WE HAVE COMMENTED before on how the mass media can play up the news so as to make it look like the United States, or at least segments of it, may be headed down the drain.

One of the latest targets, you have noted, is the automobile industry, which is laying off thousands of employees for the month of December.

However, we learn that this isn't necessarily an indication of impending doom. We learn that the auto plants have a history of this tactic for this season of the year, and the situation varies from one year to another.

The mass jumped onto the cattle industry a little over a year ago, and helped bring about the price freezes, and the resulting bad situation for the cattle industry.

Some of the people in congress are almost as bad. They now have a movement to do away with the oil depletion allowance, claiming it will bring in millions of dollars in tax money.

What they fail to realize is the fact that these millions of dollars will likely be made up by the oil and gas industry in the form of yet more increases in petroleum products.

It would seem to us that the congress would be wise to let well enough alone in the case of the oil depletion allowance.

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It is sad but no real surprise to see the United Nations acting more like a catalyst for war than an instrument of peace.

That conclusion is difficult to avoid after the spectacle which the world body has made of itself in recent weeks.

First, there is the vendetta waged against South Africa at the very moment when the white government in Pretoria is making a major effort to reach a genuine settlement with Black Africa and thus to avoid a major racial conflagration. On October 23 Prime Minister Vorster made a very conciliatory speech on the question of Rhodesia and South West Africa, and his U.N. delegate promised that South Africa would no longer condone discrimination based on race or color.

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Did that help? Not at all. On October 30 only a U.S., British, and French veto in the Security Council prevented the total expulsion of South Africa from the U.N. And a few days later, the General Assembly, in total disregard of the U.N. Charter, suspended South Africa from participating in the current session.

Such irresponsibility by an unbridled majority, many of which, like the Soviet Union, trample on human rights and practice colonialism on other peoples to an extent totally unknown in South Africa, boggles the imagination. It can only make more difficult the search for a peaceful solution to the problems of southern Africa.

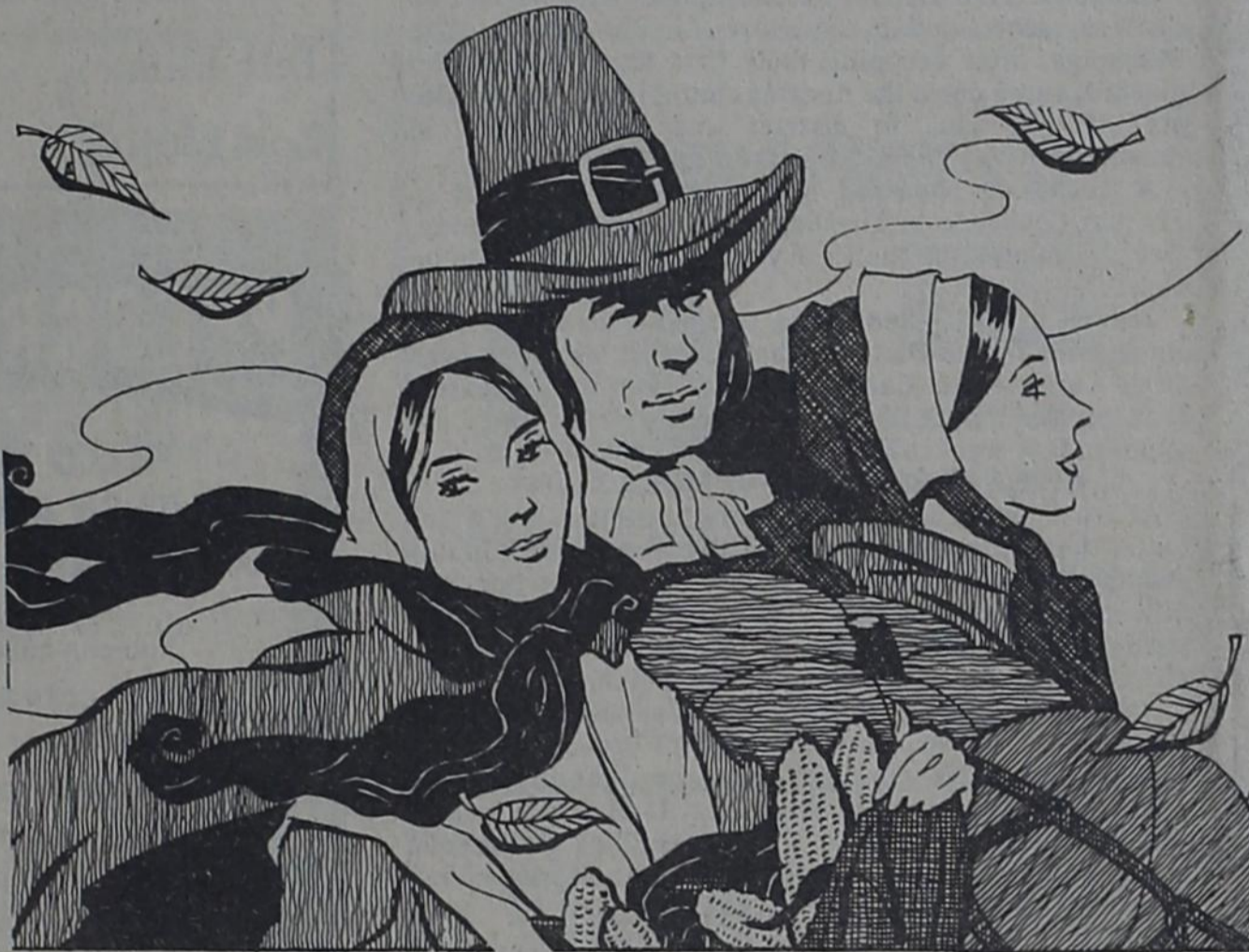
Then, in total contrast to this act of ostracism, there was the wild hero's welcome given by the U.N. to the Palestine Liberation Organization chieftain, Yasser Arafat, and to his uncompromising speech demanding the dismantling of the state of Israel. No nation can be expected to acquiesce in its destruction; so Arafat's speech was clearly

W. E. Williams Rites Held Here

Funeral services for William Elmer (Willie) Williams, 79, of Bovina were held Monday afternoon in the First United Methodist Church of Bovina.

Officiating were Rev. Howard Marcom, pastor, and Rev. L.L. Hill, associate pastor of Polk Street United Methodist Church in Amarillo and brother-in-law of Mr. Williams. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under

direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona. Mr. Williams died at 3 a.m. Saturday in Veterans Hospital in Amarillo after a two-month illness.

A native of Johnsville, Okla., Mr. Williams moved to Bovina in 1920. He owned and operated a grocery store from 1921 until the early 1930s. He established Williams Mercantile Co. in 1932 and sold the firm in

Nov. 1964 when he retired. Mr. Williams began writing "Willie's Weather" for The Bovina Blade on Oct. 9, 1957, and his weather predictions had been a regular Page One feature from that time until his recent illness.

A member of the Bovina United Methodist Church, Mr. Williams was active in church affairs and was a long-time member of the choir there. He was a member of the board of trustees of Bovina Schools for 19 years. He also helped form the first chamber of commerce in Bovina.

Mr. Williams became a member of the Farwell Masonic Lodge No. 977 A.F. & A.M. in January 1924. He was honored by the lodge in February for 50 years continuous service. He was a 32nd Degree Mason and a KCCH. He had been active in Masonic civic affairs in West Texas since 1919. He was a veteran of World War I.

He was married to the former Miss Leola Denney Aug. 30, 1922, at Farwell.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Willie Small of Austin and Mrs. Jack Barnett of Dallas; a son, Charles Williams of Allen; two

Hunt To Span Three Weekends

The 1974 pheasant season will be somewhat later than usual this year—running December 14-29.

However, the word from the game officials in Parmer County is that the pheasant crop will be very "short" this year—with one of the least productive years expected since open seasons have been held in the county.

Reason for the short crop, or at least the explanation given by Parmer County Game Association official Jack Patterson, was that the county's pheasants didn't get a good "hatch" this past spring.

"I personally had 15 to 18 hens in a wheat field near by house, with about eight cocks. The hens should have nested, and there should have been a real good hatch, but we didn't get it," Patterson says.

The county game official

says it's a matter of opinion as to why the hatch was poor. "It might have been caused by the drought. Or, it might have been the spray we had to put on the wheat (because of the extremely dry winter, wheat farmers were obliged to spray their crops two or three times)."

Patterson said that in harvesting his wheat, he saw only seven small pheasants from the new crop, from the 18 hens. "There was one hen with four young ones, another with one, and there were two young birds by themselves. I saw numbers of hens without chicks at all," he says.

It was Patterson's opinion that this year's pheasant crop will be less than half the size it has been in recent years, and estimates that on his own property, the population might be as low as one-fourth normal.

He said he had visited in the quail areas in New Mexico, and apparently the quail crop has been affected in much the same manner as the 1974 pheasant crop.

Recalling the tremendous pheasant crop of last year, Patterson pointed out that this followed the "big, bad" winter of 1972-73, which was one of the wettest in recent history.

Patterson said he didn't think the open season would further hurt the pheasant situation.

"There are always plenty of cocks for breeding stock. You only need one for every eight hens or so.

However, he reminded area farmers of their need to leave some cover for the birds, to help them through the winter.

"A lot of fellows apparently forget to do this, whether they plan to use their land the following

spring or not, many go ahead and clear it. If they would leave the cover for the birds to use, it would be a big help in their survival," he points out. The ardent game fan stated that the critical months for the birds are January, February and March. After that, they begin to move into the wheat fields.

"If we'll leave more cover, we'll have more birds," Patterson says.

The later season for hunting pheasants should prove popular with college hunters, who can be home for a portion of the season. The season is set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and the local association has nothing to do with the season, unless it should determine that the county should have a closed season. This has to be done some months ahead of the season.

Andy Martinez Wins 1st; Tabor's Lead Cut To Two

With only one week remaining in the 1974 Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest, Emmett Tabor's lead was cut to two in the race for the grand prize in the contest—an expense paid trip for two to the 1975 Cotton Bowl game in Dallas.

Tabor, with six correct predictions last week, increased his total to 88 points. Mrs. Hattie Burnett came up with seven correct predictions to move within two points of Tabor with a total of 86.

Martinez missed the Lefors win over Sundown in Class B bi-district action and picked Petersburg to defeat Hart, 21-12, 15 points off the actual 24-0 score.

Danny Stanberry and Mrs. Kathy Boozer split second and third place money of \$5 for \$2.50 each. Both contestants were 17 points off on the tiebreaker score. Stanberry missed the Arkansas win over Texas Tech and predicted a 24-17 Petersburg victory. Mrs. Boozer missed the Lefors win and predicted a 14-7 Petersburg win.

Arrest Ten Men On Drug Charges

Ten men, six of whom were from out-of-state, were charged with possession of marijuana last week by law enforcement officers in Parmer County.

On Wednesday of last week, a collision between a 1972 Cadillac with New York license plates and a 1974 Chevrolet truck, owned by C.E. Trimble and A.L. Nuttall of Bovina, led to the arrest of three men on charges of possession of less

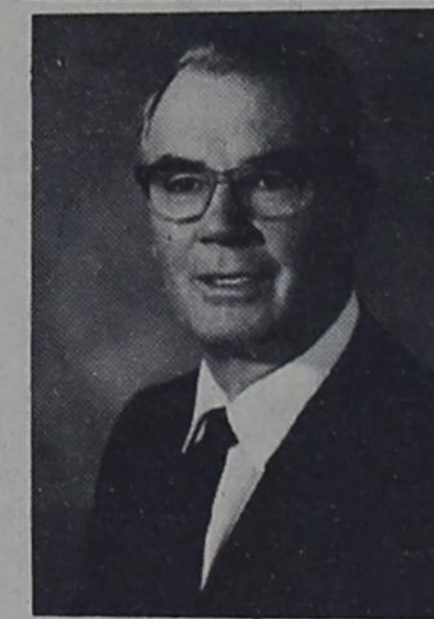
than two ounces of marijuana.

The accident occurred about 3 p.m. at Sherry Grain Co. on Highway 60 when the driver of the Cadillac attempted to pass the loaded grain truck as it was making a left turn into the elevator driveway. Arrested on possession charges were Brock Estes and Lance Estes of Connecticut and Wayne Urbanak of Arizona. The three men were fined \$200 and costs each in the Justice of the Peace Court at Farwell. Highway Patrolman Glen Fant and City Marshal Ronald Mitchell worked the accident.

Highway Patrolman Royce Keck and Jimmy Humphries arrested three out-of-state men Friday night about three miles east of Bovina on U.S. Highway 86 on possession of two to four ounces of marijuana, a Class A misdemeanor. Mitchell Jorgensen, 21, of Montana, Herman J. Hebert Jr., 24, of Louisiana, and Robert L. Alexander, 19, of Ft. Worth were fined \$150 plus court costs each at Farwell.

On Saturday night, Mitchell, Humphries and Keck arrested three Bovina men near the bridge on U.S. Highway 60 east of Bovina on charges of possession of under two ounces of marijuana. Alvino Hernandez, 20, Alfonso Delgado, 21, and Zeferin Villareal, 21, were fined \$100 plus court costs each at Farwell.

Humphries and Keck arrested Terry Lee Thompson, 18, of Friona Sunday on charges of possession of under two ounces. He was fined \$100 and court costs.

Two 10-cent traditional Christmas postage stamps are presently on sale at the Bovina post office. This year's Christmas

Masterpiece stamp is based upon a detail from "The Perussis Altarpiece," a large oil painting which hangs in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. Designer of the stamp is Bradbury Thompson of Riverside, Connecticut.

Prayer Breakfast Monday

The second monthly Bovina Men's Fellowship Prayer Breakfast will be held Monday from 6:30 to 7:30 a.m. at Fellowship Hall of the Bovina First United Methodist Church, according to Stanley Klimek, a member of the breakfast committee.

The stamp features an angel taken from the central of the five panels making up the large altarpiece painting. The angel is one of two in the center panel—one is depicted in flight on either side of the upright portion of the cross that dominates the panel.

The host church will provide the breakfast and laymen of the church will be in charge of the brief program.

The identity of the artist who painted the altarpiece is unknown. The painting is known to have been done in 1480, although it is not known where it was hung upon completion.

The breakfasts are held the first Monday each month at local churches.

The second Christmas stamp is taken from an 1853 lithographic print, "The Road, Winter," by the firm Currier and Ives. The drawing was done on the lithography stone by Otto Knirsch, one of the celebrated American artists Nathaniel Currier employed to produce drawings that were to be colored on an assembly line of girls, each of whom applied a single color.

St. Ann's Catholic Church will host the breakfast in January.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 25, 1959

Tommy's Western Wear, Bovina's newest business, will open Friday in a new building on Highway 60. Owned by Tommy Williams, the business will feature western clothing for men, women and children.

TEN YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 25, 1964

Riding high on a seven-game winning streak and their recently-won District 1-B championship, Bovina's Mustangs will meet Sundown tomorrow (Thursday) night in Farwell in bi-district competition.

Sundown is the District 2-B champion with a perfect 4-0 district record and a 6-4 mark for the season. The Mustangs, after dropping their first three non-district clashes, came down the district championship path with six straight wins in district and one decision in non-district play for a 7-3 season mark.

A week-long pheasant season will be in effect in Parmer County from Tuesday, Dec. 1, through Monday, Dec. 7. This will be the first year for open season to be observed here.

FIVE YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 26, 1969

At least one crop in the Bovina area is turning out better than expected this year. With cotton harvest in full swing, production is above that predicted earlier this fall, gin operators state. With trailers waiting on the yards to be ginned, approximately 2900 bales have already been ginned in Bovina and Oklahoma Lane.

Residents of this community have once again been saddened by the death of three of its long-time pioneer residents-Ray Sudderth, Oscar Combs and Willie Williams-within the span of a couple of weeks.

While we didn't know Mr. Sudderth, we had known Mr. Combs and Willie since we moved here 10 years ago. Among many other recollections, those of us who appreciate music will long remember the latter two men for their beautiful voices in their respective church choirs.

During the past 17 years, give or take a few weeks, Willie has predicted the weather some 884 times for Blade readers with about 85 per cent accuracy. Some time ago, when he was asked how he went about figuring out what the weather was going to do in West Texas and Bovina in particular, Willie said he based his predictions on the moon and stars, and sometimes "it is just hunches and sometimes it's just to disagree with Dan True (an Amarillo TV weatherman)."

One of Willie's weather reports in the spring of 1966 made the Associated Press wires and appeared in almost every daily newspaper in the nation.

On April 5, 1966, Bovina received a freakish four-to-eight-inch snowfall while surrounding towns only received traces. The trees already had new leaves and peach trees were blooming. Willie had predicted "moisture by the weekend," but admitted he had rain in mind. Following the report in newspapers across the nation, Willie heard from many old friends over Texas as well as other states.

We always enjoyed his weather predictions, too, because he managed to inject a sense of humor even in the midst of droughts, floods, blizzards, etc.

Friends of ours brought this little Russian "tale with a moral" by the office and thought it might be worth printing. Let everyone use their judgement, but believe we've been there.

"Whistle Softly"

An old Russian peasant was going along the road one very cold morning, when he saw a bird lying on the ground. At first he thought it was dead, but when he picked it up he felt a faint heartbeat.

He tried to revive the bird by blowing on it and putting it under his sheepskin coat, but to no avail.

He was about to throw it away, when he chanced upon a cow that had just dropped a large pancake of hot manure. The peasant buried the bird in the manure up to its little beak and went on his way. After a time, the hot manure did its work and the bird revived.

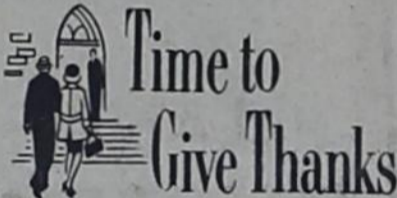
When it revived, it began to sing. A wolf heard it singing, pulled it out and ate it.



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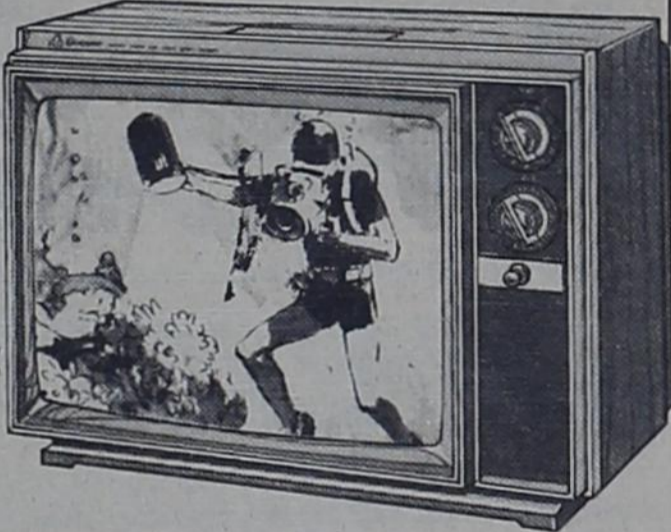
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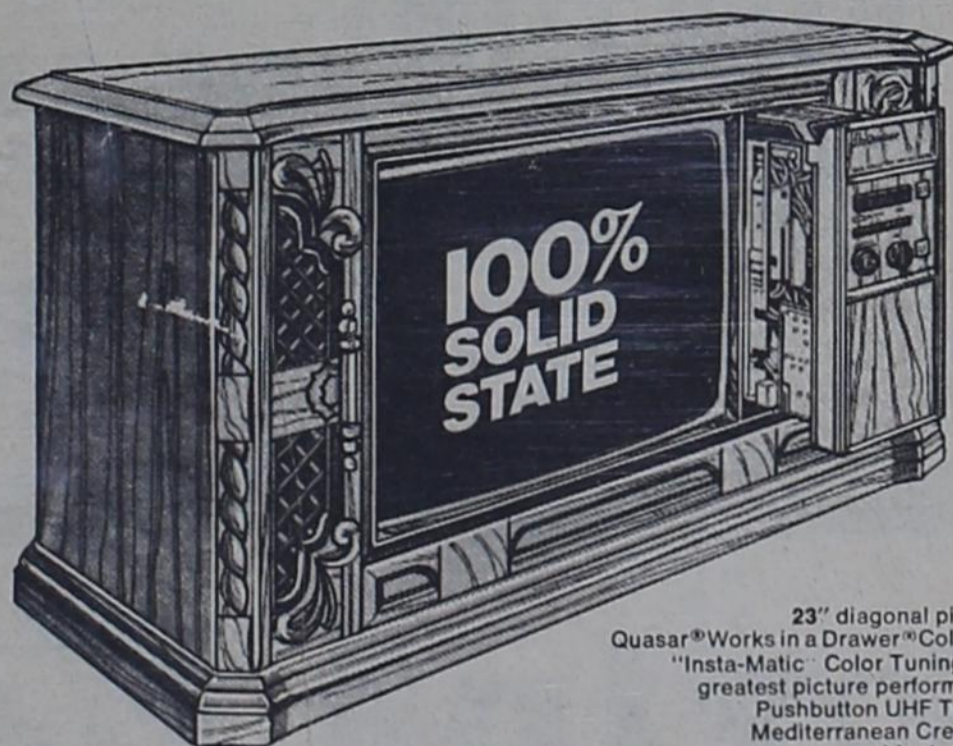
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
