While we didn't know Mr. Sudderth, we had known Mr. Among many other recollections, those of us who Appreciate music will long remember the latter two men for their beautiful voices in their respective church During the past 17 years, give or take a few weeks, Willie has predicted the weather some 884 times for Blade readers with about 85 per cent accuracy.
