MEETING SET FOR ENROLLMENT INTO MULTI-AGE PROGRAM

A meeting will be held on Thursday, March 23rd at 7:00 p.m. in the Intermediate School Auditorium for those parents interested in enrolling their children in the Multi-Age program for the 1995-1996 school year. This is strictly a volunteer program offered for students in Kindergarten through 5th grade.

This will be the second year for the Multi-Age program in the Sonora Independent School District. After the first year the response from parents, teachers and administrators has been very good. "This program has brought enthusiasm back into teaching for many of the teachers," commented Charles Russell, Superintendent of Schools.

There have been several misconceptions about the Multi-Age program that have caused some confusion as to the validity of the program. Multi-Age is a system where students are able to progress in developmentally appropriate ways. They are taught based on their individual needs, not by their age or grade level.

Another misconception is that it is an accelerated program. In fact, the curriculum used in the multi-age classroom is the same that is used in the regular classroom. The only difference is the age of the students.

The Multi-Age program is designed for a student to stay in the same classroom with the same teacher for at least two years. This is necessary in order for the students to get the maximum benefit of the program.  Dage 2 ACT ACADEMY REEVALUATED

In 1993 a Depression-era elementary school in McKinney, Texas received a one-of-a-kind \$5.5 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education to turn the school into a state of the art, high technology center to prepare students to compete internationally. It was called the ACT (Academic Competitiveness through Technology Academy). Instead of being placed in grades, 250 children, ages 5 through 18, were grouped in clusters. Round or long tables replaced individual desks to foster working together. Dozens of computers lined each classroom; a satellite dish pulled in classes and programs from around the country. This was the year-round "school of the by Sutton County directors and friends of the TSGRA. future," where children could work at their own pace on what they wanted to learn.

In the beginning, news reports were glowing, calling the Academy a "world class model" of education. Expectations were high, students would be on par with European or Japanese students. Parents lined up to get their kids in the school. Students Bloodworth, Lee Bloodworth, Susan Bloodworth, Bob Brockman, were selected from across the district to "balance ethnic and Jimmy Cahill, Curry Campbell, Edward Earwood, Ben Epps, socioeconomic factors and abilities."

Each child had an individual learning plan developed with a teacher who focused on that student's goals and interests. The initial challenge was getting students to see this school was different. One teacher said, "The first two weeks they would ask,'What do you want us to do?' My response was always, 'What would you like to do?" No traditional grades were given; students were judged on presentations and a portfolio of work. They could read on bean bag chairs or on the floor or under a table.

Now less that two years later, accolades have turned to complaints, and the ACT Academy is in trouble. Some parents say the school borders on a "failed experiment." Others say the academy needs more time to overcome the challenges in reinventing education. Teachers have come and gone, as have one-fourth of the students, including two children of school board members. The director resigned. Students performed low on standardized tests. "We were supposed to compete with the Europeans and Japanese. We're doing worse than the state of Texas," complained one parent.

Dr. Paul Reista, a University of Texas education professor hired to monitor the academy, said he had initial fears that the project was trying to do too much in too little time. Teachers were asked not only to teach in new ways but also to design their own curriculums to fit the school. "It's a tremendous undertaking," he said. "The school is inventing itself as it goes along."

Editors Note from Texas Eagle Forum:

This is Outcome-Based Education (OBE) in full bloom. Schools in other parts of the country are also "reinventing" education, and the outcome is the same: disaster. An administrator from Bay City, Michigan reports, "We were an OBE school. We tried it for six years. We spent millions to bring it into the school. I don't know anyone in the district doing it at this point. OBE is a true swear word in our district." Why are bureaucrats and educrats "reinventing" schools when traditional education works? Ask your legislators to defund such educational boondoggles. Our kids and our teachers deserve better.

Q. Why did Sam Houston move the capitol of the Republic of Texas to Washington on the Brazos?

A. In 1842, President Sam Houston, feared there would be an attack on Austin so he moved the capitol to Houston, then to Washington on the Brazos. In late December, Houston decided the government archives should be moved. Congress refused consent and Bastrop and Travis counties were strongly against this move.

President Houston wanted the archives so he instructed Captain Thomas Smith and Asa Chandler to procure the people of Austin were asleep, soldiers of Bastrop and Travis counties were off on an expedition into Mexico.

according to the story, the men were discovered by Mrs. Angelina Eberly, a proprietress of the principal hotel in Austin. She hastened to a cannon, nearby on Congress Avenue, kept loaded as a protection against the Indians. She aimed the muzzle of the cannon toward the unwelcome visitors and touched off the charge. A large hole was torn in the side of the land office building and the citizens of Austin were rudely awakened.

The intruders continued with their work and left town with the archives. Meanwhile the awakened citizens dispatched runners to the country in every direction and by morning had assembled ninety mounted gunmen and

HOSPITAL BOARD MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Sutton County Hospital District submitted Board of Directors was held Monday, March 13, 1995 in the conference room of the hospital. Directors present were Dr. Alvis Johnson, Ben Solis, Lee Bloodworth, Lewis Allen, and Carol Parker. Also present were John Hempel, Administrator, Carolyn Lara, acting board secretary, employees of Sutton County Hospital District, Dr. and Mrs. Charles Pajestka, and residents of the WTU determined that a \$14.6 million increase was fully justified. county.

Sutton County Appraisal District showed that 97% of the 1994 taxes have been collected as of February 28, 1995. There was discussion concerning the repair of the hospital's incinerator wall that is wearing thin due to extreme heat. Examination of purchasing a computer and software for the nursing home was tabled until a later date. The board agreed to establish monthly family nursing home meetings.

John Hempel reported that a three-member team from Texas Department of Health in San Angelo had returned for a follow-up inspection of the nursing home. The infection control problem was much improved and was changed from a Level A to a Level B. The deficiency on hand washing and use of gloves was cleared. The nursing home was cited for another Level A deficiency regarding physician history and physicals on some residents being delinquent and progress notes were not up to date. The team was also investigating two complaints, one was regarding acts of daily living and the other regarding treatment procedures, neither of which were substantiated. There was another challenge noted regarding a resident in isolation. The inspectors felt the resident should no longer be in isolation. The nursing home is continued on 90 day termination with remedies, all deficiencies must be cleared within approximately 43 days from the time of this will be until after the conclusion of either a settlement or hearings meeting.

Mr. Hempel updated the board on the hospital bad debts. He reported that the business office personnel had been calling people time, the Consumer Price Index has increased 34.2 percent, regarding their past due bills, between 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. However, this has not been very successful. Many of the people contacted promise to pay and have not done so. Pete Samaniego reported that instead of waiting until the bills charge off at 180 days, the office will start calling after the first collection letter is initiative, we have presented a proposal to maintain the overall mailed at 60 days. Mr. Hempel reported that the collection agency the hospital was using, PFS, is bankrupt and that he is checking into another agency. The board asked Mr. Hempel to present growth and prosperity in West Texas," Key added. contracts available from other collection agencies at the next board meeting, and the board will make a decision at that time on which agency to use. The board also asked the business office to continue calling each night.

The financial report for January 1995 was given by Mr. Hempel. The hospital is \$1,915 under budget and the nursing home is \$4,640 over budget. These figures are for the first month of the new fiscal year. In January, the hospital had a loss of \$56,815.36 and the nursing home had a loss of \$5,652.72.

Following visitor and board comments, the meeting was adjourned.

THE River NEWS WTU FILES RATE REVIEW

West Texas Utilities Company (WTU) will file a rate review with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, as previously announced by the company last August. A similar filing will also be made with several of the cities WTU serves.

After performing a study on the cost of providing service. If approved, such an increase would e spread over WTU's After acceptance of previous meeting minutes, a report from 52,000 square-mile customer service territory. The average bill for a typical residential customer could increase by \$7, based on the average usage of 1,000 kwh per month.

In a separate action, WTU announced a settlement offer to parties in the proceeding that could continue a base rate revenue reduction of \$5.9 million.

Under the settlement proposal, the bill for a typical residential customer could be \$1 to #2 less per month than their bill under the current permanent rates. The company established a period until April 17, 1995, to consider this settlement.

"As part of the proposal that would position WTU for the future, we are introducing new pricing structures to help us attract and retain business in West Texas," said Richard Key, area manager.


Under WTU's proposal, new pricing structures would result in some customers experiencing an overall rate decrease greater than the current interim reduction of 3.25 percent. At the same time, some customers would experience an overall rate decrease of less than 3.25 percent. But, with the exception of standby customers, no customer would see their overall rates increase above rates in effect prior to October 1st.

However, WTU said it won't know what the final outcome in Austin.

WTU's base rates have not increased since 1987. Since that while consumer goods such as automobiles have increased 62.6 percent and postage stamps have gone up 44.5 percent.

"WTU has a mutual interest with our cities in seeing West Texas grow and prosper Because of our continuing competitive base rate revenue at the reduced level of 3.25 percent,: said Key.

"We believe this proposal will ensure continuing economic

The newly released ICA video was shown entitled Our Story -Past, Present, and Future. It is what ICA has done and is doing for the rural communities of Texas.

A video on property rights was shown from the Farm Credit Bank. Everyone needs to be aware of the seriousness of the property rights issues. This video showed what happened to property owners who owned their own land.

Carter gave an update on the latest legislative issues; stating that a moratorium on naming any new species to the endangered list or wetlands had been passed. Also, legislation is being sought to keep Washington out of Texas business.

ICA is also working on getting the livestock user fee bill killed. Carter encouraged the members to write their congressmen on issues of concern. He said, "The letters really work."

ICA took a delegation of members from throughout the state to Washington, D.C. last month. They all felt that this visit was worthwhile and that their interest and concern in agriculture, our industry was sincere.
