Alternative Fuels Plant Opened

On Thursday, June 29, 1994, the Texas Railroad Commissioners cut the ribbon on a dream come true for proponents of alternative fuels technology for vehicles: a new state-of-the-art refueling facility that features propane and natural gas dispensers right next to the familiar gasoline and diesel ones. Having such up-front visibility and easy access, proponents say, is key to getting public acceptance of alternative fuels.

But the really big news is that the new hi-tech station is not set amid the modern steel and glass skylines of Dallas or Houston, where concern for the environment has mandated the use of alternative fuels like propane and natural gas. This harbinger of things to come sits in the heart of the oil patch, in the west Texas town of Sonora, population 2,751.

"It is important to recognize that there are no air-quality mandates for this area," said Railroad Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent. "Business owners have simply recognized that besides being environmentally sound, the use of alternative fuels will save them money."

Oil-patch fleet managers are interested in alternative fuels largely because they reduce operating costs. Range is also a factor: pickup trucks converted to run on both propane and gasoline can run 1,000 miles or more between fuel stops. By cutting down on the amount of time spent refueling, employees can spend their time more productively. In addition, alternative fuels burn clean. That means oil and spark plugs need to be changed less frequently, and engines can last up to two or three times as long.

Despite traditional fierce competition, the alternative fuel industry change is being driven by market need.

"Market demand for access to both propane and natural gas vehicle fuel is forcing

cooperation from these two historically competitive industries," said Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers. "This representation of private-sector initiative and innovation will help insure the success of Texas' alternative fuels program."

The Eddins-Walcher Company, owner of the facility, became interested in offering natural gas in addition to propane, gasoline and diesel after speaking to CNG equipment supplier J-W Operating company. Sonora provided an ideal location because of the presence of fleets utilizing both alternative and conventional fuels.

This new cooperation underscores another reality about alternative fuels.

"The opening of the station illustrates how natural gas and propane fuel pumps are

moving out of the industrial back lot and achieving the same convenience gasoline and diesel customers demand," said Commissioner Barry Williamson. "As the nation's largest producing state, Texas has a big stake in alternative fuels. This facility is one of many that, as a network, will insure the success of Texas' alternative fuels industry."

The Railroad Commission, which regulates Texas' propane and natural gas industries, takes an active interest in the increased use of these fuels.

The Commission has

backed up its belief by becoming a leader among state agencies in converting more than a third of its own vehicles to run on alternative fuels.

Vehicles that run only on propane or other alternative fuels are gaining in popularity as users discover that sticking solely to a cleaner-burning fuel is the best way to realize the cost, engine life and emissions benefits they offer.

Sutton County EMS Responds To Accidents

The Sutton County Emergency Medical Service responded to two major accidents last Wednesday morning, June 29th.

Two ambulances responded to a single vehicle accident that occurred at 7:50 a.m., nine miles East of Sonora on Interstate 10. The accident involved a family of seven from California. They were traveling West in a Ford Aerostar van. One person was seriously injured and two received minor injuries. All of the injured were brought to Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital. Two of the three were then transported to Angelo Community Hospital by ground.

The second accident occurred at 11:40 a.m. seventeen miles West of Sonora on Interstate 10. It involved six Louisiana residents traveling in a Ford Aerostar van. Three people received serious injuries and three received minor injuries. All were taken to Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital. One patient was transported to Shannon Memorial Hospital in San Angelo by Medi-Vac Helicopter, and two were transported by Sutton County

E.M.S. to Shannon Memorial Hospital.

The Ozona Fire Department used the Jaws of Life to aid in the removal of the passengers of the van.

One ambulance from Crockett County and two from Sutton County responded.

This was the first time since all three ambulances have been in service that they have all been dispatched at the same time. It was also the first time that there have been two major accidents with multiple casualties on the same day in Sutton County E.M.S.'s history.

A one-vehicle roll-over occurred 24 miles East of town on Interstate 10 on Friday morning. The injured and were transported to Hudspeth Memorial Hospital.

A one-vehicle roll-over also occurred on Wednesday morning shortly after 7:00 a.m. 31 miles East of Sonora on Interstate 10. Two persons were injured. One was transferred to Shannon Memorial Hospital by Medi-Vac helicopter at 9:30 a.m. As of 11:30 a.m., the other patient was still at Lillian M. Hudspeth Hospital.

Sutton County Human Services Update

The state spent a total of \$2,114,797 last year for major welfare programs in Sutton County, according to David Maberry, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$467,632 spent for families and children and \$347,416 for the aged and disabled for hospitals, physicians, laboratory, X-ray and other services. Also, \$26,260 was spent for families and children and \$99,916 for the aged and disabled in Sutton County for prescribed medicines. Disproportionate-share hospital payments totaled \$247,977. Nursing home costs of approximately

\$418,820 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$138,277.11 Maberry said.

Food stamps worth \$331,523 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$36,976. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.



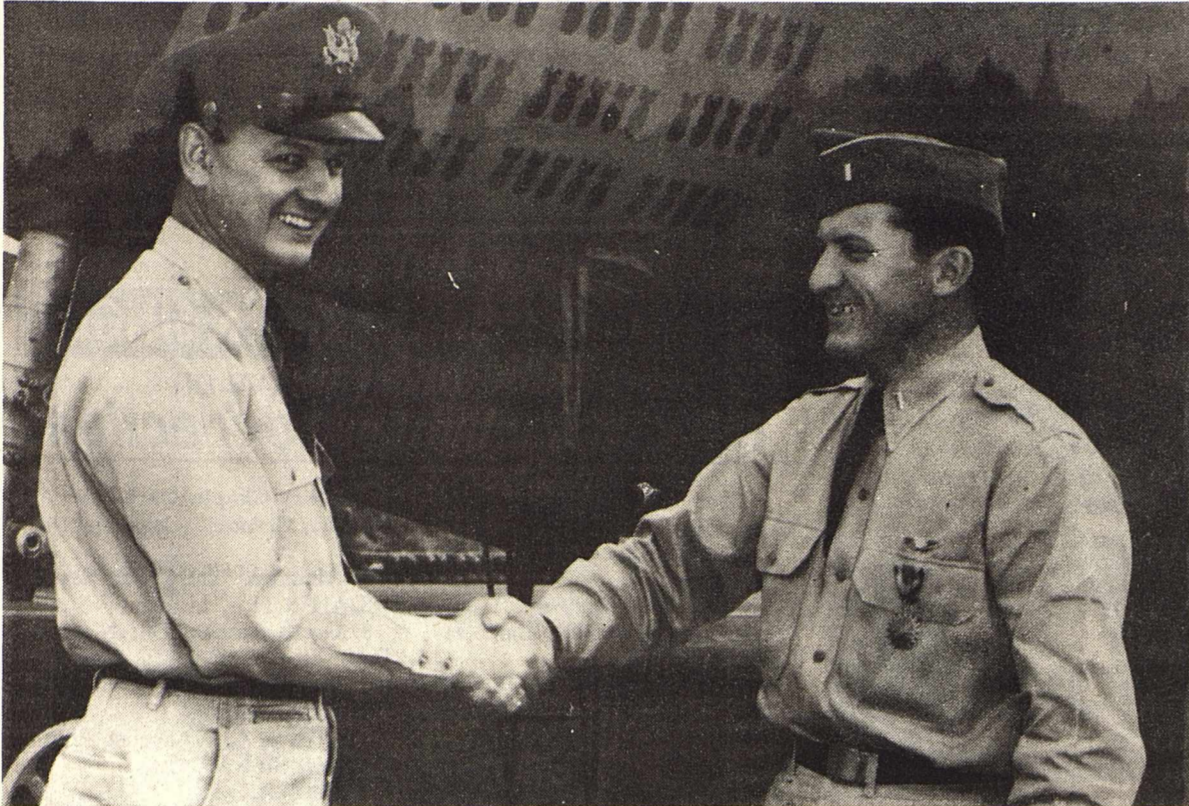

Hershel Davenport WWII/Korean War Veteran

Hershel enlisted in the Army Air Corps on November 18, 1942. He was assigned to 6 weeks Basic Training at Ft. Bliss, Texas, after which he went to Ft. Collins, Colorado to Clerical School. Upon completion, he applied for Aviation Cadet School. There were no openings at that time, so on April 10, 1943 he was assigned to Headquarters 7th Air Force, 73rd Fighter Squadron, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii for clerical duties.

On August 5, 1943, he was appointed as an Aviation Cadet with assignment to Keesler Field, Biloxi, Mississippi, to begin training. Training was continued at Massachusetts State College, Amherst, Massachusetts and then Courtland Army Air Field, Courtland, Alabama. This was followed by intensive gunnery training at Las Vegas Air Corps Base, Las Vegas, Nevada. He was then assigned to Bombardier

Training at Big Spring AFB, Big Spring, Texas, graduating as one of the top 6 cadets out of a class of 166 on May 31, 1945.

Hershel reported to Chandler AFB, Williams, Arizona as an instructor. While there he was selected to Radar/Bombardier School and was assigned to Yuma AFB, Yuma, Arizona and completed training September 20, 1945. By this time the A-bombs had been detonated and the war was over. He expected immediate discharge but was sent to Brooks AFB, San Antonio, Texas, where he was separated from the service on November 21, 1945 and put into a 5 year inactive service status.

On November 21, 1950, he received orders to report to Randolph AFB, San Antonio, Texas on December 21, 1950. "Merry Christmas from Harry Truman!!" He was assigned to Ellington AFB, Houston, Texas where B-29 crews were formed and crew training began. In May, 1951, further training was received at Topeka AFB, Topeka, Kansas. Upon completion, in August 1951, he was assigned

to Camp Stoneman, California for immediate assignment to Kadena AFB, Okinawa.

When crew training began at Randolph AFB they were under orders of Strategic Air Command and the assignment at Kadena was to be 3 months or 25 missions over Korea. The "refresher" course at Ellington was training for a certain radar range at Kadena, this was changed to a different range. Hershel happened to learn this new range quickly, so he was named Squadron Radar Officer, 28th Bomb Squadron, 19th Bombardment Group, 20th Air Force. This meant he not only flew with his own crew, but with new ones as instructor. When his crew went on R&R in Tokyo, he had to remain at Kadena.

Hershel's crew flew 32 missions, he got in 38. They were awarded the Air Medal with one oak leaf cluster for lead crew on pinpoint bombing missions. The crew flew a "non-fit for combat" B2-29 home to McClelland AFB, Sacramento, California arriving March 7, 1952. They "babied" #2 engine from Honolulu only to have all 55

gallons of oil drop out of #4 engine upon landing. Base mechanics had to use a stick to measure the remaining fuel.

After a 14-day delay in route, he was assigned to 303rd Bomb Wing, Davis Monthan AFB, Tucson, Arizona. He was next sent to Randolph AFB, for separation on May 18, 1952.

High Flight
Oh, I have slipped the surly bonds of earth,
And danced the skies on laughter-silvered wings;
Sunward I've climbed and joined the tumbling mirth
Of sun-split clouds--and done a hundred things
You have not dreamed of--wheeled and soared and sped

High in the sunlit silence.
Hov'ring there,
I've chased the shouting wind along with flung
My eager craft through footless halls of air.

Up, up the long delirious, burning blue
I've topped the wind-swept heights and easy grace,

Where never lark, or even eagle, flew;
And, while with silent, lifting mind I've trod
The high untrespassed sanctity of space,
Put out my hand, and touched the face of God.

The author, John Gillespie Magee, Jr., aged 19, an American volunteer with the Royal Canadian Air Force, was killed in action on December 11, 1941.

During the month of July, twelve original watercolor paintings by Sonora Artist Barbara Earwood will be shown at the Tom Green County Library. The exhibit will contain: several of her new floral pieces; three of her new Angora Goat works; "Sea Gulls", a rendition of her feelings of gulls while at Rockport; "Gentle Tiger", a tiger cat lazily reclining high up on a ladder, exhibited in the San Antonio Watercolor Group Exhibition and in the Texas Watercolor Society Exhibition, both in San Antonio in 1991; "Stinkys", a quadrangle of baby skunks, shown in T.W.S. in 1991 and in The Southwestern Watercolor Society Exhibition in Dallas in 1990; "Lillies", Easter Lillies growing by her bedroom window, also exhibited in S.A.W.G. in 1991, and in Dallas at the S.W.S.

Signature Show in 1993; and "For The Joy of Jumping", three Angora kids playing on the hay, exhibited in the S.A.W.G. Annual Exhibition in 1993.

Earwood is a Signature Member of each of the three watercolor groups mentioned above, and also serves on the Board of Directors of the West Texas Art Group. She has had many one woman shows throughout the area, and has shown in numerous area and national, juried exhibitions.

Her 12x5 1/2 foot montage, portraying the simultaneous growth of Sonora and the bank, hangs permanently in the Founder's Room of the First National Bank of Sonora.

The large oil painting of Mable and Joseph Vander Stucken, that is displayed at the bank, is one of her latest accomplishments.

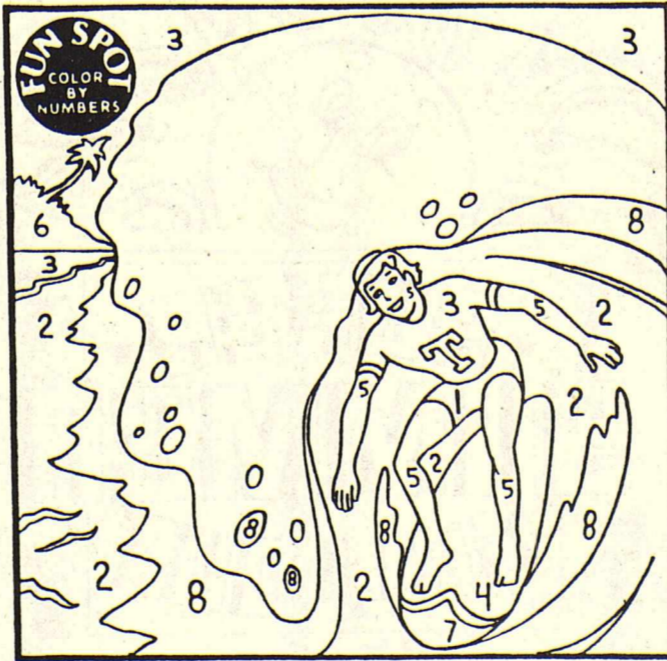
Although bidding methods have vastly improved since contract bridge was introduced in 1925, comparatively little additional progress has been made in the play of the cards. This is largely because, during the two or three centuries when auction bridge and whist — the predecessors of contract bridge — were played, a high plateau of skill had already been achieved in this area.

For example, take this deal from the 1936 Olympics, which used prearranged "par" hands to determine the outcome. The salient point of the play is just as valid now as it was then — and equally instructive.

West leads three rounds of diamonds and declarer ruffs the third one. South must now attack trumps but when he leads a low spade at trick four and West follows low, he should play dummy's eight! If he doesn't,

USDA Soil Conservation Service News

submitted by the Sutton County Soil Conservation Service

As databases go, this one is a biggie. It covers every county in the continental United States, as well as parts of Hawaii and Alaska. It tells what's growing on the land, how far a deer has to go to find water, and how much topsoil is blowing in the wind. It's the newest release of the National Resource Inventory, an ongoing data collection and analysis activity, and it's coming soon to a Soil Conservation Service office or land grant university near you.

The data gathers used satellite imaging, known as remote sensing, to gather comprehensive nationwide data on such subjects as the location and extent of wetlands, condition of rangelands, and wildlife habitat diversity. Specialists also visited fields, farms, streams and rivers to gather detailed information

about specific places.

In all, they sampled 800,000 sites over a period of two years. They generated so much data that it took statisticians another two years just to analyze it. The result was a "snapshot" of resource conditions in the U.S. as of the 1992 growing season. When combined with previous National Resources Inventories - conducted in 1977, 1982 and 1987 - it allows for analysis of changes in resource conditions and uses for more than 10 years.

Preliminary results indicate that soil erosion has dropped significantly in the U.S. over the past five years, and that the loss of wetlands has slowed dramatically.

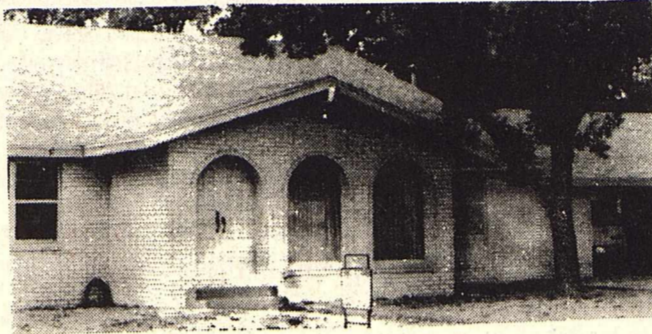
