WHITTLIN'

The recent interest in local politics, which is indicated by a more than usual number of candidates in school trustee and city council race, is a healthy sign.

Last week, we were feeling kinda sorry for the city council because it had no candidates for two positions which are becoming vacant. Our sympathy was wasted, however, as seven candidates entered the race in the time since then. The deadline for filing or being petitioned as a candidate is not until today (Wednesday) so there may still be more in the race than we know about.

The school board race is not, as far as we know now, as crowded as is the one for the city council, but there's a good representation of names on that ballot, too.

Times are changing a little bit and slowly in regard to getting candidates out for local political posts. Several years ago, it was the custom for people to be petitioned for an office. Nobody just went to the proper place and volunteered as a candidate.

We prefer the latter method and have said so here before. At the same time, we don't have anything against a petition especially except that it is pretty meaningless.

There's no point in petitioning somebody, for instance, unless he or she is agreeable to having his or her name put on the ballot. If they are agreeable, there's still no point in a petition because the candidate could file his or her own name with a minimum of effort.

The way petitions are handled here, it seems to us, signers are not necessarily endorsing the candidates they sign petitions for. They're simply agreeing that they have no objections to the candidate having his or her name on the ballot.

As we said in the beginning of this week's column, we're glad to see people taking an interest in their local politics. If we showed as much interest nationally, maybe we would have better leadership at that level!

We had a little experience on the city council and a lot of our time has been spent covering both city and school government meetings for this newspaper.

The newspaper job is easier, at least during the time the meeting is going on.

Our thinking, prior to being elected to the city council, was that we'd just do what was right about issues which came to a vote and it would be as simple as that.

But it's not as easy as it sounds. First, you have to decide what's right and often there's just no way to do that beyond a shadow of a doubt.

Nearly every issue which required a vote by the governing body had at least two sides to it . . . and not one of them may be wrong. Deciding then how to vote is the difficult part of the job.

The city council positions, not incidentally, pay a salary. The school trustee posts don't. We don't know what the difference is, but we do know that's the case in this community.

City council members draw a paycheck of \$25 per month, paid on a twice-a-year basis, we think. It might be paid quarterly. That seems to us to be about \$1 per day, if you don't count Sundays, when there's only a minimum of city counciling to do anyway.

School board posts pay off in things like getting your picture in a prominent position in the school annual each year and in complaints from dissatisfied patrons of the school district.

For additional thanks, members of either board will probably get voted out of office if they keep running long enough and do anything worthwhile during the time they're holding the office.

We heard a man say just a few days ago that "This is a cold, (Continued on Page 2)

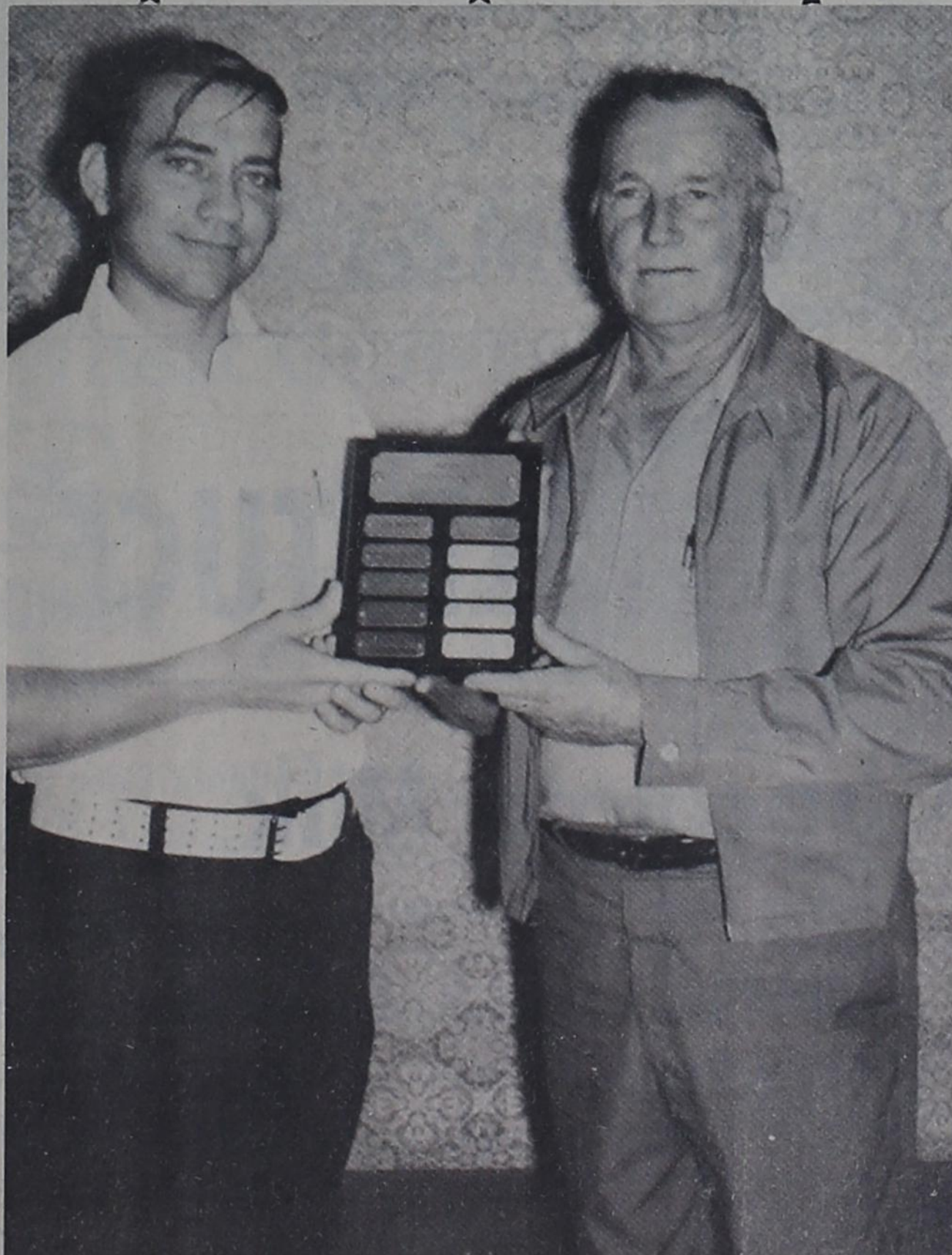
Billy Smith is chairman of

days from now --- Saturday, April 7.

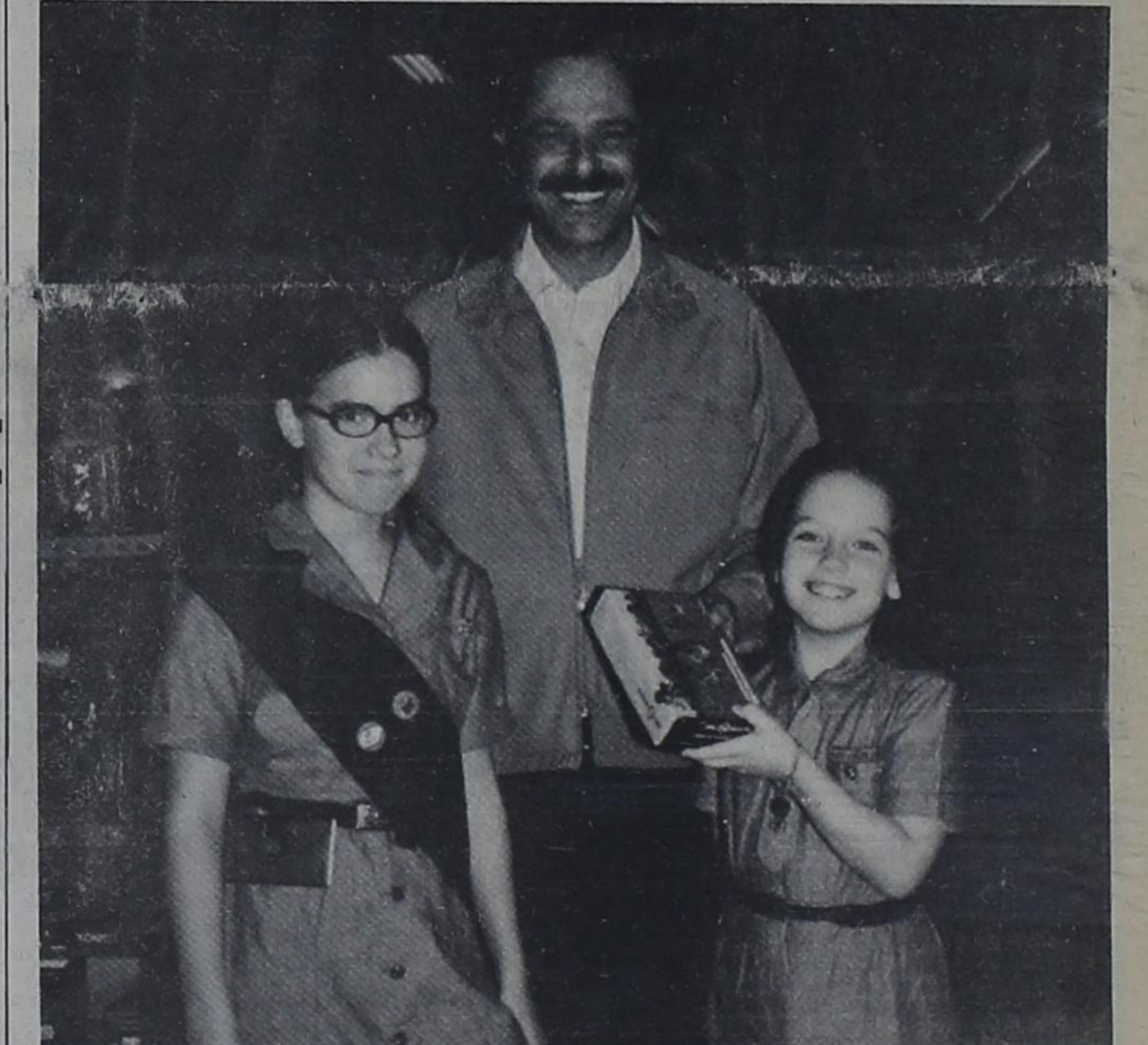

If you get your people elected, they probably won't do what you want, but look at the fun and satisfaction you'll have.

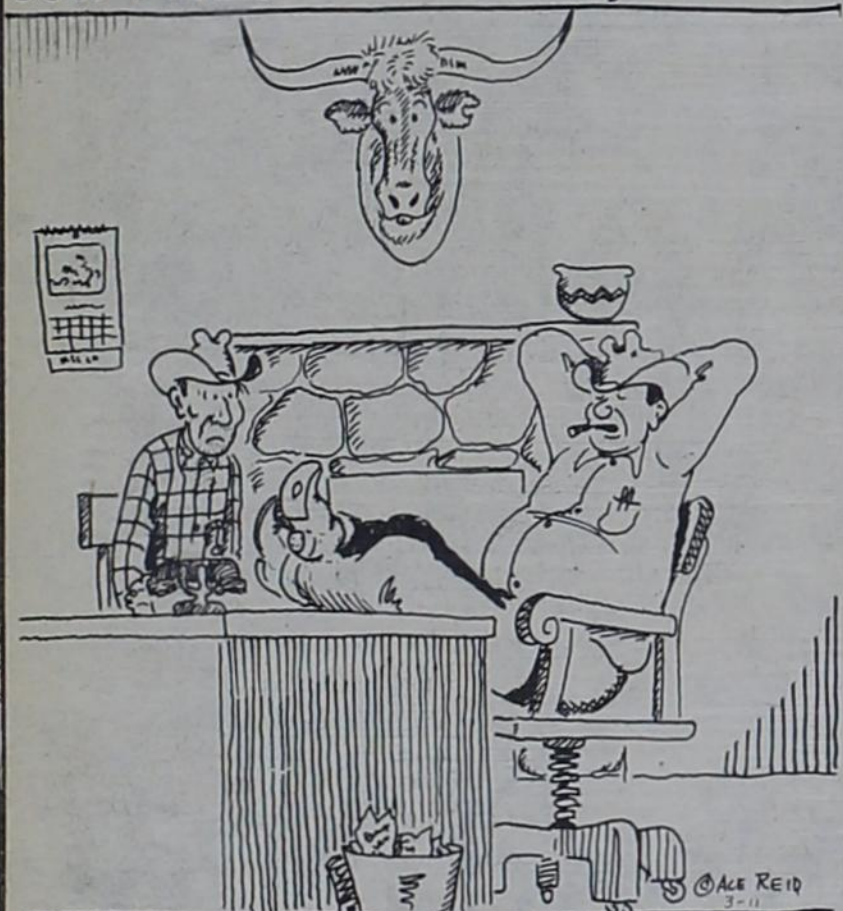
Who was responsible for deciding that Bovina wouldn't have its Religious Emphasis Day this year after two successful promotions?

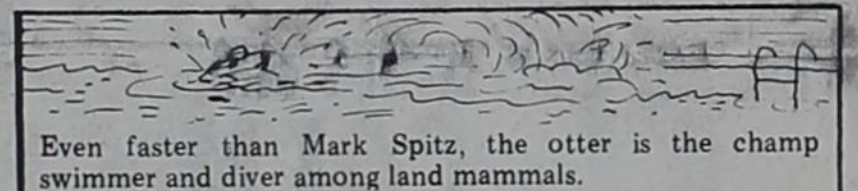
Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture officers for 1967 were named by the board of directors at a dinner meeting held at City Drug Thursday.

Conditions Right --

SCS Reports Indicate Blowing

The Soil Conservation Service in Parmer County has just completed their second wind erosion report for the present blowing season, according to Herb Evans, District Conservationist. "We consider the blow season from November to May," Evans said.

The report indicates conditions in Parmer County are the worst in years for blowing to occur. Moisture condition is good but the soil surface has been "fluffed up" by freezing. Also the moisture has come as

snow and has not packed the surface at all. Another reason for the probable blowing conditions is there has been more burning of crop residues than normal. It is common knowledge that the worst wind erosion is in burned fields.

Another point covered in the report was the wind storm of January 27. It was the worst in years. "We are all thankful for the large amounts of residues still on the surface in the county," Evans concluded.

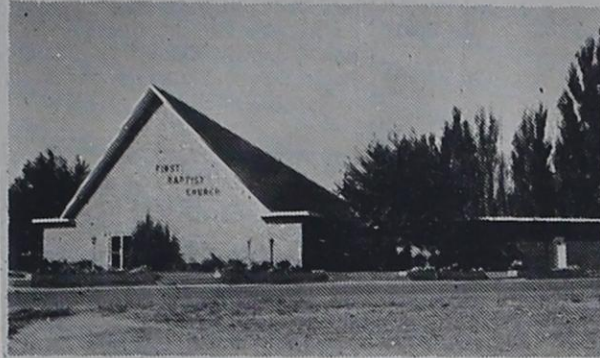
BUT GOD WAS WITH HIM
