Celebrant Singers To Perform At St. Ann's

Jon Stemkoski's Celebrant Singers, an internationally-known Christian music ministry, will present a community-wide concert on Wednesday, August 17 at 6:30 p.m. at St. Ann Catholic Church, 209 W. Plum Sonora. The concert is free of charge and a free-will offering will be taken.

Concert attendees will be treated to contemporary Christian music, praise and worship, and personal testimony and ministry. Featuring ten Singers and a twelve-piece orchestra, Celebrant Singers will inspire and bless as they share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through a musical celebration.

"Celebrant Singers is not

'just another music group'. Our objective is to share the love of Christ," said Celebrant Singers founder Jon Stemkoski. "It's a powerful ministry! It will touch your heart. Bring your family and friends--it's an experience you won't soon forget!"

Celebrant Singers have travelled throughout all 50 states, all Canadian provinces, and 65 foreign nations and have sung to more than 4 million people in live concerts and countless others via broadcast media. Nations of ministry include India, Iran, Egypt, East and West Africa, Latin America, all parts of Europe (including the former Eastern Bloc), Hong Kong, the Philippines, and most recently Cuba.

During 1994 seven teams of Celebrant Singers will present over 1,400 concerts in some 30 nations, nine Canadian provinces and all 50 states.

Celebrant Singers is ecumenical in nature. Multiple teams of committed, dedicated and talented young adults represent 38 states, nine Canadian provinces and several foreign nations.

In November '92, Celebrant Singers took their music and message for the first time into Cuba and Haiti. In November '93, they returned to Cuba with official visas from the Cuban government, permitting the team to hold the first public religious meetings in over 30 years. Celebrants were also one of the first Christian groups of its kind to conduct outreaches into previously-closed Bulgaria and Albania in '90 and '91, respectively.

"While similar groups traditionally have had an exclusively Protestant audience, Celebrant Singers is the first full-time contemporary Christian singing group to have a

widespread ministry among America's 60 million Roman Catholics," Stemkoski added. "Since 1977, we've sung in over 3,000 parishes throughout North America."

In 1984, Celebrant Singers ministered in St. Peter's Square before an Easter-week crowd of over 120,000 people. Mr. Stemkoski and Celebrants were also honored by a private audience with Pope John Paul II. They recently participated in Denver's World Youth Day, before the Pope's arrival.

Founder/director Jon Stemkoski is the driving force behind this vital ministry. Mr. Stemkoski has over 20 years of experience in music ministry and is a highly respected minister of the Gospel.

In addition to live appearances, Celebrant Singers have released seven recordings to date.

Jon Stemkoski's Celebrant Singers is an outreach of Stone Ministries, Inc., a non-profit Christian corporation ministering to the needs of people through music and the Arts, Jon F. Stemkoski, President.

Sutton County Commissioners' Court met Monday, August 8. According to County Judge, Carla Garner, Harrison Roofing, of San Angelo, received the bid to reroof the county jail.

Commissioners agreed to sale the existing library building at 210 S.E. Concho. Proceeds from the sale will go toward construction costs of the new Sutton County Public

Library. The court adopted a resolution to ask the Highway Department to build a truck loop around the city at a future date. This will reroute traffic away from downtown and school zones.

Plans were made to adopt the county budget at the next meeting. Plans were also made to adopt a tax rate that will be 3¢ lower than last year.

Crenwelge One Of 6 Hill Country Students To Receive Scholarship

Six high school graduates will be going off to college with help from the Hill Country Chapter of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association Auxiliary. They were awarded scholarships by winning the competition with sixteen applicants from the area from which the Hill Country Chapter draws its membership. This area comprises the counties of: Sutton, Kimble, Menard, Kendall, Kerr, Bexar, Gillespie, Uvalde, McCulloch, Mason, Blanco, Real, Edwards, and Bandera. The graduates who apply must show on their applications that their course of study will be in the field of agriculture.

The six college bound awardees are headed in diverse directions to begin their studies. Daniel Kunz of Kerrville plans to study in the field of agriculture while attending Angelo State University in San Angelo. He is the grandson of Kurly Kaufhold of Hunt, a long time rancher in the Hill Country. Tonya Spaeth from Mason will be attending Texas A&M University with a double major in Agriculture Economics and Secondary Education. Her family is a fourth generation ranching family. Susan Menges of Hunt, a 4-H Gold Star recipient three times, is also from a family which has been in the ranching business for many years. Cole Crenwelge a graduate of Sonora High School goes off to Texas Tech where he will study Animal Science. Cole was chosen outstanding Student by FFA (Future

Farmers of America) and received the DeKalb Award by that organization. He also received the Showmanship Award at both the Sonora and the San Angelo Stock Shows. Once out of college, he hopes to run an Angora goat operation.

Two graduates will be going to Tarleton State University Kimberly Walters and Mary Louise Davis. Kim, an Ingram Tom Moore High school graduate, will be studying Ranch Management and Ranch Ecology. Last February she spent a week in Colorado Springs, Colorado at the Youth Range Forum, a program which is affiliated with the Society of Range Management. She presided as President of that meeting, having been elected to that post the previous year. She was #1 in the state competition of the Plant and Pasture ID, followed by being named High Individual at the same time.

Mary Louise, who graduated from Menard High School, plans to major in agribusiness. She is interested in educating the public about agriculture, giving them facts and generating understanding at this time when it is so sorely needed.

ASCS News

Producers submitting production evidence records for any nonprogram crop or program crop shall ensure the following information is documented on each record:

- A) Name of Producer
- B) Farm Serial Number where crop was produced
- C) Name of Crop
- D) Signature of buyer or an employee of buyer
- E) Name of buyer's company
- F) Date purchased

NOTE: Records not containing this information will not be accepted.

This is to notify all producers that all production records submitted to an ASCS

Office are subject to spotcheck. If a buyer, packer, elevator, gin, etc., refuses to allow a review of a producer's production records, then the producer shall be determined ineligible for disaster benefits for the crop being spotchecked. Out-of-county spotchecks shall be performed at buying points, sheds, elevators, gins, etc., to ensure all applicable records have been submitted pertaining to the disaster affected crop. If the submitted production evidence records cannot be verified, then those records shall be reviewed by a representative of the Texas State Office for eligibility.

Jr. High Football Information

All seventh graders who intend to play football will need the following items by Tuesday, August 16th.

- (1) Doctor's physical from Dr. Pajestka or your family physician;
- (2) Socks, towel, football shoes if your shoe size is 8 or smaller.

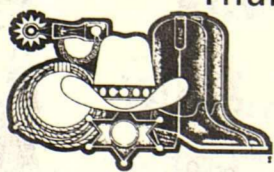

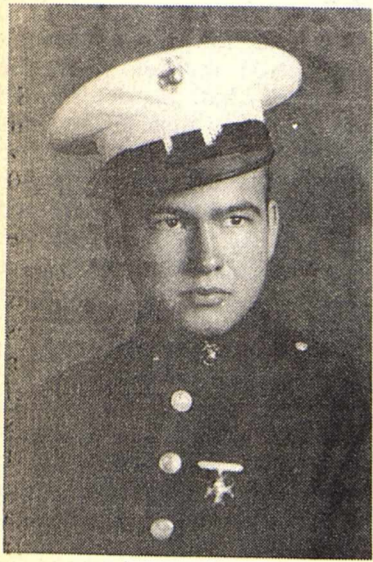

World War II Veteran Gordon William Stewart

Young Bill Stewart left San Antonio for San Diego on an old coal burning train that crawled across the country and seemed to take forever to reach its destination. He arrived at the Marine Corps Recruiting Depot and became a member of the 997th Boot Camp Platoon on October 22, 1943.

After completing boot camp he was transferred to Camp Elliott, California for additional training before being placed in a replacement battalion and sent to a transient center outside Honolulu, Hawaii for a week. From there he went to the Marshall Islands with the 4th Marine Division, which was a part of the 5th Amphibious Corps and commanded by Lt. General "Howling Mad" Smith. Then it was back to Maui in the Hawaiian Islands. Next came the Marianas for the Invasion of Saipan on June 15, 1944, then Tinian and back to Kauai, Hawaii. He was now assigned to the 8th Supply Service Regiment.

He had an interesting experience in Kauai when an ammo dump, which was one of his work areas, blew up one morning, just before he was due to report for work. Explosions kept happening all day long as the unstable ammo kept popping off like firecrackers.

Then the rumor came that the 5th Marine Division, to which he was attached, was going to Japan. Everyone was loaded on ships out of Hilo and they just knew they were off to Japan. One day a boatswain's whistle sounded over the loudspeaker and a message came over that the war had ended. Their ship continued on and landed at Sasebo and the occupation of Japan was on.

On Kyushu Island, Bill saw Sasebo and Fukuoka. One day he went with a group to see the

aftermath of the bombing of Nagasaki, which occurred on August 8, 1945. It was quite an experience to stand there and see the city from the hills. Parts of it were totally destroyed and in other places buildings stood eerily silent. Brush was singed all around the hill and it was a strange experience to stand and see where the atomic bomb had been dropped.

In December of 1945 Bill knew he would be shipped home soon and hoped he would make it for his birthday. January 16, 1946, his 21st birthday, found him on an old flat bottom LST, going 10 or 12 knots, rocking and rolling across the Pacific toward the good old USA.

On March 21, 1946, at Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, Corporal Gordon William Stewart received his discharge from service. He had been the recipient of the Asiatic Pacific Ribbon with 2 stars, the Victory Ribbon and the Japanese Occupation Ribbon.

Devil's River News, August 4, 1944

First Lt. Thomas B. Thorp, veteran of 22 months overseas and of five major campaigns in this war, is home on leave visiting his parents. Lt. Thorp is pilot on a C-47, a converted air liner which carries everything from tractors to troops. His plane was one of those carrying the first troops to Normandy to form the spearhead of the invasion on D-Day. He dropped his load of men behind German lines and went back to England to pick up equipment and ammunition to take back to them.

Letters home were received from Corporal Willie B. Ory from somewhere in England, Corporal Willie Ray Willman, who is somewhere in Italy and Private Sam Odom in New Guinea.

Baby beef, seven roast is 5 ration points and 33 cents a pound and stew meat is no ration points but 25 cents a pound. A jar of tamales is 20 cents. Campbell's Chicken Noodle Soup is 15 cents a can, a large can of Wolf Chili is 39 cents, Karo in a pint bottle is 17 cents and a 12 pack of paper plates is 10 cents.

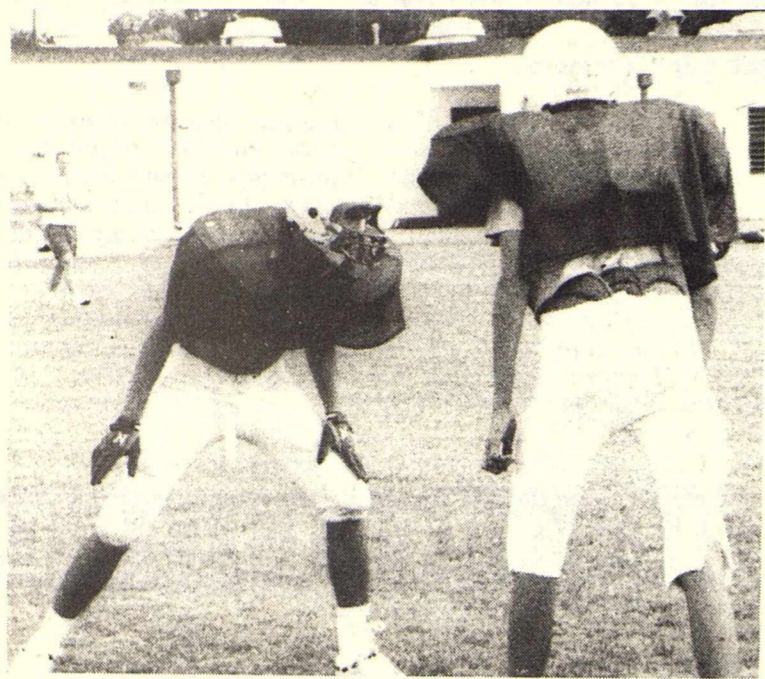

Forums Scheduled To Reinvent USDA-Soil Conservation Service

Nearly 60 years ago, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service was created to address a national resource crisis called the Dust Bowl. Since then, the agency has undergone a number of changes, resulting in the agency now known as the Soil Conservation Service or SCS. In its reinvention process, the agency aims to create the natural resources agency of the future.

To do this, the SCS in Texas has scheduled six forums around the state to solicit recommendations on the agency's future direction.

The first forum will be held in Stephenville on August 2 at the Stephenville High School J.C. Helm Auditorium. Other forums are as follows: Kenedy, TX, on August 4; Plainview, TX, on August 9; San Angelo, TX, on August 11; Nacogdoches, TX, on August 16; and McAllen, TX, on August 18.

Two sessions will be held at each location with identical agendas. Registration begins at 1:00 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. and the sessions will start at 1:30 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. Each session will last approximately two hours.

"The SCS is at a crossroads, and we and our

customers have an unprecedented opportunity to anticipate future needs and refocus the agency's mission," said Texas SCS State Conservationist, Wes Oneth.

"Predicting the future is a difficult task. However, we believe that one of the best ways to prepare for tomorrow is by looking at the past and by asking our customers and employees what they anticipate will be needed in the future," Oneth said.

Anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation is invited to participate. A survey form is available for those who are unable to attend the forum(s). More information and copies of the survey may be obtained from local SCS offices. They are listed in telephone directories under U.S. Government, Agriculture Department.

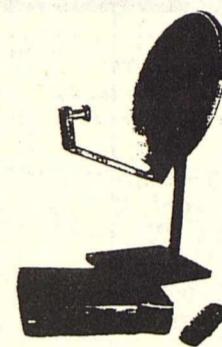

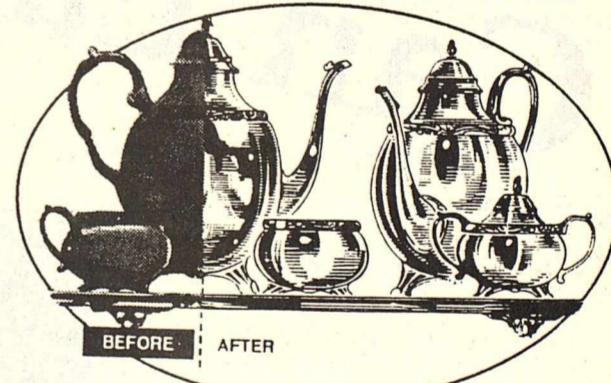

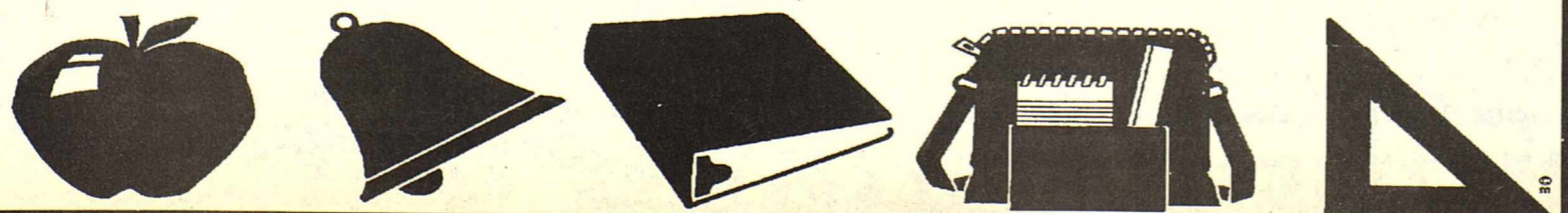

Letter To Households (Single/Child)

National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program

Parent/Guardian:
The Sonora I.S.D. serves meals each day. Children may buy lunch for (K-5)-\$1.10; (6-12)-\$1.25; Adults-\$2.00 and breakfast for \$.60. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your child, your child can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart Below, your child can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILD, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICA-

TION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult

household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your child should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Charles Russell, 807 S. Concho, Sonora, Texas 76950, Phone 915/387-2220.

Reporting Changes: If your child gets free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income

increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your child gets meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your child should get free or reduced price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed, or get food stamps or AFDC for your child, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated

against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

We will let you know when your application is approved or denied.

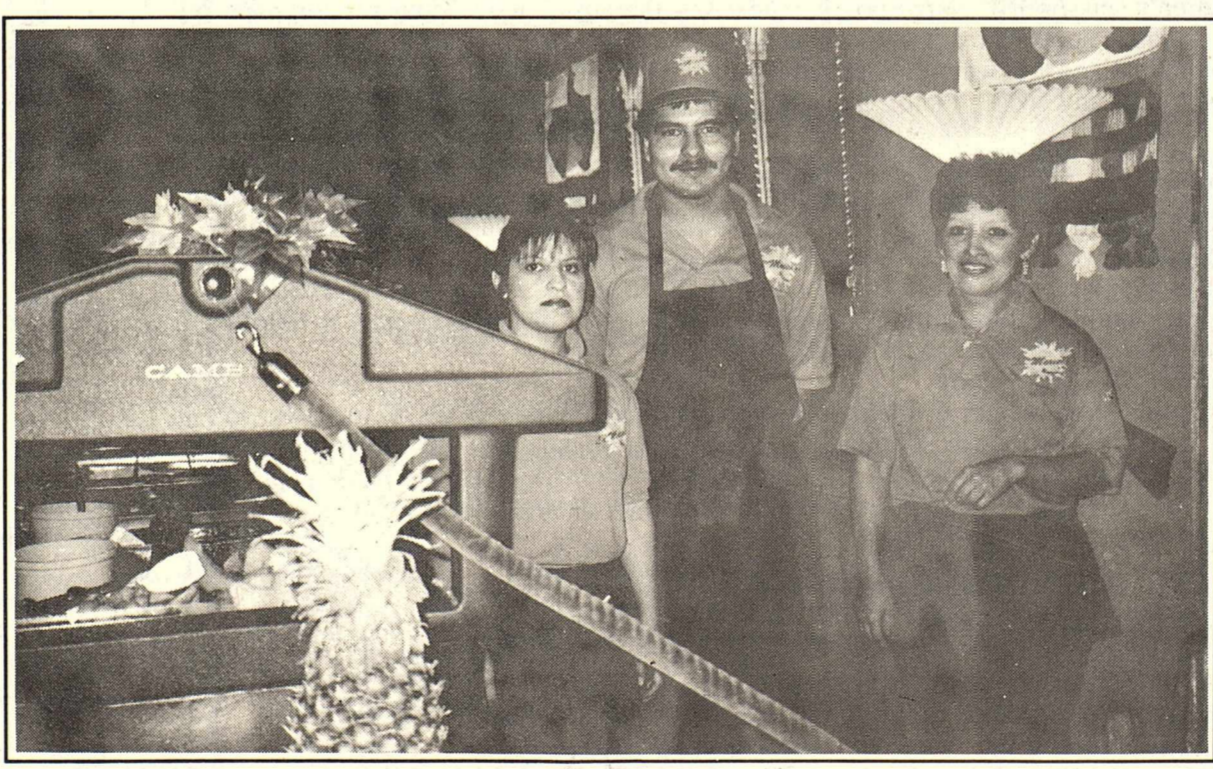

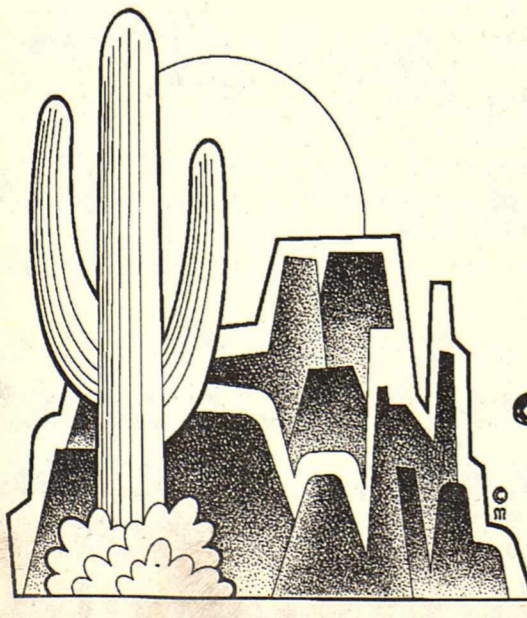

Help For The First Day Of School

A child's first day of school can be an "A+" if parents do a little homework of their own.

"A parent's attitude about school plays a big part in how the child accepts this new responsibility," said Dr. Lou Ann Mock, a child psychologist at Baylor college of Medicine in Houston. "Put aside any anxieties you may have about your own school experience."

Mock encourages parents to build excitement about the first day by emphasizing that school is the beginning of a wonderful adventure.

"If your child has been in day care, make clear that this change is a real accomplishment and that now they are grown up enough to go to 'real' school," she said.

However, children may have concerns about this new experience.

Rather than make assumptions, Mock says, ask if the child has any questions about going to school. "The concerns may be as simple as wondering where the bathroom is or what will happen if they get sick at school," she said.

Parents often make the mistake of trying to fit too many activities in at the end of

the summer. It is better to slow down a child's schedule as the start of school approaches.

Mock suggests the following techniques to prepare a child for the big day.

- Visit the school during the summer.

- Begin the appropriate bedtime and wake-up schedule a week or two in advance.

- Figure out the best morning routine.

- Let your child pick out first-day clothes and lay them out in advance.

- Get up earlier on the first day, so the morning will not be rushed.

"If possible, arrange to go to work a little later that day," Mock said. "This will put less pressure on you."

She encourages parents to make the first-day separation go as quickly as possible. Parents can always call the school later to make sure all is well.

At the end of the day, Mock recommends a family celebration with the child picking a favorite meal or restaurant.

"Be encouraging and supportive as your child takes this important step into the world," she said.

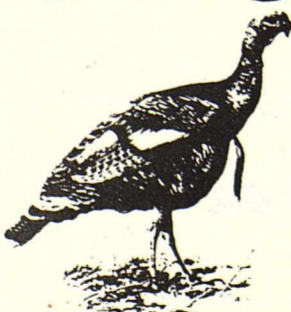

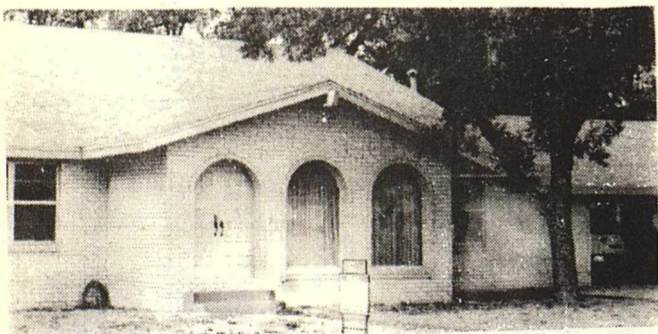
