
One Step Closer To All-State Choir

Doyle Ward Morton

Rev. Doyle Ward Morton, 84, esteemed minister for 58 years in the United Methodist Church, died Sunday, December 3, after a long illness.

The son of Nealy A. and Edna Morton, he was born in Roby, Texas, on August 4, 1911. He graduated from grade school in Dublin, Texas, and from high school in Stephenville, Texas. He attended John Tarleton Agricultural College. He was licensed to preach in 1931 and served the Roby (TX) Circuit in 1931 and 1932. He graduated from McMurry College in Abilene in 1937 and Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University (SMU) in Dallas in 1939.

He married Mary Archer in 1939, and they went to Scarritt College for one term. In 1939, they went to Brazil as missionaries. They served churches in Brazil for five years, where he was pastor and preached in Portuguese. Upon returning from Brazil, he received his Master's of Arts degree from Perkins School of Theology at SMU.

In 1945, he transferred to the Southwest Texas Conference and served as pastor of churches until his retirement in 1977. United Methodist churches served were: Sabinal, Fort Lavaca, Elgin, Eldorado, Bishop, Sonora, Beeville, St. Mark's in McAllen, and Faith Church in



Ask The Historical Society



Early day shopping in Sutton County. The stores were not fancy like we have today but they served their purpose.

Everyone is busy getting ready for the holidays and we aren't getting many questions right now. What better time to take a little look back to Decembers of yesteryear. This week we will focus on December of 1935.

> The Devil's River News, December 1935

Thirty-eight per cent of Sulton County citizens holding: poll tax receipts to vote, turned out to vote 126 for and 53 against the sale of hard liquor by package in Sutton County. Clerks who aided in conducting the election were, Mrs. P.J. Taylor, George D. Chalk, Mrs. H.V. Stokes, James C. Caldwell, Oscar Adams, and S: L. Shroyer.

On November 26th a daughter, Clarinda Marylin, weighing 7 pounds and 4 ounces was born to Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Valliant.

Second six weeks honor roll leaders were Wesley Sawyer with a 96 1/3 average and Jo Nell Miers with a 95 1/2 average. A few of the others on the grade honor rolls were: Louise Briscoe, Margaret Sandherr, Webb Elliott, Vicenta Sanchez, JoAnn Marion, Curt Schwiening, Kenneth Babcock, Bobbie Halbert, Wilma Hutcherson and Lunetta Marion.

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association met in San Antonio and elected Roy Hudspeth of Sutton County to the office of vice-president. At the meeting, B.M. Halbert, pastpresident, urged the continuation of the term chevon for goat meat.

At a Broncho football banquet decorated in a "Mexican" motif, the following were awarded letters and sweaters: Edward Archer, Eugene Adams, Francis Archer, W.B. Brantley, Louis Davis, Claude Thomas Driskell, Marion Elliott, Web Elliott, Lloyd McGhee, Cesario Martinez, Lazaro Martinez, L.M. Roueche, Robert Allen Simmons, Richard Vehle, Reginald Trainer, and Jim

At the Hotel McDonald you could get home cooked meals for 50 cents. Grace Draper's Beauty Shop was encouraging her patrons to make appointments for the holiday season. E.F. Vander Stucken Company, Inc. had Van Heusen shirts for \$1.95 and ties to match for 50 cents and \$1.00. You could phone A.&W. Drug Store at 255 for an electric heating pad selling for \$2.00 or a box of 25 White Owl Cigars for \$1.25. A one year subscription to the Devil's River News was \$2.00.

At the Self Serve Grocery you could get a 25 pound bag of pure cane sugar for \$1.25. Peaches in a can were 2 for 33 cents. A can of tomatoes was 7 cents or 12 cans for 75 cents. Five, one pound cans of pork and beans cost 24 cents and a can of Heinz Soup cost 11 cents. A twenty pound bag of pinto beans cost 78 cents and 10 pounds of potatoes cost 16 cents. A can of tuna fish cost 15 cents, a dozen eggs 30 cents and catsup in a 14 oz. bottle 11 cents. Round steak was 23 cents a pound, rib roast 10 cents a pound, picnic ham 23 cents a pound and boiled ham 40 cents a pound.

Well No. 1 George S. Allison located 330 feet from the southwest corner of Section 49, GWT&P Survey was abandoned at a depth of 4,504 feet. The hole was plugged.

Mrs. Ellen Green, one of Sutton County's oldest residents, observed her eightysecond birthday on Christmas Day 1935. She was born near Austin, Texas, on December 25, 1854. Mrs. Green came to Sonora by wagon from McKavett in 1901.

Christmas was made merry for twenty-one families by the Lions Club sponsorship of the distribution of "Christmas Cheer" baskets filled with candy, nuts, apples, oranges, some toys and clothes.

The City Variety Store had dolls, including "Shirley Temple," "Precious," and "Mickey" from 25 cents to

At the City Variety 5 cents \$4.95. Wind-up trains for \$1 and other trains from 15 cents to \$4.95. At the Corner Drug Store you could buy perfume to please the maiden or madam with Evening in Paris selling from \$1.10 upward.



COG To Award Solid Waste Grants

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission has announced that \$10.2 million has been directed to regional councils for grant programs for the fiscal year 1996 period.

Concho Valley Council of Governments has been allocated funds from this distribution. The funds to be

submitted by Kelly Carta, City available for grants in the thirteen county service area is \$90,109. These grants are available in Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, and Tom Green Counties.

Applications are now being taken. The due date is December 20, 1995. Eligible applicants are cities, counties, school districts, and special governmental subdivisions.

well as **Herb Jones** of Sonora participated in the activities.



Alcohol continues to be a serious contributor to traffic fatalities and accidents. In Texas, 37.2% of all traffic fatalities were alcohol related.

In the state of Texas alone in 1994, there were 1,803 drivers who died as a result of an accident. Tested for alcohol/drug analysis were 1,155 or 61.4%. Test results

were received on 1,033 (89.4%) of these drivers. The results indicated that 564 (54.6%) of the drivers had BAC (blood alcohol content) at or above .10, which is the legal intoxication limit. Of the drivers killed in fatal accidents, 56% of those tested had some alcohol/drugs in their system. The average BAC level for tests given by DPS personnel was

In 1994, more DWI related

accidents and fatalities occurred between 2:00 a.m. and 2:59 a.m. Why? In the big cities the bars generally close around 2:00 a.m. July recorded the largest number of fatal accidents involving DWI. There were 104 accidents with 117 fatalities. March recorded the most fatalities with 119. March 5 and October 9 were the deadliest with 5 fatalities each.

Based on accident reports for 1994: one person was killed every seven hours, 29 minutes. One person was injured every 15 minutes, 26 seconds. One reportable accident occurred every 15 minutes.

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


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
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Scout Report

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
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Biscuits' Crumbs

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On November 11, 1995, the West Texas Beefmaster Assn. had its Third Annual Performance Tested Bull Sale in Sweetwater. The bulls were gain tested for 90 days prior to the sale. Holman's 17 consignments had the highest average weight gain. All 75 bulls consigned to the sale were judged by 3 independent cattlemen and sold according to the judges' ranking. The judges were Danny Dixon, Phil Guitar, and Charlie Jones, all from large Sweetwater area ranches. Holman had the top 7 placing bulls and sold the high selling bull for \$2250.00. The sale average was \$826.00 per head and Holman averaged \$1047.00 per head.

Immigration-Reform, **Possible Seizure of Farm** and Ranch

The U.S. Senate is considering immi-gration-reform legislation that would in-crease penalties for hiring unauthorized workers, including allowing government seizure and forfeiture of farms and businesses for employment of one unauthorized-

The Immigrant Control and Financial Responsibility Act, S. 269, proposed by Sen. Alan Simpson, R-Wyo., was recently approved by an immigration subcom-mittee and is now awaiting full-committee consideration.

The bill would significantly increase penalties for hiring unauthorized workers and for paperwork violations related to hiring. It would also repeal an agriculture search warrant requirement provision contained in the 1986 immigration reform law.

Chaunce TSCRA President 0. son Jr., Breckenridge, Texas, wrote letters to U.S. Sens. Kay Bailey Hutchison and Phil Gramm, both R-Texas, asking them to work with Sen. Simpson and his staff on modifying thebill. Thompson said TSCRA believes the bill should:

* Include a reformed temporary alien workers program for agrcu-

* Stop making agricultural employers policemen for the U.S. Immigration Service,

*Deny government seizure and forfeiture of farms and ranches for employment of one unauthorized worker,

* Delete government seizure and forfeiture of farms and ranches when employees or agents violate employer sanctions and * Eliminate the provision that would repeal the agricultural search warrant law.

Thompson said the provisions in the bill are "regulatory overkill family farmers and He emphasized that 'TSCRA discourages its members from

violating immigration laws by hiring illegal aliens. "We support meaningful immigration reform that protects our rights and property, as well as the economic stability of Our country. S. 269 can achieve these goals without harming the citizens it hopes to protect," Thompson added.

This summer, TSCRA worked with Rep. Lamar Smith, R-Texas, on his version of the bill (H.R. 2202), addressing similar provisions. Smith amended his bill to protect farmers and ranchers asset forfeiture for hiring illegal aliens.

Smith's bill passed the House subcommittee and is currently in the full ju-diciary committee markup phase.

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

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
