Hundreds Visit With Santa Here Friday







Greek God **Cronus Became** Time Symbol

Chronometry is the science of measuring time—a project that has interested man since his earliest

days on earth.

The word comes down to us associated with Cronus, the Greek god once hailed as lord of the universe, as a corruption of the word "cronos" which means time.

Cronus supposedly was warned that one of his children would dispose of him, and so vowed to devour them at birth. When a child, Zeus was horn, Cronus' wife, Rhea hid the child away and presented a stone to Cronus instead Everything ended happily, according to the legend. Cronus disgorged the stone, along with previ-ous children he had swallowed. Zeus later dethroned his father and became the chief god of the Greek pantheon.

Cronus? As we said earlier, beause of the similarity of names. he became confused with the word for time. Someone placed an hour glass in his hand, someone else added a scythe and the world came to know him as Father Time.
