

In spite of the fact that the Bovina Mustangs are out of the running for the championship, this District 3-A is an interesting one.

This has been true since the opening round of mmes was played the fourth week of the season and continues to be as the football campaign progres-

Right now, for instance, no less than four teams are tied for the lead with one loss each. These are Farwell, Kress, Sudan and Vega, the team the Mustangs play here come Fri-

Anyone of those four could, of course, emerge with the championship flag.

Farwell and Sudan meet this week and that will eliminate one or the other. Vega can stay in the race with a win over the Mustangs and Kress could do likewise by knocking off Springlake-Earth as expected.

Out of the running, other than the Mustangs, are Happy, Hart

and S-E. Happy and Hart are both newcomers to the district this year and are getting pretty rough freshman initiation. Through the first five district games, neither has come out with a win. That situation will be changed this week, though, as the two cellar-dwellers meet each other at Happy. The Happy

Cowboys will be favored. Happy has been in Class A competition heretofore and probably has a better team than Hart. The Cowbovs were transferred into this league from one northeast of here. They played in the other district for a couple of years after making the move up from

Class B. The Hart team came into 3-A from Class B competition just this year. We'd guess the Longhorns don't much like their new environment and we don't blame them. In addition to being winless thus far, they've been trounced in all their encounters up to now. The Cowboys, on the other hand, have made respectable showings in their games and have nothing to be ashamed of except the winless record, which they're apt to In Bovina change come Friday night, as we said.

It would be nice to say that the district is strong and extra well-balanced. More accurate, though, is to say that 3-A is extra well-balanced. None of the teams in the loop have looked tough against outside oppo-

The Farwell Steers, for instance, were winless in their three pre-district games. Those three were against Class AA schools, however. Other teams didn't set anything on fire with their early performances, either.

Vega was one of the pre-season favorites for the erown and might prove its supporters to be right yet, but we doubt it. The Longhorns got off to a good start by beating Kress in the district opener, but then were



The tiles are made from polyester, nylon, polypropylene and other yarns. Shag tiles have become the most popular style.

The most popular size tile is 9 by 9 inches, but they are also available in 18 by 18 inches and sell for about 68 cents per square foot.

tempt to halt their current three game losing streak here Friday night as they meet the favored Vega Longhorns in District 3-A competition on Mustang Field. Game-time is 7:30.

The Longhorns are one of four teams in 3-A tied for the top spot with 4-1 records. In district play, the 'Horns have won over Kress, Springlake-Earth, Hart and Happy, Their lone loss was a 28-14 decision to the Sudan Hornets, the team which defeated the Mustangs last week, 39-26.

In addition to attempting to get their losing streak halted, the Ponies will be seeking revenge for a 20-19 setback suffered at the hands of the Longhorns in the final game of the 1969 season. Vega scored in the last two minutes to win that tilt from the Maroons.

This will be the next to last game of the year for the Bovina team which has a 3-5 record. Wins in the final two tilts would give them a 5-5 mark and would be an improvement over the 4-6 record of last year.

The 'Horns have been handicapped to some extent by injuries. Their powerful fullback, Ron Fangman, 185-pound senior, is not expected to see action because of an injury.

Vega lost only three seniors from a good team of a year ago and has 18 lettermen back from that group.

This is the second consecutive year for the 'Horns to field a better-than-average team.

Gib Hough, Mustang head coach, says the Vega team is similar to his own squad in that it runs the same offense and the defense is also much the same. "We'll be looking at ourselves when we play Vega," he indicates. Too, the teams are approximately equal from a physical standpoint.

The Mustangs, who also have been hurt by injuries to key personnel, came out of the Sudan clash "not any worse," says Coach Hough, "We're not any better, but we're not any worse, either."

Most of the Vega offense is based on a running attack, Hough says.


