SONORA WOMAN'S CLUB HISTORY WRITTEN FOR GRANT PROPOSAL The new Sutton County Public Library is on its way to
becoming a reality. Funds for the construction cost of the becoming a reality. Funds for the construction cost of the

Combers. At that time Club was organized in 1916 with 32 members. At that time, the town of Sonora was just 27 years old. county of Sutton. The area was isolated and the culture still based on the newly departed frontier. The terrain was rocky and arid; the ranches widely separated. It took all of the energies of both men and women to wrest a living from this harsh, demanding land. Although their time was consumed with never ending tasks, some of the women, as they worked, constantly cast about in their minds for ways to enrich their lives and provide more opportunities for their children. It appeared to them that if they
banded together in some sort of an organization, they could make difference. Thus Sonora Woman's Club was formed, and make a difference they did!
In spite of the difficulties of finding time and of traveling the distances necessary to meet and plan, Sonora Woman's Club managed to raise money to provide the first playground equipment, the first piano and the first drinking fountain in the
Sonora school. Projects were conceived, funded, and completed sonora school. Projects were conceived, funded, and completed to beautify Sonora in many ways and areas. The first female school
board member was sponsored by Woman's Club, as was a mass board member was sponsored by Woman's Club, as was a mass
meeting on May 17, 1918 to instruct women on how to vote. Educational programs were held on a regular basis.
Over the years, since Woman's Club had never had a home of which really suited their needs. In addition to their desire for their own place, members of Woman's Club had long cherished the hope of opening a library. The idea was always in the background, biding its time. Woodmen of Woman's Club was meeting in the hall of The Woodmen of the World. The group voted to go ahead and start a library even though they were in rented space. Books were
painstakingly collected by house to house canvass. Shelves were painstakingly collected by house to house canvass. Shelves were
built. The first year, 275 books were read. The membervolunteers built. The first year, 275 books were read. The member/volunteers
carried their own firewood to the hall in winter and sweltered in summer. But they saw their dream grow and prosper and become part $\overline{\text { of }}$ the fabric of the community.

McKavett at the time. The Comptroller's Archives Payment Records Birtrong was receiving his Bension payments from about 1890 to 1897 in Sutton County. These records are not complete and we were unable to tell when Mr. Birtrong died. It should be between 1886 and 1890.
