BRONCOS CRUSH CRANE, 31-0

Alpine Bucks Next for Playoff-Bound Broncos

The Sonora Broncos traveled to Crane Friday night knowing they did not have to win to secure bi-district playoff spot, but still eager to finish with a strong winning record and gather momentum for their first playoff game against high-scoring Alpine Bucks. All goals were

they were stopped on offense, stopped themselves; the Crane defense appeared overmatched all night long. The Bronco defense was no less impressive. Crane crossed midfield only twice during the game, and only one of those was a legitimate offensive effort; the other was the result of a Bronco turnover. Crane was unable to mount a sustained drive during the course of the game, and even when faced with Bronco 2nd and

3rd teamers, the Crane offense could not move the ball consistently or well. The game started on a positive note for the Golden Cranes. Despite fine running from Jason Morley and Gilbert Vara, the Broncos were stopped on their first drive of the night and were forced to punt. The Bronco drive as stated previously, really wasn't stopped by Crane; the ball, made slippery by the rain, made exchanges in both teams' backfields difficult all night, and a fumble on 3rd & 3 forced the Bronco punt. A fine punt from Bronco punter Louis Massey forced the Cranes to begin from their own 25, and the Bronco defense gave the Cranes an example of what it would

On 1st & 10 for Crane, Shane Deel and Cody Gann stuffed a middle dive for a negligible gain; on 2nd & 10, pressure from end Jesse Capuchina forced an early pass attempt, which was defended well by Louis Massey. 3rd & 10 brought about another incomplete pass, and the Crane punt was returned to the 50 yard line by Justin House.

The Crane defense stiffened here, forcing the Broncos into a three-and-out offensive series, but the first break of the night in what had been to this point an evenly matched ball game would fall to the Broncos during Crane's next possession. Shane Deel and Raymond Hubble controlled the Crane ground attack, and after a pass completion for a 1st down (tackle made by Hale), Cody Gann recovered a Crane fumble at the Crane 44, giving the Broncos excellent field position.

On 1st & 10, the Broncos went for it all, and a Burnham to Massey touchdown pass was called back by a holding penalty on the Broncos. Morley and Vara carried on the following 1st & 20 and 2nd & 10 plays, but on 3rd & 13 Burnham was sacked while attempting to pass, forcing the Broncos to punt again. Massey, facing a tremendous rush, punted the ball well, and Crane was again stuck inside its own twenty yard line, and forced to begin this drive from their own 15.

Levi Pool, Trini Banda, and Jason Morley played very well during the Golden Cranes' offensive possession, and stifling defense let the Cranes gain not a single yard. Crane punted from its own

goal line on 4th & 10, and Justin House fair caught the ball at the Crane 41 yard line. The Broncos at this point went back to the offense that had worked for them all year. Josh Burnham turned and handed the ball to Morley and Vara and let the two big backs pound on the Crane defense and carry the ball down the field. Vara gained 8 yards on a middle dive to begin the drive, followed by two strong runs from Morley behind excellent line blocking. Morley's second run took the Broncos to the Crane 27 yard line, and on 1st & 10 he again swept around right end down to the Crane 9, setting up a 1st & goal for the Broncos as the 1st quarter came to an end in a scoreless tie.


After a good defensive play in the end zone kept Davis Hale from making a touchdown reception, Vara took the ball to the Crane 4 on 2nd & goal, only to have an illegal procedure call bring the ball back out to the 9 for the Broncos' 3rd & goal play. On 3rd & goal the Bronco offense ran a bootleg left and Burnham flipped the ball to Morley at about the 5 yard line, and Morley crashed through several Crane defenders into the end zone for the Broncos' first score of the night. Banda's PAT was good, and the Broncos led 7-0 with 10:59 left in the 2nd quarter.

Crane attempted to mount a sustained drive on its next possession, but again the stingy Bronco defense would yield only one 1st down before forcing the Cranes to punt from their own 35. During this defensive series, Gabriel Perez, Adrian Mata, Josh Burnham, Trini Banda, Shane Deel, and Raymond Hubble all played well, making tough hits and limiting the Crane offense to short gains and incomplete passes. The slippery ball was mishandled by the Broncos, but Louis Massey was in the area and alertly recovered the ball for the Broncos at the Sonora 37.

The Bronco offense took the field, and on 1st & 10 at the Sonora 37, Burnham dropped back and hit Davis Hale streaking through the middle of the Crane secondary. Hale outran the Crane defensive backs into the end zone, and Sonora took a 13-0 lead with 8:04 remaining in the 2nd quarter.

Crane's next offensive possession was cut short by an interception by Josh Burnham at the Crane 43 yard line, and on 1st & 10 for Sonora from that same spot Gilbert Vara took the hand off and sprinted off tackle left down to the Crane 14. On 1st & 10 from the 14 a miscue in the backfield forced Burnham to cover another fumble, and the offense could not get back on track, eventually turning over the ball on downs at the Crane 7. Crane's offense was again frustrated by excellent play from Bronco defenders Pool, Gann, and Banda, and the Crane punt on 4th & 5 was returned by Justin House all the way to the Crane 21. Burnham was sacked on 1st & 10, and on 2nd & 14 Justin House could not break outside on a Wingback counter. On 3rd &15, Burnham again dropped back and this time found Jason Morley racing through the Crane secondary and a perfect pass from Burnham put the Broncos ahead 19-0 with 1:23 remaining in the 2nd quarter, and that is how the half would come to an end.

The second half started rather sloppily but featured (eventually) continued dominance by the Bronco offensive and defensive teams. Andy Mirike recovered a Crane fumble on the second half kickoff, but the Broncos returned the favor on their first possession of the 2nd half, handing the ball back to Crane 32. The Crane offense made positive yardage on first and second downs, but on third down great pass defense from Gabriel Perez thwarted the Crane attack and forced them into a punting situation. Sonora took possession at their own 33.

The Bronco offense looked as if it was a bit readier for action during this series; Vara began the drive with a sweep right for 4 yards, and on 2nd & 6 Morley broke through the Crane line off tackle left, racing 65 yards to the Crane 9 and giving the Broncos a 1st & goal situation. On 1st & goal Vara gained 5 yards to the 4, and on 2nd down the Broncos brought in their "Beef" line up; Trini Banda took over for Vara at tailback, and from the power "I" formation powered into the end zone to give the Broncos a comfortable 25-0 lead with 7:25 remaining in the 3rd quarter. Shane Deel's stint at tailback during the two-point

conversion try fell just short. Crane, now needing desperately to get on the scoreboard, started its next possession at their own 30. and attempted to get the air attack going against the tough Bronco defense. On 1st & 10, the Crane quarterback attempted a pass to his receiver in the right flat, but Davis Hale had excellent position on the receiver and intercepted for the broncos at the Crane 49. The Bronco coaching staff at this point began to insert reserves into the ball game, and during the next offensive series Adrian Mata and Mike House carried the ball well, but were unable to move the ball well enough to garner consecutive first downs, forcing the Broncos to turn over the ball on owns to Crane at the Crane 32.

On 1st & 10 from the 32, Crane completed a pass to the Sonora 23, where the receiver was tracked down by Raymond Rainer, but the Crane offense was after that play unable to generate any offense against the Bronco reserves. Peter Noriega, and Justin House, who knocked away a 4th & 9 pass attempt in the end zone, played particularly well in stopping this Crane scoring attempt.

The Sonora offensive reserves took the field at the Sonora 21 and mounted a very impressive scoring drive if their own as the third quarter came to an end. Adrian Mata and Mike House ran hard to lead the Broncos down the field to the Crane 17, and here the Broncos ran into a tougher Crane defense. On 4th & 8, Burnham, still at quarterback, took the ball on an option right, and as he was tackled flipped an accurate pitch to Justin House, playing tailback, who got the first down thanks to great individual effort. On 1st & goal, Gabriel Perez's dive was stopped short of the end zone, and on 2nd & goal Burnham's pass into the end zone was completed for the final Bronco score of the night, and the Broncos went ahead 31-0 with 10:10 remaining in the 4th quarter.

Bronco reserves played the remainder of the 4th quarter, but there was little discernible by John Tedford letdown in the team's intensity or level of play. The Crane offense was still unable to move the ball against the Bronco defense thanks to fine efforts from Mike House, Capuchina, Mirike, and Joel Salazar. The Bronco offense, led by Mike House and Adrian Mata, continued to frustrate the Crane defense by holding onto the ball and depleting the clock every time they were given an opportunity to do so.

The Broncos looked very impressive in their 31-0 shutout victory over Crane. They end their season at 7-3, 4-1 in district play, and enter the state playoffs next Friday night against a very high-scoring Alpine Buck team. Alpine is 9-1 for the season, their only loss coming to Greenwood, a team that kept the Broncos from the District 6-3A crown. The game should be a most interesting match up between Alpine's high-octane offense and Sonora's tough, quick defense, and should continue the great rivalry these two teams have had in the past. The game will be played Friday night at 7:30 in Monahans, and we encourage all Bronco fans to make the trip and support these Broncos on their march through the playoffs. Good luck, Broncos; although if the team plays with the same intensity it did against Crane, luck really won't be a factor.







SONORA RECYCLES DAY SET

Recognizing that November 15 has been declared "Texas Recycles Day" by Gov. Ann Richards, the City of Sonora had pledged to do its part by continuing to expand its recycling efforts.

The pledge is a part of a "Texas-Sized Recycling Challenge" issued September 1 by the Clean Texas 2000 program of the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission (TNRCC) and a steering committee of 70 representatives from the public and private sector.

"Throughout the last several years, we have tried to stress the need for recycling here in Sonora," noted Mayor Lemuel Lopez. "Reducing the amount of waste going into the landfill is absolutely essential if we are to continue to successfully manage our own city's solid waste needs."

It is estimated that up to 80 percent of the 20 million tons of solid waste thrown into Texas landfills every year is potentially recyclable. The goal of Texas Recycles Day is to focus attention on the importance of keeping those recyclables out of the landfills and to showcase other recycling benefits and success stories.

"Waste disposal costs are rising, yet we are seeing more and more private companies saving substantial dollars by implementing aggressive recycling programs," says TNRCC Chairman John Hall. "Recycling is truly one area where, in many cases, good economics and good environmental policy are moving in the same direction.


In addition to saving landfill space and disposal costs, recycling creates jobs and saves valuable resources that can be used to make new products. Recycling is also recognized as the first and easiest way for Texans to start taking care of the environment.

While the TNRCC is sponsoring several public outreach events across the state on Texas Recycles Day, Sonora will do its part by distributing recycling education materials, proclaiming November 15 as "Sonora Recycles Day," and by inaugurating the city's new brush chipper/shredder at the recycling center. The proclamation will be read at the regular city council meeting on that date, and everyone will be invited to meet at the Recycling Center after the meeting to view the new chipper/shredder in action.

The chipper/shredder was purchased cooperatively by the city of Sonora and Sutton County, and will be used at the landfill to reduce the volume of tree branches and similar material into mulch material. The mulch will be used by the city and county in parks and public areas, and will also be made available to citizens at no cost.

IV BRONCOS FALL TO CRANE

In a bruising defensive battle, the Sonora JV Broncos slugged it out with the Crane JV like two heavyweights in a 5'x 5' ring. In the end, the Broncos dropped the ball too many times to stay with the high-powered Cranes, and were defeated 9-6 last Thursday night at Bronco Stadium.

One disastrous minute sealed the Broncos fate. With 4:50 minutes left to play in the first half, Sonora having clawed to maintain a scoreless tie, the Broncos were in punt formation from their own 26. The center snap sailed over Kris Wood's head, and just as he picked it up he was swarmed in the end zone for a safety by what looked like the whole sophomore class of Crane High School.

Wood's free kick was returned to the Sonora 36. One play later, on 2nd and 6, blitzing linebacker Anthony Gibson buried the Crane quarterback one millisecond after he had slipped the ball to the fullback, who burst over right tackle for 32 unimpeded yards and the touchdown. The extra point kick made it 9-0. With 3:32 left in the half, Crane had all the points they would get, or need.

At the start of the second half, Chad Gibson returned the kick-off 32 yards to the Sonora 47. Illegal motion cost Sonora 5 to the 42. Quarterback Gibson scrambled into and out of the grasp of the whole Crane team on his way to an 11 yard pickup. Then fullback Gibson plowed up the middle to just short of the first down. But it was all for nought as a high pitch on an intended sweep bounced off Stephen Gandar's helmet and was recovered by Crane at the Sonora 45.

The Broncos defense gave up one first down, but stiffened as Crane reached the 30. There Sonora held Crane to 4th down, when Scott Perez pounced on the quarterback's fumble at the 33 yard line.

From there the Broncos put together their best offensive drive of the night, all of it on foot mostly behind the right side of the Sonora line, Scott Perez, Justin Eaton and Curt Dempsey, the Gibsons and Gandar chewed up the ground in 3 to 5 yard gulps. An inside reverse to Walker Wallace added seven yards, to the Crane 17. Four plays later, from the 8, Chad Gibson kept the ball along the right side, saw an opening just outside the end and ducked in for the score. The conversion attempt, a hand-off to Gandar up the middle, was turned back. With 7:24 remaining in the game, the score was 9-6.

Sonora got another chance three plays later when Shiloh Sykes recovered a Crane fumble at the Cranes' 47. A holding call stymied the Broncos, though, and they were forced to punt.

Kris Wood's punt was received at the Crane 10, and Anthony Gibson made a jolting tackle back at the 8 yard line. The Broncos held Crane to 4th and three, and hope was high with Crane in punt formation from their own 15. But hopes were dashed as the center snap was taken by an upback, who ground over right tackle to the 21. From there it was just a matter of running out the clock.

Defensively for the Broncos, Sykes, Anthony Gibson, Thomas Hunt, Michael McReynolds, Jason Jacoby, Scott Perez, and Curt Dempsey were in on numerous tackles. Hunt also had a nifty punt return in first quarter, swinging left behind a picket line for 22 yards.

Chad Gibson led all Sonora rushers with 62 yards on 11 carries. Stephen Gandar chipped in 24 yards on 8 carries, Anthony Gibson rushed 5 times for 19 yards and Walker Wallace picked up 25






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Valliant Effort
