## Sonora Student Meets Mother Nature

Johnny Terry, 21, of Sonora, met Mother Nature up close and personal on a recent educational field trip to the Texas Coast.
He was among 10 South Plains College wildlife management Science Institute at Port Aransas and other stops as part of cours requirements.
"The most interesting part of the trip for me was a tour of the Welder Wildlife Refuge, a private refuge which encourages research and study. We got to do telemetry triangulation in attempting to locate bobcats," said Terry, an SPC biology major He is also completing hours at Texas Tech University toward a bachelor's degree.
The bobcats were elusive, and the group only saw some in, open fields during the day, which is a rare occuirence
"We saw a lot of neat things of the coast I had never seen before, sea turtles, Atlantic bottle-nosed dolphins, and other Mediterranean gecko, lizards, alligators, more than 65 species of sea birds, armadillos, bobcats, raccoons, skunks, bats, javelinas, coyotes and deer,"' said Terry. They also saw two whooping cranes, among 140 left worldwide.
"This is a totally different type of habitat and wildlife species from that of West Texas and the experience allowed our students to see a wide variety of birds, mammals and other animals," said David Etheredge, SPC assistant professor of biology. "It was a tru educational trip
