The weatherman cooperated nicely for Santa's visit, too. Not always is the weather warm and sunshiny on the High Plains of Texas when outdoor activity


Roping Club Gives Fund

The \$450 was the profit made from donations for the saddle given away here Saturday afternoon.


Rouel Barron, president of Bovina Roping Club, said the members appreciate the cooperation of the residents of the area in the project of raising money for the Clinic Fund.



These two expressions "get religion" and "join the church" are not true to the Bible, yet many honest people have never questioned their correctness. God gave us the Bible, and even inspired the writers to use the correct words, I Cor. 2:13. We are told to speak as the oracles of God, I Peter 4:11. Religion is the way one lives, not something he "gets" by prayer, James 1:27. The Bible talks about our obeying the Gospel, II Thess. 1:8. An example: In Acts 2 the people to whom the Gospel was preached asked, "What shall we do?" Peter said, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Verse 41 says they that gladly received His word were baptized, and verse 47 says God added to the church daily such as should be saved. There is no question about who should be saved because Hebrews 5:9 shows that Jesus is the author of salvation to the obedient. 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





Oliver Pratt, the inspector, TREATMENT said "it is not necessary for cattle to be penned for inspection." Thank goodness. WHAT IS SCABIES?

Scabies in cattle is caused by parasitic mites of the psoroptes variety. These mites live in groups on the surface of the skin producing lesions that spread in all directions. The first lesions usually occur on the withers, over the back and around the root of the tail. The mite pricks the skin to obtain food and in so doing causes a slight inflamation. As the mites multiply, large numbers of small wounds are made and are followed by intense itching, and oozing of serum to the sur-

face. Serum soon hardens into yellowish or grayish color scabs which are frequently plant at Clovis without inspecstained with blood. As the disease advances, the

animal spends so much time licking, rubbing and scratching that it has very little time for feeding; consequently it loses weight, becomes weak and emaciated and occasionally dies from heavy infestations. WHAT TO WATCH FOR SCABIES

It is a good practice to observe all cattle at regular inber. and rough hair coat.

Texas statutes require that all animals in an infected lot be dipped twice in an approved manner and solution at 10 to 14 day intervals. WHY LOOK FOR IT?

It has been estimated that losses may run as high as one dollar per head per day for infected animals on feed. Cattle scabies not only causes

losses due to constant irritation but the economic impact on movement of cattle from Texas to other states is severe when an outbreak occurs.

Cattle in Parmer County are not under quarantine as some of the other counties are. Cattle from this county can move from here to the Clovis Livestock Auctions or the packing tion. If cattle are moved out into Mexico then the cattle must be inspected. Texas livestock industry can-





Both the couple's children finished high school in Bovina, as did Mrs. Hastings. Infact, after attending college in Canyon, Mrs. Hastings returned to Bovina and taught the first, second and third grades for a year.

In 1961 the Masonic Lodge presented Hastings with a 50year pen, having been a member that long, and now in 1966, he has been a Mason for 55 years. Mrs. Hastings was a charter member of the Order of Eastern Star here, although she claims she was never very active. Mrs. Hastings remains busy trying to find information on her family back in Pennsylvania. She has the old family Bible, published in 1856, which is printed in German with each page ornately surrounded by flowers and scroll work. 
