

## AKINS ADVANCES TO ALL-STATE CHOIR



# Ask The Historical Society



T.J. Savell and Alma Miers were married on March 17th, 1897 in Sonora, Texas

Q. Several of us went to the movies and saw Little Women. What can you tell us about the author and did she write any other books?

A. Louisa May Alcott was born in Germantown, now a part of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in 1832. Her father, Bronson Alcott conducted a school there. The family soon moved to Concord, Massachusetts.

Louisa May helped support the family by working as a house keeper, seamstress, and teacher before her writing brought in enough to enable the Alcotts to live comfortably. She wanted to be an actress at one time and wrote several melodramas that were never produced. She did much better with short stories and poems, and sold quite a few to Atlantic

Louisa May Alcott's first

book was Flower Fables (1854), a collection of fairy tales written when she was 16 but not published until she was

She worked as an untrained nurse in a Washington, D.C. hospital for Union soldiers of the Civil War and wrote letters for her patients. These were gathered in Hospital Sketches (1863), a book that made her nationally known but brought her little money as she had sold all rights for \$200. In 1864 she wrote Moods and earned enough money to enable her to travel to Europe for her health. In 1870-71 she again went to Europe.

Back in Boston, she became an ardent crusader for temperance, woman suffrage, and other reforms. She died in





## SUTTON COUNTY TAX OFFICE TO BE CLOSED

The Sutton County Tax Office will be closed January 16, 17, and 18, as steps are taken to improve the way business is done. The employees will be trained on the new Registration and Title

This automated system is a project of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT). Its development began in 1987 to replace a manual system that was becoming obsolete because of the state's growing vehicle population.

As statutory agents of TxDOT, this tax office processes registration and title transactions in addition to collecting the appropriate fees. We will be using RTS to continue that work. The system brings enhancements in the level of efficiency and customer service. Registrations will be updated in the system within 48 hours, instead of the usual six to eight weeks. This will be of considerable benefit to all law enforcement agencies and the general public. Sutton County residents will get their vehicle titles within two weeks, not ten weeks.



## THE LONELY PRIEST'S BIBLE

A lonely priest, Martin Luther, confused by what the head of the church and tradition said and what the Bible said, began to dig deeper into his Bible. His search led to the conclusion that whatever he believed must be based upon the Bible alone. Later when asked by the official church to recant, his strong convictions came out. He said, "Unless I am convinced by Scripture I can not, I will not recant, so help me God"! Not being so diplomatic he went on to say, "A layman armed with Scripture is more powerful than the head of the church and all his councils" which ended up in his excommunication.

He lost his church membership but not his convictions about God's Word. God began to use him to form a church based on the Bible alone so the church was truly God's church rather than one based upon man's reasoning. Since the Bible says, "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God", 2 Timothy 3:16 and "Thy Word is true", John 17:17 and "The Scripture cannot be broken" he went on to define the teachings of the Bible precisely so no one could dilute them. He founded the church that believes in verbal inspiration, (that God the Holy Spirit gave to His chosen writers the thoughts that they expressed and the words that they wrote, 2 Peter 1:21. Therefore he concluded "the Bible is God's own word and truth, without error." He further believed that the entire Bible, Old and New Testament, was God's word because in Ephesians 2:20 it stated that the Bible was built on the "foundations of the apostles (New Testament writers) and the prophets (Old Testament writers). Ephesians went on to say, "with Jesus Christ Himself being the chief cornerstone". Luther concluded the Bible was verbally inspired in both the Old and New Testaments whose main purpose was to bring people to saving faith in Jesus Christ.

These are the teachings of Hope Lutheran Church which is part of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod (LCMS). These teachings were challenged by a group of liberal professors at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis in the 70's who began to teach the "higher critical method" of interpreting the Bible. This new teaching from Germany was that science, history, sociology and other forms of knowledge that contained error should be used to help interpret the errorless Bible. This led LCMS members and pastors to protest the new teaching to where the errant professors walked out of the seminary and conservative leaders locked the doors. Thus, the lonely priest's teachings based upon the Bible alone were preserved.

In the years to come, especially in the 90's, some vocal and liberal elements of society have tried to kill all Bible based churches. They accepted and promoted abortion, homosexuality, a Christless Christmas, no prayer or religion in schools or government and attacked family values. However, throughout this slaughter of Christian values the LCMS is still a slave to the Bible and a church based on Scripture alone.



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


Rachel is living in quarters for nurses and medical students. She has a small room, about 8'x10', but she does have her own bathroom. She has a refrigerator and a hot plate. There are no apartments available. They were amazed at the beautiful, colorful architecture from the pre-Communist days and ancient times. Buildings built by the Communists are plain, utilitarian, and ugly. The old places are beautiful, but many have been allowed to deteriorate; however, there is a new interest in restoration. The streets are paved with cobble stones and brick with sand poured in the cracks. The communities are all built around a town square, and Christmas trees and decorations were everywhere. There were arts and crafts fairs and wonderful music. They saw an opera, Don Giovanni, in Prague in the very theater where Mozart had first staged it. They loved the beautiful cut glass and porcelain made by local craftsmen. The people were very attractive, quite handsome and healthy; they walk everywhere or use public transportation. Gasoline is over \$2.00 a gallon. Very few people in the small towns speak English, but they want to learn. They were dependent upon Rachel's language skills. It is a very difficult language, but everyone felt that she was doing exceptionally well. She is studying the Czech language and is teaching English. They toured most of the country with jaunts into Austria to see the "Sound of Music" scenery and hear the real story of the Von Trapp family. They toured some of the old castles with costumed greeters. McDonald's hamburgers have made it to Prague and Coca-Cola is everywhere, but expensive. Food is very plain, lots of pork and boiled vegetables. Goulash is popular.


The economy is very depressed. Doctors, under the medical system that is still socialized, make about \$200 a month. Cost of living is low: a fine meal with everything in a nice restaurant is only \$20+ for 6 people. Their attempted trip to Germany was blocked by snow. The highways were snow-plowed up to the German border, but the Germans had not cleared their roads; so, they had to turn back.

Rachel's pastor is a third generation Baptist minister. He and his father and his grandfather have served the church for a lot of years in the pulpit, and some time in prison. Under the Communist regime, he had phone calls saying, "We had someone in your church, and we know what you are saying." He always invited them back, and said, "If you come again, you will hear more". He was told that he could say what he wanted in his pulpit, but to keep his mouth shut outside the church. He and his wife, four grown children, and his mother live in a tiny two and a half bedroom apartment, but are quite happy. Church people in the Czech Republic do not consider beer drinking to be of any consequence. Every little community has its own brewery, and beer is cheap and plentiful. Smoking, however, is considered a sin. Smoking is popular all over Europe, but for "Church people", it is a "no-no".

When we picked them up at the airport Friday evening, Jim, Betty, and John had been up 24+ hours. They were tired and glad to be home. It was a wonderful trip, and the best part is that they were able to see Rachel, happy and doing good work.
