Sonora Red Sox In Championship

The Red Sox posted a season record of six wins and one loss to gain a #2 seed in the championship tournament.

In the first round of the tournament, the Red Sox

The Red Sox came from behind in the 7th inning to win the game with a score of 5 for the Marlins and 6 for the Red Sox.

The third round found the Red Sox entertaining the Lake View Blue, but the hitting of the Red Sox proved to be more than the Blue team could handle. The Red Sox cruised to a 10 run win: Lake View Blue 8 and Sonora Red Sox 18.

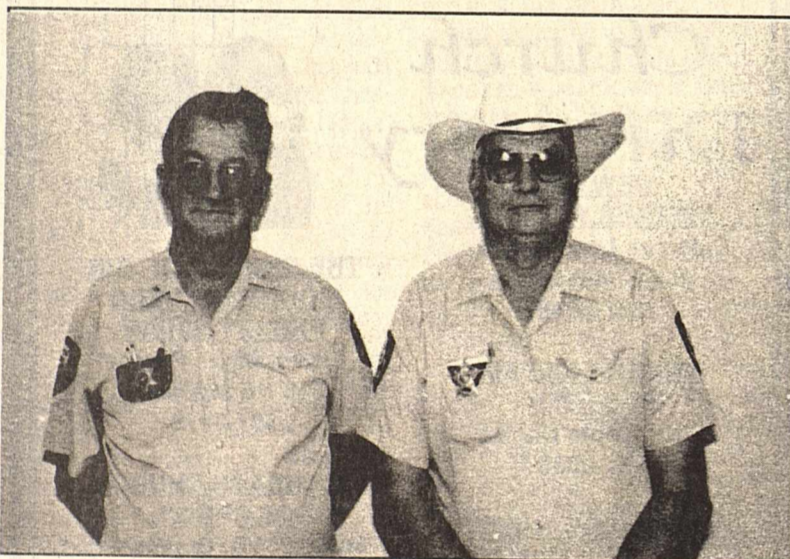
These three wins set up the championship game on Friday. It should prove to be a very good baseball game, as it will put two very good baseball programs competing against one another.

Webster Announces Retirement Of Harris And Duncan

Bob Harris has been the Jailer in Sutton County since 1980. Harris began his career in 1974 with the Sheriff's Office of Ector County. He has family in Dallas, and a son in Ozona. Ed Duncan has served Sutton

County as Deputy Sheriff for 12 years. He began his career in 1961 with the Dallas Police Department. From 77-80 he served as Chief Deputy Sheriff for Callahan County, from 80-84 he served with Stephens County

Sheriff's Office. Ed Duncan said he plans to stay in Sonora after his retirement.

"You can fill the positions of these men but you can never replace their experience," stated Webster.

Bob Harris, helped organize the Texas Jail Commission, which sets all the guidelines of county jails. He has also been instrumental in running the jail, certified by state and federal authorities, for years.

Sheriff's Office Recovers Stolen Property

Sheriff Bill Webster announced Monday, June 10, 1996, that the Sutton County Sheriff's Office had recovered a pickup reported stolen on April 16, 1996. Sheriff Webster also stated a subject was arrested in connection with the theft and a burglary of a residence North of Sonora, that resulted in the recovery of stolen firearms.

Webster stated the pickup, which belonged to a local construction company, was taken while an employee was out of the pickup at a hunting lease. A firearm and other items were reported to have been left in the vehicle. The residence burglary was reported to the sheriff's office on April 18, 1996, in which two firearms were reported taken.

Sheriff Webster stated that Deputy Ed Duncan, working along with authorities in Pecos and Upton counties, had arrested one individual in connection with both crimes and was seeking the whereabouts of another. Webster stated that Duncan had recovered two of the stolen firearms and most of the stolen items.

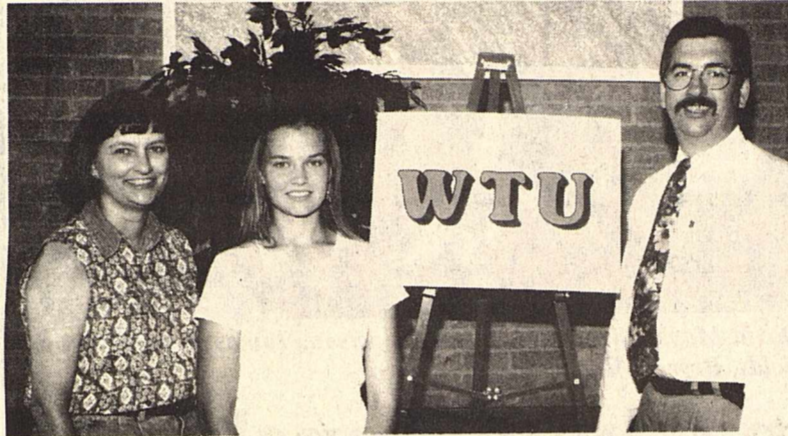

Ramirez Receives Medical Scholarship



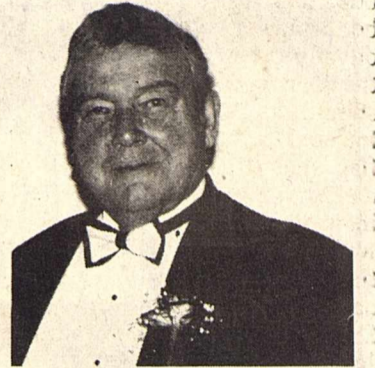
Rachel Ramirez

Ask The Historical Society

We have had a lot of questions regarding the proper display and respect for the United States Flag. We are printing the following parts of the Federal Flag Code to help our readers better understand the rules:

Sec. 2 (a) It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaff in the open. However when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed twenty-four hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness. (b) The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously. (c) The flag should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement, except when an all weather flag is displayed. (d) The flag should be displayed on all days, especially on New Year's Day, January 1; Inauguration Day, January 20; Lincoln's Birthday, February 12; Washington's Birthday, third Monday in February; Easter Sunday; Mother's Day, second Sunday in May; Armed Forces Day, third Sunday in May; Memorial Day (half staff until noon), the last Monday in May; Flag Day, June 14; Independence Day, July 4; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Constitution Day, September 17; Columbus Day, second Monday in October; Navy Day, October 27; Veterans Day, November 11; Thanksgiving Day, fourth Thursday in November; Christmas Day, December 25; and such other days as may be proclaimed by the President of the United States; the birthdays of States (date of admission); and on State holidays. (e) The flag should be displayed daily on or near the main administration building of every public institution. (f) The flag should be displayed in or near every polling place on election days. (g) The flag should be displayed during school days in or near every schoolhouse.

Sec. 3 that the flag, when carried in a procession with another flag or flags, should be either on the marching right, that is, the flag's own right, or, if there is a line of other flags, in the front of the center of that line. (a) The flag should not be displayed on a float in a parade except from a staff; or as provided in subsection (i). (b) The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides, or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or a boat. When the flag is displayed on a motor car, the staff should be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right fender. (c) No other flag or pennant should be placed above or, if on the same level, to the right of the flag of the United States of America, except during church services conducted by naval chaplains at sea, when the church pennant may be flown above the flag during church services for the personnel of the Navy. (d) The flag of the United States of America, when it is displayed with another flag against a wall from crossed staffs, should be on the right, the flag's own right, and its staff should be in front of the staff of the other flag. (e) The flag of the United States should be in the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of States or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and

displayed from staffs. (f) When flags of states, cities, or localities, or pennants of societies are flown on the same halyard with the flag of the United States, the latter should always be at the peak. When the flags are flown from adjacent staffs, the flag of the United States, the latter should always be at the peak. When the flags are flown from adjacent staffs, the flag of the United States should be hoisted first and lowered last. No such flag or pennant may be placed above the flag of the United States or to the United States Flag's right. (g) When the flags of two or more nations are displayed, they are to be flown from separate staffs of the same height. The flags should be of approximately equal size. International usage forbids the display of the flag of one nation above that of another nation in time of peace. (h) When the flag of the United States is displayed from a staff projecting horizontally or at an angle from the window sill, balcony, or front of a building, the union of the flag should be placed at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half staff. When the flag is suspended over a sidewalk from a rope extending from a house to a pole at the edge of the sidewalk, the flag should be hoisted out, union first, from the building. (i) When displayed horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in window, the flag should be displayed in the same way with the union or blue field to the left of the observer in the street. (j) When the flag is displayed over the middle of the street, it should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east and west street or to the east in a north and south street. (k) When used on a speaker's platform, the flag, if displayed flat, should be displayed above and behind the speaker. When displayed from a staff in a church or public auditorium, the flag of the United States of America should hold the position of superior prominence, in advance of the audience, and in the position of honor at the clergyman's or speaker's right as he faces the audience. Any other flag so displayed should be placed on the left of the clergyman or speaker or to the right of the audience. (l) The flag should form a distinctive feature of the ceremony of unveiling a statue or monument, but it should never be used as the covering for a statue or monument. (m) The flag, when flown at half-staff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised to the peak before it is lowered for the day. On Memorial Day the flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon only, then raised to the top of the staff. (We suggest you contact your local VFW for a precise listing of other times the flag is flown at half mast.) (n) When the flag is used to cover a casket, it should be so placed that the union is at the head and over the left shoulder. The flag should not be lowered into the grave or allowed to touch the ground. (o) When the flag is suspended across a corridor or lobby in a building with only one main entrance, it should be suspended vertically with the union of the flag to the observer's

left upon entering. Sec. 4 that no disrespect should be shown the flag of the United States of America; the flag should not be dipped to any person or thing. Regimental colors, State flags, and organization or institutional flags are to be dipped as a mark of honor. (a) The flag should never be displayed with the union down, except as a signal of dire distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property. (b) The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise. (c) The flag should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free. (d) The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding, or drapery. It should never be fastened, drawn back, nor up, in folds, but always allowed to fall free. Bunting of blue, white, and red, always arranged with the blue above and the white in the middle, and the red below, should be used for covering a speaker's desk, draping the front of the platform, and for decoration in general. (e) The flag should never be fastened, displayed, used, or stored in such a manner as to permit it to be easily torn, soiled, or damaged in any way. (f) The flag should never be used as a covering for a ceiling. (g) The flag should never have placed upon it, nor on any part of it, nor attached to it any mark, insignia, letter, word, figure, design, picture, or drawing of any nature. (h) The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying or delivering anything. (i) The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever. It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or on paper napkins or boxes or anything that is designed for temporary use and discard. Advertising signs should not be fastened to a staff or halyard from which the flag is flown. (j) No part of the flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform. However, a flag patch may be affixed to the uniform of military personnel, firemen, policemen, and members of patriotic organizations. The flag represents a living country and is itself considered a living thing. Therefore, the lapel flag pin being a replica, should be worn on the left lapel near the heart. (k) The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning. (Contact Boy Scouts or VFW)

Sec. 5 During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag or when the flag is passing in a parade or in review, all persons present except those in uniform should face the flag and stand at attention with the right hand over the heart. Those present in uniform should render the military salute. When not in uniform, men should remove their headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Aliens should stand at attention. The salute to the flag in a moving column should be rendered at the moment the flag passes.

Sec. 6 During the rendition of the nation anthem when the flag is displayed, all present except those in uniform should stand at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. Men not in uniform should remove their

headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Persons in uniform should render the military salute at the first note of the anthem and retain this position until the last note. When the flag is not displayed, those present should face toward the music and act in the same manner they would if the flag were displayed there.

Sec. 7 The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag should be rendered by standing at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. When not in uniform men should remove their headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Persons in uniform should remain silent, face the flag and render the military salute.

Sec. 8 Any rule or custom pertaining to the display of the flag of the United States of America, set for herein, may be altered, modified, or repealed, or additional rules with respect thereto may be prescribed by the Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces of the United States, whenever he deems it to be appropriate or desirable; and any such alteration or additional rule shall be set forth in proclamation.

We would like to thank the Sonora VFW Post for obtaining copy of this Federal Flag Code, Public Law 94-344, 94th Congress, S. J. Res. 40 July 7, 1976.

Please if you have torn and tattered flags replace them and properly dispose of the old flags. Display your flag properly. We hope to see a great many flags on display in Sonora for the holidays. Don't forget you can display your state, city, and organizational flags regularly as long as you do it according to the flag code.

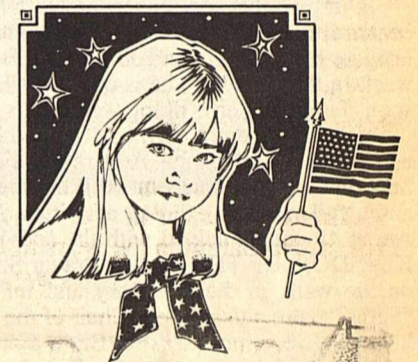

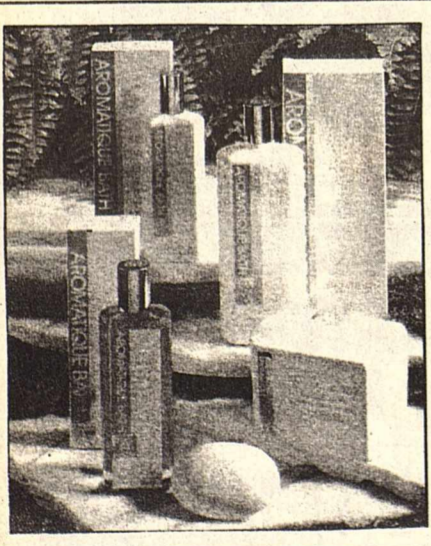

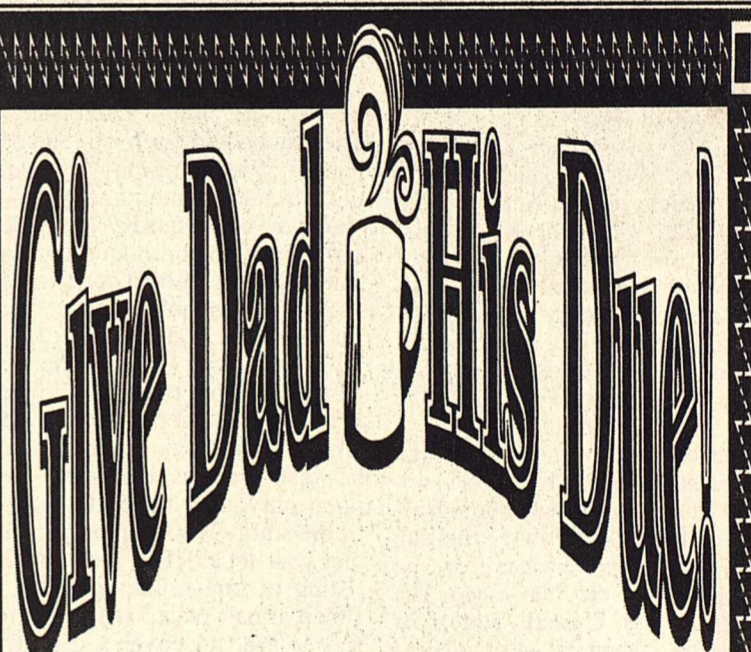

Public Input Weighed In New Fishing, Hunting Regs

continued from last week's DRN

"I think we've made it clear that as long as there are no biological or enforcement consequences, we don't have a problem pulling a regulation proposal because of public concerns," said TPWD Executive Director Andrew Sanson. "Our staff went out and listened to what the public had to say and we've been responsive to public comment. We left some good proposals on the table that could be revised to address some of the concerns we heard during the public meetings. The main thing is we now have a heightened public awareness and involvement in our regulatory process and that's exciting."

State officials indicate they may seek additional public input on some of the withdrawn proposals with the possibility of re-submitting modified recommendations of the Commission during the next regulatory cycle.

"It appeared that some of the opposition we heard during the public comment period stemmed from confusion about the proposals and once people understood our intent, they had a change of opinion," explained Dr. Bill Harvey, TPWD Regulations Coordinator.

Following is a summary of some of the key regulation changes adopted by the Commission and what they will mean to hunters and anglers around the state.

•A statewide proposal giving landowners with a department-approved management plan specifying a both-sex harvest quota the flexibility to allot permits to hunters allowing the harvest of up to five white-tailed deer (no more than three bucks) on their property. This proposal would offer increased flexibility to the landowners to manage the harvest of deer under a set harvest quota. In addition, properties with management plans specifying a both-sex harvest quota will have the option of a late antlerless-only season for two weeks, beginning the day following the close of the general season.

•A proposal to open a spring eastern turkey season in Bowie, Cass, Cherokee, Harrison, Jasper, Marion, Nacogdoches, Newton, and Trinity counties. The Season would run from the Monday nearest April 20 for 14 consecutive days, with a bag limit of one gobbler.

•A proposal to delete the current list of Community Fishing Lakes and designate all public impoundments of 75 acres or smaller located totally within an incorporated city limits or public park and impoundments of any size totally within the boundaries of a state park as Community Fishing Lakes. This definition would extend special regulations to approximately 450 reservoirs. The special regulations are a low-

ered daily bag limit for channel and blue catfish from 25 to 5 and pole-and-line angling only.

•A proposal to reduce the maximum length of seine nets allowed for the taking of non-game fish from 60 to 20 feet. This proposal standardizes the size of a legal seine for use in fresh and saltwater.

•A proposal to change flounder regulations, including a reduction of the recreational daily bag limit from 20 to 10 fish and possession limit from 40 to 20 fish. The proposal would also establish a daily commercial bag limit of 60 fish for holders of a valid Commercial Finfish Fisherman's License and would increase the overall minimum length limit from 12 inches to 14 inches for both recreational and commercial activities.

•A proposal changing the allowance of finfish in trawls from 50 percent of the total trawl catch by weight of aquatic products, including shrimp on a shrimping vessel, to 50 percent of the total trawl catch by weight of shrimp on a shrimping vessel. Redefining the finfish possession exemption in shrimp trawls to be tied to shrimp weight only reestablishes the original intent of this rule. Additionally, current fishing mortality on many finfish species due to bycatch in commercial shrimp trawls is excessive. Compliance with the new definition by shrimp fishermen should assist in reducing bycatch mortality of finfish in shrimp trawls.

Regulation changes adopted by the Commission will become effective Sept. 1.

Mohair Council America To Participate In Market Access Program

Layton Black of Goldthwaite, president of the Mohair Council of America, has announced that the council has qualified as a participant in the Market Access Program (MAP) by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
