A Sonora High School teacher has requested the right to sue the Sonora Independent School District even though the EEOC appeared about to rule in her favor in a gender discrimination complaint filed late last summer.

Martha K. Smith, an English II teacher at SHS, was one of four teachers placed on an improvement plan at an unusual school board meeting on March 12, 1996. Ms. Smith had not been made aware of the improvement plan or any change in her status. Having been given excellent evaluations for the past eleven years, Ms. Smith was shocked to discover the board's decision since she had received no prior notification or appraisal for that school year, as mandated by law

Ms. Smith charges that the former Superintendent Charles

were not treated so harshly. In fact attorney fees, but the district has she says, "The good ol' boy routine refused.

> According to Ms. Smith, "I would not have had to hire a lawyer if the school board would have rescinded its motion when they learned of their failure to follow school policy and state law. It took a lot of courage for me to stand up for myself and also a lot of money. After eleven years in the district, I just couldn't stand by while my employer discriminated against me, harming my reputation and career as a good teacher. Now the board has refused to bring closure to this awful nightmare. Their refusal to settle my claim drags this controversy out into the public and to the courthouse. It's sad because this could have been resolved almost a year ago. I feel that I was forced to hire an attorney to protect my career, and I only want what's fair."





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

### William B. Wilson

William B Wilson, better known as "Willie B," died Saturday evening the 12th of April. Willie B was born in Sonora, Texas, on June 21, 1914. He spent most of his youth growing up on the family ranch. He attended New Mexico Military Institute, where he began to play polo, the sport he loved. Later at the University of Texas, he received a bachelor's degree and a law degree in 1937.

Mr. Wilson was a second lieutenant and a flight instructor in the Army during World War II. He was stationed in Pecos, Texas. Willie B was an active member of the polo world, playing for more than sixtyfive years, making him the longest continuous polo player in the world. His credits include winning the Pacific Coast Open twice, the Silver Cup and runner up in the U.S. Open. He was also a pilot, flight instructor, rancher, published author, scholar in vocabulary, inventor of auto irrigation system and an attorney. He was a past president of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, member of the Cattleman's Association, Production Texas Credit Association, and an active member of the Church of Scientology. He was also a Trustee for the Midland Polo Club and a circuit governor. After moving to Midland in

1964, he began numerous Wilson Companies in oil and gas. These family businesses are still in operation today.

William B Wilson is survived by his wife, Idelis, of Midland; five sons, John William, Duke Glover, Word B, Michael Hagen, and Byron Blaine, all of Midland; three stepchildren James, Regina, and Ivette Salome-Sotomayor of Florida; 11 grandchildren, including John of Arkansas, Stephen, Will, Mary Margaret, Alison, Toffee, and Chelsea of Midland, Lissa Wilson Debes, Lorrie Wilson Scholl, and Claire Wilson of Houston, and Spencer Forrest of Dallas, sister-inlaw Adele Wilson of Sonora, and 2 nieces, Nancy Davis and Mary Adele Balch of Sonora. He is also survived by two great-grandchildren, Sebastian Wilson of Midland and John William Wilson IV of Arkansas.







## Ask The Historical Society



R.S. Covey, former Superintendent of Schools, Sonora, TX.

Q. Could you give us the names of some of the early baseball players in Sonora?

A. For the answer to this question we have decided to reprint the report of the Sonora vs. Ozona game printing the Devil's River News of April 17, 1909.

The Sonora Baseball team comprised of the following players played the Ozona team in Ozona, on the 10th, and won by a score of four to three: Bart DeWitt, short stop: Zenas Decie, catcher; Wes Osteen, 2nd base; Murdock McDonald, pitcher; R. E. Thomas 1st base;

Marion Stokes, center field; Harold Mills, right field; George Whitehead, 3rd base and Fisher Jones left field; Kenneth Taliaferro official scorekeeper and Leslie Adams mascot.

It was a grand snappy game all the way through and aside from a few squabbles every inning was intensely interesting and full of excitement. Three of Sonora's runs were made in the first inning and one in the third. Decie, Osteen, McDonald, and DeWitt made one run each. Ozona's three runs were made by Wright, Taylor, and Casber--one in the third, one in the fifth and one in the eighth. Sonora had one man to die on base in the seventh and eighth inning. Ozona had a man to die on base in the first and two in the 9th. With two men out and Dudley on 2nd Smith on 3rd in the last half of the ninth, Ozona had an excellent opportunity not only to tie the score, but to win the game. But Murdoch had lots of steam left and pitched with such perfect control that the side was retired by the last man up fanning out. Both pitchers had all kinds of steam and perfect control. Walter Smith of Ozona struck out thirteen men, and Murdoch McDonald for Sonora struck out eighteen. The game was more of a pitcher's battle than anything else. Notes:

The wind was blowing so hard there was so much dust, it is not surprising so few runs were made.

Aside from the ball game there was very little fussing. Mason Rountree had to put up a good talk to keep out of a fight, and Fisher

Jones got into an argument with a folding bed.

Jeff Smith took a bunch of players over in his two cylinder hay burner and got home without a single puncture or blow out.

Mason Rountree said with a little grubbing Ozona would have a pretty good little field there in front of the court house.

Fisher Jones couldn't keep his cap on account of a telephone wire in left field.

Geo. Whitehead had to jump two or three automobiles to get one of the balls they knocked him.

Harold Mills was the only Sonora boy who got lost in Ozona. Marion Stokes says he did it on purpose

All the boys pronounce Leslie. Adams the best little mascot that ever carried a bat.

The only thing the boys don't like about Kenneth's score keeping is that he won't give them any more runs than they make.

Other little interesting statements in the issue:

Easter fell on April 11 in 1909. Joe Ross the cattle and goat man was in Sonora Thursday. Joe knew this drought was coming as he read it in an almanac two years ago. Will Ogle was in from his farm

and ranch near Mayer Wednesday trading.



Counselor's Corner by Dale Kennemer

My husband and I have been taking care of his mother for some time now. Her condition is getting to the point to where he is ready to put her in a nursing home but he feels guilty about having to do this. What are some things he can do to deal with this guilt?

For sure, putting a parent in a nursing facility is an agonizing decision and process for most people, so, your husband is not alone in his feelings. It's even more difficult when you have been the primary caregiver for that parent prior to the nursing home placement. The guilt the caregiver feels during the transition to the nursing home can be the result of one or more factors. It may come from feeling helpless when you want to do so much more for that parent or a feeling of deserting mom or dad. Sometimes the guilt comes form a sense of unfinished obligation to somehow pay the parent back for all the good things he or she has done for you over the years as your parent. More often than not, though, I think this kind of guilt is more the product of the overall grief process of anticipating the death of that parent which we may think will come soon because he or she has to be put in a nursing home. (This is true in some, but not all, cases.) In dealing with the guilt of his circumstance, nothing may need to be done as it may subside once he adjusts to having his mother in the nursing home. Making sure that his mother is well cared for can alleviate some of the feeling of deserting his mother, if this feeling has been a source of his guilt. Perhaps establishing a good rapport with the nursing home director and direct care staff can help toward this end as well. The director and social worker at the home will probably be able to help him with the tumultuous feelings he may feel during the transition period. Your husband can help himself, however, by reassuring himself that this decision is not an admission of defeat, desertion, or neglect. It is very acceptable and healthy for him to realize that his mother's care requires more than he and you both can provide at home. It is also quite OK for him to factor his and his family's needs into the caregiving equation and decide that the role of full-time caregiver (albeit a noble and important role) is too physically or psychologically taxing to provide proper in-home care for his mother, thus making nursing home placement the more optimal choice for all concerned. It is not selfish to give some consideration to one's own needs when doing so will not hurt anyone else nor deprive them of having their needs met. In cases like this, with powerful emotions at work, we must do our best to make the healthiest and most balanced decision we can make at the time, carry out the decision, and then resist the temptation to question our decision in hindsight. Your husband has undoubtedly successfully faced other tough, gut-wrenching choices in his life, so, I encourage him to look to those successes for strength, wisdom, and courage to negotiate his way through this currently difficult time in his life.



#### Hearing Slated in San Angelo to Chart **Course for Sheep/Goat Industry** submitted

The National Sheep Industry Improvement Center (Center) has slated a public hearing for May 6th in San Angelo, Texas, to identify ways to revitalize the nation's sheep and goat industry.

The hearing is scheduled to be held from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on May 6 at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center located at 7887 Highway 87 North in San Angelo. Another hearing will be held in Salt Lake City, Utah on May 7 at the Airport Hilton located at 5151 Wiley Post Way.

Testimony from these hearings and a previous hearing in Columbus, Ohio, will be used to develop a strategic plan for the Center, which will operate a revolving fund to help finance projects that improve marketing opportunities and infrastructure for the sheep and goat industry.

The Center was created by the 1996 Farm Bill and is initially being funded with \$20 million, and an additional \$30 million in federal funds that may be appropriated during the next ten years. Funding is being provided through the USDA Rural Business-Cooperative Service (RBS), an agency that falls under the Rural Development (formerly Farmers Home Administration) mission area. After the federal funding is obligated, the Center will have to be entirely supported by the sheep and goat industry.

### **April 1st Texas Cattle on Feed**

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.57 million head on April 1, up 7 percent from a year ago. According to the monthly report released by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, the estimate was up 3 percent from the March 1 level. Producers placed 585 thousand head in commercial feedlots during March, up 11 percent from a year ago and up 43 percent from the February, 1997 total. Texas commercial feeders marketed 500 thousand head during March, up 8 percent from a year ago.

personnel problems in the Nursing Facility.


