

# Mustangs Seeking Upset Against Steers

The Bovina Mustangs hope to accomplish this week what hasn't been done in the past 15 years -- get a football win over the Farwell Steers.

The Mustangs' chances of accomplishing the upset are considered possibly better than average this year since they have come on strong during the past two weeks. They have won from Happy 21-0 and from Springlake-Earth last week, 21-7.

Mustang fans, the optimi-

stic ones at least, believe their favorite team can come up with that long-awaited win over the Steers if they can continue to play as well or better than they did against Springlake-Earth.

The game, which is traditionally considered the most important on the Ponies' annual schedule, will be played at Farwell. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

"We believe we can beat Farwell," was the comment

of Mustang Coach Gib Hough this week as he led his team through spirited workouts in preparation for the contest. Bovina and Farwell are the only two undefeated teams remaining in the district.

Reports from the Mustangs practice field this week are that enthusiasm has never been higher.

Both Bovina and Farwell are 2-0 in District 3-A competition going into Friday

night's contest. The Steers have won over Hart, 80-7, in a mismatch and took a 45-20 win from the Happy Cowboys last week.

The Steers "will be tough" again this year, Coach Hough goes on to point out. They are led by their quarterback, Gene Sheets, a 160-pound senior. Another Steer standout is Brett Hargrove, a 140-pound junior.

The Mustangs are in good condition physically for the

Farwell match and it's a matter of tradition that they will be prepared mentally.

In spite of the fact, the Mustangs haven't come out on top score-wise since 1954, they usually play one of their better games of the season against the always-strong Blue and White team.

Against admittedly tough pre-district competition, the Steers got off to a poor, 0-3 start this season. They dropped games to Friona,

Dimmitt and Morton before getting on the winning track with the aforementioned verdicts over Hart and Happy.

For the season, the Mustangs are 3-2.

Winner of this week's game will then have a 3-0 district mark with a good chance for the district championship. All other teams in the eight-member league have at least one district loss. Thus, the winner

of the Bovina-Farwell tilt will be in the driver's seat for the championship race.

Because of the natural rivalry between the two schools and the fact that the game is only 12 miles away, a large following of Bovina fans is expected to be on hand for the tilt.

The Steers are defending district champions. They won last year's game with the Mustangs, 23-19. The Ponies rallied in the last half to almost come out on

top after spotting the Steers to a 20-0 advantage in the first half.

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We need to remember to move up the First Freeze Contest deadline again next year. This business of having the first freeze before the contest deadline is kinda embarrassing, if we remember correctly, we moved it up a few years ago. So, this will be twice the deadline has been moved forward.

Evidently, the early freeze this year won't be as disastrous as we had thought it might. Farmers are talking about the freeze hurting the cotton a certain percentage ---- from 10 to 25 ---- and that's a heap better than no crop at all.

### Cotton Crop Hurt --

An unseasonal blast of cold weather last week brought this Fall's first killing freeze to the area.

The spell of weather was accompanied by light snow Wednesday night and early Thursday morning. The killing freeze was registered as Friday morning, October 9, and was considered one of the earliest in history.

Unofficially, however, area agricultural leaders say the early freeze date was not a record-setter. A date of October 7 was registered in the early '60's.

Temperatures early Thursday morning, October 8, ranged from 28 to 34 degrees, according to Bovina Weatherman Willie Williams, but this was not considered "the" killing freeze. Friday morning, the mercury in area thermometers dropped to a consistent 27 degrees and this was chalked up as the killing freeze.

Fine snow flakes continued to fall until about noon Thursday, but then a clearing trend

developed and all traces of the snow had melted in a matter of a few hours.

Cotton, as usual, was the crop hurt more than others by the early freeze. Farmers and ginners agreed that the loss of cot-

ton would be some 10 to 25 per cent of the potential.

The freeze aided in the maturing of the grain sorghum crop which was in the process of being harvested.

A freeze usually causes an

increase in the sugar content of sugar beets so no loss is expected there.

Probably more unusual than the first freeze date was the earliness of the first snowfall.

While farmers might have been slightly disappointed at the early freeze date, they weren't overly pessimistic about it and left the impression that they knew an early freeze was possible when they planted this year's crop.

# City's Paving Project Gets Council's Okay

Bovina's city council formally accepted the recently completed paving project here at a Thursday night session.

Cost of the project, which consisted of some 12 blocks, was \$46,470.66. The bulk of that figure will be paid by property owners. Property owners' share of the overall cost is \$40,203.31. City's share is \$6,267.35. In addition, the city pays engineering fee of eight per cent --- \$3,720.72 and legal fees of \$523.50.

Statements were mailed to property owners Friday, following the meeting, informing them that the paving cost is now due. Time payment plans may be arranged at the city hall for property owners wishing to pay by this method, according to Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary.

The council also accepted 20.25 acres on Highway 86 as the location of community park.

The acreage was purchased from Bob Estes of Bovina and Bob McLean of Dimmitt with funds provided directly and indirectly by the former Panhandle Growers Labor Association.

A \$5 check accompanies the title in the contest sponsored by The Bovina Blade and W. E. Williams, Bovina's weatherman.

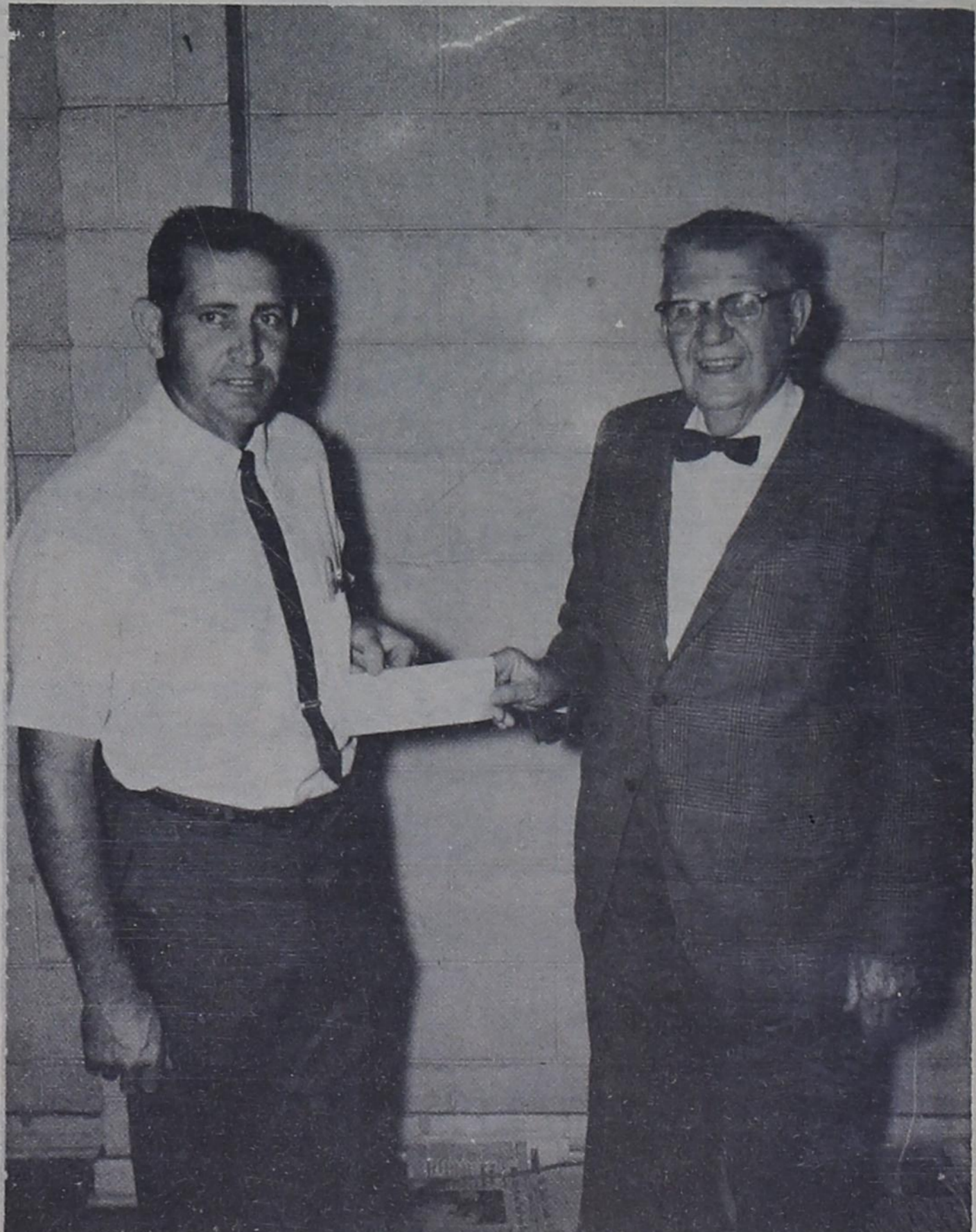

Deadline Jan. 31 --

### Voter Registration Opens For Residents

It is time to register for 1971 elections.

Registration for voting opened October 1 and continues until the deadline on January 31, 1971, County Tax-Assessor Collector Hugh Moseley announces.

Residents of Parmer County are urged to register early this year instead of waiting until the deadline nears, Moseley said. Those who register within the Oct. 1 through Jan. 31 period will be eligible to vote in elections held from March 1, 1971 until February 28, 1972.

No one can vote without having registered. There is only

one exemption for persons who are absent from their county of residence in active military service. There is no longer an exemption for persons over 60 years of age.

Requirements for voting, according to Elections Division, State of Texas, are: 1. Citizen of the United States; 2. Over 21 years old on the day of the election; 3. Resident of the State for at least one year immediately preceding election day; 4. Resident of the county for at least six months immediately preceding election day for county and city elections.

The election law also states that persons convicted of a felony who have not had their right of suffrage restored and persons who are under a judgment of mental incompetency cannot vote.

Applications are available at various places around Parmer County. They may be mailed in, or may be presented in person. Only the husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter may act as the voter's agent in applying for registration if voter cannot apply himself.

Those who will be 21 years of age before Jan. 31 must register before that date, the Elections Division states. However, persons becoming 21 after Jan. 31 may register during the regular period, and may also register at anytime afterward. The latter must have been registered for 30 days before they can vote in any election. For instance, a person who will be 21 in April may register now or after Jan. 31, if they register, for instance on May 1, the person cannot vote until May 31.

Moseley also announces he is accepting applications from persons who are 18, 19, or 20, in case the voting age is lowered a person will already be registered.

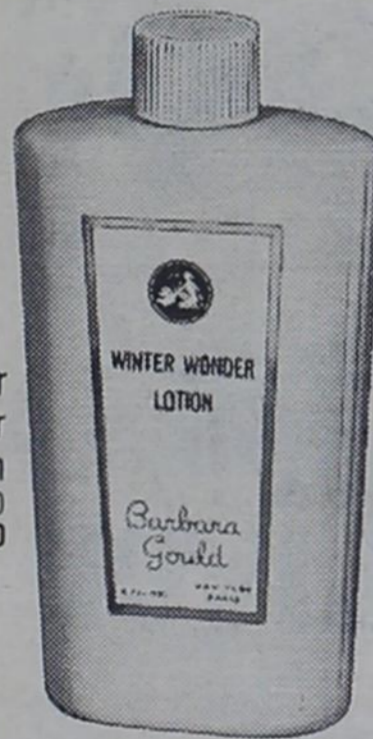

Here are a few of Edna's favorite recipes.

### CHOCOLATE REFRIGERATOR PIE

- 4 Hershey Almond candy bars
- 1/2 cup milk
- 20 large marshmallows
- 1/2 pint whipping cream
- 1 t. vanilla
- Melt marshmallows and candy bars in milk over low burner. Cool. Whip cream and fold into cooled mixture. Pour into crust and refrigerate about 4 hours before serving. May use a graham cracker or vanilla wafer crust.

### HARVEST PECAN CAKE

- 2 c. butter or margarine
- 4 1/2 c. sifted flour
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1 t. baking powder
- 6 eggs
- 1 pound box brown sugar
- 1/2 c. milk
- 1/2 c. granulated sugar
- 1 t. vanilla
- 3 T. instant coffee dissolved in 3 T. hot water
- 4 c. chopped pecans
- 1-Set out butter to soften
- 2-Sift together flour, salt, baking powder
- 3-grease bottom of 10 inch tube pan
- 4-Separate eggs; beat yolks well; beat egg whites until stiff.
- 5-In large mixing bowl, cream together butter and brown and white sugar. Add beaten egg yolks mixing well.
- 6-Combine milk, vanilla, dissolved coffee. Add alternately with dry ingredients.
- 7-Fold in pecans and egg whites. Pour into pan and bake at 325 degrees 1 1/2 hours. Let cool in pan on cake rack.

### CHICKEN BREAST IN CREAM

- 1 c. white wine (Sauterne or Rhine)
- 1 T. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 t. dry rosemary
- 1/2 pound cooked ham, cut in 1/2 inch cubes
- 1-4 ounce can chopped mushrooms
- 1 small can seedless grapes
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Brown chicken to golden in butter place in greased casserole. Blend flour in pan in which chicken was browned. Add cream and wine. Cook until thick and smooth, add rosemary, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper. Pour sauce over chicken, add ham and mushrooms. Bake covered in 325 degree oven for 45 minutes. Scatter grapes over top the last 10 minutes of cooking time. Serves 6.

# Mustangs Pull Off Major Upset With 21-7 Victory

The Bovina Mustangs pulled off a major District 3-A upset here Friday night as they whipped the favored Springlake-Earth Wolverines, 21-7.

Playing what was probably their best game of the year, the Mustangs were never behind in the contest. The score was tied 7-7 at the half, but after that Bovina was in command.

Mike Beauchamp ran the second half kickoff back 92 yards to send the Maroons back in front. Beauchamp let the ball get by him around the 15-yard line, but he followed the pigskin back to the eight picked it up and set sail on the touchdown jaunt which featured crisp blocking by his teammates and good running by the ballcarrier. Beauchamp was almost stopped at the Bovina 20, but broke loose from a swarm of tacklers to continue the successful effort.

The Ponies went out in front early, scoring the second time they had possession. Halfback Roy Ramirez got the score on a two-yard plunge. The touchdown capped a 10-play, 52-yard drive. The drive started with the Mustangs putting a Springlake-Earth punt in play at the Wolverine 47. A five-yard pen-

alty set the Bovina team back to their own 48, but Beauchamp got four, then 10 on a reverse and then 14 on a great twisting run, giving the Mustangs a first down on the 24. Ramirez made one to the 23 before Quarterback Mike Hough made nine and a first down on a keeper play. Hough then dropped a yard, back to the 15, but Ramirez got five to the 10. On the next play, a Hough to Jimmy Harris pass was incomplete near the goal line, but a penalty against the visitors gave the Mustangs a first down on the two and Ramirez went over on the first play from there.

Harris kicked the extra to make the score 7-0.

Springlake-Earth got the tying seven points early in the second period. Returning a Ramirez punt to the Bovina 35, the Wolverines scored in five plays. Halfback Eddie Alair went the final three yards after Quarterback Hoyt Glasscock set up the score with a 16-yard run from the 19. Glasscock, the big, do-everything quarterback for the Wolverines, kicked the point to tie the score. Linebacker Shannon Davis put the Mustangs in possession

of the ball for their final scoring drive late in the third period with a pass interception which he returned to the S-E 26-yard line. After a Hough to Harris pass went incomplete, Fullback Royce Sisk banged for 12 to the 14. Ramirez lost five yards on a fumbled pitchout, but retained possession. Then with the ball at the 19, Beauchamp took a pitch out down to the one yard line and scored on the next play.

Harris' kick was low, but good, and the scoring was all over at 21-7.

A tough Mustang defense kept the Wolverines at bay in the second half and two pass interceptions by the Mustangs in the fourth period kept the Wolverines from making a serious scoring threat.

Outstanding defensively for the Mustangs were Ends Bobby McMeans and Randy Chisum. Davis also played a good defensive game.

The win made the Mustangs' district record 2-0. The Wolverines are now 1-1 after winning over the Sudan Hornets the previous week.

For the season, Bovina is 3-2.

The win over the Wolverines was especially satisfying for the Mustangs. Not only were the visitors heavily favored, but they had blanked the Ponies 64-0 last year.

Beauchamp was the leading ballcarrier for the Mustangs with a total of 68 yards in 15 carries, not counting the kick-off return. Sisk made 48 yards in 12 carries. Ramirez had a net of 25 in 11 tries. Walter Martinez toted the leather three times for 14 yards.

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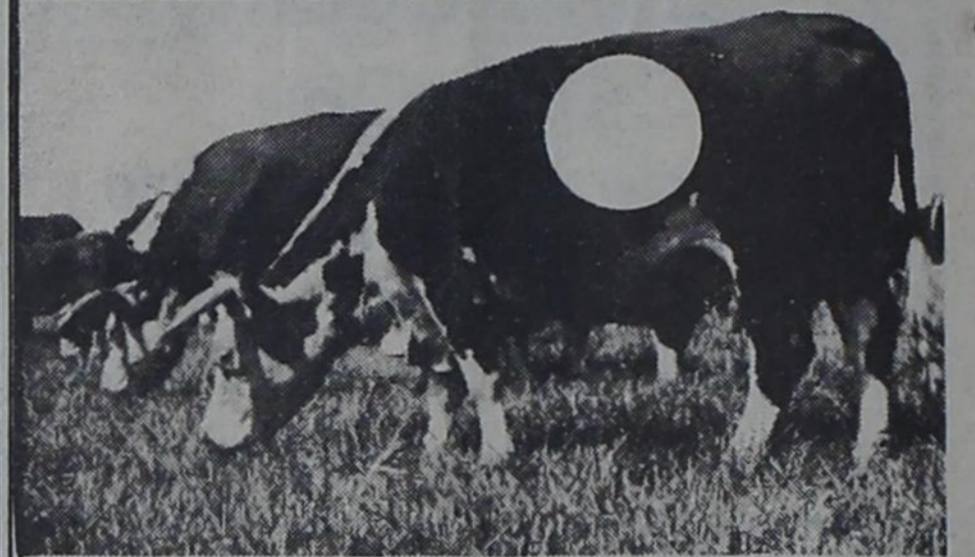
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
