County Ropers and Mutton Bustin' Winner To Nursing Home to Close in Thirty Days.

The regular meeting of the Sutton County Hospital District, Board of Directors, was held on Monday, August 14, 2000 at 7:00 p.m. at the Civic Center. The following Directors were present: Alvis Johnson, Jr. - President, Ray Smith - Vice President, Paul Chevalier, Preston Faris, Virginia Epps, Lewis Allen and Sherrill Dannheim. Also present were Dianne Dower - Administrator, residents and employees of the District and Kathy Knight- Board Secretary.

Dr. Johnson called the meeting to order and advised the first item of business was to go into Executive session under article #6252-17 (VATS), as amended by Citation #496. The purpose of said session was Personnel Wages.

After the Board reconvened into open session Dr. Johnson advised that personnel of the Nursing Home were discussed with regards to the ones that have left and/or are leaving. Dr. Johnson advised severance pay was discussed and stated that no action was needed at this time.

The minutes were inadvertently left off the agenda and will be approved at the next meeting.

Upon a motion by Ray Smith, seconded by Sherrill Dannheim, the Board appointed Juanita Mesa as Absentee Ballot Board Judge for the election of August 26, 2000.

A discussion regarding the letter from Rev. Wm.R. Du Buisson, O.M. I. was held.

The Board advised that with the budget presented at the last meeting, there is no way to raise enough taxes to support the Nursing Home. Paul Chevalier advised that many residents have already moved. he also told that several employees have resigned and some have been laid off. Chevalier then made the motion to close the Nursing Home as of September 15, 2000. Virgina Epps seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Dr. Johnson advised that discussion had been held in executive session on benefits to be paid to the employees that are being laid off. Vacation and holidays earned by each employee will be paid. The Board will try and arrive at a satisfactory severance pay package for the employees. Preston Faris mad the motion to direct the Administrator to put together a severance pay package and present it at the special meeting being held to canvas ballots. Sherrill Dannheim seconded the motion and it carried.

Dianne Dower presented the 2001 budget with the adjustments to the line items discussed at the special budget meeting on August 2, 2000. Dower advised she had included several line items for a contingency fund, consultant search firm for lab, and the bankruptcy debt. Lengthy discussion was held regarding the contingency fund. Discussion of the \$150,000 shortfall for the 2000 budget was held. Discussion was also held on the severance pay package coming out of this year' budgets. Ray Smith made a motion to table the budget and the setting of the tax rate until the special meeting to canvas the ballots.

Lewis Allen seconded the motion and the motion carried.

The Board reviewed the list of Hospital vendors and contracted services. A motion was made by Smith, seconded by Faris to approve the list of vendors and contracted services. Motion carried.

Dower reported that the new xray equipment has been installed and is up and running. She reported that the accounts receivable for the Hospital was at \$379,625.00. This is the lowest it has been in several years. Dower commended the office staff for their work on getting the A/R down. Ray Smith advised that he had been taking care of the Life Line, for the Committee on Aging, since 1985. Smith advised that one of the Hospital employees will now be responsible for this, with one other person helping. The nurses at the Hospital respond when the Life-Line goes off and contact the person or responder to check on that person.

Kathy Knight gave the financial report for June. The Nursing Home had a loss of \$29,203 which is \$233.56 under budget. The Hospital had an operating loss of \$60,830, which is \$9,736 under budget, with a net loss for June of \$43,614, which is \$74,193.74 under budget.

Upon a motion by Ray Smith, seconded by Lewis Allen, the Board approved the July expenditures.

After several questions and comments from residents of the District, the meeting was adjourned.

County Votes to Keep Two Sutton County Days Sewing Exhibit Trappers_

The Sutton County Commissioners Court met with a full house on Monday, August 14, 2000. Ranchers from all over Sutton County filled the room and hallway to hear what decision was made on retaining two Government Trappers. The court was discussing the current budget, and necessary cuts. One of the Trapper positions was up for discussion of possibly being cut. Mr. Dorsett addressed the Court with figures taken last year and so far this year, regarding predator control and helicopter use. Dorsett reported that there were 80 ranches worked in Sutton County in the 1999 fiscal year. On the 80 ranches, 14 hours of aerial hunting hours using the helicopter were reported. The predator take for these ranches were: 10 coyotes, 15 bobcats, 6 red fox, 61 gray fox, 174 feral hogs and 87 raccoons. For the 2000 fiscal year this far he reported 68 ranches worked with 8.5 helicopter hours. On these ranches there have been 6 coyotes, 18 bobcats, 7 red fox, 28 gray fox, 133 feral hogs and 106 raccoons.

Dorsett said that there aren't many coyotes taken in this county, but that is because the trappers are keeping them out, thus keeping them from reproducing.

When asked how many ranches were worked each year, Dorsett reported that the number depends on the number of calls received asking for assistance, but that all ranches were able to use the trappers because they are county funded. Commissioner Mike Villanueva proposed that the county continue to fund only one of the trappers and the ranchers fund the second and made a motion on this proposal. A discussion then took place regarding this motion. Commissioner Bill

Keel said that he felt the numbers of predators were low because the Trappers were doing a good job. He went on to comment that if they let this program go, then Sutton County will lose agricultural economy and the ranchers will be out of money, therefore unable to pay taxes. Keel said that he felt this program is as important as any program in the county.

Sutton County resident and rancher, Marvin Shurley then asked to address the court. Shurley advised the court of statistics that reported over \$20 million lost in 1999 due to predatory animals killing livestock. He went on to say that he felt this program was too important to Sutton County to be cut at this time and that by doing so could cause conflict at a later date.

The motion then died due to the lack of a second.

A motion was then made and seconded to retain both Trappers. Votes were 3 for and 1 against.

Mike Villanueva requested that it be made clear that he was not trying to do away with the program, only trying to make necessary cuts in all areas so as to help the budget.

Prior to this discussion a motion was made, and it was approved to allow Jed Davenport from the Probation office to budget an additional \$6800 this year, so as to employ a juvenile officer. There have been an increase in juvenile cases this year and the probation office is trying to get a handle on this situation. The employee will be in an office at the school and be available for "at risk" students as well as students already in trouble.

Continuing with the budget discussion, Deedie McIntire of the County Tax Assessor's Office, vehi-



Judge Caleb Davis Smith of Del Rio was a physician in Sonora until 1912 when he left here to live in Del Rio. He died in Del Rio at the age of 73, had been a federal commissioner in Del Rio as well as city corporation judge. He was found dead at his home recently by two custom officers who went there to bring him to town to conduct a hearing in United States Commissioner's Court.

Caleb Smith had graduated from Southwestern University,

Georgetown, and from medical college in Baltimore. He practiced near Tyler, his boyhood home and in Stamford and Sonora. In 1912 he went to Del Rio and engaged in ranching. He was a Mason and a member of the First Methodist Church. His father the Rev. Caleb Smith was a noted minister of the Methodist denomination.

Judge Smith was buried in Del Rio and on the day of his funeral the city flew the flag at half mast. "Val Verde County Cemeteries 1879 -1989" states that Dr. Caleb D. Smith died on December 8, 1934 and is buried in block 2, lot 17A of the Masonic Cemetery in Del Rio.


period of the scarlet fever epidemic. His salary will be \$25 a week.

I would like to point out that the Board and the hospital administration did not miss the opportunity to provide counseling for the residents, their families, and the staff. The hospital retains a social worker, Sherri Munsey, who visits the Nursing Home on a regular basis to counsel about any problems that exist. She has been aware from the beginning, of the disruption and distress the closing of the Nursing Home has engendered, and has been offering assistance and counseling in dealing with these feelings.

Marci Aranda SWA-LPC, (Social Work Assistant - Licensed Professional Counselor) a Regional Ombudsman for the Area Agency on Aging of the Concho Valley, was contacted. She has been a frequent and welcome visitor to the Nursing Home in the past. I arranged for her to come for two days to hold In-services on Anger, Grief, Change, and Resolution. These counseling sessions allow persons to work through emotional stages related to grief/job loss. Discussion cover denial, anger, depression, reorganization, and resolution. Mrs. Aranda was in the nursing home from 10 AM to 5 PM on these two days, holding group discussions with residents and staff in the common areas before and after the scheduled In-service day. A notice was posted on the bulletin board that she would be happy to counsel one on one with any person who wished to make an appointment. No appointments were made. The regular social worker, Sherri Munsey, was called in from Bronte for additional visits and participated in the entire two-day effort with Marci Aranda in coming to grips with these troubling circumstances.

I have no knowledge of whether Reverend Du Buisson or other local ministers have provided counseling, but the Hospital District Board and the hospital administration have done what was in their power to alleviate this situation.

AEP-West Texas Utilities Supports Emergency Policy on Disconnections

Abilene, TX- AEP-West Texas Utilities (WTU) today issued a statement praising the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) for adopting an emergency policy prohibiting disconnection of electric service to residential customers agreeing to deferred payment plans. The policy goes into effect immediately and will continue through Sept. 30.

A press release issued Thursday by the PUCT states that, "Effective immediately through September, Texas electric utilities are prohibited from disconnection service to residential customers for non-payment if the customer has agreed to a deferred payment plan for past due amounts."

The rule adopted by the Public

Abilene, TX- AEP-West Texas Utilities (WTU) today issued a statement praising the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) for adopting an emergency policy probibitize disconnection. The rule does not apply to municipal utilities and electric cooperatives, which are not sub-

ject to PUC regulation." Alphonso Jackson, American Electric Power-Texas state president praised the action, saying, "We urge customers to take whatever precautions necessary to ensure their safety during this current heat wave. That's why we support this emergency policy. We encourage customers who are having difficulty in paying their bills to contact us as soon as possible so that payment arrangements can be made. Taking this action will lessen the possibility of customers having to face a large past-due bill at some later date







LMAAP Program

Farm Service Agency personnel attended training in Fredericksburg on August 8th concerning the Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program (LMAAP).

This LMAAP program application for Year 1, covering a period from July 22, 1999 through September 30, 2000, has three types of payments. This application may benefit sheep producers who have purchased a ram, made an improvement on a facility that benefited their sheep and lamb operation or have their sheep enrolled in a sheep improvement program. Deadline for application for Year 1 is October 13, 2000.

The LMAAP for Year 2 and 3 will apply to producers who raise feeder or slaughter lambs. It will pay producers \$3.00 per head for certain feeder lambs owned at least 30 days and sold after August 1, 2000 thru July 31, 2002. IMPOR-TANT: Producers who plan to sell feeder lambs must either self certify their lambs 3 working days prior to the sale or request ear tags for their lambs. Your local FSA Office has the forms that are used for the selfcertification of these lambs. This

will pay producers \$5.00 per head for certain slaughter lambs owned at least 30 days and sold after August 1, 2000 thru July 31, 2002. Slaughter lambs must meet certain USDA standards. Slaughter facilities will provide USDA inspectors on site that will certify your application.
