

Olie Smith won the Timed Event Championship of the World last weekend, March 11th and 12th in the Lazy E Arena in Guthrie, Oklahoma. A total of twenty competitors participated in this event.

CHAMPIONSHIP OF THE WORLD

Olie Smith's other achievements are National Finals Rodeo Steer Wrestling Finalist, 1985 and Calgary \$50,000 steer wrestling bonus winner, 1983. In 1994 he placed sixth in the Timed Event Championship. Olie's average time for this year was 347.4. Olie also recently played in the TNT movie "Good Ole Boys."

Ben Ingham, of Sonora, also participated. He placed 5th in the fastest round with a time of 57.3. Ben's achievements include PRCA Steer Roping Rookie of the Year in 1988.

Steve Duhon was scheduled to participate, but was injured prior to the event while practicing steer wrestling at Jimmy Powers arena. His substitute was Brad Gleason.

The Timed Event Championship of the World in rodeo circles has many synonyms. Some people call it the "Irion-Mann Contest" or the "Pro-Bowl of Rodeo." Whatever name you choose, the fact still remains that it is the only competition like it in the world.

Through the years, the Timed Event Championship has earned the reputation as the "most talked about" event in pro rodeo. The concept of the event is what makes it so popular with the fans and cowboys. The formula is simple: take Pro Rodeo's greatest timed event cowboys, then have those contestants compete in all five timed events through five grueling performances. Offer a purse of \$140,000, where a contestant could compete and walk away with the \$40,000 average pay-off, and the title of the "World's Greatest Timed Event Cowboy"; all of this makes for a winning combination.


Harry Frye

The first day the purse was divided between Fields and Garvin. The second day Fields won and the third day Etheridge and on the fourth day Garvin. The Association paid out over \$600 in prizes, mostly in small amounts to local people and all out of the gate receipts.



Sonora Student Meets Mother Nature

Johnny Terry, 21, of Sonora, met Mother Nature up close and personal on a recent educational field trip to the Texas Coast.

He was among 10 South Plains College wildlife management students who made the trek to The University of Texas Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas and other stops as part of course requirements.

"The most interesting part of the trip for me was a tour of the Welder Wildlife Refuge, a private refuge which encourages research and study. We got to do telemetry triangulation in attempting to locate bobcats," said Terry, an SPC biology major. He is also completing hours at Texas Tech University toward a bachelor's degree.

The bobcats were elusive, and the group only saw some in open fields during the day, which is a rare occurrence.

"We saw a lot of neat things on the coast I had never seen before, sea turtles, Atlantic bottle-nosed dolphins, and other animals such as a Gulf Coast ribbon snake, bullfrogs, Mediterranean gecko, lizards, alligators, more than 65 species of sea birds, armadillos, bobcats, raccoons, skunks, bats, javelinas, coyotes and deer," said Terry. They also saw two whooping cranes, among 140 left worldwide.

"This is a totally different type of habitat and wildlife species




