Sonora Municipal Swimming Pool/Recreational Area

After hearing many people express their concern about the cost and need for the new swimming pool, I decided to check into it and pass my findings along to our readers.

The first thing I feel should be expressed is that this is not just a swimming pool. The city council has done an excellent job of designing a recreational area that can be utilized by people of all ages. Included in this recreational area will be a basketball court, a
sand volleyball court, tether ball covered picnic area with grills, a sand volleyball court, tether ball, covered picnic area with grills, a
large swimming pool, a wader pool for small children, a large swimming pool, a wader pool for small children, a
bathhouse with changing rooms, a concession area, and a bathhouse with ch
waterpark-type slide.

This project began in January of 1993 when an application was submitted to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for a matching grant. The city received the grant for the amount a
$\$ 269,000$. (Half of the $\$ 538,000$ proposed for the swimmin pool/recreational area.) Since the city received this grant, they are obligated to spend at least $\$ 538,000$ on this project. The city's half of the money can come from the budget, grants, donations, inkind labor, etc., as long as it totals at least $\$ 269,000$. (The city received $\$ 7,500$ from Meridian Oil and recently received a
$\$ 1,000$ donation from an individual to go towards the cost of the $\$ 1,000$ donation from an individual to go towards the cost of the
swimming pool. The city welcomes and appreciates all donations, swimming pool. The city wel
no matter what the amount.)

The old swimming pool was constructed in 1964 and required major repairs annually due to deterioration and leakage, Maintenance costs for the pool escalated to the point that it was no facility. (An average of $\$ 3,600$ in maintenance costs and 360 man hours were spent yearly for the past five years before the pool could be opened.) The pool also did not meet the current minimum standards for swimming pool design, and, as a result,
safety and liability became a major concern for the city. The pool

Linda must be the most caring hygienist in the country. Linda, has been cleaning teeth in Sonora for 16 years and she does a wonderful job. We are really happy to have Linda Bowers working part-time. Linda is very personable and gets along great with our patients. We are also blessed to have Herlinda Duenes cleaning our office each evening. My wife, Mary, gets little notice, but she's the one who pays the bills and gets many of our supplies. Without her, our office would not function nearly as well. There is something unusual about our staff. Each of our full-time staff has two daughters. I guess you could say that is a little hen pecked.

## Continuing Education

We believe that it is essential that we attend continuing education courses throughout each year in order to keep up with the latest developments in dentistry. Generally, we attend these courses at the dental school in San Antonio and we are only out of the office on Friday and Saturday.

Our most recent courses have been on Emergency Training and CPR, Cosmetic Dentistry, Dental Implants, and Temporomandibular Disorders.
Something that we are doing at a younger age are hard acrylic night guards on patients that have more than average wear on the biting surfaces of their teeth. We hope to prevent excessive wear of the teeth and maintain a more youthful and healthy appearance. Excessive wear can cause severe tooth pain and possible abscess and also can cause TMD problems.

- Also, since many of our patients have had some recession, either from previous gingival surgery or from other causes, we are recommending the construction of an appliance that can hold fluoride and other medications in close contact with the root surfaces to reduce sensitivity, to prevent decay, and to help combat the bacteria that cause gum disease.


## Orthodontics

L.M. Pollard, D.D.S., is at our office to do orthodontics (braces) every other Thursday. Dr. Pollard does both adult and children patients. He also does interceptive orthodontic treatment on those children that would benefit from this type of treatment.

## Sterilization

All of us want to be sure that we are protected when we go to the dentist. We want our patients to know that we follow every guideline to make sure that your visit is safe. All our drills and instruments are sterilized after each use. We also have our autoclaves monitored each week to be sure that they are working properly. We also use many disposal items. These items are used on only one patient and then discarded. We want you to feel completely safe at our office.

## TMD

TMD (temporomandibular disorder) symptoms can include teeth, neck, ear, head and back pain. It can also include ringing in the ears, sinus problems, clicking and popping of the joint, grinding of teeth, locking of the jaw, and pain of opening the jaw or pain while eating. Many of us now believe that TMD is actually many different, but related disorders. Causes of TMD include joint disease like arthritis and trauma such as a severe blow to the head, malocclusion, stress, and grinding and clenching the teeth. It is true that most patients that suffer TMD are women. This may be because women have ligaments that are looser than men's and because women's joints are aligned slightly different than men's. I believe that the treatment for TMD should be conservative and reversible. I usually recommend a bite plane and the use of over the counter anti-inflammatory medications and the use of hot and /or cold packs, and a soft diet. Usually, this conservative treatment works for most patients.

## Advanced Technology

Advanced technology has come up with two new types of crowns (caps). One is the VITA In-Ceram all-ceramic crown. This new crown is the state-of-the-art, with high strength biocompatibility, and excellent esthetics. It is especially useful for anterior crowns. This system is also used for high strength and accurate ceramic inlays and onlays. The other new system is the CAPTEC crown. This crown uses 22 carat gold and porcelain to produce exact fitting and very esthetics crowns. We are very happy to provide these services for
