Plane Crashes At Sonora Golf Course

A single engine Cessna 175 airplane crashed at the Sonora Golf Club, Monday at approximately 8:30 p.m. The plane was being flown by Alvin Lewis Stewart, 41, of Sonora. One passenger, Alvis Junior Rudolf was aboard the flight.

The plane hit some trees and crashed just west of the seventh tee box.

There were several witnesses to the crash, including Brian Rhodes, Sonora Golf Club greenskeeper. Rhodes gave a report to Douglas Wigington, air safety investigator with the National Transportation Safety Board. Rhodes stated in his report that approximately 15 minutes before the crash he "saw the plane circling around the golf course and airport at a very low altitude.'

Tony Torres, Rhodes coworker, witnessed the plane circle and crash. Stated Torres, "It (the airplane) was tilted way over making the turn too low and the left wing hit the trees."

Rhodes, Torres and golfers, Savell and Shelly Shannon assisted the two injured men. Both men were transported to Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial hospital and from there to San Angelo. Mr. Stewart was released. Mr. Rudolf remains hospitalized in





O. When was the Sonora **Police Department Building** built?

A. Devil's River News, January 11, 1935, Municipal Building To Be Completed by

Wynn, city attorney; George Suggs contractors for the building.

The total expenditure for the building will be approximately \$5700. Thirty percent of this sum is an outright Public Works Administration Grant. Completion according to the contract, must be within sixty working days. The building will be of tile and stucco and have a tar and gravel roof. It will house the city's fire equipment and provide a building for the transaction of city business.

Note: This building has been greatly changed through the years with additions and major interior changes.

The library was to be closed for a month to try to check the spread of contagious diseases



Natural Gas Safety Tips

School's out once again, and it's that time of year for parents and kids to learn their summer safety do's and don'ts.



the club will need to be active in helping get the new baseball program going.



Good declarer play requires good planning from start to finish. Any declarer who believes he can play now and think later is sure to run into trouble from time to time.

Here is a typical case. South got to six hearts as shown and West led the king of spades. Declarer won with dummy's ace and cashed the A-K of diamonds and ruffed a diamond, hoping the missing diamonds were divided 3-3.

But East showed out on the third diamond and South could no longer make the slam. He could ruff a club in dummy but he would then have to lose two spade tricks later on. Alternatively, he could establish dummy's fifth diamond and then

spades, since that would make South's jack a trick, so he would have been forced to shift to another suit. Let's assume West switches to a club at trick two. Declarer wins with

with the queen).

the ace, cashes dummy's A-K of diamonds, ruffs a diamond, plays the king of clubs and ruffs a club in dummy.

Then, after ruffing another diamond, declarer draws trumps, crosses to dummy's ace of spades, and discards his last spade on dummy's last diamond. All told, South scores one spade, five hearts, three diamonds, two clubs and a club ruff in dummy to finish with 12 tricks. He loses the first trick, but that's all






