


"We have to remember that love is reciprocal; therefore, the higher the expectations we have of our home life, the greater the chance we will be disappointed," he adds.



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Sonora Livestock **Auction Report**

Sonora Livestock Auction had its one year anniversary sale last week. We held 75 sales since opening our doors; gave the producers a viable choice in marketing their livestock, and gave 100 plus people needed jobs. We certainly want to express our thanks to the producers and buyers who have stood by us and supported our new and exciting venture. Your confidence in our program is most gratifying!!

The sales last month; November 2-30 showed a strong demand for all classes of livestock. Our numbers also increased considerably, as did the number of new buyers. We saw cattle increase at a steady pace: cows \$2-\$3 higher as compared to the previous week. Feeder steers and heifers \$1-\$2 higher, with instances \$4 higher on good to choice calves weighing 400-500 pounds, yearling steers and heifers were steady to \$1 higher. Cow/calf pairs sold \$500 to \$625 per pair with calves weighing 200-300 pounds. We still to fill some of these orders. The packer cows and bulls are in strong demand and are showing a stronger market than previous weeks.

The sheep and goat market is finally on the up side of a very unsteady market in previous weeks. The best increases were in new crop lambs which saw choice number one lambs bringing up to \$1.05. Yearling ewes are in strong demand with the most interest showing a market of \$75-\$105 per head. Spanish nannies still on the up side with an increase in demand of fat nannies going to Mexico, Spanish nannies ranged from \$39-\$55 per head. Spanish kids 70-85 CWT, small Spanish kids \$18-\$25 per head. Angora goats were \$2-\$5 higher with fat nannies ranging from 35-4 CWT, Angora kids at 50-60 CWT.

We will have a second annual, All Breed Bull Sale in February or March, watch for dates. We are also going to hold our second annual Boer and Meat Goat Sale in May. Starting the first Saturday in January 1997, we will continued to hold our monthly Horse and Tack Sale the first Saturday of each month, immediately following the sheep/goat sale and before we sale the cattle. Please try to attend our weekly sales for good family entertainment and help us market the livestock of this area.




