

### Page 2 SONORA WOMAN'S CLUB HISTORY WRITTEN FOR GRANT PROPOSAL

The new Sutton County Public Library is on its way to becoming a reality. Funds for the construction cost of the family will be taken care of in such a great way. I want to thank Committee, a representative cross-section of concerned Sutton came by to help Lori at the store or at home while I have been County citizens. To allow donations to be tax deductible, the contributions were solicited in the name of the Sonora to a familiar voice. Woman's Club Library Association, the part of Sonora Woman's Club which is a 501(c)(3) organization. This has led to some natural confusion as to what role Sonora Woman's Club plays in the Sutton County Public Library.

The following brief history of Sonora Woman's Club and its commitment to library service in Sutton County is offered here as an explanation. This history is the opening statement of the grant proposal submitted to The Meadows Foundation of Dallas by the Sutton County Public Library Committee. It was written by two members of the Library Committee who are also associate members of Sonora Woman's Club. The proposal resulted in a grant of \$64,000 from The Meadows Foundation, which supplied the remaining funds necessary to allow the project to be advertised for bids.

Sonora Woman's Club was organized in 1916 with 32 members. At that time, the town of Sonora was just 27 years old. It was, and still is, the only town in the 1,454 square miles of the pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church of San Angelo, officiating. county of Sutton. The area was isolated and the culture still based on the newly departed frontier. The terrain was rocky and arid; the ranches widely separated. It took all of the energies of both men a homemaker. and women to wrest a living from this harsh, demanding land.

Although their time was consumed with never ending tasks, some of the women, as they worked, constantly cast about in their minds for ways to enrich their lives and provide more opportunities for their children. It appeared to them that if they banded together in some sort of an organization, they could make a difference. Thus Sonora Woman's Club was formed, and make a difference they did!

In spite of the difficulties of finding time and of traveling the distances necessary to meet and plan, Sonora Woman's Club managed to raise money to provide the first playground equipment, the first piano and the first drinking fountain in the Sonora school. Projects were conceived, funded, and completed to beautify Sonora in many ways and areas. The first female school board member was sponsored by Woman's Club, as was a mass meeting on May 17, 1918 to instruct women on how to vote. Educational programs were held on a regular basis.

Over the years, since Woman's Club had never had a home of its own, the members had met in a variety of places, none of which really suited their needs. In addition to their desire for their own place, members of Woman's Club had long cherished the hope of opening a library. The idea was always in the background, biding its time.

In 1920, Woman's Club was meeting in the hall of The Woodmen of the World. The group voted to go ahead and start a library even though they were in rented space. Books were painstakingly collected by house to house canvass. Shelves were built. The first year, 275 books were read. The member/volunteers carried their own firewood to the hall in winter and sweltered in summer. But they saw their dream grow and prosper and become part of the fabric of the community.

In 1926 Woman's Club decided to make the all out effort to build its own meeting place, which would also house the library. An estimated \$2500 was needed. Many bake sales and creative fund raisers later, the structure became a reality. It was located on the corner of Water Avenue and Oak Street where the Sutton County Annex now stands. continued on page 6



Things are going well, but his arm will be in a sling for 4 to 6 weeks. This type of surgery is very successful, but it involves a lot of pain.

The stated goal of Woman's Club has always been to promote culture and to furnish a medium through which its members could work for the general good of the community. In 1926, Woman's Club voted to make the library its sole project. As the library expanded in its new quarters, Woman's Club devoted all of its energies and finances to maintenance, purchasing books, and staffing the facility with volunteer/member help. Sonora Woman's Club never wavered in its unconditional support for what it believed was a vital component of the cultural enrichment of Sonora.

In 1975 it became apparent that the library had outgrown the club house. With no large block of funds available to build an

addition, Woman's Club opted to sell the club house and move the library to the 2nd floor of City Hall.

As the oil and gas boom of the late 1970's doubled the population of Sonora, the location of the library became less satisfactory each day. Throughout this time of upheaval, Woman's Club continued to wholly support and maintain the library operation.

Finally in 1982, the Aldwell family generously donated an older home to the club. The library, relocated once more, settled into this convenient, downtown site which seemed to be a permanent answer to its physical needs.

It was at this time that the Sonora Woman's Club made the decision to give the library to Sutton County for the following reasons.

1. The growth in population increased the use of the library to the point that services required could not be entirely provided by the volunteer staff.

2. As a privately owned institution, the Sonora Woman's Club Library was not eligible to participate in library services provided by state and regional library systems and associations such as interlibrary loans of books, books on tape and audio visual material. Neither could it benefit from

### SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT/TRAINING PROGRAM






