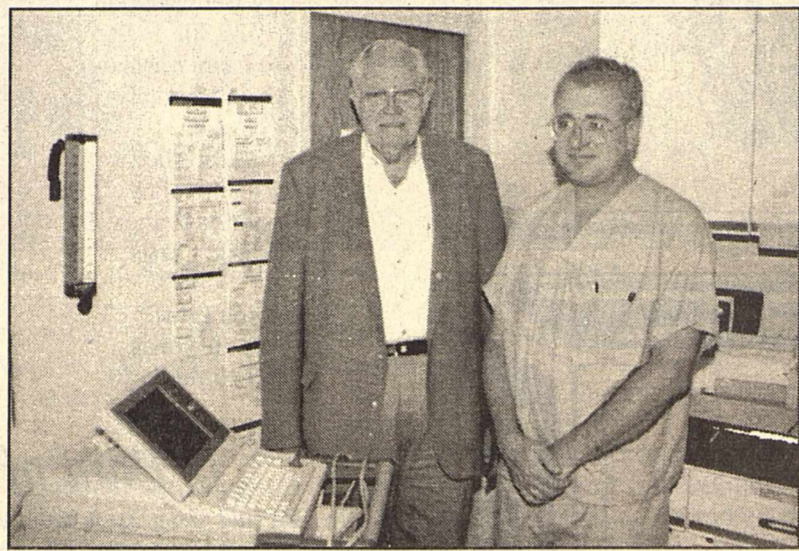

Sonora Basketball Camp Scheduled For July

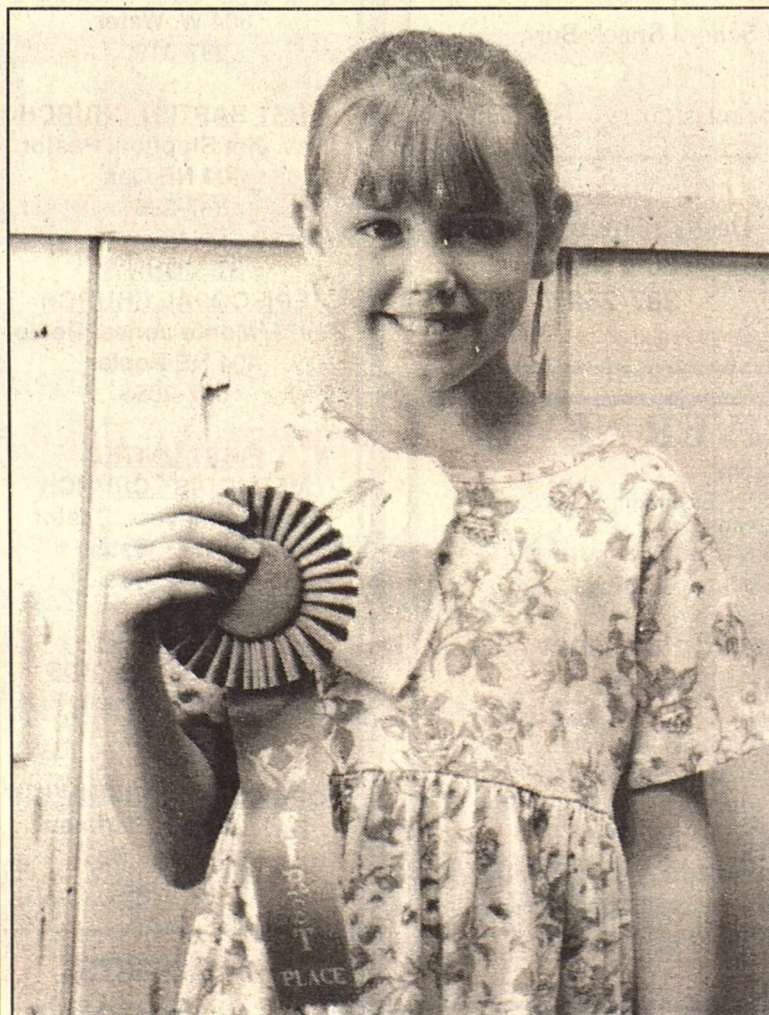

The Covered Wagon Dinner Theatre continues this Saturday, July 13 with the return of Cajun music provided by Ponty Bone. Born in Dallas in 1939, Ponty grew up in San Antonio - playing the accordion since the age of five. In the sixties, his first band, New Moan Hey, made an album and played Austin's Vulcan Gas Company.

In the seventies and eighties, Ponty and longtime friend Jesse Taylor toured nationally and internationally with the Joe Ely Band, still regarded by many as the best of its day. Since then, the busy accordionist has split his time between recording and playing with his own bands the Squeezetones and Zydeco Loco and with many others such as Jimmie Dale Gilmore and Timbuk3.

Ponty also writes songs which his fans feel very strongly about -- titles such as "(She Ain't As) Bad As They Say" and his

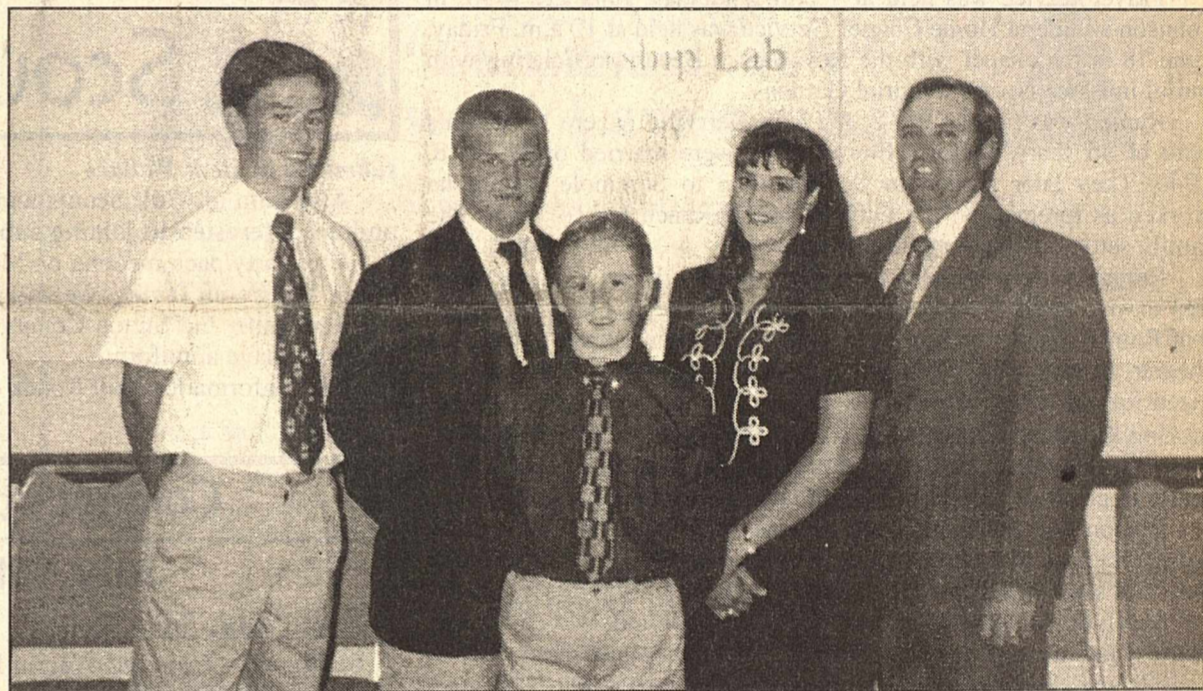
ode to hometown San Antonio - "Frio City Road". Ponty's piano and organ chops can be heard on his, and other albums, but in the live show, it's "squeezebox time" as he roams around the dance floor happy to be who he is. 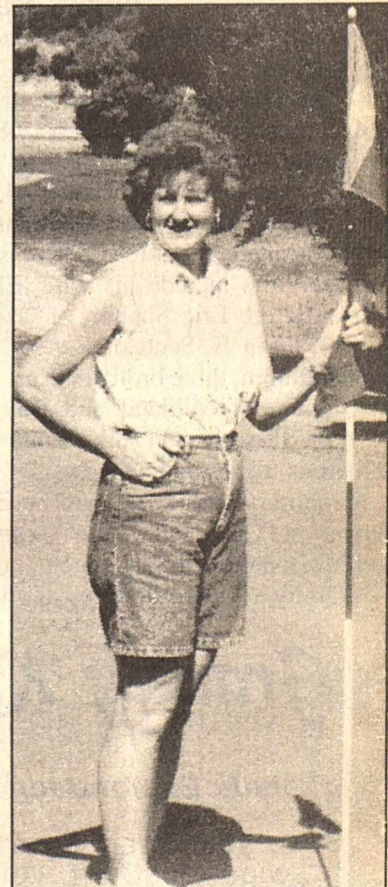

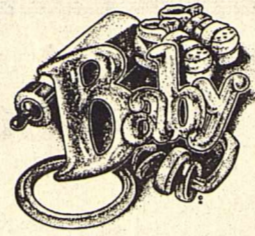

Q. Are hot dogs made from dogs and if not why do they call them hot dogs?

A. The National Hot Dog and Sausage Council says the frankfurter is believed to have originated in a butcher shop in Frankfurt, Germany, in 1652. Much later at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in 1904, a concessionaire was selling the wieners as plain sausages. In order to make it easy for his customers to eat the sausages he loaned them white gloves. However at the end of the day, he found that the gloves were not returned. He then consulted a baker who created the hot dog bun to protect the fingers of the eaters.

Another tale tells the story of the hot dog name. In 1901, a concessionaire who was losing money sent his employees out to secure "dachshund sausages." They sold them from hot water tanks on the New York Polo Ground shouting "they're red hot! Get your dachshund sausages while they are red hot!" Editorial cartoonist, Tad Dorgan, sketched the vendors hawking their sausages and, unsure of how to spell dachshund, he simply wrote beneath it "Hot Dog!" And so the name was born.

Originally, hot dogs were served in casings, like other sausages. But in 1937, the "skinless" hot dog became popular. Now more than 90 percent of hot dogs in the country are of the "skinless" variety. But many

people still prefer the "snap of the traditional natural casing wiener.

Today, hot dogs are associated strongly with sporting events, particularly baseball. On some occasions, hot dog sales at ball parks have exceeded attendance.

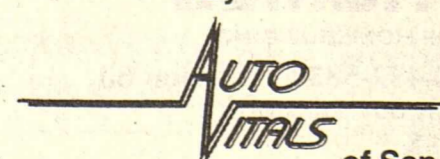

It is exciting to know that some great music was this close to home. If you have not been to Mayfield's Store and the Devil's River, you have missed a treat.

Another country/western music story this week has a Sonora connection. Don Walters, a country/western, artist is a retiree who has developed a terrific second career. Walters was a state employee and long time national guard member who always was a musician for fun. It was not something that he did to make a living. All of that has changed. After retiring, Walters has become an "over-night" success in the music world.

Italian Beef Stir-Fry

- 1 lb. sirloin tip steaks, 1/8" to 1/4" thick
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 2 small zucchini squash, thinly sliced
- 1 cup cherry tomato halves, or larger tomato wedges
- 1/4 cup reduced-fat bottled Italian salad dressing
- 2 cups hot cooked spaghetti
- 1 Tbsp grated Parmesan cheese

1. Cut beef steaks lengthwise in half and then crosswise into 1-inch wide strips.
2. Cook and stir garlic in oil in large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat 1 minute. Add beef (1/2 at a time) and stir-fry 1 to 1 1/2 minutes or until outside surface is no longer pink. Season with salt and pepper. Remove with slotted spoon; keep warm.
3. Add zucchini to same skillet; stir fry 2 to 3 minutes or until crisp-tender. Return beef to skillet with tomato and dressing; heat through. Serve beef mixture over hot pasta; sprinkle with cheese. Makes 4 servings.

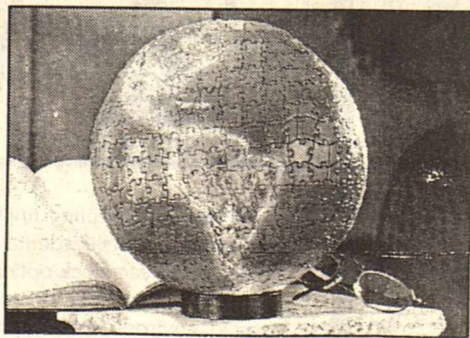

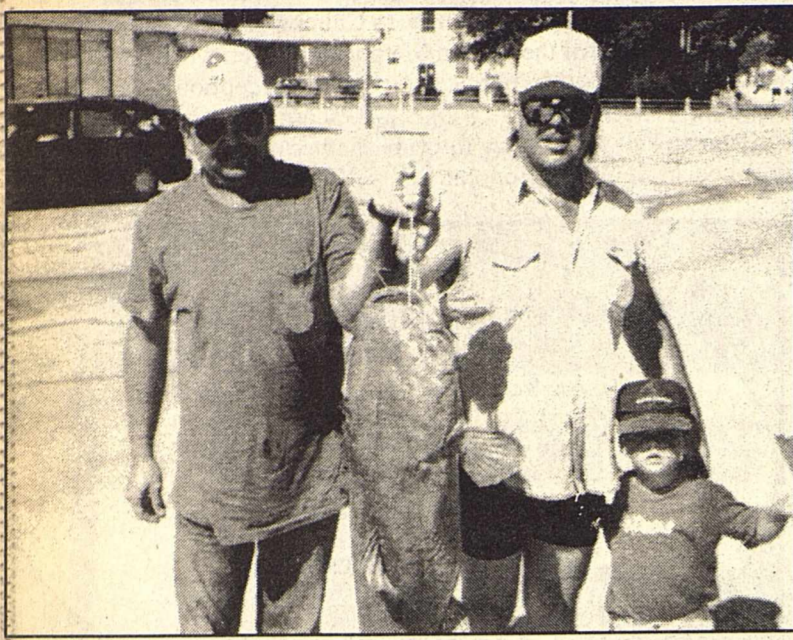

Texas Fishing Report

AMISTAD

Water clear; very low; 81 degrees; black bass to 6 pounds are good on spinners and Power Worms; striped bass are good on live bait and topwaters; white bass are fair to good on slabs, spoons and crank baits; catfish are good on rod and reels baited with shrimp, nightcrawlers and cheese bait.

BROWNWOOD

Water clear; normal level; 78 degrees; black bass to 8 pounds are good on spinners, topwaters and Rat-L-Traps; hybrid stripers and white bass are fair to good on live bait and spoons; crappie are fair on minnows and jigs fished over main lake brush piles; channel catfish are fair on rod and reels baited with shrimp and worms.
