 The ARB is an independent hoard of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to
solve problems. If you tile a written request for an ARB hearing (called a noticc of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set

you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their delernination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to, reviell a your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representauve. The ARB will make tis decision based of the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 300 E Oak Street, Suite 2, Sonora, Texas. No'e: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its
order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.
Tax Payment
f you appeal and rour case is pending, you must pay the lesser in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.
