

The Sutton County Hospital District Board of Directors, had a called meeting on Wednesday, August 2, 2000, at 12 noon in the Family Room at the Nursing Home. The following Directors were present Alvis Johnson, Jr. - President, Ray Smith - Vice President, Paul Chevalier, Virginia Epps, Preston Faris, Sherrill Dannheim. Also present were Dianne Dower - Administrator, employees and residents of the District and Kathy Knight, Board Secretary.

After being called to order, upon a motion by Preston Faris, seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, the Board appointed Juanita Mesa as Election Judge for the August 26,

2000, election. Ray Smith made the motion to appoint the office personnel as early voting clerks, which includes: Kathy Knight, Carolyn Lara, Pete Samaniego, Donna Schooley, Vickie Cooke, Lydia G. Martinez, Belinda Robles, and Sheila Richter, for the August 26, 2000, election. Virginia Epps seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Mrs. Dower presented two budgets for 2001. Dower stated that one budget was with the Nursing Home closed and the other was with the Nursing Home open, Mrs. Dower had attached assumptions for each of the budgets. The Board discussed the \$150,000 deficient that the District started the year with, due to the use of the 2000 tax money at the end of 1999. There was an in depth discussion regarding the balancing of the 2001 budget with the Nursing Home open versus with the Nursing Home closed. If the Nursing Home remains open, in the fall of 2001, the District would be out of money. Discussion was held regarding the election and the raising of taxes to .35 cents, if the election passes. Even going to Legislature to raise


2:30 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. Shannon Gillespie

Sonora Showdown Results





on John Eaton and the early football team, if you have any? A. Devil's River News, Octo-

ber 23, 1920

Saturday, October 16th, in a hard fought battle waged on the local gridiron, the Sonora High School Eleven defeated the Ozona football team 24 to 15. Both teams fought hard every minute of the game, but it was evident from the beginning that the local team had the edge on the visitors especially in team work. They were able to gain consistently with end runs, not because of any noticeable weakness of the Ozona team, but because of strong interference put up by the local boys. Line plunging was also used to quite an advantage in the latter part of the game.

The visitors at first made frequent gains through the Sonora line but soon that line buckled down and Ozona had to quit bucking the line because it became impenetrable. Forward passing was used quite successfully by Ozona, one of their touchdowns being made from a pass. The Ozona team deserves special mention for a feat seldom accomplished in High School football, that was a field goal made by a drop kick from the thirty yard line.

It would be hard to name the stars of the Sonora team without naming them all for each man played his position exceeding well. Graydon Rees at quarter was the mainstay of the team although he was hurt early in the game he played __ _. Horace Rees at fullback was indeed a star at line plunging. Albert Runnels, right half, did some fine tackling, making numerous tackles behind the line. Curtis Edens at left half did splendid work on defense as well as in offensive. Clyde Martin the

speedy right end, made some very spectacular runs during the game. Lum Trainer, the left end, was in the game every minute, breaking up many plays coming around his end. One of the outstanding features of the game was the way the Sonora line held. Merck and Hebert tackles and Logan and John Martin were responsible for this. John Eaton played a remarkable game at center making every pass good and always

A. Devil's River News, October

The mail car and about twenty sacks of mail for Sonora was destroyed by fire Monday afternoon about twelve miles north of here. The driver, J. C. Spillner, had put out the mail at the Earnest box and had gone but a short distance when he smelt smoke and looking back found the car in flames. He saved the lock or letter pouches but was unable to save anything else. The car burned up and the gasoline tank exploded. It is of course not known what the value of the mail and parcel post amounted to but the saving of the letter mail was indeed fortunate as it will enable a near adjustment of the losses. The carrier has no theory as to the cause of the fire. A ranchman at the 12 mile ranch saw the car on

fire and tried to attract the drivers attention to it; a car going north passed the mail car a few minutes before the fire and says there was no indication of fire as he passed. A traveler arrived while the mail was still burning and brought the letter mail and carrier to town. Postmaster Murray at once notified the Inspectors department. There was not much express on the car and the loss from that source will not amount to

Meeting to discuss the Budget for the Year 2001 and related matters. The facts and figures were discussed and the conclusion was unanimously reached that the Nursing Home must be closed, no matter what. It is apparent that no alternatives were ever realistically considered so that additional revenue sources might be brought in. The use of taxes could then cover the deficiencies of revenue at the Nursing Home. "Full speed ahead, damn the torpedoes" was the clarion call of the Board.

The only stated reason given for not having a Motion "to close the Nursing Home immediately" was that the Meeting was a "Called Meeting" and "It would look bad to close the Nursing Home at a Called Meeting. The decision had been previously made and was reaffirmed "to close the Nursing Home on October 1, 2000" at a vote at the next Regular Meeting. No "ifs," "ands," or buts".

From the information presented at the Meeting, there is no other alternative. The Hospital District lost \$151,795 in 1999. This year the District may not collect all the taxes due because of a bankruptcy. The year will end with another loss. It seems to be disingenuous, at best, that the Board firmly believes that, by closing the Nursing Home, the Hospital can survive without additional sources of revenue. The Budget for 2001 calls for all taxes to be collected, no unplanned major repairs and no deviation from the Budget. If the history of the last few years can teach us anything, these three factors are not foregone conclusions, MUCH LESS A SUGGESTED DECREASE IN THE TAX RATE.

A realistic perusal of the hospital building suggests that many repairs and much remodeling nee'i to be done. Yet, there is no Replacement Fund. The unfunded accumulated depreciation of Property and Equipment (at cost) is \$1,176,665. To upgrade the Property and Equipment to current standards will cost several times that amount. The unspoken solution is

At this same meeting, the Board went on record to ask the local representative in the Texas Legislature to introduce enabling legislation next year to raise the tax cap for the Hospital District to \$0.75 per \$100.00.

Finally, the Board discussed some "severance package" as the "decent thing" to do for those employees who will be terminated. The Board missed an opportunity to provide the necessary counseling for the residents and the staff. Many of these persons have worked, lived together, enjoyed many happy occasions and felt sad losses by the deaths of other residents, but now are experiencing a heart-rendering separation, not of their own choosing. Once again, the "bottom line" got in the way of compassion. As human beings, not necessarily believers in God, the Board

The community must have a clear hope that the Board will spend the necessary energy, if not funds, so that the necessary public relations, timely and sufficient information will be offered in the future and in ample time for discussion, input and help from the public. The common good of each and every citizen must be the goal of government at every level. The presentation of the best available information in a clear and timely manner

It is unfortunate that the Nursing Home is being forced to close because of the lack of adequate information in the past and the resultant lack of commitment. This same situation must not be allowed to happen to the Hospital. It can easily happen, or the tax burden to maintain a hospital

Soon, the Nursing Home will be past history and a stark empty building. The care of the elderly, the long-term sick and the needy will no longer be near at hand. Sutton County will loose in many other ways. The

If the raise in the tax cap is passed, an election could be held at any time in the future to raise the cap, if necessary. Closure of the Nursing Home will be on the agenda for the August 14, 2000, regular meeting. No action was taken at this time.
