholastic performance during the Spring 1994 semester. She has earned a designation on the Dean's Honor List. Leslie is a 1993 graduate of Sonora High School and the daughter of Edward and Arcelia Carrasco.

Richardson Selected Outstanding Performer

Vicky Richardson of Sonora High School was among 160 high school musicians selected as Outstanding Performer at the 1994 University Interscholastic League Texas Solo and Ensemble Contest held May 28-30. The three-day competition was conducted at the University of Texas at Austin and Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos with more than 24,000 high school musicians from throughout the state in attendance. It is the largest music festival of its kind in the world.

Richard Floyd, UIL State Director of Music, said, "To be recognized as an Outstanding Performer at the

UIL Texas State Solo and Ensemble Contest is one of the highest individual musical achievements that a high school student can attain. The french horn solo performance presented by Vicky was a credit to her talent, hard work and dedication. This distinctive honor is clearly worthy of the designation *State Champion*."

The contest was judged by music educators, university professors and professional musicians from throughout the United States. The format of the contest provided both a performance evaluation and specialized musical instruction for each student musician.

Controlled Burning Ordinances

Dangerous fire conditions require additional safety measures during controlled burns.

County Judge Carla Garner asked that we publish this county ordinance.

Ordinance §111.107 Responsibility for Consequences of Outdoor Burning.

The authority to conduct outdoor burning under this regulation does not exempt or excuse any person responsible from the consequences, damages, or injuries resulting from the burning and does not exempt or excuse anyone from complying with all other applicable laws or ordinances, regulations, and orders of governmental entities having jurisdiction, even though the burning is otherwise conducted in compliance with this regulation.

Ordinance §111.105 General Requirements for Allowable Outdoor Burning.

Outdoor burning which otherwise is permissible shall also be subject to the following requirements when specified in §111.103 of this title (relating to Exceptions to Prohibition of Outdoor Burning):

(1) Prior to prescribed or controlled burning for forest management purposes, the Texas Forest Service shall be notified.

(2) The burning must be outside the corporate limits of a city or town except when it is necessary to eliminate a

naturally occurring fire hazard as determined by the local fire department.

(3) Burning shall be commenced only when the wind will carry smoke and other pollutants away from any city, town, residential, recreational, commercial, or industrial area, navigable water, public road, or landing strip which may be affected by the smoke. Burning shall not be conducted when a shift in wind direction is predicted which could produce adverse effects to persons, animals, or property during the burning period. If at any time the burning causes or may tend to cause smoke to blow onto or across a road or highway, it is the responsibility of the person initiating the burning to post flag-persons on affected roads in accordance with the requirements of the Department of Public Safety.

(4) The burning must be at least 300 feet (90 meters) from any adjacent properties which have residential, recreational, commercial, or industrial use.

(5) The hours and wind conditions for burning shall comply with the following:

(A) The initiation of burning shall commence after 9 AM. Burning shall be completed on the same day as soon as is reasonably practical prior to 5 PM.

(B) Burning shall not be commenced when surface wind speed is predicted to be less than six m.p.h. (five knots) or greater than 23 m.p.h. (20 knots) during the burn period.
