Upset Against Steers

Dimmitt and Morton before getting on the winning track

The Bovina Mustangs hope to accomplish this week what hasn't been done in the past 15 years -- get a football win over the Farwell Steers.

The Mustangs' chances of accomplishing the upset are considered possibly better than average this year since they have come on strong during the past two weeks. They have won from Happy 21-0 and from Springlake-Earth last week, 21-7.

Mustang fans, the optimi-

stic ones at least, believe their favorite team can come up with that long-awaited win over the Steers if they can continue to play as well or better than they did against Springlake-Earth.

The game, which is traditionally considered the most important on the Ponies' annual schedule, will be played at Farwell. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

"We believe we can beat Farwell," was the comment of Mustang Coach Gib Hough this week as he led his team through spirited workouts in preparation for the contest. Bovina and Farwell are the only two undefeated teams remaining in the district.

Reports from the Mustangs practice field this week are that enthusiasm has never been higher.

Both Bovina and Farwell are 2-0 in District 3-A competition going into Friday night's contest. The Steers have won over Hart, 80-7. in a mismatch and took a 45-20 win from the Happy Cowboys last week.

The Steers "will be tough" again this year, Coach Hough goes on to point out. They are led by their quarterback, Gene Sheets, a 160-pound senior. Another Steer standout is Brett Hargrove, a 140-pound junior.

The Mustangs are in good condition physically for the

Farwell match and it's a matter of tradition that they will be prepared mentally.

In spite of the fact, the

Mustangs haven't come out on top score-wise since 1954, they usually play one of their better games of the season against the alwaysstrong Blue and White team.

Against admittedly tough pre-district competition, the Steers got off to a poor, 0-3 start this season. They dropped games to Friona, with the aforementioned verdicts over Hart and Hap-

For the season, the Mustangs are 3-2.

Winner of this week's game will then have a 3-0 district mark with a good chance for the district championship. All other teams in the eight-member league have at least one district loss. Thus, the winner of the Bovina-Farwell tilt will be in the driver's seat for the championship race.

Because of the natural rivalry between the two schools and the fact that the game is only 12 miles away, a large following of Bovina fans is expected to be on hand for the tilt.

The Steers are defending district champions. They won last year's game with the Mustangs, 23-19. The Ponies rallied in the last half to almost come out on

top after spotting the Steers to a 20-0 advantage in the first half.

Scores of the Bovina-Farwell games for the last 15 years, all in Farwell's favor, have been 0-6, in '55, 0-13 in '56, 12-38 in '57, 8-38 in '58, 12-36 in '59, 12-44 in '60, 0-6 in '61, 14-18 in '62, 0-46 in '63, 0-21 in '64, 0-6 in '65, 12-28 in '66, 6-7 in '67, 0-48 in '68 and 23-19 last year.

enthusiasm. Most dedicated Bovina fans think this just might be the year when the Mustangs take a win from the Big Blue team

over at the Capitol City.

Personally, we need to witness a win by the Ponies over the Steers to make our career as a sports spectator more complete. We've never seen Bovina defeat Farwell on the gridiron in our 16 years of following the Mustangs. The last time Bovina won this traditional game was in 1954 and we started eyeballing the contests on a continuous basis the next year, in '55.

For instance, we've even seen Texas A&M beat Texas Tech, believe it or not, but we haven't seen the Mustangs win over the Farwell club.

Most fans here feel this could be the year that the Mustangs break the Farwell jinx eventhough the Steers will be favored. The incentive is there, as always, the Mustangs have the ability, as we see it, and if Lady Luck will smile just ever so slightly in our favor, the outcome of the game could be different for a change.

We need to remember to move up the First Freeze Contest deadline again next year. This business of having the first freeze before the contest deadline is kinda embarrassing. If we remember correctly, we moved it up a few years ago. So, this will be twice the New Park Discussed -deadline has been moved forward.

Evidently, the early freeze this year won't be as disastrous as we had thought it might. Farmers are talking about the freeze hurting the cotton a certain percentage ---- from 10 to 25 ---- and that's a heap better than no crop at all.



# City's Paving Project Gets Council's Okay

Bovina's city council formally accepted the recently completed paving project here at a Thursday night session.

Cost of the project, which consisted of some 12 blocks, was \$46,470.66. The bulk of that figure will be paid by property owners. Property owners' share of the overall cost is \$40,203.31. City's share is \$6,267.35. In addition, the city pays engineering fee of eight per cent --- \$3,720.72 and legal fees of \$523,50.

Statements were mailed to property owners Friday, following the meeting, informing them that the paving cost is now due. Time payment plans may be arranged at the city hall for property owners wishing to pay by this method, according to Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary. \* \* \* \* \*
